The pay hike, ranging from 2.5 per cent to 8.5 per cent, would affect all members of the Armed Forces except enlisted personnel with less than two years of

How does Hawaii, with its vast military installations, look to a person who is seeing them for the first time in more than 40 years?

Fred M. Osborn, 66, of Sun Valley, Calif., finds it hard to describe.

"I can't express in words the vastness and modernness of the Station," Mr. Osborn stated after touring the Station recently with his wife and MGySgt. John Funk, ISO NCOIC.

Mr. Osborn, a former Leatherneck, who saw duty with the Marine Barracks at Pearl Harbor in 1918 and 1919, said,

"I remember that during the war (WWI) there was nothing but thick jungle engulfing the area on which the Station sits today."

After the outbreak of war in 1917, Osborn ran away from home and enlisted in the Corps at Stockton, Calif.

at Stockton, Calif.

Six weeks later he completed basic training at the Marine Corps Training Center located at Mare Island, Calif., Naval Ship Yard. He joined the 118th Co. of the 7th Marine Bn. Part of the 7th Bn. went to France while the 117th, 118th and 143rd companies went to Marine Barracks, Pearl Harbor as a security detachment.

Osborn, then a private, was an expert rifleman making \$35 a month, payable in gold, when he first arrived at the Barracks in 1918.

"My greatest thrill," Osborn said, "was when I would sneak away from the company at night to practice with the Barracks band. I was finally caught and reprimanded by my CO, but he eventually allowed me to become a member of the band," he added.

Osborn played a trumpet with the band for the duration of his tour of duty in the Corps.

"The band used to go to

town and play in front of movie theatres. Upon attracting a crowd, the theatre management would usually let all of us into the movie free of charge," Osborn smiled.

"At one time we played in front of Hawaii's only hotel, the Moana, and were given a free meal in the dining room," he added.

Osborn was discharged in 1919 and moved to Modesto, Calif., where he started his own commercial bus company. Shortly after, he sold his company to the rapidly expanding Greybound Lines.

He then opened a grocery store in Modesto. Osborn met his wife, the former Etta Lowry, when her parents purchased the store.

The Osborns then moved to Los Angeles where he was employed by the Los Angeles Metropolitan Bus Service as a driver. Mr. Osborn retired after 37 years with the company.

Mr. and Mrs. Osborn also toured Marine Barracks, Pearl

Harbor, during their visit to the Islands.

After a conversation with Col. J.H. McMillan, Barracks CO, they toured the command with SgtMaj, J.H. Johnson.

SgtMaj. Johnson stated, "He (Osborn) has a most remarkable memory. He could still identify pictures of former Barracks officers and also tell what their duty assignments were at the time."

Mr. Osborn summed up the tours with, "The Corps to-day is indescribable compared to the equipment and facilities which were on hand during the first of the century."

The Osborns left Hawaii last week to return home for a short rest before continuing on to Alaska for a visit there.

Mr. Osborn's final critique concerning the Corps—"If I had the chance to do it all over again, I would. The Marine Corps offers the best training a young man could ever hope to obtain."








