The USNS Barrett, carrying more than 400 Three-Four Marines returning from Guam, is scheduled to tie up at the Army Terminal, Pier 40A, at 8 this morning.

Led by LtCol. D. N. Mc-Dowell, the Brigade Leathernecks are expected to disembark as soon as they can be cleared through customs.

On hand to greet them will be families, friends, Brigade officials, and the U.S. Army Hawaii Band. The Army musical contingent will "sit in" for the Brigade band which is putting finishing touches on to-night's annual Christmas concert.

The Brigade Marines were dispatched to Guam by air Nov. 13, following Typhoon Karen's devastation of the Pacific island.

They augmented security forces there and aided in the rehabilitation.

While this advertisement won't be carried under a general classification heading in today's Windward Marine, it does mark the beginning of what could-with good support -become one of the top mu-sical aggregations in the Pacific.

Ivan L. Manning, Information Director for the Hawaii State Department of Economic Development and a Windward neighbor, has volunteered his time and services to the Station and First Marine Brigade in forming a choral group along the lines of the Pensacola and West Point cadet choirs.

"Don't get the idea," Mr. Manning said, "that this is go ing to be a church-choir-type of organization. I'm aiming at a tight, disciplined team operation that, can represent the

Department at virtually any function."

If the success of such a group is reflected in the background and training of the conductor, Mr. Manning should field a sure-fire winner.

A graduate of Whitman Conservatory of Music, Walla-walla, Wash., the Kailuan sang professionally with the "Six Hits and a Miss" on a top radio show in 1940 and 1941 in California. In addition, as a Naval reservist, he conducted both the Protestant and Catholic Church Choirs at Fleet Activities, Yokosuka, Japan, during the Korean Conflict.

For the past four years he's been active with the Honolulu Gleemen, the oldest male chorus west of the Mississippi. During a Mainland trip last year he visited Pensacola and was guest conductor of the Cadet Choir at several performances.

"I'm aiming for sign-ups shortly after the first of the year," Mr. Manning said. "I don't want anyone to think this is going to be a hit-miss proposition. If we get enough interested men who will be willing to practice three hours a night, twice a week, we'll have the best a cappella group in the islands."

The group will function under the auspices of Special Services, Mr. Manning pointed out.

"Where we're really getting a break," he said, "is in arrangements. The University of Hawaii has offered complete use of its extensive library of music."
