Brigade and Station Marines and Navy men are busily eyeing candidates to represent their units in the 1964 Water Carnival queen competition.

This year's Water Carnival will be held July 12 from 11 a.m. 'til 5 p.m.

Queen contestants must be single residents of Oahu (permanent or temporary), between the ages of 15 and 19 and available during the period May 20 through July 14. Contestants under 18 must have their parents' consent to participate in the queen contest.

The seven major units of Brigade and Station must make their final selections by June 15. The Queen Contest will begin June 15 and end at 4 p.m. July 1.

The winning candidate will be the girl who receives the most votes. Each vote will cost a penny and all

monies donated will go to K-Bay's Youth Activities fund.

On carnival day the Queen's duties will include awarding trophies to the winners of the events and greeting visitors.

Prior to carnival day, the queen will make personal appearances over local TV stations, be interviewed by radio commentators, and participate in several Windward community functions.

In the Korean conflict, the Colonel served as a photo reconnaissance pilot with the 1stMAW.

On his next duty assignment, Col. Jobe was aide to the Commanding General, 3dMAW, Miami, from 1952 to 1953. Col. Jobe then spent the next two

years at Cherry Point with MAG-33 as a fighter pilot.

Following his tour at Cherry Point, Col. Jobe attended Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, N.Y., where he received his Master of Science degree in industrial management.

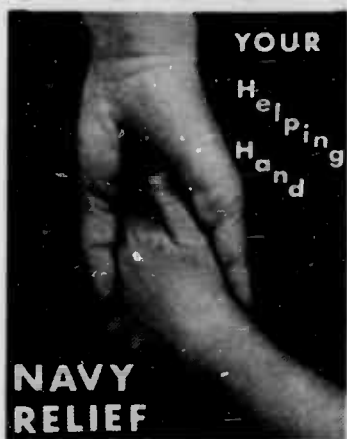
The Colonel assumed duties as S-3 Officer at MCAS, Yuma

Nominations By July 10

HQMC Stresses LDO-WO Nominees Be Pre-Eminently Qualified Marines

Nominations for the fiscal year 1965 Limited Duty Officer and Warrant Officer programs must reach HQMC by July 10, 1964, according to MCO 1040.23A.

The recently published order gives administrative instructions for the programs which provide enlisted Marines with an opportunity of gaining officer status.

Warrant Officer applicants began the required aptitude-area tests May 3. The tests

will be administered until June 30.

All Marines who meet the basic qualifications for the program (as outlined in MCO 1040.14A) may make application to their commanding officer.

However, commanding officers were directed to nominate only those applicants whom they consider pre-eminent qualified for appointment.

In the past K-Bay Marines were often faced with shortages of aids material and space in which to produce their original creations. It is hoped that the Schools' workshop will help them construct new and interesting aids.

"We are available to offer assistance and guidance to all hands in making up graphic displays. This includes illustrations, printing and correct color selections for posters," stated SSgt. P. J. Stewart, NCOIC. Sgt. Stewart is aided by

Cpl. C. L. Stephens, assistant NCOIC, and LCpl. K. M. Noe, illustrator.

On hand for do-it-yourself patrons will be paper, bristol board, T-squares, triangles, brushes, paints, speedball ink pen sets, drafting boards and tables.

An opaque projector is also available to those desiring enlargements of illustrations. The projector operation is simple and requires no artistic ability to produce a professional reproduction on the first try.

"Give our workshop a try. It will be well worth your efforts for you and your students," adds Sgt. Stewart.

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Korea CMC, Party To Visit MCAS, Brigade Wednesday

The Commandant of the Republic of Korea Marine Corps, LtGen. KIM Du Chan, will visit the Station and Brigade Wednesday.

Members of the General's party include: BrigGen. LEE Yong Woo, Col. KIM Ki Hwa and Col. KIM Sung Dae.

While serving as the Assistant Commandant/Chief of Staff, KMC, in November 1961, the General was promoted to his present rank and assumed the post of KMC Commandant.

Prior to his assignment as Assistant Commandant, Gen. KIM served as the Commanding General of 1st Korean Marine Division.

Gen. KIM, who is scheduled to arrive at 9 a.m., will receive honors at Dewey Square. He will then proceed to K-Tower for a briefing by Station and Brigade commanders.

The tentative schedule of the General and his party include touring MAG-13 areas, ServBn., Field Maintenance, Brigade Schools

and visiting the MACS-2 area.

In the evening, Gen. KIM will be the guest of BrigGen. M. E. Carl, Brigade CG, at an informal dinner at Gen. Carl's quarters.

Gen. KIM began a three week tour of Marine Corps installations on the Mainland April 29.

The General has made official calls in Washington, D.C. and at MCS, Quantico, and has visited the World's Fair and United Nations in New York.

Gen. KIM and his party have observed Marine activities at Norfolk, Camp Lejeune, Parris Island and Albany.

Tomorrow, the General will arrive for a two-day visit in the Los Angeles area. He is scheduled to depart the West Coast Monday and arrive in Hawaii that evening.

Tuesday, Gen. KIM and his party will be the guests of FMFPac.

They are scheduled to depart for Korea at 11 a.m. Thursday.

2-4 Readies for Tac Test On 'Big Island' May 20-21

Marines of 2/4 were busy this week preparing for the annual BLT Tactical Test to be held at Pohakuloa next Wednesday and Thursday.

In support of 2/4 for the Tactical Test are: H-3/12, an engineer platoon, a recon platoon, a communication platoon (radio relay), a shorefire control party

(3/12), a shore party, and a detachment from C-Motors.

Attack bombers from VMA-214 will provide close air support and HMM-161 will fly aerial observer reconnaissance missions.

The Tactical Test will be administered under the direction of Col. E. P. Dupras Jr., Regimental CO.

According to Maj. H. D. Fredericks, Regimental S-3 (Assistant Tactical Test Director), the object of the test is to test the proficiency of participating elements of a BLT under simulated battlefield conditions and to evaluate the adequacy of the unit's training.

BLT 2/4 is scheduled to return to K-Bay May 23 when BLT 3/4 goes to the Big Island.

Plans call for 3/4 to take the Tac Test June 3 and 4 and return to K-Bay June 6.

BLT 1/4 is scheduled to depart for Pohakuloa June 6, to take the Tac Test on June 17 and 18, and return to K-Bay June 20.

Marines Volunteer Saturdays

ServCo. Helping Build Waimano Campsite

More than 100 Marines from Service Co., ServBn. are volunteering their services each Saturday to help the residents of Waimano Training School and Hospital build a semi-permanent campsite.

Development of the campsite began Mar. 21 under the leadership of 1stLt. E. R. Markell II, Assistant OIC of Fleet Stock Account.

Lt. Markell became interested in working with retarded children when he visited Waimano in the fall of 1963.

At that time the Lieutenant was taking a course in Devel-

opmental Psychology at Schofield Education Center, given by the University of Hawaii, under the direction of Dr. Satoru Izutsu of Waimano.

After a tour of the school, Lt. Markell talked to Dr. Izutsu about how Marines could help the school. Early this year, a discussion was held at Waimano with school officials and Service Co., CO, Capt. G. H. Taylor III, to discuss plans for helping.

Officials of the school suggested that a campsite near Waimano be cleared and developed in order to save transportation costs and fees which were being incurred by the school in sending residents to camps and picnic grounds away from the school.

After the meeting, Marines of Service Company were introduced to the Waimano Program with a company hike under the direction of Jerry Ishimoto, Waimano's recreation director.

At Waimano, the Marines played volleyball with the residents who will be working with them in building the site. Through this sport activity, which has become a weekly contest, the Marines became acquainted with the residents they are working to help.

After the site for the

camp was picked, the Marines and the residents began the project by clearing the immediate surroundings of the site area in order to avoid hazard of fire.

Upon clearing the area, a general purpose tent was erected to provide immediate shelter for the volunteers.

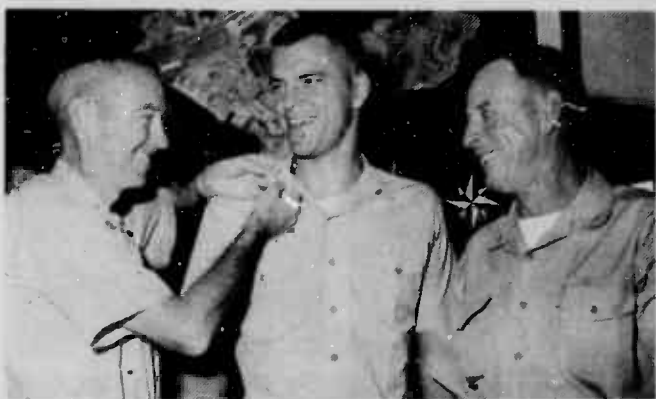
Permanent floors for four wall tents will be built. A campfire circle, a kitchen area and safe hiking trails around the area will be developed.

VMCJ-2 Wins Navy Citation

VMCJ-2, 2d MAW, MCAS, Cherry Point, N. C. became the first Marine Corps unit to receive the Navy Unit Commendation Medal during peace time.

The reconnaissance squadron was cited by the Secretary of the Navy "for exceptionally meritorious service during the period Sept. 1, 1960 to Dec. 1, 1962, in connection with the planning and executing of aerial reconnaissance missions in support of operations of the utmost importance to the security of the United States."

VMCJ-2 uses "Skynight" aircraft for electronic reconnaissance and counter measure missions. For aerial photographic reconnaissance operations they use "Crusaders."
