PRAYER FOR PEACE, MEMORIAL DAY, 1964 2 1

A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS on Memorial Day of each year PCHIVES&LIBRARY custom of this Nation to honor its forefathers and compatriots who have laid down their lives that we might live in freedom; and

WHEREAS we are eternally grateful to them for their supreme and selfless sacrifice on the field of battle; and

WHEREAS the same revolutionary beliefs and ideals for which our forebears fought and died are still at issue in the world and the challenge against them can be met only through the same qualities of bravery, fortitude, and unyielding determination shown by our noble dead; and

WHEREAS Memorial Day each year provides a fitting occasion upon which our citizens may commemorate departed loved ones and offer prayers for the preservation of liberty and peace free from the threat of war; and

WHEREAS for this purpose the Congress, in a joint resolution approved May 11, 1950 (64 Stat. 158), requested the President to issue a proclamation calling upon the people of the United Statestio observe each Memorial Day as a day of prayer for permanent peace;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LYNDON B. JOHNSON, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate Memorial Day, Saturday, May 30, 1964, as a day of prayer for permanent peace, and I call upon all the people of the Nation to invoke God's blessing on those who have died in defense of our country and to pray for a world of law and crder. I designate the hour beginning in each locality at eleven o'clock in the morning of that day as the time to unite in such prayer.

I also urge the press. radio, television, and all other information media to cooperate in this observance.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

DONE at the City of Washington this twenty-third day of April in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and sixty-four, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and eighty-eighth.



Marine Corps officer promotion plans for fiscal year 1965 were announced last week by CMC.

The promotion zone to major general ends with BrigGen. Ormond R. Simpson. Five of the seven officers in the zone may be selected by the board which meets July 7.

This board will also consider 54 officers for promotion to brigadier general in the zone ending with Col. Samuel W. Smith Jr. Six selections are authorized.

One hundred-twenty selections are authorized for promotion to colonel. There are 230 officers in the zone ending with LtCol. kex Wilson. The board meets July 20.

Beginning in FY65 it is

planned that the continuation board will be authorized to continue all twice-failed lieutenant colonels to 26 years of commissioned service except those which the continuation board finds should not be continued on active duty under any circumstances.

The promotion zone to-lieutenant colonel ends with Mai. Timothy S. Vogt. The Marine Corps has discontinued the use of the zone of consideration. One hundred eighty-eight se lections are authorized.

This board will meet August 11. It will also consider 19 LDOs in the zone ending with Maj. Eugene D. Anderson.

# Social Security Offers Many Important Benefits To Aid You and Your Family

All persons entering active duty in the Marine Corps are required by law to contribute a small portion of their pay to the Social Security program.

Many of these people tend to associate Social Security benefits with old age, a mediocre monthly pay check or other fringe benefits that old age accrues. This is not so.

Social Security benefits can play an important part in our lives. Looking into a few of them you will find:

Total Disability Payments—If a person becomes unable to work due to disability. Social Security will pay him monthly benefits based upon his earnings before disability occured.

Social Security will also supplement the disability payments for children and the wife if she is providing for a child eligible for the payments, and for the wife (without children) if she is 62 or over.

Eligibility—A person must work under Social Security for at least five years, or, since credits are counted in units of calendar quarters, at least 20 calendar quarters.

in units of calendar quarters, at least 20 calendar quarters.

An exception to the five-year or 20-calendar quarter requirement are the free-wage credits granted to servicemen who served on active duty between 16 September 1940 and 31 December 1956.

These free credits count the same as actual earnings of £160 per month in determining whether you have enough credits for a Social Security benefit and in figuring the amount you or your family can receive.

Amount of Disability—A personneed not be totally helpiess. He must have a disability that is so severe, that in the words of the law, renders a person "unable to engage in any substantial gainful activity."

The disability must be a physical or mental condition that is expected to continue indefinitely or to eventually result in death. These conditions must show up in medical examinations and tests.

Survivor Payments—In the case of death, certain members of a Marrine's family can receive monthly

payments if the deceased Marine worked long enough under the Socil Security law.

In addition, a single lump-sum death payment can be made to the wid-ow/widower if she or he was living in the same household. This lump-sum is intended to help towards burial expenses. The payment is figured on three times the monthly retirement benefit, not to exceed \$225.

Those eligible for survivor benefits are: unmarried children under list, children 18 or over provided they were disabled before reaching 18 and have remained so since, and widows, provided she is caring for a child who is entitled to payments. Also dependent widowers 62 and over, dependent parents 62 or over.

and a divorced wife, if, prior to the death of the husband, was dependent upon the deceased husband pursuant to a court order or agreement and har in her care the child who is also entitled to payments.

### Some CS Workers To Get Pay Lift

The Station's 325 blue collar Civil Service workers will receive pay raises averaging 12 cents per hour effective June 7

The raise is the result of a recent full scale wage survey in which current wages were compared with those in private industry in Hawaii.

After reviewing the data collected, the Navy Department in Washington approved a new Schedule of Wages for the Honolulu area.

Army and Air Force employees will get similar pay increases.

The increased per-nour rates are 2d Step Laborers (Pay Level 2), \$2.13; Warehousemen and Helpers (Pay

Level 5), \$2.32; Automotive Mechanics, Carpenters, Painters (Pay Level 10), \$3.05; Electricians (Pay Level 11) and other benchmark trades, \$3.19.

Electronics Mechanics (Pay Level 12) will receive \$3.51


