# Operation 'Turn Table' Goes Monday; VMA-214 Flying New Skyhawks Home

Operation "Turn Table," VMA-214's 2233-mile trans-Pa-cific return flight from El Toro, Calif., to K-Bay is scheduled to begin Monday.

The non-stop flight will bring the "Blacksheep" and their new A4C "Skyhawk" jet attack bombers home after a month on the Mainland.

The first of the new air-craft are expected to touch

down shortly after 2 p.m. LtCol. O. "E" Howe Jr., Squadron Commander, will lead the initial four-plane division.

Twelve Skyhawks are set to make the flight Monday, with the remaining aircraft sched-uled to land Tuesday morn-ing.

Again, as in Operation "Change Train," the Squad-

ron's attack bombers will be refueled over the Pacific twice by KC-130 Hercules tankers from El Toro's VMGR-352.

The aerial refuelers will also conduct weather reconnais-sance over the flight course.

The 32 officers and 200 enlisted men of VMA-214 departed K-Bay Mar. 20 on operation "Change Train" to trade-in their A4B aircraft for the newer model A4C.

After receiving the new air-craft at El Toro, the squadron underwent two weeks of flight and weapons training at MCAS, Yuma, Ariz. They flew back to El Toro Apr. 11 to prepare for the Pacific Ocean crossing.

In event of foul weather, the operation will be postponed for 24 hours.

# Brigade Air, Ground Teams Support Army Infantrymen

Air and ground elements of the Brigade joined forces with the Army and the Navy to conduct an amphibious

landing exercise on the island of Molokai yesterday.

The exercise, which be-gan Apr. 9, is dubbed "West Wind." It involves some 6000 troops of the Army's 25th Infantry Division and 13 ships of the Navy's am-phi-bious forces.

Assaulting Army troops are being given Marine Corps close air support by VMFs 212 and 232, MACS-2 is providing air control.

A 1stLdgSpt team of com-municators, engineers and shore party men are assist-ing and advising the Army on beach operations.

HMM-161 is providing heli-copter support for the opera-tion.

K-Bay's Runway 18 became a simulated LPH from which 20 Marine Corps UH-34Ds and six Army H-21s transported troops of 1/35, 25th Infantry Division to the Popohaku Beach area yesterday.

After the initial assault HMM-161 reduced to eight the number of helicopters on call for the operation.

The exercise was scheduled to continue ashore as a coun-ter-insurgency and anti-aerila operation until Sunday.

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## E-7s, Below Must Get CMC Approval For Time Over 20

Career Advisors often talk to senior Staff NCOs who are unaware of data contained in the Marine Corps Manual. One of the subjects — enlistment extensions.

A Marine in gunnery sergeant rank and below may not extend his enlistment, should it take him beyond 20 years' active duty without approval from CMC.

Such requests are submitted to CMC three months before time for discharge. Some requests go to HQMC six months ahead of time. Late submissions create extra work and cause an administrative problem.

Each request must go through two separate branches in the Personnel Section. Some requests have to undergo a further step and be screened by the Enlisted Performance Board.

In a few cases, late entries require holding the Marine long enough to act upon his request. He is retained for a short period of time, which often finds him facing complications when his reenlistment bonus is tabulated.

This may be a minor oversight to some, but to those contemplating staying aboard beyond 20 or 30 years it can be a problem. It's easy to avoid. Get your request in on time.

## Brigade Marines Learn New Methods As School Opens in Basic Demolitions

Twenty 2/4 Marines became the first graduates of the Brigade's newest school last week as they completed four days of instruction in demolitions.

The school, designed to familiarize Marines with basic demolitions, will be attended by personnel of the 4th Regiment.

Classroom instruction begins Wednesday in the school area, and continues through

Friday. Night problems are scheduled for Friday at Bel-lows Air Force Station.

Saturday's training includes live firing at the Brigade's EOD Burn Pit.

According to SSgt. R. G. Walker, Demolition School NCOIC, classes will include the history of demolitions, electric and non-electric firings devices and the use of demolition equipment.

In addition students will be

familiarized with various types of charges and the correct procedures for converting bombs to charges.

The curriculum also includes classes on the destruction of obstacles, use of satchel charges and both timber and steel cutting.

Instructors for the course are SSgt. Walker, Sgt. E. A. England and Sgt. D. O. Floyd.

"Although there are about 125 kits to be returned I am indeed pleased with K-Bay's generous response to Red Cross' fund appeal this year," Mr. Hadley said.

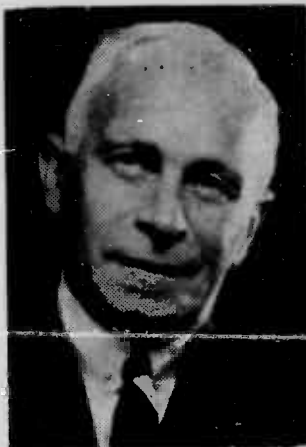
## Ten Selected For Fair Duty

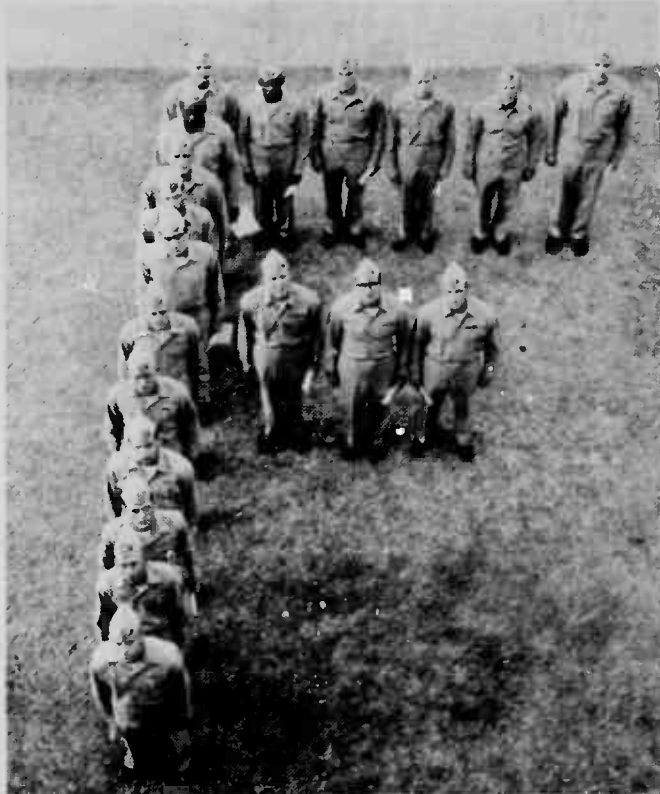

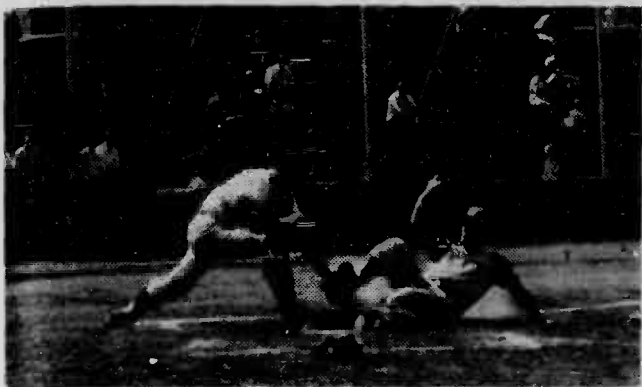

Two hundred Marines will test the effects of water rationing against the results of uncontrolled water consumption at Camp Lejeune in July.

The Marine Corps present policy is to allow a Marine all the water he desires. The tests will be conducted to de-

termine how a Marine performs his normal duties when placed on a minimum amount of water in the event of a water shortage.

Two companies of Marines with the Drum and Bugle Corps participate in the Marine Corps Memorial ceremonies.

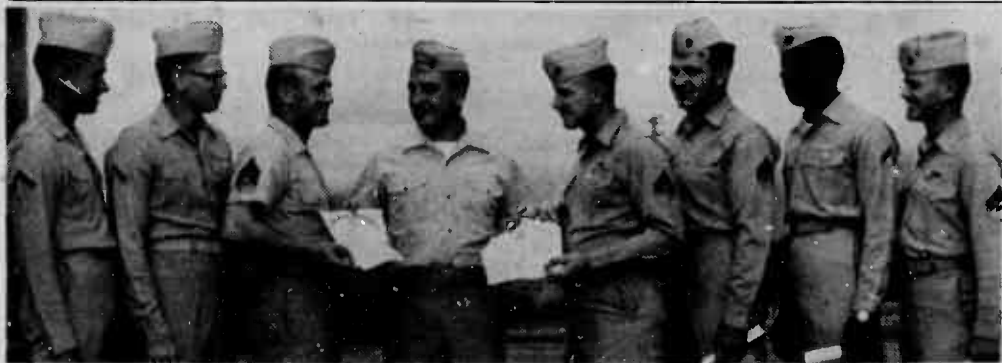
