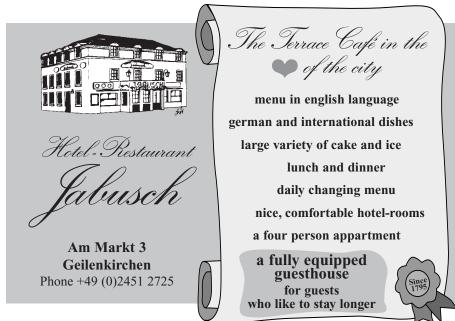

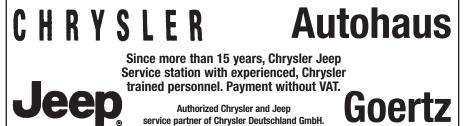

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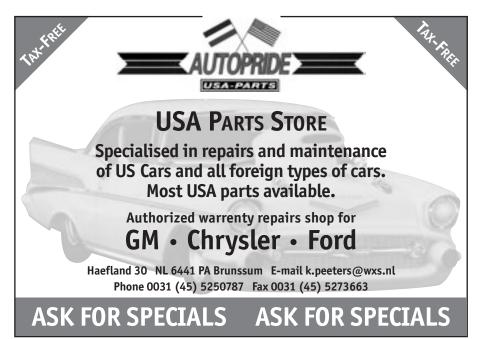
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New names within NATO

The NATO headquarters ALLIED FORCES NORTH EUROPE (AFNORTH) located in Brunssum, the Netherlands, changed its name to Joint Force Command (JFC) Headquarters Brunssum. The headquarters in Brunssum was originally called Allied Forces Central Europe (AFCENT) in 1967 and was transformed to Regional Headquarters Allied Forces North Europe (AFNORTH) in 2000. The name change reflects the new streamlined NATO Command Structure, as a result of the 2002 Prague NATO Summit. JFC HQ Brunssum is the headquarters for the JFC Brunssum command which also consists of three component commands; Component Command (CC) Air Headquarters in Ramstein, Germany, CC-Land Headquarters in Heidelberg, Germany, and CC-Maritime Headquarters in Northwood, United Kingdom.

At operational level the NATO command structure consists of two Joint Force Commands (JFCs), one in Brunssum, the Netherlands and one in Naples, Italy. In addition, a smaller Joint Headquarters (JHQ) was activated in Lisbon, Portugal, specifically designed to command a sea-based CJTF operation from an afloat command platform.

Each JFC will be assisted by three commands, each specializing in land, air and maritime operations. The JFC Naples Land Component Command (CC-Land) was established on 1 July 04 at Madrid, Spain.

Allied Naval Forces Southern Europe (NAVSOUTH) converted into the Component Command maritime (CC-Mar) Naples. Similarly, Headquarters Allied Forces Southern Europe (AIRSOUTH), currently based in Naples, will relocate to Turkey and become the Component Command Air (CC-Air) Izmir on 11 August 04. Operating under CC-Air Izmir, there will be Combined Air Operations Centres (CAOCs) at Poggio Renatico, Italy and Larissa, Greece.

With the implementation of the new NCS, the Joint Sub-Regional Commands that were established in 1999 at Izmir (Turkey), Larissa (Greece), Madrid (Spain) and Verona (Italy) will stand down.

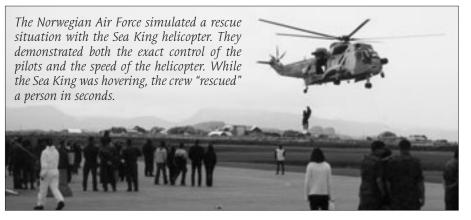

essential. For visitors whose interest in flying was inspired, two flight simulators were open. The simulators were very authentic and had lots of capabilities. Guests could choose whether to fly an F16 Fighting Falcon or a Lynx helicopter. Those who decided for the F16 were amazed by the "dogfights" this system could offer.

The crew of Squadron 2 didn't notice all of this, however. As the busy day went by and they could finally finish their work the airshow was already closing. The second and last day was much like the first, except for the training flight back that extended the arrival home.

Heads of State and Government also gave direction to develop a package of high-tech capabilities to protect civilians and forces from terrorist attacks.

These will include defences against weapons of mass destruction, protection of wide body aircraft against shoulder launched missiles; protection of rotary wings (helicopter blades) for aircraft from ground threats; protection of harbours and vessels; improvised explosive devices (covers all types of 'home-made' bombs); detection of mines.

These new measures build on what the Alliance is already doing through its operations, including patrols in the Mediterranean, operations against terrorist groups with links to the Al-Quaida network in the Balkans, as well as cooperation with partners.

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Aircraft ageless in Arizona Desert

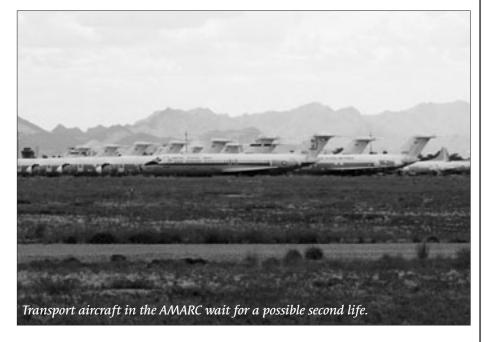
The state of Arizona contains some of the most spectacular scenery in the whole of the United States. The Grand Canyon is just one of the highlights. Besides that, from the desert floor to the highest pine-covered mountain peak, Arizona's renowned sunshine ensures that nearly every day is perfect. This warmth, along with its low rainfall and humidity and its hard-baked soil, make it a perfect place for a storage facility for war surplus aircraft, which could be preserved for possible use at a later date when needed.

Adjoining the base is AMARC, or the Aerospace Maintenance And Regeneration Centre, a joint-service facility managed by the U.S. Air Force Material Command. Often referred to as 'The Boneyard', AMARC is an aerospace storage and maintenance facility, which provides a service to all branches of the US military (Air Force, Navy, Marines and Army), as well as the Coast Guard and other national agencies.

Its mission is to store and maintain aircraft, and other aerospace vehicles, withdraw aircraft from storage, reclaim parts, and to prepare aircraft for disposal after they are no longer needed and when all required parts have been removed. The centre also stores a variety of aerospace-related items such as production tooling, pylons, engines, etc. During wartime or contingencies, AMARC is often tasked to withdraw airframes and components. Some aircraft depart by overland (rail or truck) or air shipment, while others fly out of AMARC, under their own power.

For many 'dismissed' military aircraft, Davis-Monthan AFB, near Tucson, is the last stop. But some of them start a second life. As in earlier operations at Korea and Vietnam, the Pentagon recalled A-10 Thunderbolts for Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Reclamation involves the removal of parts and assemblies from stored aircraft in support of customer needs. Parts are cleaned, inspected, bench checked and packaged prior to shipment. In many cases the item is no longer in production, and the supply by AMARC can save customers large amounts of time and money.



It also encompasses special projects, such as the elimination of B-52 Stratofortresses under the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty (START). Beginning in 1993, hundreds and hundreds of B-52 and F-111 aircraft have been scrapped. The process originally involved dropping a large blade nicknamed The Executioner from a crane onto the aircraft in three places, severing the wings and fuselage like a guillotine. A new process of surgical cuts involving large circular saws commenced in 1999.

The area on which AMARC now stands originally held Tucson's municipal airport, which was opened around 1919 and subsequently became a military establishment. The first aircraft to arrive for storage were B-29 Superfortresses and C-47 Dakotas in early 1946. By mid-1946, more than 900 aircraft were present and by July 1960 this total had risen to over 4,000. Today approximately 4,200 aircraft join each other in rows on the 2,600 acres (1 acre is 4,047 m²) area.

Many of the aircraft are damaged, but could provide parts to still-flying comrades. Others support exercises used by maintenance personnel to familiarize them with improvised repairs under wartime conditions. This is no problem for the facility because the stock is huge. Especially from aircraft which were once the backbone of the U.S. Air Force, like the F-4 Phantom and the B-52 Stratofortress.

Not all of the aircraft are retired. Also in the desert collection are modern aircraft. Many F-15 Eagles and F-16 Falcons have found their place on the hard baked soil. Some of them are waiting for a second life. Others, due to the age of the airframe find their definite end at AMARC. The more lucky ones that are still usable have the chance for a second life with a foreign air force. Selected aircraft are withdrawn from storage and prepared for the customer.

Aircraft arriving at AMARC for storage go through several preservation and protection processes during their stay. Initially a unique 'Production Control Number' is issued to each aircraft, and this is the number it is known by during its stay at the facility. The aircraft is then stripped of any weaponry, ejection seat charges and classified items, and then thoroughly evaluated and inspected by the approximately 600 employees there.

Fuel is drained and the system purged with lightweight oil to protect it from corrosion. The aircraft is then towed to the 'Wash Rack' where it is washed with a corrosion inhibitor. The sealing process then takes place as engine intakes, exhausts and any other gaps are covered and taped up. These taped areas and fragile surfaces such as canopies and radomes are then covered with non-hardening vinyl plastic. First a layer of black vinyl to keep out dust and water is applied, followed by a white vinyl that is designed to maintain the internal temperature of the aircraft to within fifteen degrees of the surrounding air and prevent damage from sand storms. After four years, the protective layer is stripped away and the whole protection process repeated.

AMARC inventory shows different aircraft types. Besides the already mentioned F-4, B-52, F-15 and F-16 more than forty other types can be found. Some of the more unusual aircraft to have been stored at AMARC over the years are a sizeable group of Soviet designed MiG fighter aircraft. The exact history of these aircraft is not yet fully known, but what is known is that the majority of them were imported to the USA from Poland during the mid to late eighties.

To keep AMARC rolling costs \$20 million per year. At first sight it seems that the price is high, but the opposite is true. During an average year it saves the American taxpayer several tens to hundreds of millions of dollars.

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Traffic is everyone's business

It seems that many Component members do not have a clear idea how dangerous it can be on the roads within the boundaries of the NATO Air Base. Quite a number of drivers - and there is no difference between drivers of a duty or a private car – are just ignoring the traffic rules laid down in Component Directive 05-127 (Traffic Policy) and the German Road Traffic Code (Straßenverkehrsordnung). The following information is provided to give everybody an impression of traffic offences and accidents that have occurred since the beginning of this year.

Speeding

This year, the International Military Police (IMP) cited 101 speeding violators between 1 January and 31 May. Within the boundaries of NATO Air Base Geilenkirchen, the general speed limit is 35 km per hour. Only on NATO Avenue between 1st Street and 7th Street and between Gate 162/Civil Guard and the West Gate the

speed limit is 50 km per hour. All speed limits are clearly posted.

Parking

The IMP observed 202 parking violations during the last six months. Generally, parking is only permitted in designated parking areas/slots. Parking is prohibited on yellow or white marked curbs, in front of fire hydrants, in driveways, on grass, unpaved surfaces or seeded areas, at building entrances, in reserved parking slots, or in any other way negatively affecting safety or creating a traffic hazard. Furthermore, vehicle operators are not allowed to take more than one parking slot, to park on roads, or to impede the flow of traffic.

Other violations

61 Other traffic-related violations were observed by the IMP. This includes stop sign violations, not using seatbelts, using mobile phones while driving and all other moving and non-moving violations.

Suspension of base driving privileges In the future, the International Military Police will strictly enforce violations against our Component's traffic rules to make our roads safe.

Your base driving privileges may be suspended when you build up the following traffic points:

- 1 month suspension for 10-14 points within a 12-month period
- 2 months suspension for 15-19 points within the same 12-month
- Longer suspension by decision of SWC for 20 and more points within the same 12-month period The Traffic point system does not apply to parking violations. Parking violations will result in a special
- 1 month suspension for 3 parking tickets in a 12-month period
- 2 months suspension for 4 parking tickets in the same 12-month period
- 3 months suspension for 5 parking tickets in the same 12-month period
- Longer suspension by decision of the Base Support Wing commander for 6 parking tickets or more in the same 12-month period

A few words about traffic accidents

38 traffic accidents were reported to the IMP between 1 January and 15 June 04. Almost every fourth day a traffic accident occurs on NAB Geilenkirchen. This includes accidents with duty vehicles, privately owned vehicles or fixed objects. One in every ten accidents is a "Hit and Run case".

All personnel are reminded that it is everybody's responsibility to ensure

that the operator of a vehicle that has caused damage to another vehicle or a fixed object is aware of that fact. It is not enough to leave a note on the damaged vehicle with your personal information. According to the rules on NAB Geilenkirchen, anybody involved in any kind of traffic accident, even if you think it is not so important or the damage is only a minor, must report this immediately to the IMP ext. 4819.

Also, if you witness a traffic accident, always report it to the IMP, ext. 4819, even if the driver has stated he/she would do so. Your statement could be important. Don't forget that next time it could be your vehicle.

Driving off base

If you are violating traffic rules outside the base, either in Germany or the Netherlands, you will be punished with a notice of payment, loss of driving privileges or immediate loss of your driving license, depending on the type of violation you will also be subject to disciplinary action.

Drive safely!

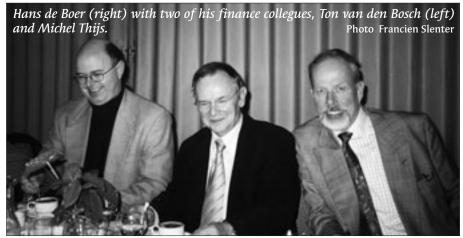

After my national duties were finished in April 1967, Headquarters AFCENT moved from Fontainebleau, France to Brunssum, The Netherlands. Not many

French civilians were willing to follow this move resulting in quite a number of civilian vacancies at the new location. Since I was still single and did not have specific ideas what to do, I decided to apply for a NATO civilian position with the idea to temporarily work for NATO. Needless to say that "temporarily" lasted for 37 years. Over these years, I held positions in the Civilian Personnel Office and the Budget & Finance Division in the following commands: Headquarters AFCENT, Brunssum, The Netherlands; Headquarters SHAPE, Mons, Belgium; Headquarters LANDJUT, Rendsburg, Germany and finally the E-3A Component, Geilenkirchen, Germany. My last position was that of the Chief, Fiscal & Accounting Branch.

I would like to thank NATO for the career opportunities over the last 37 years. I would also like to thank all those who paid tribute during my farewell reception at the Officer's Club on 28 May 2004. After retirement we moved to Sittard, The Netherlands what is close enough to stay in contact.



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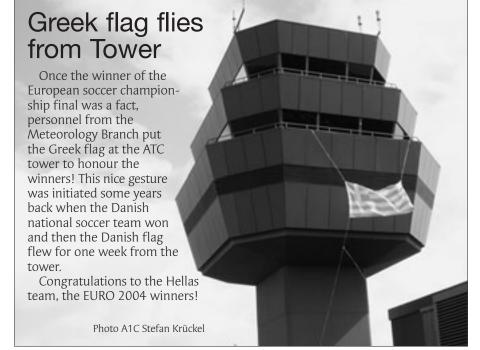
