'161 Pilot Awarded Purple Heart for Viet Nam Injury

Captain Virgil R. Hughes, former HMM-161 helicopter pilot, received a belated Purple Heart last Friday for injuries sustained while flying a troop support mission in South Viet Nam.

Capt. Hughes is the first Marine serving with the Brigade to be awarded the Purple Heart for injuries while serving in the Republic of Viet Nam.

He was wounded while serving on temporary duty with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing's HMM-162.

The Captain was presented the award by BrigGen. C. A. Youngdale, Brigade Commander, before a formation of officers and men of MAG-13.

Capt. Hughes was injured Apr. 27, 1963, during a routine flying mission 43 miles south of Da Nang, when Viet Cong automatic fire penetrated the cockpit of his helicopter, hitting him in the leg and causing him to lose control of the chopper and crash.

Another Marine chopper in the vicinity picked up the Captain, his crew and passen-

Senate Gathering Is Now Studying Military Pay Hike

Hearings on the military pay raise began last week before a subcommittee headed by Senator Howard Cannon (D-Nev.).

The Senator said the hearings are not expected to run more than several days and he feels sure the subcommittee will report the bill out promptly after hearings are completed.

"I will anticipate that we will come up with some changes in the bill," Sen. Cannon said. "I am not convinced that the House bill is the complete answer."

The Senator would not elaborate on this statement until he has studied the bill more and the subcommittee has started working on it. (AFPS)

Finer Screening Coming

Corps' 5-Digit MOS Proposal Is Pau; Present System Now Being Revised

Plans to convert all Marine Corps present four-digit enlisted MOS classifications to a proposed five-digit system are pau.

HQMC had planned to put the system into effect sometime this summer.

The five-digit system would have defined Marine job specialties more thoroughly. For example, an additional digit could have defined the infantryman as a rifleman or fire

One colonel now serving with the Brigade and two others who left it only recently have been selected for brigadier general rank.

Gayle, N. D. Henderson, A. H. Adams and F. J. Karsh. Another HQMC promotion board reported out at the same time, naming eight brigadier generals for promotion to major general rank.

One of these, BrigGen. Paul J. Fontana, served as MAG-13 CO from August 1957 to June 1959. He was a colonel at the time.

Others selected for a second star were: BrigGens. P. R. Tyler, W. J. Van Ryzin, W. T. Fairbourn, B. A. Hochmuth, W. R. Collins, L. B. Robertshaw and R. McC. Tompkins.

P.O. Explains ZIP Rulings To K-Bayites

K-Bay personnel residing in either Kailua or Kaneohe are now affected by the Postal Department's new ZIP Code.

The code went into effect July 1, consisting of five digit numbers, allowing a postal clerk to glance at the code and immediately recognize what National area, state and post office the mail is to be delivered to.

Kailua's Zip Code is 96734 and Kaneohe's is 96744. Personnel living on-Station do not have a code yet.

According to WO W. K. Willsmann, Brigade-Station Postal Officer, it is important that each citizen learn the code for his community and use it in the return address of all his correspondence.

In answering mail, the Zip Code should be taken from the return address on incoming mail. The code should follow the city and state in addresses.

Fitness Program Receives Corps Recognition, Support

Headquarters Marine Corps has announced participation by the Corps in the Physical Fitness Leadership Recognition Program sponsored by the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce. The program, endorsed by the President's Council on Physical Fitness, will honor men and women of all ages who are making significant contributions to the Nation's physical fitness effort.

Marine Corps participation is primarily designed to recognize and encourage outstanding achievements of military and civilian personnel of the Corps who participate voluntarily as individuals in non-official programs during off-duty time.

HQMC emphasized that the awards program, as it pertains to DOD personnel, is not intended to recognize outstanding activities of personnel in the official physical fitness programs of the Marine Corps.

Local leaders will be honored by the 4700 chapters of the JCC, and nominated for state competitions. State winners will receive a special bronze medallion. Twelve of the state winners will win a trip to Washington for the Jaycee national awards programs, and three of these will receive

\$1000 cash grants for their accomplishments.

Nominations may be submitted directly to the nearest local chapter of Jaycees, to the state office, or to the national headquarters.

K-Bay Offers Students 25 Alien Lingos

K-Bay's Brigade Language School is currently conducting classes in Spanish, German, French and Italian on a voluntary basis for those desiring to learn a language.

The classes are conducted during the day and evenings with students attending two-hour sessions twice weekly. In the future, additional languages will be added to the school.

The school also has the entrance Language Aptitude Test required for the Army Language School at Presidio, Monterey, Calif. These tests will be given on appointment only and those interested are asked to call 73564 for reservations.

A total of 25 languages are available through the school. The group includes Japanese, Korean, Yiddish, Hebrew (modern), Indonesian, Russian, and others.

During the recent 50th State Fair, the Language School made a total of 1289 recordings of 15 languages. The most popular were Spanish, French and German.

Pre-Kindergarten Tots 'Signing Up'

K-Bayites planning to register their children for next semester's Pre-Kindergarten School have two days to get them enrolled.

Registration begins Monday at the school, located at Bingham and Minter Streets, from 1 to 3:30 p.m. and 7 to 8:30 p.m. The other enrollment day is Friday, Aug. 2.

Children of K-Bay-based Marines and civilian workers in ages 3 and 4 are eligible to attend.

A fee of \$7.50 will be required at time of enrollment. Tuition charges for the full semester are \$67.50 per child or \$15 per month.

More Defense, Less Expense

DOD Budget-Watchers Save \$1 Billion, Boost Readiness

Defense Department savings for Fiscal Year 1963 have been set at \$1 billion and have "actually increased our military effectiveness," according to Secretary Robert S. McNamara.

In a report to President Kennedy, Secretary McNamara said Defense expenditures have been cut without compromising the national

security. The report revealed that Defense has saved \$250,000 more than estimates tabulated a year ago.

The Secretary listed these accomplishments in his year-end report:

- A 100 percent increase in the number of nuclear warheads in strategic alert forces.
- A 60 percent increase in the tactical nuclear forces deployed in Western Europe.
- A 45 percent increase in the number of combat-ready Army divisions.
- A 60 percent increase in airlift capabilities.
- A 100 percent increase in ship construction and in Naval fleet modernization.
- A 200 percent increase in the Special Forces program, which trains men to fight guerrilla insurgents.

Sec. McNamara said savings were realized because of: (1) the purchase of only what is necessary for balanced readiness, (2) the purchase of equipment at the lowest price, and (3) integration and standardization of operating schemes.

In the first instance, Mr. McNamara said costs were lowered by transferring excess (See DOD Ahead, Page 8)

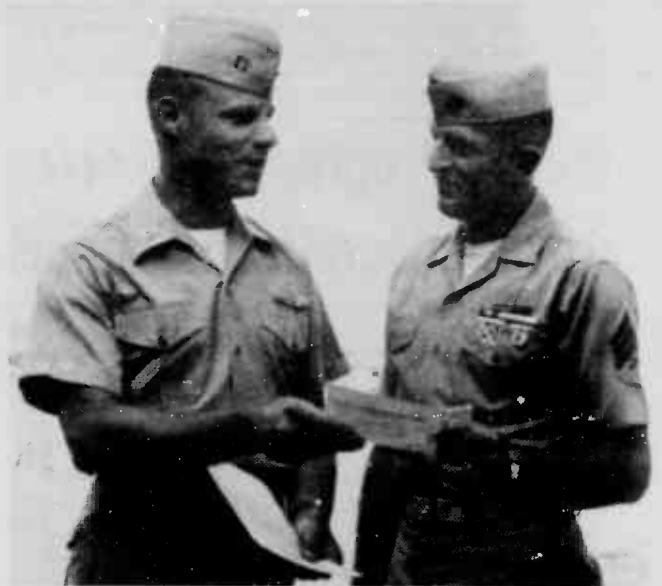

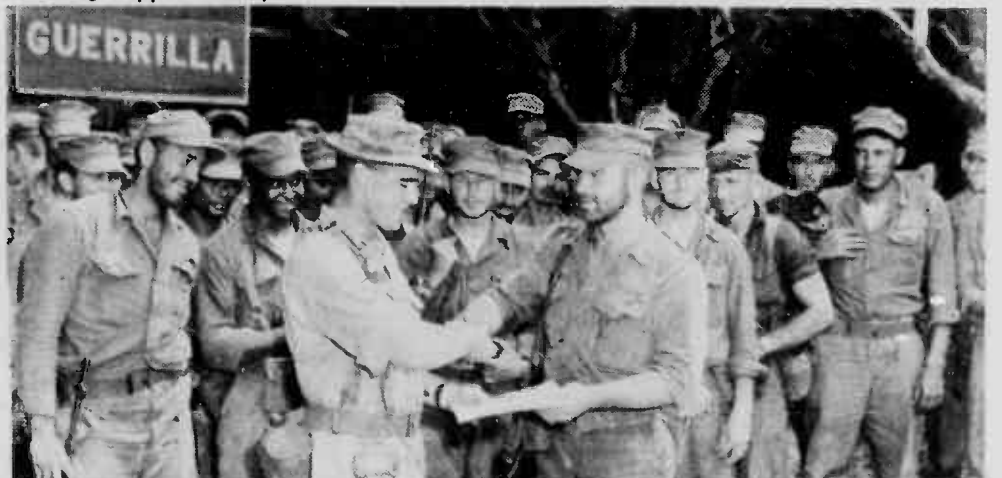

For Meritorious Duty

Commendation Medal OK'd For Joint Staff Personnel

The Department of Defense has announced the establishment of a Joint Service Commendation Medal which will be awarded in recognition of outstanding performances of duty and meritorious achievements by members of the Armed Forces assigned to joint

staffs and other joint activities.

The medal, to be awarded in the name of the Secretary of Defense, is the first which unified commanders can award without going through Service channels.

The joint Service Commendation consists of four conjoined hexagons of green enamel, and a gold eagle with outspread wings grasping in its talons three gold arrows. It is topped by 13 gold stars with a gold base representing land, sea and air, all within a gold circular laurel wreath bound with gold bands.

The medal will be accompanied by a certificate bearing the name of the recipient and details of the award. The ribbon for the medal is colored blue, green and white.

Any member of the Armed Forces who distinguishes himself by meritorious achievement or service while serving in any specified joint activity after Jan. 1, 1963 is eligible for the award.

Authority to award the medal has been delegated to the Deputy Secretary of Defense, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Director of Defense Supply Agency, Director of National Security Agency, and Commanders-in-Chief of unified and specified commands.

equipment instead of buying additional or new equipment to fill needs.

Secondly, better competitive contracting resulted in spectacular reductions in unit costs compared to older "single source" and "cost plus" methods.

The Secretary cited the closing of activities not necessary to the national security, simplification of supply procurement procedures,

and increased efficiency in the areas of transportation and maintenance as "integration and standardization" methods contributing to cost-cutting.

Mr. McNamara said the estimated \$3 billion savings predicted during FY63 to FY67 can be raised another billion, based on the experiences of the fiscal year just completed. (AFPS)

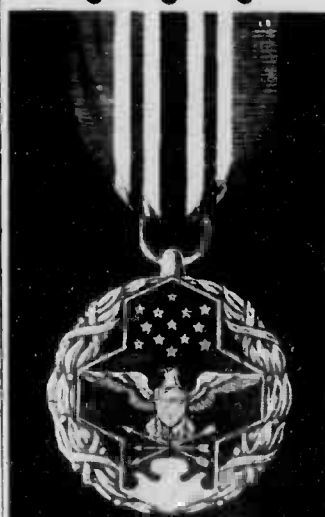
