Also Marine Pvt. J. L. Warren, 21, E-2/4, completes a 63-hour, 15-minute 136-mile run around Oahu.

Feb. 20 — Nearly 1000 Brigade infantrymen from 2/4 reinforced begin departing for the West Coast to participate in training exercise, Operation "Steel Gate."

April 3 — Two-Four arrives in Hawaii aboard the USS Lenawee after six weeks of maneuvers in California. The battalion acted as "enemy" ag-

gressors during Operations "Steel Gate" and "Desert Winds," opposing the 1stMarDiv and 3dMAW.

April 4 — One-Four Marines wait anxiously in their compartments aboard the USS Valley Forge for the signal calling them up to the flight deck and into churning helicopters. Today is "D" Day for exercise "Dirt Road."

April 26 — Groundbreaking ceremonies are held for the construction of a \$2 million housing unit at K-Bay.

May 7 — Brigade Marines are put to the test with the opening of a rugged new Confidence and Obstacle Course. It's rated one of the toughest of its kind in the Corps.

May 18 — Marines and Navymen at K-Bay and citizens of the surrounding Windward communities join in observing annual Armed Forces Day.

June 1 — LtCol. W. J. Kohler assumes command of Service Battalion, succeeding LtCol. E. P. Claude who will become Brigade CEO.

June 4 — Col. Paul T. Johnston succeeds Col. W. R. Campbell as commanding officer of the Air Station. Col. Johnston comes to Hawaii from MCAS, Cherry Point.

June 28 — Col. Henry W. Hise becomes commanding officer of MAG-13. Col. Hise comes to K-Bay from FMFPac where he served as G-1.

July 2 — A five-week contest to select the 1963 K-Bay Water Carnival Queen ends with the crowning of 19-year-old Peggy Dieffenbaugher, sponsored by 2/4.

July 12 — The Brigade's new fighter squadron, VMF-212, received its first two F8B "Crusaders." The former attack squad-

It'll Be Even Dozen Years Of 'Occupation Duty' Here

When the colors unfurled and were hoisted to the top of the flagpole here on the morning of Jan. 15, 1952, it was a ceremony marked throughout the Marine Corps as an occasion of significance.

The Marine Corps Air Station, Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii, was "born" 12 years ago next Wednesday.

Following commissioning, life began to throb on Mokapu Peninsula—the former Naval Air Station — which had laid dormant since 1949.

Col. Frank G. Dailey, the Station's first CO, began preparing facilities for the first

Marine-aviation units which arrived in a few months.

The following year, 1953, the first elements of the First Marine Brigade's ground units began arriving from Camp Pendleton.

Together, the aviation and ground Marines began training to become the formidable First Marine Brigade of today.

Once more, Mokapu Peninsula began to reflect the glory of its past when it was the Sacred Land of Hawaiian royalty.

After adjusting to the activity of its first "tenant" — the Brigade—the Air Station became home for the Navy-managed Pacific Missile Range complex which arrived in 1958. During the same month—September—the First Radio Company arrived here from Camp H. M. Smith.

Today, a dozen years later, the Air Station is "home" for thousands of Marines, Navymen, civilian workers and dependents.

The multi-million dollar installation has become the Corps' major mid-Pacific training base for Marines, air and ground, and is one of the most sought-after duty stations in the Corps.

Biographical Sketch Of General Greene

General Wallace M. Greene Jr. was born Dec. 27, 1907, in Waterbury, Vt.

He graduated from high school in Burlington, Vt., and attended the University of Vermont prior to entering the Naval Academy.

He was commissioned a Marine second lieutenant upon graduation from the Academy in June 1930. Officer's Basic School at the Philadelphia Navy Yard came next.

Duty at Marine Barracks, Portsmouth, N. H., followed; then assignment to Sea School at San Diego.

After school he joined the Marine Detachment aboard the USS Tennessee until March 1934.

Brief assignments at Pensacola, Fla., and Quantico, Va., preceded orders to Marine Barracks, NAS, Lakehurst, N.J. Appointed first lieutenant in November 1934, he completed a course in the Chemical Warfare School at Edgewood Arsenal, Md. In March 1936, Lt. Greene went to MCRD, San Diego.

He sailed for Guam that October, then joined the 4th Marines in Shanghai as Assistant S-3, then CO of E-2/4. In September 1937, the regiment became part of the 2d Marine Brigade and Lt. Greene became a captain.

During the Sino-Japanese hostilities of 1937-38 Capt. Greene was commended for performance of duty while attached to the defense force for the International Settlement in Shanghai.

He then attended the Junior Course at Quantico until May 1940. His next post was with the 1st Marine Brigade — then at Quantico — as CO, 1st Chemical Co. until April 1941. He sailed with the Brigade to Guantanamo Bay where the unit was subsequently designated the 1stMarDiv.

Capt. Greene then served at Quantico and at Camp Lejeune as Asst. G-3, 1stMarDiv.

In November he went to London as a Special Naval Observer. While in England he attended the British Amphibious Warfare School and the Royal Engineer Demolitions School. Now a major, he returned to the U.S. in March 1942.

Duty with the 3d Marine Brigade in Western Samoa and promotion to lieutenant colonel came next.

He then joined the V Amphibious Corps in Hawaii. For outstanding service as G-3, Tactical Group I, during the planning and execution of the Marshall Islands campaign, LtCol. Greene earned his first Legion of Merit w/Combat "V."

He earned a second one as G-3, 2dMarDiv, for outstanding service prior to and during combat operations on Saipan and Tinian.

He returned to the U. S. in September 1944 to become OIC, G-3, Operations, Division of Plans and Policies, HQMC. Duty with the Personnel Dept. there followed.

In April 1946 he was transferred to Little Creek, Va., as G-3, TTULant. There he was promoted to colonel in 1948, with the rank from August 1947.

Returning to Hawaii, he was G-3, FMFPac, until June 1950, when he became Chief of the Combined Arms Section, MCS, Quantico.

He graduated from Naval War College in Washington in June 1953. He was subsequently named Staff Special Assistant to the Joint Chiefs of Staff for National Security Council Affairs.

Promoted to brigadier general in September 1955, he served briefly as ADC, 2dMarDiv. In May 1956, he became the first CG, Recruit Training Command, MCRD, P.I.

His next assignments were as CG, MCRD, P.I., then CG, MCB, Camp Lejeune.

Back at HQMC as G-3 in early 1958, he added a second star in August and served as Deputy Chief of Staff (Plans) from March through December 1959.

On Jan. 1, 1960, he became Chief of Staff with three-star rank.

Gen. Greene was nominated by the late President John F. Kennedy Sept. 24 to be the 23d CMC. The Senate confirmed and on January 1 he was promoted to general and assumed the office of CMC.

His medals and decorations include: the Legion of Merit w/Combat "V" and Gold Star in lieu of a second award, the Navy Unit Commendation, the China Service Medal, the American Defense Service Medal w/Base clasp, the European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal, the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal w/three bronze stars, the American Campaign Medal, the WWII Victory Medal and the National Defense Service Medal.

In the 134-pound class, Hirao pinned LCpl. R. E. Owens, I-3/12, in 55 seconds of the second period.

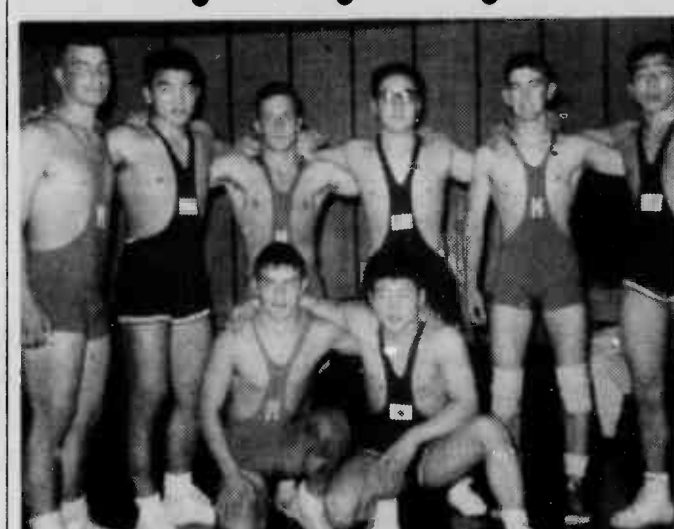
Wrestling at 160 lbs., LCpl. J. L. Bricker, H&S-3/4, was pinned by Hattori in an extended period.
