It has finally arrived—aircraft 90453. For the NATO Mid-Term insider this jet is better known as N-1. After almost six years at the **Boeing facilities in Seattle,** Washington, the first NATO Mid-Term upgraded E-3A arrived on 24 August at the Main Operating Base, Geilenkirchen. With the arrival of this aircraft, another step has been taken towards the Mid-Term upgrade for the entire fleet, the biggest and most cost-intensive project ever for the NATO E-3A fleet.

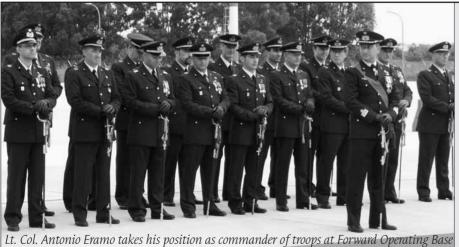
After a Mid-Term upgrade, everything in the main cabin of the E-3A from the front door to the Radar Technician position will look different. The crew will fly with 14 instead of nine operator consoles. The working station for the computer specialist, called the Data Technician (DT), is gone and the DT, now called the System Technician, will be right next to the Communication Technician. The position of Communication Operator will no longer exist on board the E-3A. The mainframe computer will be replaced by a server, and each of the working stations has its own state-ofthe-art PC with a 21-inch or 17- inch flat screen display. The mission software is based on Unix technology and has more than 5 million lines of code. In comparison, our legacy operational software has 350,000 lines of code. In state-of-the-art terms, the Mid-Term E-3A is one of the first flying command and control platforms where Commercial Off The Shelf (COTS) technology has been put to use. Additionally, radios (VHF and Sat COM), Multi-Sensor Integration with Mode-S interrogation capability and an integrated GPS/INS system are available.

But before the NAEW&C Force Command and NAPMA sign the final fleet retrofit decision for the remaining 16 aircraft and the mission simulators, the Component will run an extensive and robust Operational Test and Evaluation (OT&E) program on the jet.

A total of 14 preplanned and clearly defined test sorties will be flown, including a major NATO exercise to prove the operational capability of the newly installed system.

# New Commander takes reins at FOB Trapani

The Forward Operating Base (FOB) at Trapani, Italy, received a new commander on 29 August as Lt. Col. Antonio Eramo took the reins from Col. Alfonso Dalle Nogare. Component Commander Brig. Gen. Axel R. Tüttelmann presided over the ceremony.

The new commander comes to the FOB with a great deal of experience in NATO AWACS operations as he completes more than four years assigned to the Main Operating Base here in Squadrons 1 and 2 and in the Operations Wing. Lt. Col. Eramo has flown more than 1,600 hours on the E-3A and supported a range of operations during his time in Geilenkirchen including Eagle Assist, Crescent Guard, and Distinguished Games.

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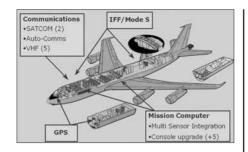

In advance of the big event, the Component sent mission crews from Training Wing and Operations Wing as well as specialists from IT Wing and Logistics Wing to the Boeing facilities in Seattle, where Boeing specialists trained the crews on the new system.

But because operational testing has its own requirements and procedures, an extensive one-week course was also conducted at NAPMA, Brunssum, the Netherlands, to prepare the crews for this difficult tasking.

The basement of the Information Technology Wing (IT) building will be used for the FOT&E mission planning and has received a lot of new equipment. A new server in support of NATO Mid-Term mission planning has been installed in the IT Wing. Other preparations have been completed in the Logistics Wing. During the next weeks a number of unfamiliar faces will be on the base including not only folks from NAPMA and Force Command but also many Boeing representatives here to support this testing.

Assuming the tests are positively completed and the final decision to start the fleet retrofit is made, the next aircraft will leave the MOB this November to fly to the European Air Defense and Space (EADS) facilities in Manching, Germany, just 80 km north of Munich, where all remaining E-3A's will be retrofitted. The last aircraft will be due back in Geilenkirchen at the beginning of 2009. At the same time, Mission Simulator I will be shut down and will never be on line again in its configuration. It is scheduled to be operational again with the NATO Mid-Term system around June 2006.

With arrival of tail #453 at Geilenkirchen, you will see our base changing over the next three years with many challenges that will definitely impact the Component's way of doing business. But with the completion of the retrofit program we will have the most sophisticated airborne C21 system in the world.

While the Plans and Programs Division, Modernization Branch, is the management agency for the Mid-Term Project within the Component, this is not the only modernization project at the Component. With the implementation of a new autopilot for the TCA to ensure the reliability of this aircraft's Reduced Vertical Separation Minima (RVSM), other projects like Large Aircraft Infrared Counter Measures (LAIRCM) might come up in the near future.

After two years in my position as E-3A Component Commander, I had the privilege to be selected as the new NAEW&C Force Commander. After just turning over the Component to Brigadier General Schmidt, I want to emphasize how much I enjoyed my time here and how privileged I feel to have served as your Commander.

What we have accomplished in the past few years is remarkable. When I arrived, we had just started to prepare for a first-of-its kind TACEVAL. With close cooperation, professionalism and teamwork, we successfully met that challenge. As my first experience with NATO AWACS teamwork, I found that it set the stage for the many challenges and successes to follow.

After the TACEVAL, we plunged into a long series of more than 20 highvisibility events, augmenting security for a variety of nations, spanning the range from NATO Summits to the Summer Olympics in Greece and the Pope's funeral in Italy. Again, we tackled each of these missions and achieved a near-perfect record. We have also successfully faced a variety of other challenges. For instance, we have made great strides adapting to and implementing substantial changes in our Peacetime Establishment. We completed a base-wide Consolidated Inspection, and came out with high marks. And just this June, everyone pulled together to host over twentyfive thousand visitors during our International Cultural Festival—yet another great accomplishment by our team.

You are aware that the overall framework for the Component has been changing. NATO is adapting to become a leaner, more mobile force that can be employed across a broad spectrum, both within and beyond its traditional boundaries. The Component has been shaping itself to meet these new challenges. The present priorities include preparing for the NATO Response Force, due to be fully operational in October 2006, and for potential out-of-area operations. Important steps towards implementing increased capabilities have already been taken. However, the adaptation process has to continue. Doctrine, training and equipment are in some parts still under revision, and others need to be fully implemented. But I look to the future with optimism. We are on the right track, and I have no doubt this Force will rise to the challenges ahead.

These challenges can only be successfully implemented with people—the right people. This was my key experience at this Component. It is the multi-national character that makes this flying unit so unique in NATO. AWACS is one of the most visible examples in NATO that the concept of multi-nationality does work. I could see highly motivated military and

civilian personnel who tackled each and every task with dedication, determination and professionalism. I also experienced the successful process of integrating over 300 newcomers of 12 different nations into the Component each year, and saw how quickly these new members got focused on the common mission and adapted to the international environment.

For me, working in this environment is a lifetime experience that I would not have wanted to miss. You, the Component members, have represented your nations well, and your individual contribution has been indispensable to accomplish our mission. This also applies to our more than 900 civilians who hugely contribute to the overall success. All the men and women of the Component who have served over the years with NAEW&CF can take pride in their contribution to peace and security.

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# NAS Keflavik gate between

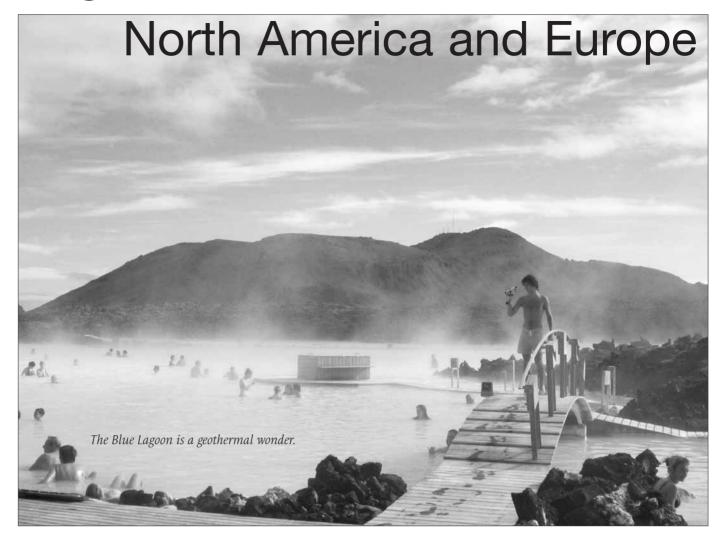

Several times per year personnel from the E-3A Component take up their duty in Iceland to perform training and testing with the Iceland Defence Force, which represents a NATO and U.S. commitment to the defence of Iceland and supports the country's commitment to the common security of the Alliance. Naval Air Station (NAS) Keflavik hosts our men and women. Time for an introduction.

The country is an important member of NATO, located strategically in the North Atlantic. It has been key to keeping the air and sea connections open between North America and Europe for more than 50 years. The importance of Iceland continues to be underscored. It's essential for any European build-up or contingency operation nearby where United States or NATO forces must move large amount of troops and supplies. It also provides an effective base for maritime patrol aircraft from its NATO allies, in addition to supporting essential communications and fighter aircraft operations.

The Iceland Defence Force was established in 1951 following the signing of a Defence Agreement between the governments of Iceland and the United States at the suggestion of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. The Force is composed of U.S. Air Force and Navy units under the joint command of a Navy Rear Admiral. Naval aviation units can be deployed to conduct maritime patrol operations and the Air Force 85th Group is responsible for air defence. A minimum of four F-15 or F-16 fighter jets and one KC-135 tanker aircraft that can refuel them in flight are stationed in Iceland on a rotational deployment. NAS Keflavik provides all the service and support facilities needed by the operational units including the airfield.

Four radar stations observe air traffic in the Iceland area. Normal air traffic is coordinated with the international air control facility in Reykjavik, the country's capital. If an aircraft enters the Iceland air defence zone, which is international airspace up to the twelvemile territorial limit, and cannot be identified through flight plans or other means, the defence force takes the responsibility for identifying it.



As the most of the flights over water the Defence Force must have an efficient, fast reacting rescue capability. Five Sikorsky HH-60G 'Pavehawk' Helicopters from the 56th Rescue Squadron are stationed at NAS Keflavik. The rescue services are ready for anyone at the request of the Iceland Coast Guard. It has been credited with saving more than 300 lives since 1971.

The primary mission of NAS Keflavik is to maintain and operate facilities and provide services and material to support operations of aviation activities and units of the operating forces of the Navy and other activities and units, as designated by the Chief of Naval Operations. The Iceland Defence Force is composed of about 1,350 military men and women who live on the base together with approximately 1,800 family members. NAS Keflavik is the thirteenth largest population centre in Iceland, providing its 3,150 residents with all general services. Additionally, one NATO staff officer from Denmark and Norway are assigned.

Direct working for the Defence Force are 660 Icelanders in a wide range of jobs, and the Icelandic contractor companies that operate for the Defence Force employ another 450 workers at

any particular time.

Iceland is an island of almost 103,000 square kilometres. The coastline is dotted with more than one hundred fjords – and green, fertile valleys extend from them. It also has more than 10,000 waterfalls and countless hot springs.

The population numbers almost 300,000 from which more than half lives in the Reykjavik area. Situated on the Mid-Atlantic Ridge, the country is a hot spot of geothermal activity. Thirty post-glacial volcanoes have erupted in the past two centuries, and natural hot water supplies much of the population with cheap, pollution-free heating and bathing water.

Located at various sites within 40 kilometres from NAS Keflavik swimming pools can be found. The most unique, invigorating and exciting experience is the Blue Lagoon, a geothermal spa, known for its healing powers. The water stays warm and inviting at 36° Celsius year round. The lagoon is rich in a unique natural combination of minerals, and blue green algae and white silica mud give the lagoon its soft milky aquamarine color.

Whether you choose to bathe surrounded by snow in the middle of the winter or while enjoying the long summer daylight, Iceland is a relaxing atmosphere after a long flight or long day of maintenance work.



# 1.3 Million landmines to be destroyed in Serbia and Montenegro

A special facility where 1.3 million landmines will be destroyed under a NATO Trust Fund project was opened on 17 August in Kragujevac, Serbia and Montenegro. This the second NATO Trust Fund project to be carried out in Serbia and Montenegro and will help the country to meet its obligations under the international Mine Ban Treaty.

The project will see the safe destruction of over 1.3 million antipersonnel landmines currently stockpiled in 57 different locations in Serbia and Montenegro.

#### **Eliminating weapons**

The project will also enhance the capacity of Kragujevac plant to

conduct other demilitarisation projects in the coming years. Under NATO's Partnership for Peace Trust Fund, NATO and partner countries help fund projects to assist Alliance partner countries in the safe destruction of stockpiled landmines, munitions and weapons.

To date, more than 2 million landmines, as well as thousands of tonnes of munitions and thousands of small arms have been safely eliminated under the programme. Canada and Austria are the lead nations for the project. Funding is also provided by Bulgaria, the Czech Republic, Hungary, Ireland, the Netherlands, Norway, Sweden and Switzerland.

NATO's Supply and Maintenance Agency (NAMSA) is the executing agent for the project. Representatives of Serbia and Montenegro, the donor countries and NAMSA attended the opening ceremony, and it was followed by a tour of the destruction facilities.

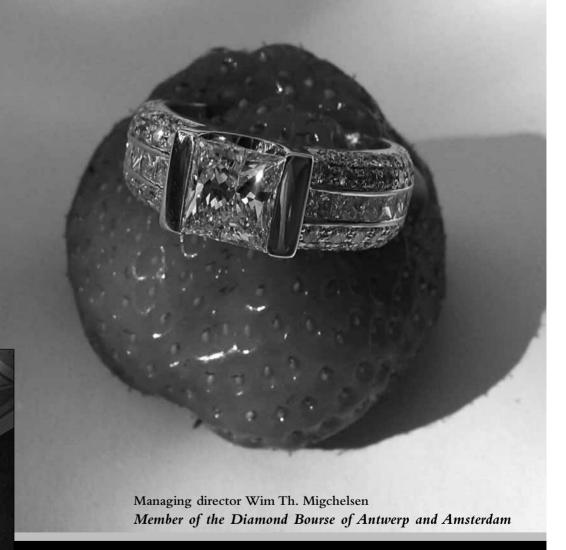
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# Mrs. Kruklat retires after 24 Component years, working for 10 Generals

Admission adults €12; children 3-11 years €8.75; Madurodam guidebook included (available in 11 languages).

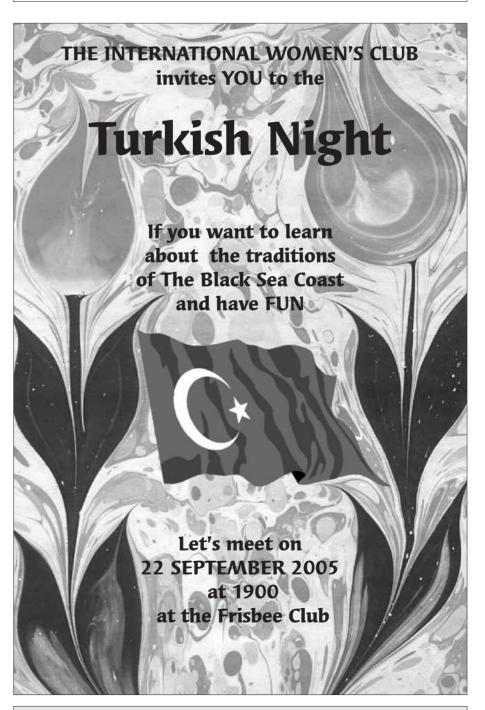
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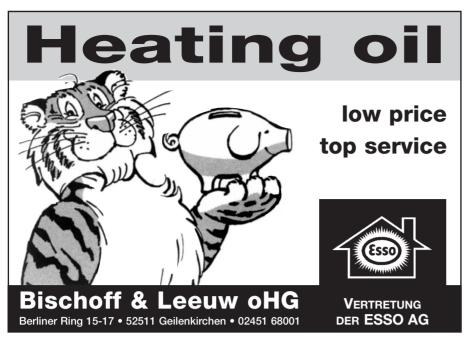
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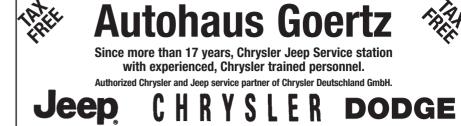

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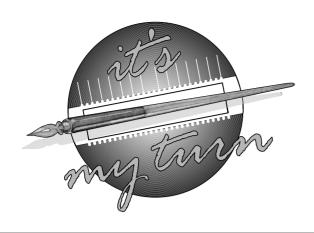




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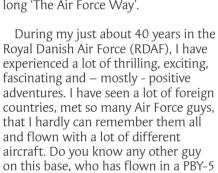


# This is a guest column by a NAEW&CF E-3A Component member.

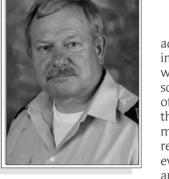
But my most fascinating and interesting experience was taking part in the training of pilots and aircrew at the RDAF Flying Training School. During my story, I will spice it up a bit with some self-defined aeronautical terms.

## RPM: Initials of a large corporation that builds tachometers

Flying is fascinating and always will be fascinating. Ever since I was a little boy, I had a great desire to become a pilot, or at least have something to do with airplanes, which my Mom wasn't so happy about. So right after high school I decided to apply for pilot training in the Air Force. But unfortunately the medical examination turned off my wish to become a pilot, since my eyes and ears were not fit for flying. Well, if you can't join them, then try something else in the Air Force. So that's what I did. And it became a way of life, which I never will forget. As my lovely wife tells me, she often doubted which marriage was my primary, she or the Air Force.

On 8 August 1962 I walked happily and excited through the gate of a small Air Force Station in Denmark to complete 3 months of Boot Camp. And there I faced the first of many surprises in the Air Force, since the drill-sergeants had a lousy habit not

It is also desirable that the Aviator develop a strong esprit-de-corps and at the same time create traditions, which can keep the impact of ambitions and love of adventure within a reasonable limit, and effect the daily and simple hard work."

And now I come to the most amusing point. I think it is quite remarkable, that what Captain J.P. Koch in 1917 wrote in his letter is exactly the same experience I had during my 20 years with pilot training. Yes, indeed pilot and aircrew are of a very special stuff.

It is difficult for an old guy like me to say what my best time in the Air Force has been, but surely the job as First Sergeant at the Danish Air Force Flying Training School was indeed both interesting and fascinating.

So, ladies and gentlemen of the air, I salute you. And thank you all for a very exciting time in my life.

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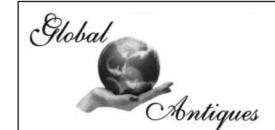


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
