Progressive Motorcycle Program promotes safety among the ranks

As of May 9, the Army has lost more Soldiers from accidents as opposed to combat-related deaths in the current fiscal year; many of the accidents involved motorcycle driver negligence.

In order to address the dire trends of motorcycle accidents, the Army instituted the progressive motorcycle program (PMP) designed to cyclically engage riders to promote safe riding techniques, reduce rider complacency, and to establish lifelong learning among military riders. While this program is still in its infancy, many changes have occurred in order to foster more awareness to motorcycle safety; however more changes are expected in the near

future.

The U.S. Army Combat readiness Safety Center intends to create rider specific web-based and hands-on training to further emphasize rider safety.

Implementation of the Progressive Motorcycle Program (PMP) was mandated by rapid action revision (RAR) to Army Regulation 385-10, The Army Safety Program (Oct. 4, 2011). Under the PMP, all soldiers who own or operate a motorcycle must complete four separate training events at specific time intervals. Listed below are the current regulations for authorized motorcycle operation for both on post and off post riders:

- The Motorcycle Safety Foundation's Basic RiderCourse (BRC) must be taken prior to operating a motorcycle; this is a

onetime requirement.

- The Motorcycle Safety Foundation's Basic RiderCourse II (BRCII) or Motorcycle Sports Basic RiderCourse (MSBRC) must be completed within 12 months of taking BRC.

- Motorcycle Refresher Training is required for all soldiers who have deployed for more than 180 days. The Motorcycle Refresher Training is also required for soldier experiencing a hiatus from riding for more than 180 days.

- Sustainment Training must be completed every three years following BRCII. Approved sustainment training includes but is not limited to retaking BRCII or MSBRC.

As Soldiers complete their training and gain authorization to

ride motorcycles, the following personal protective equipment (PPE) is always required:

- Helmet – DOT approved with properly fitting chin strap
- Eye Protection - Impact and shatter resistance
- Foot Protection - Sturdy over the ankle footwear
- Protective Clothing - Long sleeved shirt or jacket, long trousers, full fingered gloves

Unit readiness is vital for sustaining a force ready to deploy and engage the enemy in combat and to fulfill this obligation motorcycle safety must become conspicuously integrated in all riding circumstances. By exercising prudence and follow the PMP, soldiers can remain safe and ready to fight while reinforcing safe motorcycle behaviors for continued personal enjoyment.



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
