Company M drill instructor awarded Silver Star

While performing a route reconnaissance in the Sangin District, Afghanistan, Sgt. Phillip A. McCulloch Jr. and his squad heard an explosion off to the northeast as they were crossing the Helmand River. Moments later his team was ambushed by three machine gun positions. They took cover on the riverbank.

The engagement resulted in McCulloch, squad leader for 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines, Regimental Combat Team 8, 2nd Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force (Forward) Afghanistan, having to make many critical decisions to ensure the safe return of his 21-man team Jan. 8, 2011.

"I've always had aggressive leaders in charge of me, who accepted nothing less than perfection," said McCulloch, 23. "I never second-guessed myself."

McCulloch personally led his squad on the counter-attack, even taking time to destroy an enemy fighting position with an AT-4 anti-armor weapon. His squad then forced their attack-

ers to fall back by maintaining constant pressure and by making use of their air support and indirect fire capabilities.

"I was just doing my job. I wanted to make sure my Marines were safe," said McCulloch, who was born in Arizona but raised in Texas. "It was just another day on the job."

Only after six hours of fighting and with his squad low on ammunition did he return to friendly lines. During the engagement he was wounded in the leg while trying to draw fire to reunite his squad.

For these actions, McCulloch was awarded a Silver Star by Brig. Gen. Daniel D. Yoo, commanding general, MCRD San Diego and the Western Recruiting Region, during a morning colors ceremony aboard Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego Feb. 10.

"He absolutely deserves that medal," said First Sgt. Christopher M. Carlisle, company first sergeant, Company M, 3rd Recruit Training Battalion. "He'll probably see more medals like that in the future. His courage under fire is unwavering. He's the future of the Corps."

The Silver Star is the third

Co. M recruit becomes a Marine - at last

For most Marines, boot camp is a three-month training cycle that seems as though it may never end. For one Marine, this journey was four times as long, and most likely four times as difficult.

Lance Cpl. Max T. Jensen from Appleton, Wis., spent the last 13 months aboard the depot waiting to finish recruit training and earn the title Marine.

"I simply just wanted to become a Marine," said Jenson. "I refused to give up over a minor set back."

Jensen, who is 21-years old, arrived at the depot Jan. 3, 2011 and was picked up by Company M, 3rd Recruit Training Battalion. He was well on his way of earning his Eagle, Globe and Anchor when he was dropped around nine weeks for stress

Only a minor set back is what he was thinking, but what happened next would change his views on injuries all together.

"I was picked up by India Company," said Jensen

"They're helping people that you'll never get to meet," explained Dana Douty, rehabilitation superintendent, San Diego Habitat for Humanity. "They're making a huge difference in these people's lives."

Douty, who rehabilitates homes all over the San Diego area, said that HFH always receives a lot of support from all military branches and that a majority of the volunteers are service members.

The Marines of Co. I began renovation at this site the week before, usually working a seven hour day starting at 8 a.m.

The Marines worked hard on the inside of the three-bedroom, single-story home in El Cajon by putting up drywall, smoothing out the bumps and completing other odd jobs to have the home ready for finishing touches.

Renovating the home proved to be more than just a giving back experience.

"I think everyone benefits from this because we are learning to build a house." Said Staff Sgt. Nicholas DeWeever, drill instructor, Co. I

DeWeever explained that he and the other Marines are learning the basics to home renovation and they may be able to apply these skills in the future.

"There are lots of skills that these Marines bring to the table and here they are able to utilize them for something constructive," said Olson.

The experience gave the Marines a break from the everyday work schedule of their jobs on the depot. The majority of the

Marines who volunteered are drill instructors and renovating the house gave them the chance to break away from the hectic demands of recruit training.

"This gives the Marines the opportunity to do something different," Olson said.

This is Olson's second time volunteering at the site but his first time volunteering with HFH. He believes that HFH, and volunteering in general, opens up many opportunities for his Marines as well as others on the depot.

Lance Cpl. Jaimee Williams, administrative clerk, 3rd Recruit Training Battalion, had no hesitation when she was asked to volunteer for this project.

"I was more than willing to come out," Williams said. "A majority of my family and friends have lived in homes built by Habitat for Humanity, so I understand how important it is for us to come and help out."

The Marines also gained a whole new level of camaraderie while working together to build the home.

The Marines leave the site in a better mood. The fact that they know that they've been productive and doing something for other people makes them feel good, Olson said.

Douty said the work the Marines have completed so far has kept the project right on schedule and HFH appreciated all of their services to the project and for their service to the country.

At the end of the day, the Marines of Co. I walked away from the project knowing that they've completed a good deed.

"You really get more back than you give," Douty said. "They're just a little piece of change in doing something so great for someone in need."

McCulloch has been a drill instructor at the depot since December 2011 and is in his first recruit training cycle.

"With this combat experience, maturity and understanding of the way the Marine Corps works, he is definitely a person I want in front of recruits," said Carlisle.

Throughout his time in the Marine

Corps McCulloch has proven he has what it takes to get the job done.

"His nickname was 'Prodigy,' he stood above his peers," said Carlisle. "He really was made to be an infantry squad leader."

Although McCulloch is the Marine being awarded, it's his squad he would like to recognize for their actions.

"I don't think I earned it. My Marines earned it," said McCulloch. "I wish they could all have one. I recognize them. They definitely earned it in my eyes."

VIRGINIA ARMY NATIONAL **GUARD INSTALLATION** FORT PICKETT, Va. — After finishing a series of refresher exercises, Marines with 2nd Low Altitude Air Defense Battalion, Battery B, began bilateral training with the 36th Canadian Brigade Feb. 20, as part of Exercise South Bound Trooper aboard Virginia Army National Guard Installation Fort Pickett,

The Marines and their Canadian counterparts are executing field scenarios using a Canadian training system called "Weapon Effects Simulator."

"This is a chance for us to showcase our skills and the way we conduct ourselves on the battlefield," said 1st Sgt. Marcus Martinez, first sergeant of Battery B. "We will also learn how the Canadian Army does everything and maybe even learn a bit about ways to improve our tactics."

In today's Global War on Terror, the Marine Corps is accustomed to conducting bilateral operations, said Martinez, and the goal of South Bound Trooper is to reinforce the tactics used with allied forces.

This "Weapons Effects Simulator" system follows the same principles as laser tag with a vest worn by each combatant, linked by a computer and GPS system that tells the participant when they are hit, as well as the severity of the wound or if they have been killed, said Canadian

Mai. Michael I. Gervais, deputy commanding officer with 36th Canadian Brigade Group.

The gear is only a small part of this exercise and the most important aspect is familiarizing the troops with their coalition partners, added Gervais.

"This is the first time we have worked with a Marine land section," he said. "The Marines of LAAD have shown us a lot of different tactics we can utilize, and that is what this exercise is supposed to bring around to us."

Seeing how the Marines do their job prepares us for possible integration during deployments in the future, said Gervais.

By working with the Canadians over the last week, we have been able to get extra work on our two main missions, which are ground-based air defense and providing security posts, said Capt. Jonathan M. Trizila, commanding officer of Battery B.

"This exercise has given us a means to hone our skills on a much larger unit level," Trizila said. "We usually have to simulate different events happening when training on our own."

Everyone, from lance corporals to staff noncommissioned officers is learning a great deal during the exercise, said Trizila.

"Working with the Canadians lets us see the bigger picture about tactics they use," said Cpl. Demingo Lara, a section leader with Battery B. "This event makes Bravo Battery a better team of Marines."

Marine sets bar, saves hit-and-run victim's life

Sgt. Jeremy Caddell, the squadron deputy family readiness officer, Marine Wing Communications Squadron 38, and his fiancée just happened to be driving down Bernardo Center Drive around 12:30 p.m. on July 31 when they noticed a motorcycle accident at the intersection.

Caddell said the accident looked as though it just happened when he got there so he rushed over to aid the victim.

"My initial thought was to make sure no one moved him and to just turn off the motorcycle because there were fluids everywhere," said Caddell.

The victim turned out to be Gunnery Sgt. Dave Smith, training chief, Headquarters and Service Battalion, Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego, who had just been hit by a drunk driver that had fled the scene.

"He rolled me over, cleared my airway and helped keep me (resuscitated) until paramedics arrived," said Smith. "Once the firefighters got on scene he helped a volunteer firefighter roll me over onto the stretchers."

Smith was unconscious from the second the SUV hit the back of his motorcycle until 10 days later. Smiths only knowledge of what happened was from the report. When he finally woke he was informed he sustained lacerations to his liver and kidney, a subdural hematoma and a hematoma in his throat.

To make matters worse, he also suffered an internal decapitation that separated his skull and spine.

Thanks to Caddells selfless act Smith was able to walk out of the hospital three weeks and two days later.

To show thanks, Col. Wayne Sinclair, Headquarters and Service Battalion commanding officer, Marine Corps Recruit Depot, wanted to recognize Caddell by awarding him the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, for playing a major role in the survival of another human being

The ceremony took place on Marine Corps Air Station Miramar on Feb. 15.

"I awarded (Caddell) with this medal as a very small token

to recognize his courage and responsibility toward a fellow human being who just happened to be a Marine," said Sinclair. "I just wish I could do more."

Caddell went above and beyond what was expected of him, reflecting great credit upon

himself, upholding the highest tradition of the United Stated Marine Corps and setting the bar high for his fellow Marines.

who was planning on finishing training and graduating only weeks later.

While participating on the crucible Jensen was conducting a fireman's carry, which is a form of relocating another person from one point to the other, when he felt something pop.

"It didn't feel right and continued to hurt," said Jensen. "I made it through a few more events, but I just couldn't make it to the next staging area. I was sent to see the corpsman."

The corpsman had him take x-rays that would soon verify he had a broken femoral neck. Days later he was recycled back to the Marine Rehabilitation Platoon where he would spend many days healing and working with Navy medical personnel in physical therapy.

Navy medical personnel gave him at least 10 chances to return home, continuously reminding him that injuries of that nature don't do well upon returning to training, but according to Jensen his doctor never gave up hope in him. Eight months down the road he was cleared to return to Company M and complete boot camp.

"The medical care I received was top notch," said Jensen. "I feel that I was very well taken care of and my doctor was a huge inspiration. I am thankful for his time and patience with me from beginning to end."

Those eight months spent rehabilitating wasn't a waste of time. Jensen was able to continue to learn about the Marine Corps and take advantage of what others around him had to offer.

"I was around a lot of different [staff noncommissioned officers]," said Jenson. "I was able to learn about different leadership styles and take something away from them all. I also learned the importance of caring for body and the different types of injuries."

Most families will notice the difference in their Marines right off the bat. Jensen is no exception to this rule as he displayed a great amount of maturity when returning to Co. M.

"His maturity level compared to other recruits was definitely noticeable," said Gunnery Sgt. Jeff Liske, senior drill instructor, Co. M. "He had been around drill instructors so long their work ethic and professionalism must have rubbed off on him."

He was told on 10 separate occasions he could go home, but chose to continue recruit training and refused to let his injuries set back his goals.

Jensen said, he recommends other recruits in position should try to learn everything they can until they return to training, to stay positive and make friends because no matter how bad the injury, goals are always attainable.

Feb. 23, Jensen and the rest of Co. M received their Eagle, Globe and Anchor upon completing the crucible and earned the right to consider themselves part of the world's finest fighting force, the United States Marine Corps.
