



## Historical journey: Operation Anchor Guard

In this issue of Skywatch, we will continue to look back at the Component's history by publishing another original front page from the past.

In this article we highlight Operation Anchor Guard, which was the first and most demanding 'real world' test of the E-3A Component's mission capability.


In 1990, the Gulf crisis brought the world into a serious military confrontation and on 9 August 1990 the E-3A Component launched the first of many missions in Operation Anchor Guard. Squadron One was the first to deploy to our Forward Operating Bases in the South of Europe, which for the next eight months were 'invaded' by a much larger than normal number of people to support and maintain equipment and to cock and operate the aircraft.

The Gulf Crisis was characterized by massive media coverage and at that time the Public Information Office (PIO) received numerous phone calls from local citizens and local news agencies asking "What are you doing in the Gulf area?" The question was relevant, since the Gulf area is beyond NATO's boundaries. But Turkey,

which has a common border with Iraq, could be threatened and NATO therefore increased its surveillance in the area by deploying the E-3A. The Component's mission was strictly to observe and not to become actively involved.

Operation Anchor Guard was a huge challenge for the dedicated crews deployed to Italy, Greece and Turkey. They were deployed for 12 to 14 days, back home for four or five days and then deployed again. They flew almost every day, with flights of ten and twelve hours being the norm.

There were also many other, often less well-known offices back at the E-3A Component involved in ensuring that the primary mission of flying was accomplished. They performed tasks such as monetary exchange into Turkish Lira, taking care of hotel accommodation, making arrangements for cleaning and linen exchange, procuring fruit and vegetables, preparing flight meals, and much more. Every task was a prime example showing that each and every person at the E-3A Component is a necessary part of the overall team effort.

Lt. Col. Hans Brouwers from Squadron Two has been a Tactical Director for 13 years and has a total of 594 missions behind him, including 22 from **Operation Anchor** Guard. Looking back he says, "Since this was the first 'real' operation, nobody knew what to expect. It was like a test of what we had been training for. Especially the first month there was a feeling of uncertainty. We flew in an orbit north of the Iraqi border and the intelligence briefing mentioned more than 700 Iraqi fighters, including MiG- 29 Fulcrum, SU-24 Fencer and Mirage F-1 and you

"In the beginning the mission was mainly air surveillance over Turkey and the Mediterranean Sea, where the coalition were building up for the intervention," Lt. Col. Brouwers continues. "After 17 January 1991, when Operation Desert Storm was launched, the mission changed more to broader air defence, including combat air patrols to protect Turkey. After the first couple of weeks with almost no resistance the initial concern went away. It was good to see,

that the training we did at the Component worked out so well in a real operation. The teamwork was just awesome and everybody was working hard. Lessons learned from Anchor Guard laid the foundation for future operations.'

Operation Anchor Guard came to an end on the afternoon of 16 March 1991, as the last of three E 3As with Squadron One aircrews returned home. Between 9 August 1990 and 16 March 1991 the Component flew a total of 1,129 missions and 8,581.8 hours in support of Anchor Guard.

The TCA, too, played a key role in Anchor Guard, being described as the Component's 'work-horse'. Since the acquisition of the TCAs in 1988, the Component had become more independent and

for Anchor Guard the TCAs were immediately available, meeting transport requests day and night seven days a week. The total number of passengers from the Component, NAEWFC, FOB/L and SHAPE during

Operation Anchor Guard amounted to 5,527 people and the overall weight of cargo came to approximately 450 tons. The TCA flew more than 640 hours on 192 flights for Anchor Guard alone.

"These figures are impressive. They tell an important story of sacrifice, hard work and dedication that the men and women at the Component, the FOBs and FOL can be proud of," said Brig.Gen. Jay D. Blume Jr, E-3A Component Commander at that time. "NATO has indicated that the way of the future in the Alliance is more mobile, flexible, and multi-national forces. They need only look at their own E-3A Component as a unique

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# Occupational Health Branch helps keep employees safe, healthy

Occupational Health focuses on the interaction between people and their work and the goal is to enable employees to work without any risk to their health. For the Occupational Health Officer, this field of work is multidisciplinary because he has to

unite many skills, in a similar way to a general practitioner, to master the great variety of challenges.

Occupational Health is not a discipline involving therapeutic activities. Patients do not come and see the Occupational Health Officer because they suffer from acute health problems and they will also not be treated by him, except in some special cases. Occupational Health is about prevention. "People realize that it is more sensible to invest in the area of prevention in good time than to straighten things out which have been missed before," said Dr. Helmut Stienen, the Occupational Health Officer on

base. Patients are examined and given advice at early stage about any negative effects of their work, so that countermeasures can be taken. Regularly recurring noise, for example, has negative effects on hearing. Once hearing is damaged it is irreparable. That is why measures have to be taken early to protect workers from noise.

The area of Occupational Health on base is subject to the NAEW&C Force directive, which specifies that the E-3A Component has to comply with the laws of the Host Nation and must act according to German law. The Occupational Health Officer, together with the Safety Division, is responsible for the safety of all on-base workplaces in accordance with security and work medical knowledge. It is very important to prevent accidents and keep employees healthy by applying the latest technology and manpower studies. "As Occupational Health Officer you often get the chance here on base to see beyond the end of your own medical area's nose. You deal with organizational as well

as many technical fields into which you would not gain any insight elsewhere: from building technology and procedures in aircraft servicing to physical strains affecting firemen and dog trainers. It is never boring," said Stienen.

In principle, all personnel employed at the Air Base can consult the

health. Employees can consult the Occupational Health Officer for many different reasons. It makes no difference whether you have a physical health problem or a mental one. If you have problems with a colleague or even with your boss, or if working conditions trouble you, the Occupational Health Officer can help.

assistant to the Chief of the Medical Squadron. In 2000, Occupational Health became an independent branch in the Medical Squadron.

"I think there are not many people on base who can say that they know every workplace and almost every employee. But I can say that almost every one of them has sat in the chair in front of me," he said.

Occupational Health Officer. Flying personnel are the only exception. They have their own Occupational Health physician, the Flight Surgeon. However, if any flying personnel are not onboard aircraft for a short time and work in an office, for example, they can also consult the Occupational Health Officer. Under Host Nation legislation relating to health and safety at work, every employee is entitled to occupational health care. In small businesses this is hard to translate into action, but the 3,000 employees on base have many advantages from the full-time availability of the Occupational Health Officer:

The Occupational Health Officer is a competent expert directly on base. He guarantees routine occupational treatment and gives advice about individual problems. Most of the patients are regularly invited to be checked. But from time to time it happens that patients come to see him for special reasons. For example, because of an illness or an incident at the workplace that might have consequences for their

"Even though I more or less said goodbye to therapeutic activities, I hope to achieve something positive for the patients, the employer and the whole organization. Hopefully, I can do this even without a prescription pad and referral forms and without a scalpel," Stienen emphasizes.

Thanks to the Occupational Health Branch, concrete ideas to keep employees healthy are constantly being developed. There is the opportunity to do back-training classes at the workplace and medical life-style coaching is offered. If you had an accident you get help to reintegrate and become fit again. There is also an advisory service about work-life balance. "The aim of these programs is to support the employees in regard to their health as well as keeping them present at the workplace. This is a prerequisite for successful mission accomplishment."

Dr. Stienen has been permanently working on base since 1993. After qualifying as a medical practitioner, he worked as a Flight Surgeon and



Component joins effort to support Chernobyl children

A group of about 25 children aged between 8 and 10 years who live near the Chernobyl nuclear disaster site in Belarus will visit the town of Brunssum, the Netherlands, from 12 January to 4 March 2008. While in Brunssum, the Chernobyl children will also visit the Component on Tuesday, 12 February. During the visit the children will visit the fire brigade and the flight deck simulator, have an E-3A walk-through and a Component-sponsored lunch. This will be the third time in the last eight years that Chernobyl children have come to Brunssum and the first time to visit our Component.

A special committee in Brunssum is making all the arrangements for the area visit. Karen Segal, from the United States, has been living here for the last seven years. Her husband, Jack Segal, works as the Chief Political Advisor at Allied Joint Force Command (JFC) Brunssum and they are both a part of the organizing committee for the visit. As part of this committee, they also serve as the central liaison between the local Dutch community and the NATO communities in Brunssum and the E-3A Component.

"It all started in the local school and the Protestant church. The teachers wanted to make the Dutch children more aware of children with problems, and one way of practicing charity at home was to host children in need," says Karen. "The idea of having the Chernobyl children here is to give them access to good food, clean air and water,

and opportunities to exercise their minds and bodies. Even two months of living in a good environment will strengthen these children for the rest of their lives!" I felt Karen's heartfelt compassion for the children and this project as I began to understand the amount of hard work that she and the event committee have to do to make all this happen.

The children all live in very poor villages that have lots of environmental problems and not much hope for a better future. To get here they will travel for three days on a bus before their local host families in the Brunssum area welcome them. The overall purpose is to make the Chernobyl children feel at home and be a part of normal everyday life. One of the opportunities they have is to attend classes at the Benjamin Elementary School in Treebeek.

With full support of the E-3A Component, the NATEX will provide each child with a brand new winter jacket and one pair of winter boots as soon as they arrive. The NATEX will also donate 'Fruitopia' juices for the children from Chernobyl during their upcoming visit to the E-3A Component.



- To make this whole program a reality the event committee welcomes any financial contributions by the NATO community. Donations will be used to cover expenses of bus transportation, insurance and other care for the children that are estimated to total €17,000. All donations can be made to Dresdner Bank, account number 02 883 508 01, and bank code (BLZ) 390 800 05.
- The event committee is also looking for people to sponsor one-day tours for the children.
   Some of the suggested tours

are to Snow World (€300) or swimming at a local pool (€40 per session).

Thousands of people have died as a result of the Chernobyl nuclear disaster. Very large numbers of Russians, Ukrainians and Belarusian's who live in the most contaminated regions are still alive but seriously ill.

On 26 April, 1986, the fourth reactor of the Chernobyl Nuclear Power Plant, exploded at 01:23 AM local time. The workers were performing an experiment with the reactor's safety systems. Problems occurred during the tests, the reactor did not receive enough coolant and had built up too much heat in the core, and control rods had been fully withdrawn, all of which contributed to very unstable and unpredictable reactor operation. When the control rods were reinserted in an attempt to regain control of the unstable

reactor, there was a sudden increase in reactivity and an uncontrollable runaway reaction occurred.

The reactor produced tremendous amounts of steam, eventually causing a steam break/explosion, which destroyed part of the reactor. Over 100 radioactive elements including iodine, caesium, strontium, and plutonium were released into the atmosphere. All permanent residents of Chernobyl and the 'Exclusion Zone' were evacuated because radiation levels in the area had become unsafe.

The Exclusion Zone was established soon after the Chernobyl disaster in 1986 in order to evacuate the local population and to prevent people from entering the heavily contaminated territory, the area within a radius of 30 km being the most dangerous. Any residential, civil or business activities there are legally prohibited and punishable. To this day and for the foreseeable

future, the area is considered too dangerous for human habitation, though normal radiation levels have returned to some locales.

On 17 September, 2007, it was announced that a new steel containment structure will be built to replace the aging and hastily built 'sarcophagus' that currently protects the damaged reactor. The project is being financed by an international fund managed by the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development. A giant archshaped structure made from steel, measuring 190 metres wide and 200m long, will be built to cover the old crumbling concrete dome that is currently in use. It is expected to take a year to design the new building and another 2 years to build it. A separate deal has also been made to build a storage facility within the exclusion zone for the nuclear waste produced by Chernobyl.

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
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

Known as the Venice of the North, Bruges is one of the most beautiful cities in Europe. Only 235 kilometres from Geilenkirchen it makes a perfect destination for a one-day trip. Bruges has something to offer for the whole family. Besides the historical sightseeing, you can go for a romantic hand-in-hand walk, a classical concert, or to a wonderful park for the children to play in. Bruges also gives all the gastronomic pleasures you can imagine.

Upon visiting Bruges, you will immediately notice that this city has carefully cherished its architectural and artistic treasures from the past. This splendid medieval city is one of Belgium's crown jewels. In no other European city is the feel and the look of medieval times as present as it is here in this city close to the North Sea coast.

Take your time to walk through busy squares, refreshing parks and quiet, intimate cobbled streets. Also be sure not to forget to discover the city from its canals. A boat tour gives you a unique opportunity to explore Bruges from the same angle as they did 200 years ago. From the water side you are able to see some of the extraordinary, unknown and very old things you would never see from the roads. In the Early Middle Ages the roads were in such poor condition that the network of canals functioned as the main transportation network. Thus, almost all traffic and especially all trade to and from Bruges took place via the canals.

There are many fine medieval buildings in Bruges, including the Church of our Lady, whose brick spire - at 122m - makes it one of the world's highest brick towers. The construction of the church began in the 13th Century and lasted more than 200 years. The view from outside is spectacular, but it does not stop there. Continue going inside this church and you will find a marvellous collection of paintings, unique glass windows and probably the most expensive work of art in Bruges: Michelangelo's Madonna.

Walking around Bruges offers lots of sensory impressions and

temptations for those who enjoy the good things in life. International tourism has boomed in Bruges and these efforts have resulted in Bruges being designated European Capital of Culture in 2002. Furthermore, in 2000 UNESCO included the entire historical city centre on the World Heritage list. Be aware that visiting Bruges on weekends or holidays can be a crowded experience – everybody wants to have a piece of this popular medieval city.

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
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
