Damico serves as deputy mobilization commander

Col. Timothy Scott Damico is the Deputy Commander of Mobilization at Camp Shelby Joint Forces Training Center. He is primarily responsible for the coordination and synchronization of receiving, deploying and redeploying forces in support of missions overseas.

The native of Etowah, Tenn., has served more than 33 years in the Army. He enlisted in the Tennessee Army National Guard in 1979.

"Growing up in a small town in east Tennessee, I was introduced to the Tennessee Army National Guard while attending high school," said Damico. "I saw it as an opportunity to serve and something I could have fun doing. I never thought it would last for more than 33 years, but I'm still having fun!"

He received his commission as a second lieutenant in May 1983, while attending East Tennessee State University in Johnson City, Tenn. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in Education in 1985.

Damico began his active duty service in 1985, in the Aviation Branch. He served

in the 9th Infantry Division at Fort Lewis, Wash., as the Platoon Leader and the Army Aviation Liaison to the 3rd Infantry Brigade. In 1990, he deployed with the 2nd Armor Division as a Target Acquisition and Reconnaissance Detachment Commander to the 3rd Armor Cavalry Regiment for Desert Shield and Desert

Storm.

Upon returning from his deployment one year later, he was reassigned to the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg where he commanded Bravo Troop, 1st Squadron, 17th Cavalry Regiment and became the Quick Strike Operations Officer on the Division Staff. In 1993, he served as an Observer Controller for the Joint Readiness Training Center at Fort Polk, La.

In 1994, he decided to leave the active duty ranks and moved to Hattiesburg where he worked as a Rescue Seven pilot for Forrest General Hospital.

Damico came to Camp Shelby in 1995 as a member of 3rd Brigade, 87th Division as an Observer Controller. In 1998, he transferred to the Mississippi Army National Guard, and served as the Airfield Commander, Operations and Training Officer, Security Officer and the Provost Marshall for Camp Shelby until 2004. He served as the director of Personnel and Community Activities from 2007 until 2009 when he was reassigned to his current position.

He was promoted to his current rank in December 2010.

Aside from his military career, he finds time to volunteer with the "Dad's Club" at Sacred Heart School. The club provides free labor for small construction and maintenance projects for the school.

He spends his spare time with wife, Sharon, and their children, Isabella, 11 and Ryan, 8.

Importance of Master Application

Have you gone for a job interview lately? Chances are, if you have, you were asked to arrive a few minutes early to complete your job application.

This is something that everyone has to complete before they begin work for the new employer. Filling out the application is a breeze if you are prepared, but if you are not prepared; it can be a nightmare and may cost you the job.

Frequently, the employer does ask the job candidate to arrive a few minutes before the job interview to fill out the application. If you are not prepared, you may go into the interview with a negative mindset from having to rush through the lengthy application.

The application asks for a vast amount of information including your previous experience and skills, completed education and schools, dates and addresses of employment, names and contact information of previous employ-



ers, salary history, reason for leaving each job, and more. All of this information must be verifiable and accurate. Otherwise, even if you get the job and the employer finds out that the information is false, you could lose the job.

To make the application process easier and to maintain a positive mindset going into the interview session, it is crucial to develop a master application to take with you to the interview. This master application will have all the details of your previous jobs (usually going back 10 years) to include the information listed above.

The details of your previous jobs must also be in terms that are familiar to the employer. Having this information handy in the form of a master application, will help you feel prepared as you fill out the application, and you can be confident that the information you are providing is accurate. However, you still can't just hand in your master application; you will still have to fill out the application.
