


News From the Theater - Camp Buehring, Kuwait - April 2013 Final Edition

TASK FORCE WORKHORSE

Hello Families and Friends of the 935th ASB. I write this article today for myself and CSM Acosta and we want to express our sincere gratitude to the hardworking Soldiers in the 935th ASB. By the time you read this, we have released the reigns of the mighty 935th Workhorse to the strong Spartans of the 449th. Over the last 9 months, the CSM and I have stressed "Support" is in our name and the 276 WORKHORSE Soldiers performed exceptionally well, supporting the 35th CAB and units outside the CAB including the Navy. The outstanding performance of course is accomplished by the hardworking Soldiers. The Soldiers also need good leadership and we had that from the junior to the senior NCOs, Company CDRs all the way to the BN XO.

Each Company had their own unique mission and the Company leadership teams were absolutely key. HSC leadership of MAJ Steiner and 1SG Dorsey were mission focused on Ground Maintenance managing the workflow of 122 pieces of rolling stock. With hard work from dedicated Soldiers, HSC took a 46% Operational Readiness Rate in August to an average Operational Readiness rate of 94% for the last 6 months. Other contributions from HSC were Medical, PSD, and UPAR duties. Great job by the Mustangs!

Alpha Company's mission focus was refuel operations at Patton Army Airfield on Camp Arifjan. LT Holmes and 1SG Lowe's leadership was key to the success at Patton. The refueling operation pumped over 300,000 gallons of JP8 aviation grade fuel into more than 1200 Army, Navy and Marine Helicopters. This refuel operation insured all joint and partnership missions in and out of Patton Army Heliport were a success for 35th CAB. Other key support by Alpha Company was

LOGPAC's and LNO's. Outstanding work by Pillar and Pillar Fox!

The Blacksmiths of Bravo Company, led by MAJ Noppenberger and 1SG Boyer, were the aviation maintenance operations for the 935th. As the largest Company, they had the critical task of leading the aviation maintenance for the 935th and managing the workflow of the Component Repair Platoon (CRP) and the Aviation Maintenance Platoon (ARP). These Platoons completed over 1,600 work orders and over 18,000 man hours of maintenance. Their leadership helped maintain the 35TH CAB aircraft during the 9 month deployment. Great job by the Soldiers in Bravo Company!

Charlie Company was led by LT Maidment and 1SG Holt and they were responsible for the tactical communications of 935th and 35th CAB using the Joint Network Node and Satellite Terminal Transportable. Communication is essential in any operation and Charlie Company did an excellent job supporting 35th CAB partnerships in Kuwait and JSA Georgia. Great Job by the Lightning Soldiers of Charlie Company. As you can see, the performance of the Companies was outstanding and the CSM and I thank them for all the hard work and outstanding support of the 35th CAB.

I want to recognize the hard work of the XO and Staff and the many hours they put in to processing awards, gathering intelligence, planning operations, providing logistic estimates, tracking property, fixing computers, fixing satellite terminals, making safety checks, and listening to Soldiers spiritual needs. Over the last 10 days, we have completed the hand off to the 449th and they are ready to go. With the outstanding leadership team of LTC Hughes and CSM Cazeres, the 449th will move forward with excellent support to the 36th CAB, 135th GSAB and the 501stARB! 1,000 miles....Too easy.

While on deployment Sgt. 1st. Class Shawn Hoehns a Battle NCO has accomplished a great feat and a wonderful physical fitness goal. He has ran over 1,000 miles since we got here in Kuwait back in August.

"My total running miles as of Sunday Apr 7th is 1,113.50 miles. All of those miles were ran on the treadmills at the Buehring Gym, except for the Camp Buerhing Army 10 miler on Oct 21st, the Camp Virgina ½ Marathon on Nov. 18th & the Camp Buehring Marathon on March 3rd," said Hoehns.

He first heard about the Cardio Club at the Camp Buehring Gym from the 29th CAB during the first week here in Kuwait. HE decided to do it because it seemed like a good way to keep track of my running progress throughout the deployment. He also thought 1,000 miles would be a good-realistic & safe challenge to accomplish by the end of the deployment.

He is an avid runner back home and has participated in the Batan Death March for numerous years.

"I do run a lot back home also. Over the years I have run lots of local 5K and 10Ks races. I have also been a member on the Missouri National Guard's team which ran the Bataan Death March/Marathon in 2010, 2011 & 2012, at White Sands Missile Base in New Mexico. If you have never heard of it... that is a very tough race, because you are running across a desert & up a mountain (all in your ACUs & boots). So yes, I do plan to keep on running various local races again and I plan on making the MONG Bataan Death March team again in 2014 and do it for several more years after that," said Hoehns.

He ran the last marathon in a very respectable time of four hours and two minutes.

As an NCO he leads by example on how fitness is important for his Soldiers.

Congratulations on this remarkable accomplishment. Now all the running left to be done, is him running home to see his family, as the deployment is almost over!
