RECON UNIT TRAINS IN SUBPAC 'LUNG' COURSE

Rubber boats or submarines . . . They're all the same to men of the 1st Provisional Marine Amphibious Reconnaissance Group.

Men and officers of the reconnaissance company interrupted their exercises in rubber boats at Bellows Field to concentrate on the possibilities of a submarine as a means of getting ashore on an enemy held beach as quietly as possible and undetected.

The entire company numbering approximately 150 men and officers underwent a three-day siege of training at the Pearl Harbor Submarine Base, where they went through the Momson Lung training program.

Given Pressure Test

In this training, each of the men was required to submit to pressure tests to determine whether he could stand the weight of some hundred feet of water crushing against his body, then—wearing one of the compact breathing apparatus—each went through the standard escape procedure for abandoning a sunken submarine. This consists of making one's way up a 100 foot water-filled tube, using the lung as a means of breathing.

The entire course of training was taught by Navy personnel at the Sub.Base.

Recalls Makin Raid

"There's a very real reason for such training," says Maj. Robert McClean, commanding officer of the reconnaissance group, which is under going training with the 1st Provisional Marine Air-Ground Task Force.

"Marines are by no means strangers to submarines, and most people will recall that the attack on Makin Island by Carlson's Raiders in World War II was launched from underwater-craft.

"This is only one phase of the training we are undergoing here, which is aimed at one thing—being able to get into an enemy position, get information we want and get out again without it being known."

Under order of Maj. McClean, all officers of the company also went through the submarine escape training.

The unit's home base is Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton, Calif., where it is attached to Fleet Marine Force Troops.

Lt. Col. Stallings Named Force Executive Officer

Lieutenant Colonel George R. Stallings has been assigned as executive officer of the 1st Provisional Marine Air-Ground Task Force.

The assignment was made by Colonel Boeker C. Batterton, commander of the task force. Col. Stallings served as logistics officer for the organization and coached the Kaneohe Marine gridiron eleven prior to his present duties.

A veteran of World War II actions in the South Pacific, where he served with the Paratroopers, he later served with the Fifth Marine Division, after the "jump outfit" was disbanded. He holds two Bronze Stars for heroism in action against the enemy.

Prior to joining the task force last spring, when it was activated, he was stationed at Headquarters, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, at Pearl Harbor.

STIFFER PENALTIES PLANNED FOR TRAFFIC VIOLATORS

Major James S. Hightower, Station Provost Marshal, said today immediate steps will be taken to halt the alarming increase in minor traffic violations.

A main problem now is parking and driving in the area around the swimming pool and directly behind barracks 222, where grass is being cultivated. Although many "Keep off the grass" signs are posted, drivers pay little heed.

Public works smoothed the earth, planted grass seed, and posted signs. The following day automobile tracks were seen throughout the area, and several signs were missing. One person posted a sign of his own. It read: "What grass."

"A large portion of my morning is spent in handling unnecessary minor traffic violations," Maj. Hightower said. "This is due to the driver's neglect of details, and if a sharp decline isn't seen in the near future, penalties will become more rigid."

He went on to explain that many times men who come before him cannot produce a Territorial drivers' license. He said they seem to forget state-side licenses are good here for only 90 days.

He urges you, the driver, to think while you're behind the wheel.
