

USM CLTT hosts information session

An information session presented April 18 at Camp Shelby Joint Forces Training Center gave Soldiers who attended insight into the career training opportunities offered through The University of Southern Mississippi's Center for Logistics, Trade and Transportation (CLTT).

"We've worked with Camp Shelby personnel for the last several months and the interest in our MSLT has been tremendous," said Sulbaran. "In fact, there are even Soldiers from different parts of the state that drove a couple of hours to participate in this information session, and the number of officers registered for the event surpassed the capacity of the original location."

from Soldiers interested in the program at the information session, and hopes more will take advantage of the program's opportunities that allow them to advance their education while carrying out their military duties.

The CLTT provides a competitive advantage to logistics and supply chain industries and government agencies through its multidisciplinary activities in logistics, trade and transportation, including its online Master of Science in Logistics, Trade and Transportation (MSLTT), graduate certificates in economic development and logistics, applied research activities and networking events.

The MSLTT is an interdisciplinary program comprised of 30 credit hours and can be completed in one year. Its coursework, offered in a flexible hybrid format that includes online and in-person learning experiences, provides its graduates with the tools and critical understanding of supply chain management, economics, finances and the practice of contemporary global air, maritime and land transportation systems.

CLTT Director Dr. Tulio Sulbaran said he was pleased with the response

Case Lot sale brings savings to customers

Military members, retirees and dependents took advantage of savings at Camp Shelby Joint Forces Training Center Case Lot Sale April 25-26.

The Guard/Reserve On-site Sales Program provides the commissary benefit to eligible Guard/Reserve members and their Families that live in areas that are not close to an existing commissary store.

The Defense Commissary Agency (DECA) holds periodic case lot sale events, offering customers bulk quantities of their favorite products at increased savings, such as canned goods, beverages, cleaning or laundry products, meat

and produce.

"We are conducting a sale for the troops up here at Camp Shelby that normally don't have access to a commissary," said Walter Taylor, DECA store director in Gulfport. "This gives them the opportunity to not only see the savings and get some good deals but brings the benefit to them. This lets them use their benefits that they normally don't use."

DECA operates a worldwide chain of commissaries providing groceries to military personnel, retirees and their Families in a safe and secure shopping environment, according to its website. Active and Reserve Component Soldiers and their Families save an average of more than 30 percent on their purchases compared to commercial prices, saving that amount to thousands of dollars an-

nually when shopping regularly as a commissary.

"Shopping here at the case lot sale benefit Soldiers because DECA overall saves the military member over 30 percent on their groceries; more on their meat and produce," said Taylor. "When they normally don't get to use a facility, this gives them the opportunity to reap those 30 percent plus savings."

As the case lot sale came to a close, Taylor predicated that nearly 2,000 customers had come to the sale to take advantage of the savings and he feels that it was a huge success.

"This has been a real delight and very successful," said Taylor. "Everybody received us well and we received good support. It's real nice to see the patrons and how they appreciate what we do."
