continued interest in the job and summarize the qualities that make you the best choice.

Sometimes you need to highlight particular skills or qualifications you possess that the employer considers to be essential. If possible, use a few "buzz words" from the career field that show you will fit in. The letter will leave the employer with a good impression of you, your skills and abilities.

If you forgot to mention some pertinent information or didn't answer an interviewer's question as well as you could have during the interview, the thank-you letter can give you a second

chance. In the letter, repeat you strong points and elaborate on the points you failed to mention before. Answer the questions that you did not answer during the interview.

After sending the thank-you letter, no matter how well you thought the interview went, don't sit by the phone waiting to hear from the employer. Job hunting is an ongoing process—start working on your next interview.

Always remember that interviewing is a learning experience. Although it will probably never be your favorite pastime, you will improve each time you interview.


During his military career, the Fort Worth nativeserved as a platoon leader,

In her spare time she draws and paints.




