Be careful out there...

South Mississippi's weather is starting to warm up. That means for us motorcycle riders, it's time to pull our two-wheeled motor vehicles out of the garage and burn up the highways.

Take note that safety should be your top priority before and during your ride. I came across this safety article on a privately-owned motorcycle crash that claimed one Soldier's life and wanted to share it with you:

"A Fort Bragg Soldier died from injuries sustained in a two-vehicle crash. The Staff Sgt. was riding his Kawasaki Ninja ZX 10R 1K when he attempted to pass a dump truck in front of him. As he was passing to the left of the dump truck, a Honda Civic in front of the truck turned left into the Soldier's path. He struck the Honda and was thrown from the motorcycle."

The Staff Sgt. was pronounced dead at the scene, according to police. Both the Soldier and driver of the Civic used turn signals. The civilian driver will not face charges in connection with the incident. Police confirmed that the Staff Sgt. was licensed, insured and wearing all his required protective gear."

I pray for this Soldier and his/her Family. This Soldier was probably in a hurry and paid the ultimate price for it. And even though this Soldier was wearing all required Personal Protective Equipment, it still wasn't enough. Because of his/her careless decision, the Family must live day-to-


