Family, Friends, and Soldiers:

I hope this message finds all of you well as the days of summer continue to fall from the calendar. As we enter the month of August, our Soldiers will be hard at work and focused on our transition from theater to home station. To give everyone a sense for the chronology of events from now until block leave, I'll provide a few critical benchmarks for everyone to plan against;

(1) Our final redeployment teleconference with Fort Bliss will be conducted on 08AUG, where key leaders will discuss the status of everything from personnel files, equipment, and travel arrangements. *Once the unit arrives at Fort Bliss, our travel arrangements back home will be finalized, and our arrival**

date will be disseminated through the Battalion Commander and Family Readiness Group (FRG)***

- (2) In the middle of August, most of the unit's remaining equipment will be shipped back to Fort Bliss to minimize our load when we fly from Kandahar Airfield to Manas. Please note: some of your Soldiers have accumulated personal items that will need to be shipped back home before we depart, so thank you in advance for your support and flexibility. Each Soldier is only authorized to carry 1x duffle bag, 1x ruck sack, and 1x carry on bag.
- (3) Towards the end of the month, our transition with the 2nd Cavalry Regiment will begin. Transition is a busy time for many of us as we'll be engaged with members of the new unit exchanging best practices and providing an overview of what we've accomplished the past 8 months. This is one of the most critical tasks the unit will accomplish during our time here, and will set the conditions for the inbound unit to build on our success. Simultaneously, we will be saying farewell to our partners from Bosnia and Herzegovina, who will be flying back home to their loved ones for some much deserved time off.
- (4) Upon completion of our transition, the unit will move from FOB Walton to Kandahar Airfield, and prepare to fly to Manas. Once the unit lands in Manas, our stay will last approximately 24-48 hours, then onto Fort Bliss for demobilization.
- (5) Demobilization at Fort Bliss will last anywhere from 10-14 days.

As days continue to drop from the calendar, it's only natural for our minds to shift to homecoming and getting a sense for the timeline. I can assure you that planning and execution for our movement is well underway, and I remain confident that it will be a smooth transition not only for our Soldiers, but loved ones as well.
