Senate Approves Pay Bill: House Passage Expected

The Senate passed a 2.5 per, cent military pay raise Monday for all officers and enlisted personnel with more than two years service.

Officers with less than two years would receive an 8.5 per cent raise, but enlisted men with less than two years would be left out of the proposed hike.

Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.) said, "My only criticism is that it (the pay bill) is not large enough."

Senator Richard B. Russell, (D-Ga.), who pushed the increase through the Senate in a record time, said that he expected the House to pass the bill without major changes.

This could send the measure on to President Johnson in time for the fatter military pay envelopes to begin next month or in Sep-

The Senate approved version, increases would range from \$49 per month for top generals and admirals down to \$3 per month for privates and recruits with two years prior service.

\$360; E-5, \$6 on \$255; E-3. \$4 on \$149, and a \$3 boost for E-1's with more than two years service.

The Senate version of the bill will cost an estimated \$202 million annually or about \$8 million more than the Department of Defense proposed pay raise.

1961. Col. Schmid was scheduled to depart Wednesday, for duty with the 1stMAW in Japan.



Senior School Revises Requirements; Workshop Replaces Platform Lecture

colonels and majors who complete resident Junior School or the Junior School correspondence course of the Marine Corps Extension School will be assigned to the revamped Senior School at Quantico.
The Senior School has

discarded the platform lec-ture method in favor of a new "field grade officers workshop", created to stimulate critical thinking, and provide an atmosphere con-ducive to the serious contemplation and resolution of problems that the field grade officer can expect to encounter in and out of the

The new concepts will be phased into effect beginning in the next academic year with at least three years allowed for completion.

The course has eliminated

the previous concentration on fundamentals, knowledge of which, officers are assumed to have attained by the time they reach Senior School

Prospective student offi-cers are expected to be aided by a reading program for which they will be furnished a reading list prior to reporting to Quantico.

Some of the subjects will cover the area of political-military theory, foreign policy, treaty obligations and mutual defense agreements.


The Marine Corps Schools educators emphasize the fact that the primary objective is to prepare officers to win bat-

ever, they realize that the military commander must be an educated man, well-versed in political-military relationships and geo-political affairs.

He must also understand the utilization of emergency actions short of war.

While not attempting to reach the War College level nor to decry the past courses as obsolete, Marine Corps Schools has revised the course to prepare lieutenant colonels and majors better group level and for staff duty at the division-wing level.

Language instruction in French or Spanish, previously spread over the entire school year, will be concentrated into a shorter period. The course of instruction will remain at 100 hours but has been designed to give the student the continuity required to absorb a conversational language.
