

# Component faces Consolidated Inspection


The Force Commander announced recently the schedule for the next Consolidated Inspection (CI) of the E-3A Component. Set for 30 May through 10 June, the CI will be conducted by a team of about 60 inspectors from Force Command and SHAPE.

Different from a Tactical Evaluation which focuses on how a unit functions in war or crisis situations, a Consolidated Inspection focuses on day-to-day processes. According to Component Commander Brig. Gen. Axel Tüttelmann, it will be a lot of work getting ready for the Cl, but it is also an opportunity for the Component to improve how it does business.

"The idea of this inspection is twofold: First, the implementation status of higher headquarters policies, directives, orders and manuals will be verified. Second, the inspection will identify areas where process improvements can or should be achieved," said Gen. Tüttelmann.

To ensure a well-organized effort to prepare for the inspection, Gen. Tüttelmann asked the Plans and Programs office (PPC) to create a working group with representatives from around the Component. The team is working to review issues from previous inspections, as well as to help prepare Component members for the next one.

In an effort to improve the information flow, the team created a special web site on the WISE page. According to Maj. Glenn Whittingham,

Canadian Air Force, the deputy chairman of the CI preparation team, the WISE page has important information all Component members need to be aware of.

"We tried to make the site as user friendly as possible and everyone should pay special attention to the self-inspection checklist," said Maj. Whittingham. "If someone goes through that, they will be a long way towards succeeding in the actual CI."

The CI team has already identified several areas important as the Component prepares. According

to Brig. Gen. Tüttelmann, the most important areas are awareness and commitment of all individual Component members to make the CI a success.

"It is critical that everyone on the Component be aware that this evaluation is going to happen and that each one of us will play an important role in how well the Component does", said the commander.

According to Maj. Whittingham, individual preparation is the key to success. "We've seen in the past that most write-ups during a Cl can be avoided, some even easily avoided.

A good example is making sure publications are not outdated. A little bit of time invested now can make a big difference later."

All Component members with access to the WISE page are encouraged to review the CI section. "We've all been through inspections and evaluations before and I know that we will pull together as we always do", concluded Brig. Gen. Tüttelmann. "Let's show the CI team and NATO the first class, professional team that we are."

# German NCO Association donates to social institutions

On 9 March E-3A Component Commander Brig. Gen. Axel R. Tüttelmann and Base Support Wing commander Col. Reinhard Mack hosted the ceremony handing over a €15,000 donation from the German NCO association to social institutions in Geilenkirchen and surrounding area. The Association's representative, MSgt. Norbert Tryb, gave a short speech. Then Brig. Gen. Axel R. Tüttelmann praised the effort.

"I'm happy that some nations do more work than necessary on their own and are able to help social institutions to give youth a better education."

The donations were given to 29 institutions, mostly schools, Kindergartens and institutions for disabled people. The money will be used to buy new toys, music instruments, or for the modernization of buildings and computer systems. Especially today during difficult economic times, it is very important

that private organizations help such institutions.

As they received the donations from the E-3A Component commander, a representative from each organization took the time to say "Thanks" and to tell about the institution and how they would use the donation.

# NATO Mid-Term aircraft returns to Seattle

After 16 days at Geilenkirchen and several flights in the crowded airspace of central Europe, the NATO Mid-Term Program aircraft, known as N-1, went back to Boeing Field in Seattle, Washington on 15 March.

The Euro deployment of the Mid-Term aircraft provided Boeing the opportunity to test the new systems on the aircraft in the dense airspace environment of central Europe.

This was the first time since the aircraft left Germany in 2003 that it has been back in Europe to test the new systems. According to the Component's Program Manager, Maj. David Gaedecke, Component support for the complex Euro deployment went exceedingly well.

In addition to the support from various Component organizations, the tests required coordination and support from Force Command, the NATO AEW&C Program Management Agency, and the Electronic Systems Center at Hanscom Air Force Base in the U.S.

"It took the cooperation and hard work of many people to make sure this all came together," Maj. Gaedecke said. "Members from each Wing in the Component pitched in to support the program and Boeing during these 2 weeks. It was a quite an undertaking and the entire Component team did a great job."

During the deployment, the Mid-Term jet flew five times in an effort to demonstrate interoperability in the European airspace. Two of the flights were used to support Boeing test requirements. The other three flights were operational assessment opportunities flown by Lt Col Doug Kieser's "bunker" test crew.

The aircraft completed tests with various European ground agencies, exchanging data and communications with NATO Air Operations Centers, worked with British fighters, and established links with other Component E-3As.

According to Maj. Gaedecke, despite serious lingering problems with system stability, the tests were a step forward.

"We're still working with the team to identify and solve some problems with the system. However, we've come a long way and are looking forward to the [Operational Test and Evaluation] phase scheduled to happen later this year."

In addition to the flight testing, the visit to Geilenkirchen included a mandatory mid-phase inspection of the aircraft by the Logistics Wing.

"Because of the compressed schedule, [the Log Wing's Mid-Term rep], Mr. Jos Meertens worked with his leadership to have people on duty during the weekend to complete the phase inspection" said Maj. Gaedecke. "This was a huge effort and they were successful at getting the jet back in the air and keeping the program on schedule."

The schedule calls for the Mid-Term aircraft to return to Geilenkirchen in August for the Operational Test and Evaluation. After NATO officially signs tail 453 back into the fleet in Seattle this summer, more than 80 personnel from the Component will participate in test activities.

# NATO ready to deepen partnership with Ukraine

Meeting with President Viktor Yushchenko at NATO on 22 February, NATO leaders expressed support for Ukraine's reform agenda and agreed to strengthen cooperation with the country.

At the special NATO-Ukraine Summit, President Yuschenko outlined to NATO Heads of State and Government his plans and priorities for the reform process in Ukraine. Alliance leaders, who expressed support for Ukraine's ambition of Euro-Atlantic integration, welcomed these.

Strong support

'NATO is ready to work with you', NATO Secretary General Jaap de Hoop Scheffer said at a joint press conference with President Yuschenko. The Secretary General said that NATO stands ready to 'sharpen and refocus' the existing cooperation, carried out in

the existing cooperation, carried out in the framework of the NATO-Ukraine Action Plan, to support the President's priorities. The need to make full use of the

The need to make full use of the existing mechanisms was stressed by President Yuschenko. "Ukraine has made its position clear about joining the Membership Action Plan", he told

reporters, "At the same time it means that our country will be also using the possibilities that are provided by the existing instruments for cooperation, meaning the Action Plan between NATO and Ukraine."

As an expression of its determination to enhance cooperation, NATO has launched a project to help Ukraine deal with the dangerous legacy of old ammunitions and small arms and light weapons stockpiles. This 25-million euro initiative is the largest of its kind ever undertaken in the world.

The Secretary General also paid tribute to the people of Ukraine, saying they had shown the way to democracy. This was the highest-level meeting between NATO and Ukraine since the 2004 presidential election in the country.





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


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# The lucky ones picked the special eggs


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
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
