

# 3 Squads Will Compete For Top Brigade Honors

Three 4th Marines rifle squads will battle it out next week for the right to represent the Brigade in the 7th Annual Rifle Squad Combat Practice Competition Sept. 2-23 at Quantico, Va.

The squads, chosen earlier this month from the Brigade's 108 rifle squads, are from D-1/4 led by Sgt. J. F. Grindstaf; F-2/4, led by Sgt. R. W. Bradley; and I-3/4, led by Sgt. A. O. Miller.

The winner of the Regimental competition Aug. 3-6 at Kahuku Army Training Area, will vie with eight other squads representing the Marine Corps' other infantry regiments.

The Brigade's "Top Squad" will be announced at a Regimental Review Aug. 7 on Platt Field.

I-3/4, last year's Corps-wide title holders, enter the Brigade competition with one man returning from last year's squad, Cpl. J. W. Turley.

Should the local entry win at Quantico, the title will come to the Brigade and the 4th Marines for the fourth consecutive year.

During the Brigade competition each squad will be graded on the squad leader's ability to co-ordinate his fire team, and his ability to readily change plans in emergency situations. The umpires will also grade each individual's conduct.

The squads will be equipped with full combat equipment, including body armor, live ammunition, smoke grenades, and demolitions. Aggressors from B-Recon will add to the realism.

Each of the squads are allowed to have an alternate fire team to provide replacements should one of the regular squad members become sick or injured.

Chief umpire for the contest is Maj. J. H. Blair, Director, Brigade Schools.

Fire team umpires furnished by 3/12 are, 2dLt. N. G. Jung-

man, 2dLt. R. L. Krolah, and 1stLt. S. W. Townsend.

The patrol umpire will be 1stLt. G. P. Lynch, and the medical umpire will be Chief P. E. Graeter.

Maj. D. R. Jones, Regimental S-3, has been designated as OIC of the aggressors and will command the aggressors during the competition.

# Col. Fuller Will Become Brigade's Chief of Staff

Col. Regan Fuller, former Chief, Southeast Asia Plans and Policy Section, Plans Division (J-5) at CINCPAC, is scheduled to assume duties as Brigade Chief of Staff Aug. 17, relieving Col. Donald J. Robinson, who departs tomorrow for duty at MCS Quantico, Va.

Col. Robinson, who arrived at K-Bay in September 1963,

served as 4th Marines CO before becoming Chief of Staff last January.

An aloha reception was held at the O-Club last night honoring Col. Fuller and Col. Robinson.

Col. Fuller enrolled in the Platoon Leaders Course in 1939, and was commissioned a second lieutenant in August 1940.

He completed Basic School in June 1941, and was transferred to Camp Lejeune, N.C., where he served as a platoon commander with the 5th Marines.

During World War II, the Colonel served as a platoon commander and later as a rifle company commander with the 7th Marines on Guadalcanal. While on Guadalcanal, Col. Fuller was awarded two Silver Star Medals for his actions against the enemy.

The Colonel also holds the Bronze Star Medal, and two

The Colonel also served as Assistant G-3 Hq V Amphibious Corps on Saipan, Guam, Tinian, Leyte, and Iwo Jima.

## Vaccine To Cost \$2.50

# Station Doctors Urge Immunization Of K-Bay Keikis against Measles

Navy Capt. H.C. Nordstrom, Station Senior Medical Officer, has announced that it will now be possible for K-Bay parents to obtain live measles vaccine for their children.

Limitation of funds require parents to pay the cost of the vaccine which is administered with gamma globulin. The cost will be \$2.50 for each child.

Because the vaccine is being purchased directly from the company, payment ONLY in the form of money orders made out to Merck-Sharp and Dohme Co. will be accepted.

Payment must be made next week, Aug. 3-7, at the Outpatient Department, Station Dispensary.

Station medical officers urge that K-Bayites obtain this protection for their children which will be administered at the time of the school physicals, Aug. 18, 19 and 20.

The vaccine should not be given to children who are allergic to eggs, egg products or feathers because the possibility of a serious reaction exists.

When the measles vaccine is administered with the gamma globulin it is uncommon to have any reactions. However, there may be a day or two of low grade fever and a transient skin rash.

Children under the age of 9 months may not receive this immunization.

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# Corps Emblem Outshines Tactics by Cuban Troops

A shining cold war victory was won recently when the U.S. Forces stationed at Guantanamo Bay used a huge Marine emblem to put "stars" in the eyes of Fidel Castro's Cubans.

Since relations between the United States and Cuba deteriorated, Marine guards posted at the Guantanamo gates and along its boundaries have been subjected to harassment, including rock throwing and shouted insults.

Last spring the Cubans hit on a new way to pester the American guards.

According to Rear Adm. John D. Bulkeley, the base commander, the Cubans put up floodlights outside the north-east gate of the base with their strong beams focused on the guard posts. The aim: to blind the guards.

Admiral Bulkeley mulled this new situation over and counter-attacked with the aid of Navy seabees and Cuban workers employed on the base.

The group picked a site on a hill 75 yards inside the gate and laid out a circular concrete slab 30 feet in diameter and six inches thick. After the concrete hardened, they painted the eagle-globe-and-anchor emblem of the Marine Corps in red, gold and white.

The Cubans found when they turned on their floodlights they could not aim them at the sentries without illuminating the Marine emblem.

Rather than let the Marine emblem be a shining example of freedom, the Cubans decided to abandon the use of floodlights. (AFPS)

Prior to assuming duties at CINCPAC, Col. Fuller served as Chief of Staff, III Marine Expeditionary Unit in Thailand.

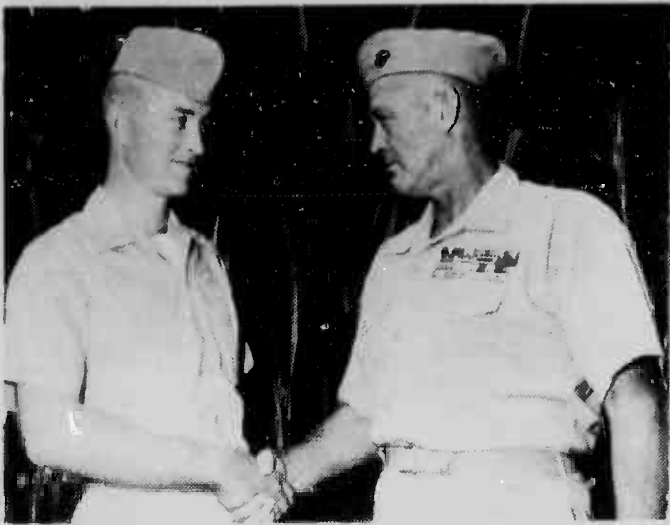
In June 1958 the Colonel assumed duties as Section Head, G-3 Plans at HQMC. His next tour was as Director of the Emergency Action Center at HQMC.

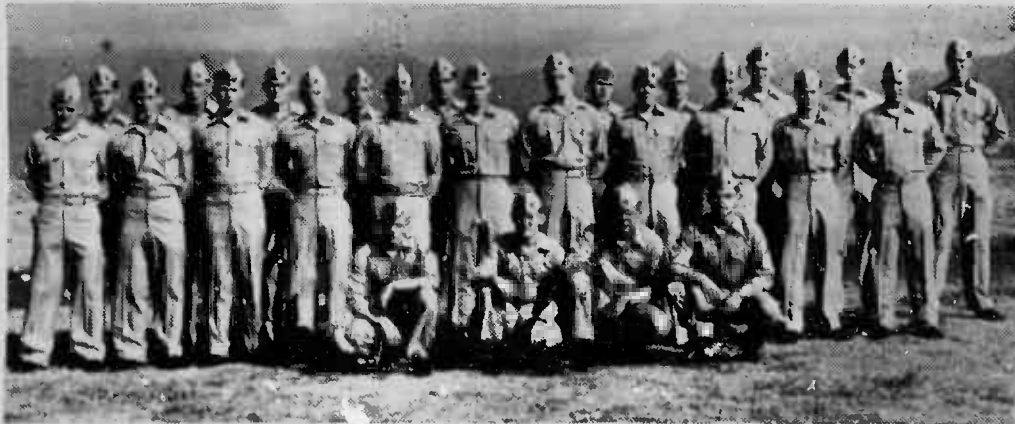

## Check Station Fishing Regulations Before Going After The Big Ones

Before going after the big ones, prospective anglers might do well to check with the hunting and fishing regulations contained in Station Order 5510.1J.

This order contains six pages of information about fishing at K-Bay.

Active duty and retired military, their families and guests are permitted to surf fish, fish off-shore and skin or scuba dive in KMCAS waters.

Station Civil Service employees, MCAS Activity ID card holders and civilians having Station fishing permits are allowed to surf fish at K-Bay. A full page of the order

lists general restrictions in effect covering boats, equipment and methods allowed in local water.

The eight fishing areas on the Station are the hangar area, fish pond area, finger pier and bay, runway, North Beach, Black Beach and Fort Hase areas.

Each of these areas are described in the orders along with the parking areas, hours, type of fishing and personnel permitted to fish there.

K-Bay's fishermen can pick up a copy of these regulations from the Provost Marshal's Office.

# Longer and Higher Paying Program In Place of Old Indemnity System

Just as important to any Marine husband and father as knowing that his wife and children are cared for while he is serving on active duty is the knowledge that if he were to die, his family would receive an income and have future financial security.

The program or source by which the large portion of income to dependents would derive is called De-Pendency Indemnity Compensation.

This is a higher and longer paying program for protecting survivors that has replaced the old Servicemen's Indemnity which formally gave military members automatic indemnity protection of \$10,000 and paid a survivor monthly payments of \$92.90 for 10 years.

Most persons referred to old program as the "\$10,000 free insurance." It was, however actually a type of indemnity and not insurance. Furthermore, is is not to be confused with NSLI, or U.S. Government Life Insurance that many servicemen may have acquired earlier and on which they may currently be. (DIComp) is administered by the Veterans Administration.

DIComp is made to the unmarried widow or to orphaned children and to dependents parents of a Marine who dies of a service-connected cause. The amount of pay is \$120 plus

12 per cent of the basic monthly active duty pay of the deceased Marine. The minimum monthly amount is \$130 paid to the widow of a Marine who was in pay grade E-1.

If there is no eligible widow, the monthly DIComp payment for support of a single child is \$77; with \$28 added for each additional surviving child.

Normally, payments stop when a child marries or reaches age 18, but may continue past the age of 18 for an unmarried child incapable of self-support because of a physical or mental disability that ex-

isted before the child reached age 18.

Payments to dependent parents may vary according to their income. A single dependent parent may receive between \$17 and \$83 monthly, and payments to two parents can range between \$11 and \$55 each.

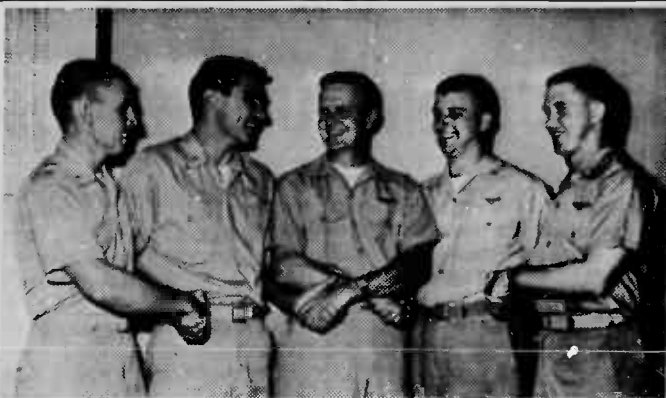
The DIComp payments are the same for both wartime and peacetime deaths, and, except in the case of dependent parents, are payable without regard to other income.

There are other benefits payable to the dependents of a Marine upon his death on active duty.

Think it over — stay over.
