

K - Bay Carnival Time Again!

It's carnival time again under the "big top" of beautiful Hawaiian skies. The Fourth Annual K-Bay Water spectacular will make its big splash Sunday.

There'll be thrills from beginning to end in this one-

day extravaganza that provides six hours of entertainment. The free-admission carnival is open to the public and starts at 11 o'clock.

This year's carnival promises to be one of the biggest and best. More than 30,000

spectators attended last year and officials anticipate more carnival goers this year.

Carnival planners have "something for everyone" and

have sought to improve the show and the midway for a more enjoyable and entertaining day.

There will be ample parking space with the entire flight line available near the carnival grounds. Military Police will be on hand to direct the flow of traffic to the area.

To avoid parking problems and alleviate traffic congestion, free bus service from and to on-Station housing areas will be operating throughout the day. (See page 4.)

A colorful 52-page souvenir program will be distributed free at the main gate and on the carnival grounds by members of the youth clubs that receive support from the K-Bay Youth Activities Association.

All proceeds from the carnival, including the penny-votes for the queen, revenue from advertising in the program, and profits from carnival concessions will go to

support the K-Bay Youth Activities Association.

More than 40 booths on the midway will offer food, drink, fun and relaxation.

The midway and fun-and-games concessions will be sponsored and operated by K-Bay units. Some of the fun-filled events included on the midway are a new parachute-jump for the kids, a train ride, a merry-go-round and a river steamer for young and old kids alike.

A cake booth, staffed by Officers, Staff and Enlisted Wives Clubs, will offer home-baked wares ranging from dainty cupcakes to mountainous works of confectionary art.

An information booth will be located near the center of the midway and adequate restroom facilities will be available.

Highlighting the day of activities will be the presentation of the 1964 Water Carnival Queen, Miss Connie Miller, who will reign over the carnival.

Observe Belated Anniversary

K-Bay Corpsmen Hold Birthday Party

K-Bay's Hospital Corpsmen played host to other corpsmen of Oahu Wednesday in a belated observance of the Hospital Corps' 66th Anniversary.

Rear Admiral J. H. Holland, Commander in Chief, Pacific Fleet Medical Officer, performed the traditional cake-cutting at ceremonies held at Pyramid Rock Recreational Area.

Because of heavy operational commitments, the observance was postponed from the actual anniversary date of June 17, so that a maximum

number of corpsmen could attend the ceremonies.

Admiral Holland presented the first pieces of cake to the oldest and youngest members present.

The oldest Sailor was HMC H. A. Young, 55, currently serving with HqCo—Brigade.

Eighteen year-old HN D. M. McDonald, a company corpman with L—3/4, was the youngest member.

The Hospital Corps came into existence as an organized unit of the Medical Department by an act of Congress June 17, 1898.

Nearly 25,000 Navy Corpsmen are now serving with Navy and Marine units.

The corpsmen serve in 36 technical specialties within the Hospital Corps. These specialties range from Medical Field Technicians who serve with FMF Marines, to the Radio Isotope Technicians who operate complicated instruments in Naval Hospitals.

In the past corpsmen have distinguished themselves on the battle field, with seven "Does" being awarded the Medal of Honor during WWII.

Again in Korea, Navy medics displayed their valor when five more corpsmen were awarded Medals of Honor.

Today there are a total of 207 corpsmen stationed at K-Bay. One hundred and

eighty-one of these men are assigned to the Brigade, and the remaining 26 serve the Air Station.

These corpsmen stand ready, with the Brigade, as the Fleet Marine Force Pacific's "Force in Readiness."

Squads Competing for Battalion Honors

The "TO" squad that represents the 4th Marines in the Seventh Annual Rifle Squad Combat Practice Competition at Quantico in September will be trying to make it four straight for the "Fighting Fourth."

I-3/4 won last year succeeding H-2/4 and G-2/4 who won in 1961 and 1962, respectively.

One-four will choose its

representative unit July 16. Three-four will select its top squad July 20 and Two-four will name its competing unit July 24.

Competition for the regimental title will begin August 4.

The 4th Marines will then send its top squad against the Corps' eight other infantry regiments' representatives at Quantico.

The best squad in the Ma-

rine Corps will be determined in the Quantico finals, September 21-23.

Before the Quantico competition, the nine finalists will have eliminated more than 900 other squads during local testing for proficiency in combat tactics and marksmanship.

Following the competition, individual engraved medals will be awarded the winning, second and third place squads.

Security Duty Is Available

Brigade lance corporals and below who are single and have completed 12 to 16 months of their initial tour with the Brigade may volunteer for duty with Pacific Ocean Area Security Force units.

Individuals cannot be nominated under this program if the tour length at the new command would cause them to exceed five consecutive years outside CONUS. Hawaii and Alaska are considered outside CONUS for this purpose.

Volunteers must meet other qualifications set for in FMF-Pac Order 1300. 8B to be eligible for reassignment under this program.

Electricity, Water Conservation Urged

Careless Consumption Ups Utilities Bill

Have you paid your electricity and water bill this month?

Of course not, if you live on Station. The bills are paid by the Station. In this situation personnel sometimes tend to become careless in the consumption of these utilities, whether at work, in the barracks, or in the housing areas.

For instance, the Station spends approximately \$450,000 annually for the purchase of electricity and water.

According to Lt. (jg) N. W. Day, Public Works Maintenance and Utilities Officer, the electrical bill for the month of June rose to \$32,000 as compared to \$28,991 for the same month last year. The June rate was the highest since March. In May the bill totaled \$30,915.

Daily conservation of small amounts of water and electricity will result in considerable savings.

Mr. Day suggests the following guidelines for the reduction of utility consumption by all personnel:

- Turn off all unnecessary lights at the beginning of normal working hours.
- Turn off all unnecessary

MAG-13 CO To Accompany

VMA-214 To Make Landings Aboard Carrier Kearsarge

Some 23 aviators from VMA-214 are scheduled to go aboard the USS Kearsarge (CVS33) early next week to conduct carrier qualifications in the A4C "Skyhawk" jet attack bomber.

Col. R. H. Spanjer, MAG-13 CO, will accompany VMA-214 aboard the USS Kearsarge.

In addition six other staff pilots from the Group will make carrier landings.

Eighteen of the aviators will board the carrier at Ford Island while the remaining pilots will fly 12 of the squadron's jets aboard.

The A4C's, acquired by the squadron in April, are being flown in carrier qual-

ifications for the first time by the Blacksheep pilots.

Seventeen of the pilots have qualified in the older model "Skyhawk," the A4B. They will be flying refresher quals. The remaining pilots will be qualifying aboard a carrier for the first time in the "Skyhawk" type aircraft.

The schedule calls for approximately 300 carrier landings to be made with each pilot making 10 landings for initial qualification.



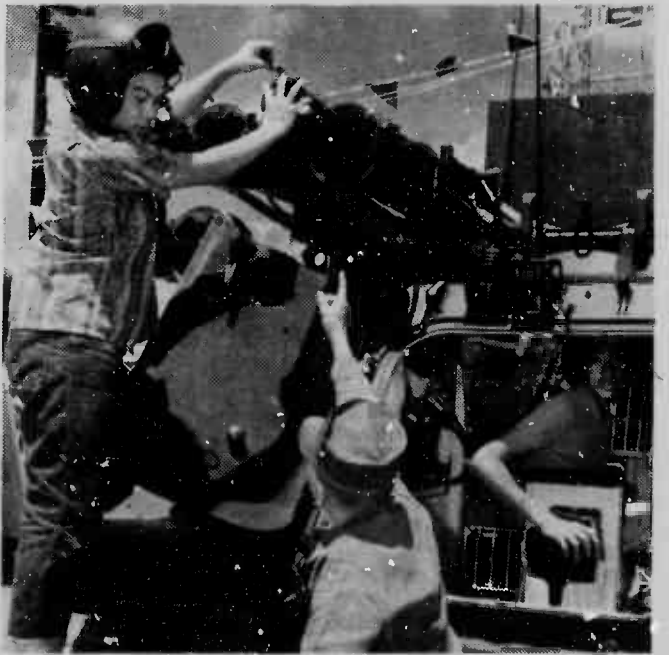

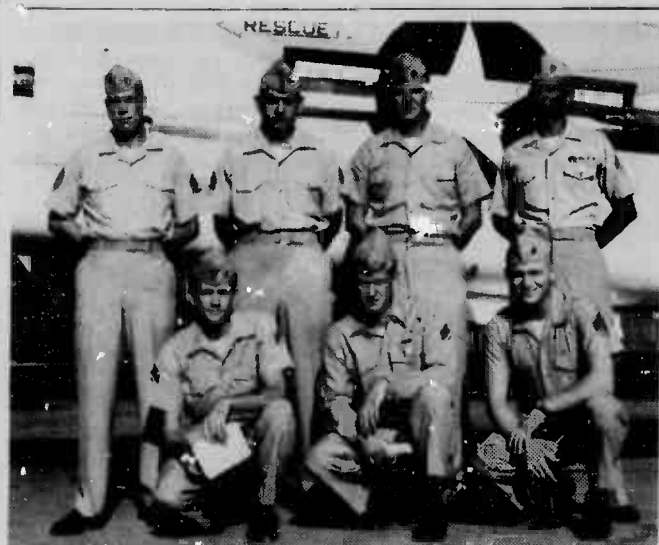
An experimental combat boot will soon be tested by U. S. Army forces in the United States, Europe, Korea and Alaska.

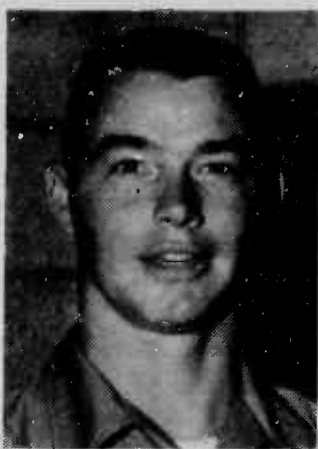

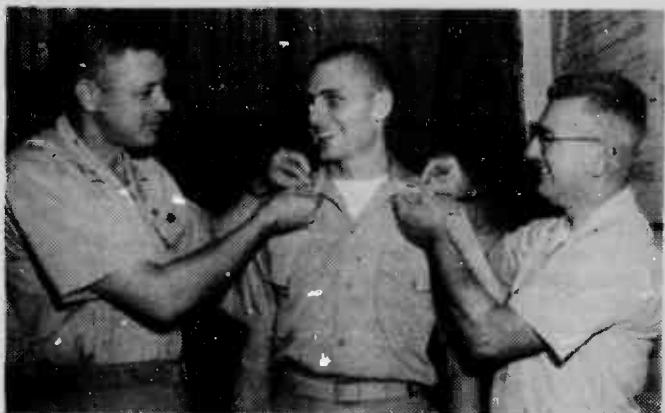
