YCP helps with tornado cleanup

After a massive EF-4 tornado ripped through the Hattiesburg area Feb. 10, the Camp Shelby Youth Challenge Academy responded in less than 24 hours with disaster relief efforts, lending a helping hand to local citizens affected by the storm.

"I live in Oak Grove, and I was at home Sunday evening when the tornado hit," said Lt. Col. (Ret.) Rickey Hosey, program coordinator for the Mississippi Youth Challenge Academy. "I thank God it didn't damage my home, but it did hit my next-door neighbor's house, blowing his back porch away and knocking down several trees."

Hosey said his trip to work the next day gave him a better idea how severe and widespread the devastation was throughout the Hattiesburg area and provided him with a lot of motivation to find

ways to help.

"As I saw the damage all along my route to work the next morning, I knew we had to do something to help the community," said Hosey. "I started calling different organizations in the area like the Red Cross, the Salvation Army, and found out that there was a meeting with the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency in Hattiesburg that morning."

Hosey informed the Hattiesburg area emergency and relief agencies that there were cadets available for community service and assistance as needed, and that they stood ready to help in any way.

"We got our first call right after lunch on Monday, less than 24 hours after the storm hit, and we sent cadets to Hattiesburg to assist an elderly lady whose home had been smashed by falling trees," said Hosey. "We went to work with power saws and bare hands, pulling out limbs and de-

bris so that the interior of the house was accessible during the cleanup process."

Many residents of Duane Street and the surrounding area in Hattiesburg were very happy to have the cadets on hand to help with the cleanup efforts, and had lots of good things to say about the young volunteers.

"Anything we've asked them to do, they've done, and they've even volunteered to do things that we didn't even ask," said Kathy McCoy, a local resident. "I don't think very many of them even stopped to eat during all this, or if they did, they just grabbed something quick and ran back in to help. They've been working very hard."

As the extent of the damage became more widely known, calls continued to come in to the Youth Challenge Academy, asking for help, and there was no shortage of eager hands willing to
