Other FMF Units Affected

Division Service Battalion Due 'New Look'

Reorganization of several FMF units will be effected July 1 in accordance with a plan approved by CMC.

Several years of testing, evaluation, and study will be culminated with the establishment of an independent Shore Party Battalion and reorganization of the existing Service Battalion within the Marine Division.

It is not known at this time how these changes will affect the Brigade's Service Battalion.

In a related move the Force Service Regiment will undergo a functional realignment.

In the division, the ServBn. will discard the present land-

ing, light and medium support companies and reconstitute along more effective functional lines.

This will spawn a ServBn. with four companies (H&S, Maintenance, Supply, and Truck) more adaptable to the combat service support requirement of the division's tactical units.

The combat service support capability of the old Medium and Light Support Companies will be perpetuated, by relocation within the newly created companies.

The result is a functionally organized battalion with each company having its primary mission identified by name. The battalion's mission of general and direct combat service support

to the division has been broadened.

Reorganization will move the LdgSpt. companies from the ServBn. to an independent Shore Party Bn. These companies will contribute the nucleus for three Shore Party operating companies.

The battalion will have the capability of supporting three Regimental Landing Teams making either amphibious or helicopter landings.

The reconstructed FSR will also stress the functional alignment mentioned for the division's ServBn. Under the new FSR structure H&S Bn. remains, but certain supply functions are moved to the newly created Supply Bn.

This battalion acquires stock account from H&S Bn. and Supply Co. from the old Material Supply and Maintenance Bn. Material Supply and Maintenance Bn. drops all external and supply capabilities and becomes Maintenance Bn.

Korean CMC Visits K-Bay; Sees Marines, Equipment

LtGen. KIM Du Chan, Commandant of the Republic of Korea Marine Corps, completed a three-week tour of U.S. Marine Corps installations Wednesday when he visited the Brigade and Station here at K-Bay.

Upon his arrival at 9 a.m., the General received honors at Dewey Square.

He then visited Kansas Tower where he was briefed by Brigade and Station commanders.

N.Y. World's Fair Features Discount for Armed Forces

The New York World's Fair which opened its gates Apr. 22 expects more than 70 million people to pass through the turnstiles.

A steady stream of visitors is expected to continue through the gates until Oct. 18 when they close for the winter. The fair will re-open Apr. 21, 1965 and close permanently Oct. 17, 1965.

During the two 180-day periods thousands of expected visitors will be Armed Forces personnel of the U.S. and other nations.

Special discounts and privileges will be available to servicemen and their families who visit New York during the fair.

On arrival in New York City, servicemen should go to the Times Square USO, 132 West 43d St., to secure special discount tickets for admittance to the fair.

The discount tickets offer a 65-cent saving on a regular \$2 admission. Children's discount tickets are 67 cents each.

Service personnel are advised to make advance hotel reservations if possible, since hotels are expected to operate at capacity during the peak summer months.

The USO will have an information office and lounge at the Fair where servicemen and their guests can relax and get information on all aspects of the fair.

Free tickets to shows and attractions will be offered as

they become available at the lounge.

About 75 per cent of the exhibits will not charge admission and of the 134-full-size pavilions, 119 will have no entrance fee. (AFPS)

Without Discipline Confusion Reigns; Good Spiritual Training Preserves Us

However, without discipline only confusion can exist. We might liken humans without discipline to a cluster of little steel bearings rolling around in a saucer, each independently crossing paths and colliding with others.

Discipline is the magnet put under the saucer which draws them together in a symmetrical pattern.

Once we are aware of the basic rules of society, self-discipline ought to take the place of external discipline.

The training of our minds and spirits and wills to obey our own highest impulses and desires will preserve us from dreaded, external punishment.

Some California K-Bayites May Get State Tax Refund

Some K-Bayites may be among the thousands of California servicemen due for state tax refunds if they were assigned away from their home state and paid state income taxes for the time that they were away.

According to Navy Times, a California Franchise Tax Board ruling says "the personal income tax law provides that a person who leaves this state for other

than a temporary or transitory purpose becomes a non-resident on leaving.

"Therefore, a member of the military forces who is assigned permanently to a post of duty outside this state will be considered to be a non-resident for state income tax purposes.

"If, however, the taxpayer is domiciled in California and his wife remains here, the wife will be required to file a return and pay tax on one half the military pay earned by the husband outside the state, plus all income derived from California sources."

In addition to refunds, the ruling means that in the future Californians need not pay the income taxes for the time they are on permanent assignment out of the state.

California tax law has a statute of limitations of four years so claims for refunds cannot be made for any year before 1960. The taxes for 1963 were due last month.

K-Bayites among those who feel that they have a refund coming should write to the State of California Franchise Tax Board and ask for Form 543 which is the document on which to file a claim.

Slated Locally, Island-Wide

Off-Duty Education Entrance Exams Are Available to Qualified K-Bayites

During this month, June and July off-duty education entrance examinations and achievement tests will be administered at four educational institutions on the island.

On Monday at 6 p.m., the California Achievement Test will be given at the Kailua Community School for Adults. A fee of \$1 is charged. Two days are required to complete this test.

The University of Hawaii will hold entrance examinations June 9 at 6 p.m., June 13 at 1 p.m. and June 23 at 6 p.m. The cost is \$2.

The American College Testing Program Test (ACT) will be held at St. Louis High

School, Honolulu, on June 20. A \$4 fee is charged.

On July 8 the College Entrance Examination Board (CEEB) Test will be administered at a testing center to be designated. The fee for this test depends on the type and number of tests taken.

Personnel desiring to take either the ACT or the CEEB tests must apply approximately four weeks before the testing dates.

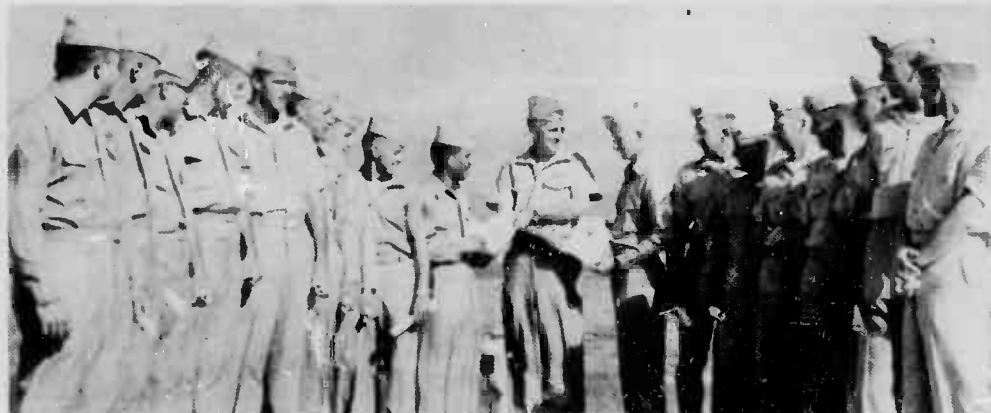

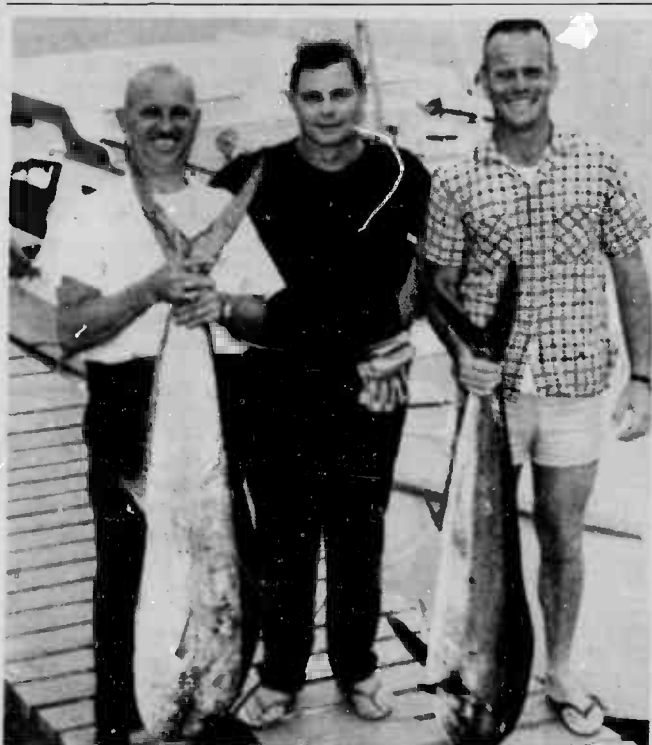

MAG-13 has chosen this unique way to inspect its Motor Transport vehicles and equipment. All the vehicles will be together at one time in a space suitable for inspection purposes.

Originally scheduled during Operation "Long Day," the vehicle display was postponed because of prior commitments.

More than 300 prime movers and trailers are scheduled to be displayed.

The display will be set up

on a 400-foot front and will extend approximately 450 feet in depth. The vehicles will be displayed by squadrons and will be inspected by squadron commanders.

Improper Address Hampers Delivery

Although the Armed Forces have discouraged the sending of personal mail for military personnel to service headquarters, personal mail continues to flow in.

Armed Forces policy discourages the use of official mail channels for the receipt or dispatch of personal or unofficial mail.

Most mail received is improperly addressed and does not carry the service number of the addressee.

The problem has become so acute that the services can no longer assume responsibility for forwarding mail addressed to military personnel in care of a service headquarters unless the addressee's service number, or other identifying information, is included in the address.

The mail will be sent to the post office, according to Armed Forces Press Service, for return to sender.

Properly addressed personal mail sent to service headquarters should include the individual's full name, service number, grade, organization and current duty station.

Physical Fitness Class To Be Held at El Toro

Indoctrination courses designed to train instructors for the Marine Corps Physical Fitness Centers will be held at HQMC and MCAS, El Toro, June 2 through 9.

All commands authorized physical fitness centers are authorized to send two non-commissioned officers (sergeants or above) to the appropriate clinic.

A candle was lit by each girl as she passed over a simulated bridge inside a horseshoe formed by the Girl Scouts. The Brownies lit a candle for each Scout law.

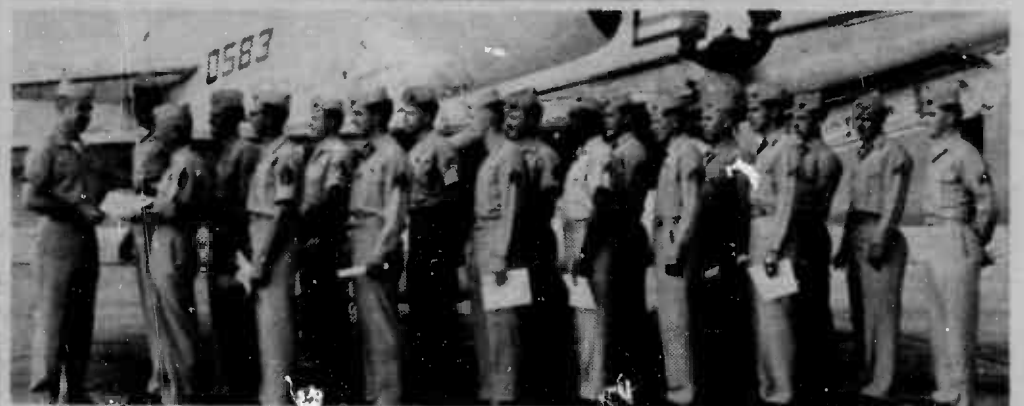
