"It's not about me," said Ellsworth, "it's about us, the Americans."

"We get to visit with a lot of regular people and we find

out that people in Arizona, Louisiana, Mississippi, Virginia, New York and Iowa are all very similar. I really hope that in some way American Ride helps us see the things that bring us together, so we can quit trying to find things that tear us apart."
