To top off K-Bay's Christmas — at the very top — MACS-2 will go 600 ft. up in the air with season's greetings to all of Windward Oahu.

## 3-4 Marines Arrive Aboard Barrett Today

The USNS Barrett, carrying more than 400 Three-Four Marines returning from Guam, is scheduled to tie up at the Army Terminal, Pier 40A, at 8 this morning.

Led by LtCol. D. N. McDowell, the Brigade Leathernecks are expected to disembark as soon as they can be cleared through customs.

On hand to greet them will be families, friends, Brigade officials, and the U.S. Army Hawaii Band. The Army musical contingent will "sit in" for the Brigade band which is putting finishing touches on tonight's annual Christmas concert.

The Brigade Marines were dispatched to Guam by air Nov. 13, following Typhoon Karen's devastation of the Pacific island.

They augmented security forces there and aided in the rehabilitation.

The Barrett departed Guam for Hawaii Dec. 13.

## Two 3-4 Marines Praised for Daring Action, Know-How in Guam Air Crash

Two 3/4 Marines have been lauded for their daring actions after they rescued and aided victims of a Dec. 4 aircraft crash on Guam.

The accident claimed three lives and critically injured several others.

The Marines, SSgt. R. W. Boughton and LCpl. J. R. Ravey, both of L-3/4, recently received meritorious mast on Guam from their CO, LtCol. D. N. McDowell, for a "calm and determined effort, with complete disregard for their own personal safety."

Sgt. Boughton, while standing duty as commander of the guard, saw a blinding flash on a nearby mountain. A Navy C-121 transport had crashed on Mt. Macajna at approximately 3:10 a.m.

He and LCpl. Ravey, also a member of the guard, sped to the scene where they immediately began removing crash victims and applying emergency first aid.

The removal operation necessitated the two Leathernecks going into burning wreckage repeatedly to remove survivors, preventing further injuries and possible fatalities.

They also organized and directed others arriving on the scene in search and rescue operations.

The citation read in part:

"Your sense of duty, judgment and unselfish devotion to your fellow man in the face of catastrophe was in the highest tradition of the Marine Corps."

## Marine Choir Is Possibility Here if Singers Answer Up

**WANTED:** 50 to 55 Kaneohe Bay Marines to form one of the most distinctive glee clubs on Oahu.  
**QUALIFICATIONS:** A desire to represent the Marine Corps through music at varied military and civic functions in Hawaii. Vocal training is unnecessary. Anyone who can carry a tune is eligible.

While this advertisement won't be carried under a general classification heading in today's Windward Marine, it does mark the beginning of what could—with good support—become one of the top musical aggregations in the Pacific.

Ivan L. Manning, Information Director for the Hawaii State Department of Economic Development and a Windward neighbor, has volunteered his time and services to the Station and First Marine Brigade in forming a choral group along the lines of the Pensacola and West Point cadet choirs.

"Don't get the idea," Mr. Manning said, "that this is going to be a church-choir-type of organization. I'm aiming at a tight, disciplined team operation that can represent the Marine Corps and the Navy

Department at virtually any function."

If the success of such a group is reflected in the background and training of the conductor, Mr. Manning should field a sure-fire winner.

A graduate of Whitman Conservatory of Music, Walla-walla, Wash., the Kailuan sang professionally with the "Six Hits and a Miss" on a top radio show in 1940 and 1941 in California. In addition, as a Naval reservist, he conducted both the Protestant and Catholic Church Choirs at Fleet Activities, Yokosuka, Japan, during the Korean Conflict.

For the past four years he's been active with the Honolulu Gleemen, the oldest male chorus west of the Mississippi. During a Mainland trip last year he visited Pensacola and was guest conductor of the Cadet Choir at several performances.

"I'm aiming for sign-ups shortly after the first of the year," Mr. Manning said. "I don't want anyone to think this is going to be a hit-miss proposition. If we get enough interested men who will be willing to practice three hours a night, twice a week, we'll have the best a cappella group in the islands."

The group will function under the auspices of Special Services, Mr. Manning pointed out.

"Where we're really getting a break," he said, "is in arrangements. The University of Hawaii has offered complete use of its extensive library of music."

An announcement of the time and place for the sign-ups will be made in the immediate future.





On 3 March 1962 I arrived on Oahu and took command of the 1st Marine Brigade. I was a Malahini. I was new to the Islands and to the Brigade. I consider I am now qualified to be a Kamaaina.

During these nine months I have observed many things within the Brigade. One observation is that we still have trouble in communications. I am not speaking about radio and wire communications in the field, but day in and day out problems of communicating the word to all hands.

There are many ways to pass the word and get the dope out, but three of the best are eyeball-to-eyeball, the telephone and the personal memo. I have chosen this last means as one way to get some information to as many Marines as possible via your newspaper. I intend to convey to you periodically some of my observations in this column, hence the title, CG's/OP.

Given Highest Priority

Pay Increases Pushed into DoD Spotlight

Highest priority has been placed on the Department of Defense's proposed legislation on military pay increases by

Secretary Robert S. McNamara, according to a DoD release received this week.

Because of the legislation's effect on welfare and morale of all Armed Forces personnel, Ass't. Defense Sec'y (Manpower) Norman S. Paul has set up the Task Force on Military Compensation.

This task force will develop the legislation to implement pay raise proposals after approval by the President and Secretary of Defense.

It will provide for coordination and collection of necessary supporting information before and during Congressional hearings.

The Task Force will also pre-

pare information to go before Congressional Committees.

Reports from the study group and its recommended legislative proposals are already being studied by the President's Panel on Federal Salary Systems.
