For more than 10 years, the country of Bosnia and Herzegovina and the Maryland National Guard (MDNG) have been training and operating alongside one another as a result of the State Partnership Program (SPP). During the last decade, the MDNG has provided a wide range of support to the Armed Forces of Bosnia and Herzegovina (AF BiH) consisting of the exchange of best practices, equipment provision, and training. These resources have significantly enhanced our capabilities, professionalization, modernization, and have furthered our goal to officially being recognized as a NATO country.

The 115th MP BN was the main axis of advance in developing and moving this partnership a step forward dur-

ing multiple personnel exchanges and training events. Whether our Soldiers were located in Bosnia or Maryland, we lived and trained together at the individual, team, and collective levels as brothers in arms. Our forces made it through the intensive training and emerged on the other side as a cohesive unit that resembles much more than a simple partnership. The culmination of our combined efforts was the realization that we would soon join one another in combat in Kandahar, Afghanistan.

In 2012, senior leaders of both the National Guard and AF BiH recognized the successful integration of our forces into the 115th MP BN as a result of our relationships, skills, capabilities, and interoperability. Once the decision was final, we again embarked on an intensive training regimen located in Bosnia, Germany, and the US that focused on the mission essential task mentorship operations with the Afghan Uniformed Police (AUP). The Soldiers of the AF BiH performed at a very high level and exceeded the standard throughout the final training period, further demonstrating our value and devotion to the mission.

Since January 2013, AF BiH Soldiers have served shoulder to shoulder with Maryland's Finest in Kandahar City contributing to the safety and security of it's people. Not long ago, our country was an international forces consumer, now a short time later, we are providing value and helping those in need. That fact alone is a great source of pride for our Soldiers, and I can say with certainty that we look forward to future contributions to global security and becoming a member of the NATO family.
