

General Greene Becomes 23d Commandant

A former rifle company commander with the Fourth Marines in Shanghai in 1937, he became 23d Commandant of the United States Marine Corps.

General Wallace M. Greene Jr. took the Corps' helm Tuesday morning in ceremonies at historic Marine Barracks in Washington, D.C.

At the same time, Gen. Greene's predecessor, General David M. Shoup, retired after more than 37 years as a Marine leader.

Wasting no time in checking on his Marines in the field, Gen. Greene is scheduled to arrive in Hawaii at 1 p.m. today.

It will be his first stop on an 11-day tour of Marine units in the Pacific. He is slated to depart for the Far East tomorrow at 4 p.m.

Gen. Greene and his party plan to make stops at Wake and in the Philippines.

After visits to Japan, Okinawa and Vietnam, the new CMC is scheduled to return to Hawaii Jan. 13 for a one-day

layover enroute back to Washington. His return stop, his itinerary calls for a visit to K-Bay.

A Marine headquarters spokesman said the purpose of the trip is to visit Marine units and facilities in Hawaii, the Far

East and Southeast Asia. The CMC will also obtain on-site knowledge of the military situation in Vietnam.

Born Dec. 27, 1907, Gen. Greene is a graduate of the Naval Academy, class of 1930.

In June 1937, then-Lieutenant Greene arrived in Shanghai to join the Fourth Marines. He first served as

assistant operations officer. Promoted to captain that September, he took command of E-2/4.

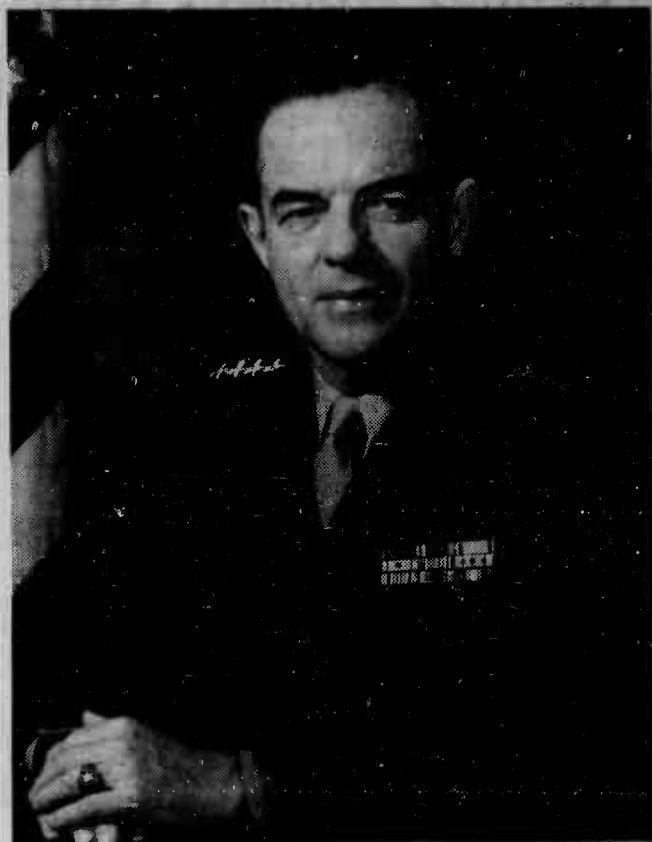
Returning to the U.S. in August 1939, the 23d CMC entered Junior School at Quantico. Upon completing the course in May 1940, he joined the 1st Marine Brigade, then at Quantico, as CO of the 1st Chemical Company.

He sailed with the Brigade in October 1940 for Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, enroute to the Island of Martinique where a crisis was brewing. While in Cuba, the Brigade was redesignated the First Marine Division.

Gen. Greene has served in Hawaii twice in his career. He joined the staff of the Fifth Amphibious Corps here in November 1943.

He was again ordered to Hawaii in June 1948 for duty as Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, at FMFPac headquarters.

Gen. Greene is married to the former Vaughan H. Emory. They have a son, Marine Capt. Wallace M. Greene III, and a daughter, Vaughan.

Belts in Your Buggy? Now Is the Time!

"Seat Belts Save Lives."

And to help save K-Bay lives, a joint Brigade-Station seat belt campaign will get underway aboard the Station Saturday, Jan. 11, featuring belts of all sizes and 10 different colors.

The campaign, proposed by the Brigade Safety/Safe Driving Council, and approved by BrigGen. C. A. Youngdale, Brigade CG, and Col. P. T. Johnston, Station CO, will be held on three consecutive Saturdays (Jan. 11, 18 and 25) between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Sale and installation of belts will be conducted behind Bldg. 1099 and between Bldgs. 1098-1099. The Council has obtained the most desirable belt available and they are approved by both the Society of Automotive Engineers and the General Services Administration.

Seat belts will go for wholesale price at \$3.50 each and installation will be accomplished free by Marine volunteers. Four-man crews will be able to install two front belts in an average time of 20 minutes.

The special service is open to all K-Bayites, including dependents and civilians possessing a green military decal.

"When considering that a K-Bayite might be one of the 40,000 lives lost each year in traffic accidents, our costs for seat belts are a small price to

Cardinal Spellman Holds Sunday Mass

More than 800 Marines, Navymen, and their dependents overflowed K-Bay's St. Michael's Chapel Sunday to participate in the Mass celebrated by His Eminence, Francis Cardinal Spellman, D. D., Archbishop of New York.

Cardinal Spellman, Military Vicar of U. S. Armed Forces, was assisted by K-Bay Catholic Chaplains L. D. Ward and P. W. Power, and by the Very Reverend Mon-

signor Charles A. Kekumano, chancellor-secretary of the Catholic Diocese in Honolulu.

After the Mass, the Cardinal greeted parishioners and spoke briefly from the pulpit.

He then attended a reception at the quarters of Col. Paul T. Johnston, Station CO, where he met BrigGen. and Mrs. C. A. Youngdale and a number of other Marines and dependents.

Following the reception, he

flew by a HMM-161 helicopter to Pearl Harbor to conduct the 11 a.m. Mass in Bloch Arena.

During Mass at K-Bay, Cardinal Spellman personally distributed communion.

The Cardinal recalled his many visits with Marines. He said he particularly remembered the Masses he said for Marines in Korea.

He told of the Marine Corps Color which hangs in his home in N. Y. presented by the Commandant of the Marine Corps during a parade and review at Marine Barracks, Washington, D. C.

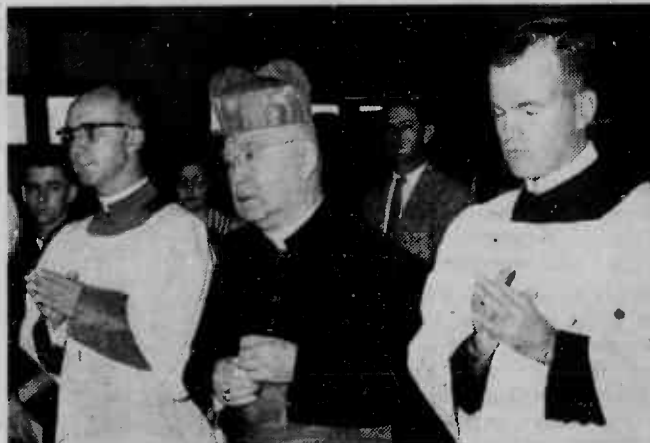
"I have always held Marines in high esteem," he said.

Sunday's visit to K-Bay was not the first for the Military Vicar. He was here in 1945 at the moment of the Japanese surrender.

Upon hearing the news, the Cardinal went to Pearl Harbor where he said a special Mass of thanks aboard the battleship New York.

The 74-year-old Cardinal stopped in Honolulu after making his annual visit to U. S. servicemen around the world. He had just returned from Antarctica.

He departed Honolulu Tuesday for Los Angeles.

At the left of the written theme appeared a painting of an open bible with the quote from St. John: "And the word was made of flesh and dwelt among us."

M-3/4 Marines selected the theme: "In every clime and place." It depicted a Santa Claus arriving by parachute into a bunker. Gifts, dropped by separate parachutes, lay strewn about the ground.

MABS-13 erected a stained glass window on their barracks lawn with the words: "MABS-13 wishes you a Merry Christmas and a Joyful New Year." The work depicted a life-size replica of Christ with a choir girl and boy on each side of Him.

MSgt. Spillman's display consisted of multi-colored lights entwined in small

"Happy New Year! May all the happenings of the new year be pleasant."

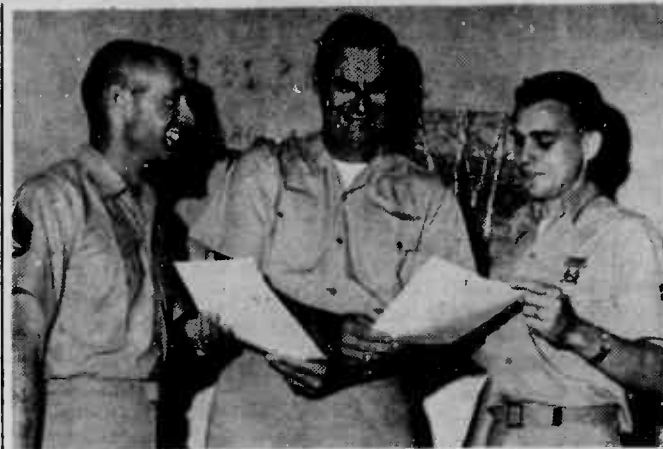
This is all that we most often mean by the phrase. But we are not floating fish-net balls at the mercy of the winds and tides or the happenstances of life.

pay for the protection of our loved ones," WO W. K. Wilmann, Brigade Safety Officer, said.

Thousands of lives are lost each year due to people being thrown into the windshield or out of the car by the impact of the crash. Your chances of being fatally injured are five times greater if you are thrown from the vehicle.

More than half the accidents causing injury or death involve speeds of less than 40 mph. A seat belt can prevent or lessen injury in an accident and more than likely can save your life.

"Facts and figures plus another major statistic — seat belts reduce injuries by more than half and you can get them for half cost — spell only one thing. They're a must for all K-Bayites," Al Roth, Station Safety Officer, added.

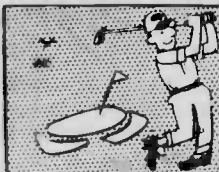

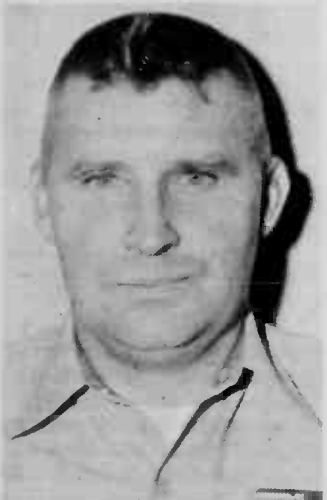

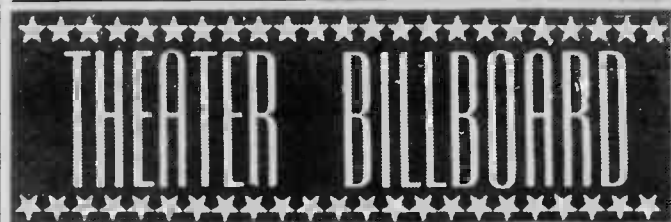
