

Navy Leader Views K-Bay And Marines

Secretary of the Navy Paul H. Nitze, made his first official visit to K-Bay last Saturday morning.

He arrived by HMM-161 helicopter at 10:25 a.m.

The Secretary was greeted by LtGen. V. H. Krulak, CG, FMFPac, BrigGen. M. E. Carl, Brigade CG, and Col. P. T. Johnston, Station CO, who escorted him to Kansas Tower for informal briefings.

Secretary Nitze toured the Air Station by sedan. He was briefed on Group operations by Col. H. W. Hise, MAG-13 CO, at MAG headquarters.

At the HMM-161 flight line, he presented the Navy Commendation Medal to Sgt. John H. Quackenbush. He congratulated the Sergeant and spoke briefly with Mrs. Quackenbush.

The Secretary observed bayonet training by the 4th Marines. From the Regimental CP he saw a demonstration of infantrymen rappelling from hovering helicopters.

Maj. R. J. Smith, CO, 1stRad Co., briefed the Secretary on the operations of his company at the field across from the Main Exchange. From there Secretary Nitze went to the Ontos park. While enroute he observed two 3 12 artillery batteries in convoy.

Secretary Nitze ate lunch with Marines in Messhall #2. He departed K-Bay by helicopter at 12:40 p.m.

Early Easter Services Set For Pyramid

K-Bayites and the general public have been extended an invitation to attend the Air Station's annual Protestant Easter Sunrise Services at Pyramid Rock at 6:30 Easter morning.

Sponsored by the Kailua Ministerial Association and Station - Brigade chaplains, this year's observances are being held near the site of what was once a native heiau on historic Mokapu Peninsula.

Today three crosses stand at Pyramid Rock representing the Trio on Calvary almost 2000 years ago.

Traffic coordinators will direct automobiles to the parking area near the runway. From there, worshippers will be transported by shuttle bus to and from the Pyramid Rock area.

In addition, shuttle bus service will be provided residents in Station housing areas and will service 4th Regimental Headquarters and the Station bus terminal.

This year's guest speaker will be the Reverend Doctor Harry T. Scherer of LaJolla, Calif. He will deliver a sermon titled "Easter Is Personal."

Easter observances will begin with appropriate musical selections by the Brigade Band under the baton of MSgt. Robert Thacker. A bugler sounding "church call" will follow.

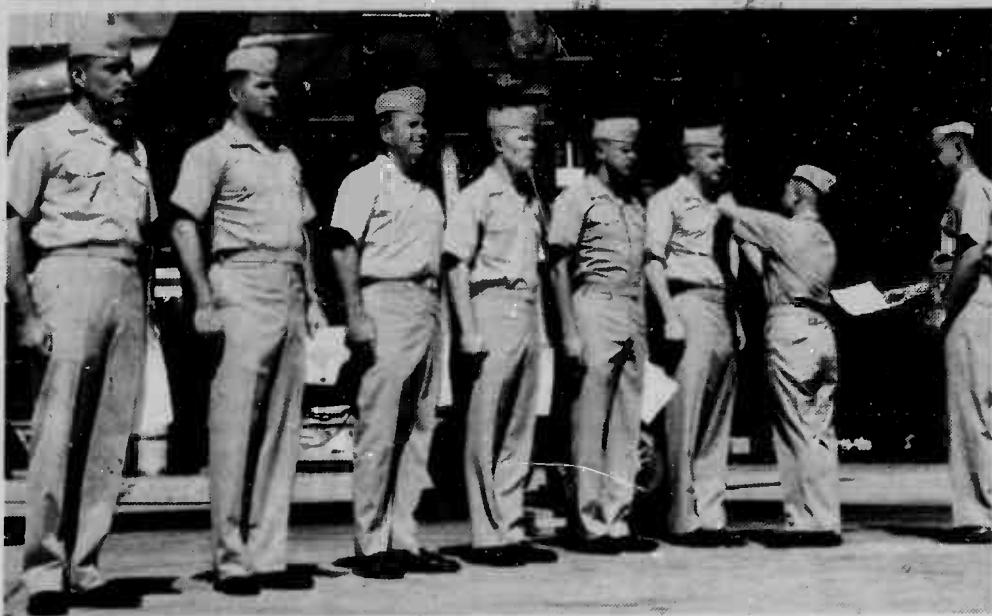
He was presented the Navy Commendation Medal in formal ceremonies on HMM-161's flight line by the Secretary during his Saturday morning visit.

Sanctioned Savings and Loans

To Get It or Save It, See CU for Money

Interested in money? Most people are, and so is the MCAS Federal Credit Union.

What is the Credit Union? It is a financially secure, federally chartered institution established to provide a means for people to lend their savings to each other for a productive use and to help people help themselves through the wise use of thrift and credit facilities.

The Credit Union is authorized by the Department of Defense and approved by HQMC and the CO of the Air Station.

For those with money to save, the Credit Union currently pays 5 1/4% annual interest. FCU's dividends have averaged five percent annually for more than 30 months. This rate is higher than that paid by most savings institutions.

For those who borrow mon-

ey, a charge of one percent per month on the unpaid balance of the loan is made. This charge is well below that of most commercial institutions.

Some 3500 K-Bayites have savings totalling \$667,483.70 on account with FCU, while the branch's money is cur-

rently on loan to 1894 members.

Last year, the MCAS branch approved 2340 loans totaling more than a million dollars.

Chaplain's Corner

Christ Rose from Physical Death Proving that He Was The Messiah

With a word or with a mere touch he cured the paralytic and the crippled, gave sight to the blind and hearing to the deaf, drove out devils from the possessed and cleansed the leper.

He changed water into wine, multiplied the loaves and fishes, calmed the storm and walked on the water. He even brought the dead back to life.

The evidence was overwhelming. Only one conclusion could be drawn. Jesus was the promised Messiah.

Great crowds thronged to see him.

As he entered the temple city of Jerusalem, the people cried out, "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord." They cast palm branches in his path to honor Him. He was their Savior.

Five days later, the scene changed from a palm-strewn road to a Cross-studded hill.

Stronger evidence exists today to tell us that Christ is the Messiah. He had not risen from the dead on that first Palm Sunday. Now he has, "He has risen as He said."

In spite of this abundant clear evidence, we still exchange the palm branch for the cross. We make the exchange when we profess a religion on our dogtags but do not attend church on Sundays.

If you have built such a cross for Christ, tear it down by getting to church this Easter Sunday and every Sunday of the year.

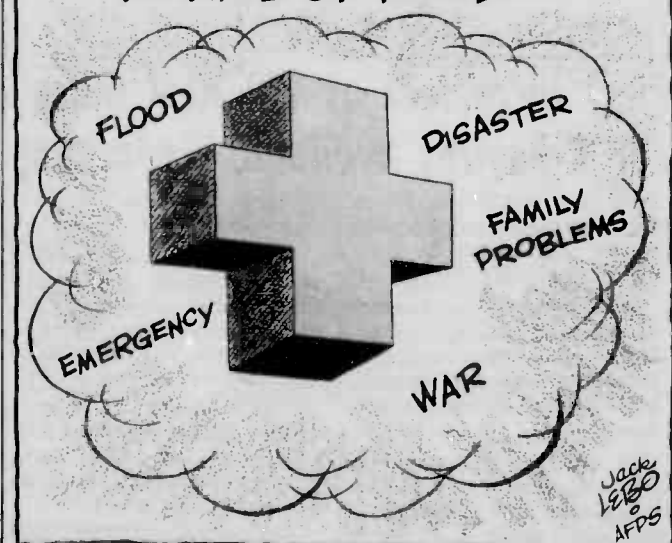

'Blacksheep' Finish Flight To California

Twenty jet attack bombers of the Brigade's VMA-214 made a 2233-mile, non-stop, transpacific flight from K-Bay to El Toro, Calif., last weekend.

Col. O. "E" Howe, commander of the "Blacksheep" squadron, piloted the lead A4B "Skyhawk." He departed Kaneohe at 6 a.m. Friday and landed at El Toro at 11:35 a.m.

Nine aircraft made the flight Friday and eight made it Saturday. Three additional aircraft launched Friday, but returned to Kaneohe when they were unable to take on a full load of fuel from KC-130 "Hercules" tankers in the first of two in-flight refueling areas. They made the flight Sunday.

At El Toro the squadron were to swap their A4Bs for a newer version of the Skyhawk, the A4C. The Blacksheep will then fly to Yuma, Ariz., for instrument and weapons training.

They are scheduled to make the return transpac flight about Apr. 20.

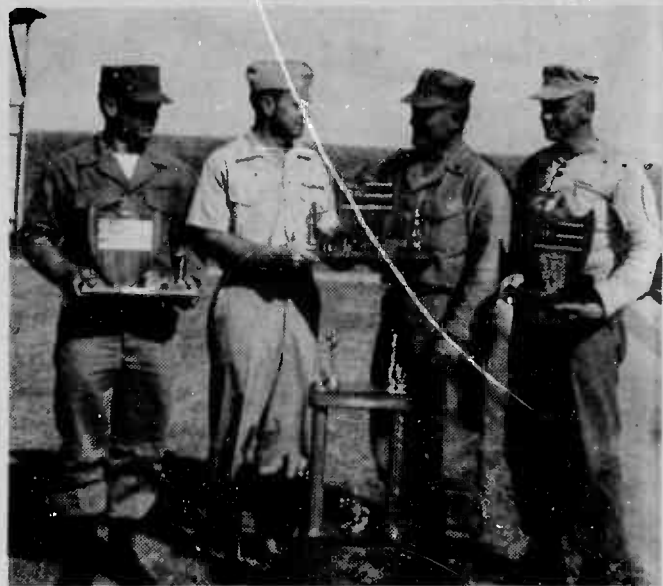

the sunrise photo for some six years before it became a reality.

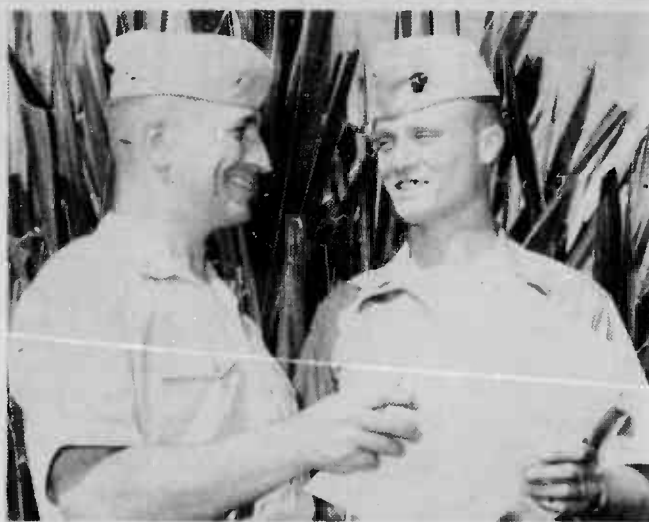
He made the picture on Fort Hase Beach Feb. 6 and subsequently superimposed the cross by a second exposure on the same negative.

Testing, once a month, assures the working condition of the equipment and allows K-Bayites a chance to familiarize themselves with the sounds.

Under actual conditions, the tidal wave alert is repeated five times.

Will Know Before June 7

Some Civilian Workers To Get Raise In Pay If Wage Review Warrants It

Approximately 325 ungraded Navy civilian employees will receive wage increases if a full-scale wage survey ordered by the Office of Industrial Relations in Washington indicates that a new wage schedule is warranted.

The survey was ordered begun Mar. 24 in compliance with the Navy Department's policy of periodic wage reviews. The survey will be con-

ducted jointly by the Army, Navy and Air Force.

Data collectors will visit private employing establishments for the purpose of obtaining wage rates and other data. Upon completion of the survey, the data will be forwarded to the Office of Industrial Relations for evaluation.

If the survey shows that a new wage schedule is warranted, it will be issued not later than June 7.
