

# Oktoberfest brings 4,000 to Hangar IV

On 24 and 25 September around 4,000 Component members, relatives and friends from the surrounding area enjoyed the great entertainment from a Bavarian Live-Band, specially-brewed Oktoberfest beer and lots of delicious Bavarian food.

The Oktoberfest officially started at 1900 on Saturday with the traditional draw from the first 'Oktoberfest beer barrel' with Component Commander Brigadier General Stephen D. Schmidt, the mayor of Geilenkirchen Mr. Andreas Borghorst and the representatives of the German NCO Association DUK (Deutsche Unteroffiziers Kameradschaft), who organized the whole event.

The DUK already began preparing the Hangar one week before the event. They had assistance from different agencies and a lot of volunteers and at the end everything was well prepared and the Hangar got its Bavarian look.

There were not only booths for the Oktoberfest beer and soft drinks, there were also booths with some traditional Bavarian specialties, like Leberkäse, Haxen, Sauerkraut, etc., and booths for souvenirs, like mugs and t-shirts, shooting-booths and a playground for the kids with a bouncy castle.

On Saturday the whole Hangar was crowded with people because the event was sold out. And while most of the typical Oktoberfest clientele was sitting on the traditional long tables eating

Bavarian food and drinking the greattasting beer, the band did their best to get the crowd dancing and rocking to and fro together. So it happens that some of the musicians were dancing on the tables and throwing their instruments through the air to entertain the partygoers.

Sunday morning started with the typical 'Frühschoppen' and went on until evening. It was more a family day, or an event for people who like to drink beer already in the morning and afternoon, but the Live-Band did a great show again and made lots of people dance.

About 1800 the Oktoberfest ended, but only for the partygoers. There was a lot of work to do after the

event because everything had to be cleaned and cutback again.

So special thanks to the German NCO Association for all the organization and preparation, thanks to all the volunteers who helped to make the Oktoberfest a really big success, thanks to the band for the entertainment and thanks to the people worked all night long on Saturday night to spoil the guests with the beer and delicious food.

As in previous years, the benefits of the Oktoberfest will go to charities. With the income of their events the German NCO Association helps hundreds of suffering people every year.

# Dutch State Secretary for Defence visits E-3A Component

The tree issue is a hot item in the Dutch seat of government, The Hague. It has a high level on the political agenda. To familiarize himself with the latest information on the issue and talk to base officials, State Secretary for Defence Mr. Cees van der Knaap visited the E-3A Component on 23 September.

Besides an introduction to the interior of an AWACS aircraft from Deputy Commander Col. Jelle Zijlstra, he flew a 'mission' with the flight simulator. During this simulated flight he got a good impression of the impact that the trees at the western end of the runway have for Component operations. Next he received

information on what measures the E-3A Component takes to fly in a safe way in spite of the tree obstacles.

He was also informed on the measures the E-3A Component takes to reduce the inconvenience to its neighbours by optimising the use of the flight simulator and by exporting flight movements to its Forward Operating Bases/Location and other Allied Bases and civilian airfields.

Mr. Van der Knaap also received an update about the numerous real-world operations the men and women of the E-3A Component took part in during the last few years, like the Greece Olympics, the European Soccer Championships in Portugal and many other High Visibility Events.

The 'C' from TCA was in high demand during the last three weeks. The Trainer Cargo Aircraft (TCA) from the E-3A Component supported a NATO Response Force operation to provide relief to the **U.S. following Hurricane Katrina** by setting up an air bridge to Little Rock Air Force Base, Arkansas. The TCAs transported more than 116,000 kilograms of relief supplies.

While the edges of yet another hurricane, Rita, produced rain showers on 24 September on the city of Little Rock, at the nearby Air Force Base the TCA's were unloaded one day earlier and the aid efforts were directly brought to a convoy of waiting trucks.

"The goods go directly to the refugee stations in Louisiana," said a spokesman at Little Rock. "This help is very needed. Those victims from Katrina lost everything."

Since NATO Secretary General Mr. Jaap de Hoop Scheffer directed on 9 September that relief supplies from Europe be provided to the United States to assist in recovering from Hurricane Katrina, the TCAs flew 9 times to Little Rock.

"Flying is our business," says aircraft commander Lt. Col. Alex von Lengriesser, "but these flights have a special meaning for us. To perform humanitarian flights to bring aid supplies to people who lost all their goods that gives an extra motivation."

The Transatlantic Ocean flights have a consequence for the human body. "The time difference between Europe and Little Rock is seven hours", explained Lt. Col. von Lengriesser. "Your body listens to the European time (ET). With the preplanning, the flight itself and the after flight maintenance we have a sixteen-hour duty day, arrival at the hotel around midnight ET. Having

de-briefing and dinner afterwards we go to bed a few hours later. The next day we fly overnight back to Europe. So, in three days we miss all nights."

As the flights had to be generated on short notice Lt. Col. von Lengriesser, also TCA operations officer, had no problem to fill the crew composition. "The TCA Branch is a small branch", he continues, "and these humanitarian taskings ask the commitment of everyone. Without any complaint already-granted leave and free weekends were turned back. Besides, TCA qualified pilots from the other squadrons offered their assistance which we gratefully accepted."

The two flights on 23 September brought a load of more than 26 tons. Donations come from Euro Atlantic Partnership nations. Ramstein Air Base serves as a strategic air hub for onward transportation of US-accepted donations. Donating countries that are closest to Ramstein were requested to move their donations by road to Ramstein Air Base with their own resources. Other countries used NATO Response Force tactical airlift to move relief goods to Ramstein.

One TCA picked the cargo one day earlier and departed directly from Geilenkirchen to Little Rock. The second had to stop in Ramstein to pick up the aid relief efforts.

As it was foreseen that the air bridge had to go for several weeks, the TCA were changed to a cargo configuration. Aircraft tail # 19997 normally operates in a combined configuration carrying both passengers and space for five pallets, but now it's changed to a cargo configuration. Forty-five from sixtynine seats were removed to bring the cargo load up to nine pallets.

The cargo platform on Ramstein AB is a busy place with cargo loaders driving on and off. Not only the military aircraft from NATO and the USAF, but also pallets from a

commercial Boeing 747 from Atlas Air was fully loaded with supplies. The TCA was loaded with 10,470 kilogram's of urgently required items.

"It's a combination of several factors how much load we can take", explains loadmaster SMSgt. Matthias Prietzel. "First there is the distance to fly. You have to take the amount of fuel that's needed and that brings weight to the aircraft. Then you have the size. Of course the cargo hold is limited for its size. And for each configuration you have to divide the cargo weight through the aircraft to keep the centre of gravity within the limits.'

Important to note are the different ways of unloading and loading on each base. On Ramstein AB the specialists bring the pallets by one cargo loader, which has a space for six. While ten and a half hours later on Little Rock AFB the specialists put three cargo loaders after each other and unload the aircraft - all in cooperation and supervised by the TCA loadmasters SMSgt. Prietzel and MSgt. Jörg Alberga.

"At the loading at Ramstein we noticed that one pallet was defect", says MSgt. Alberga. When we had used this

pallet it was possible that the interior floor of the aircraft had become damaged. Also the possibility was high that with the unloading in Little Rock we could expect a major problem. So, we stopped the loading and the cargo had to rebuild on another pallet."

The hotel rooms in Little Rock are occupied with people who fled for Hurricane Rita. "The rooms that we had still free this weekend we filled up with evacuees", says the Courtyard Marriott hotel manager.

Like so many residents of the Gulf Coast area Joseph and Sharon Bellard from Duson, Lousiana, had fled from a monster storm they feared so much. "We arrived at Little Rock on Friday. We drove Thursday night for eight hours." Duson locates halfway between Lake Charles and the Texas border.

"As we own a mobile home it was mandatory for us to evacuate for Hurricane Rita", they said. "It's extremely scary to leave your home behind and not knowing what happens to your property. Since our arrival here we have watched the television and with the computer we follow the Duson local news."

It seems that the eye of Hurricane Rita didn't hit their hometown and that the area sustained little damage. "We saw and heard that Lake Charles was hit very hard. That's only eighty miles from Duson." Fortunately, Duson sustained little damage but what the couple will see when they come home is unclear. "We heard that power lines broke. The possibility is that electricity is not available; also minor stuff."

They had a worse experience with Hurricane Katrina. "Katrina devastated the company we work for in New Orleans—they lost eighty million dollars. Buildings, trucks, office supplies, all gone. Also our colleagues lost everything: houses, cars, clothes, nothing left. It's so good to hear that NATO and its partnership countries are helping us."





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


ith one hard swing E-3A Component Commander, Brig.Gen.Stephen Schmidt tapped the keg and opened

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

#### NATO Secretary General in Iraq


On 26-27 September, NATO Secretary General Jaap de Hoop Scheffer, accompanied by NATO's Supreme Allied Commander, General James L. Jones, visited Iraq to mark the enhancement of NATO's training mission.

The Secretary General raised the NATO flag over the new NATO Training Mission Headquarters inside the International Zone of Baghdad. Along with the Iraqi Prime Minister Al-Jafaari, he also opened the Iraqi Joint Staff College in Ar-Rustamiyah, on the outskirts of the capital, where officer training will primarily take place.

Training future officers

During his visit, the Secretary General also consulted with the Commander of the NATO Training Mission on the current status and future shape of the NATO effort.

The NATO training effort focuses currently on mid-and-senior level lraqi officers. It aims to help the Iraqi



security forces develop an officer corps trained in modern military leadership skills, as well as to inculcate the values appropriate to democratically-controlled armed forces.

The NATO Training Mission will, this year, train around 700 officers in country, as well as several hundred in NATO facilities in Europe. That figure will rise next year to some 900 officers trained in country.

NATO is also providing significant amounts of equipment to the Iraqi forces, including an impending delivery of 77 Hungarian T-72 main battle tanks.

#### **Protecting nuclear convoys**

From 14 to 15 September, NATO and Russian experts observed a UK nuclear weapon accident response exercise, Senator 05, on safeguarding nuclear convoys and mitigating any abnormal events.

The invitation of the NATO-Russia Council to witness the exercise, which was held at a military site near Edinburgh in Scotland, is part of the continuing evolution of NATO-Russia cooperation. Senator 05 simulated a scenario in which a nuclear weapon road convoy was involved in an accident that resulted in the release of radioactive material.

Testing worst-case scenarios

Its aim was to test the effectiveness of the Ministry of Defence's Nuclear Accident Response Organisation, and the ability of the civilian emergency services and local authority to cope with the effects of such an event.

Nearly sixty civilian and military

experts from 20 NATO countries, Russia and NATO Headquarters attended the exercise, the first time that Alliance and Russian Federation representatives have observed a UK exercise of this kind.

Speaking at the exercise, UK Minister of the Armed Forces, Adam Ingram

The attendance of representatives of the NATO-Russia Council at Exercise Senator served to enhance practical cooperation and common understanding between NATO and Russia, he said.

The exercise involved over 700 people, including some 200 servicemen of the UK Army and Royal Air Force but also 100 members of local government and the emergency services (police, fire and ambulance teams).

#### Component members successful in third Mosbach Bunker-Run

On Thursday, 8 September the third Mosbach Bunker-Run took place near Heidelberg. Three Component members, Lt. Col. Jochen Walter, SMSgt. Claus Cohnen and CMSgt. Ulrich Ponssen (from left to right) participated in this unusual running competition. Altogether there were over 150 participants, equally divided between military and civilian, men and women.

The circuit was about 7 km long and divided into two parts; first 3,5-kilometres were underground through the military materials-depot with over 60-metres of altitude difference and a temperature around 17 Degree Celsius.

The second part was completely different with a temperature of around 28 Degree Celsius and a gradient of 100-metres in altitude difference. The change of conditions is the biggest strength challenge during the run and it is not comparable to other running competitions.

At the end SMSgt. Cohnen was third place in 28 minutes, CMSgt. Ponssen was 15th place in 24.57 minutes and Lt. Col. Walter needed 39.20 minutes and ended on place 30 in the Masters Category.

It was a big success for the participants and the Component Team ranked third place in the team ranking overall.



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


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## Component donates PCs to local schools

The pupils of the Catholic Elementary school in Teveren were having their break when a truck from the E-3A Component pulled up, and four men started unloading 25 PCs, monitors and keyboards.

Since these PCs are no longer used by the E-3A Component, the idea was born to start a special PC donation program. This program started in April 2001 and, until now, 675 PCs have been given to elementary schools and clubs on both the German and Dutch sides.

The Teveren school received their equipment on 27 September and a delivery of 10 PCs and a laser printer went to the elementary school 'De Draaiende Wieken' in Posterholt, The Netherlands, on 28 September.
