

President Johnson has signed the Military Pay Bill and the pay increases are expected to go into effect in September.

The \$207 million pay increase for more than 1.8 million mem-bers of the U.S. Armed Forces sailed through the House of Representatives and the Senate with little debate before going to the President.

The pay increase ranges from 2.5 per cent to 8.5 per cent and affects all members of the Armed Forces except enlisted personnel with less than two

years of service.

The pay raise is the second in the past 12 months for military personnel.

CMC Says More Marines **Needed for New Weapons** 

edly ready to ask for a boost in its present 190,000-man strength, according to Navy Times

While the size of the increase was described as "modest" by a Corps spokesman, Gen. W.M. Greene, Jr., CMC, was quoted as saying an increase is necessary because new planes and weapons coming into the Corps require more men to maintain and operate them.

The new F4B Phantom jet fighter bomber was cited as an example of the need for more out that this plane requires a two-man crew, rather than single crewman of earlier aircraft used by the Corps.

This means that up to 100 more men per squadron will be required just to maintain this technically sophisticated type of plane, according to Gen Greene.

The Corps got its last strength boost four years ago when the late President Kennedy allowed it to swell its ranks by 15,000 men

### **Old Health Record Folder** May Shrink to IBM Card

A pilot program designed to reduce the individual Marine's health record folder to a single IBM card began last Monday at MCAS, El Toro.

Cdr. F.E. Stewart, ad ministrative officer to El Toro's medical officer and one of three developers of the program, estimates the revamped system will cut the present 280-man-hours needed annually to screen health records to 12.

He also pointed out that, in addition to releasing more medical personnel from administrative work for patient care, the system is expected to almost eliminate human error in maintaining health records.

The cards will carry information on the Marine's unit, rank, immunization record, blood type, x-ray record birth date and history of sensitivity

The idea for the system called the mechanized Health Immunization Program, came about during an inspection at the El Toro

uary.
The IBM card system idea was incepted and developed by Cdr. Stewart, Marine CWO E. D. Johnson and HMC G.B. Dunn

CMC representatives and the Navy's Bureau of Medi-cine and Surgery reviewed the trio's proposal in Wash-ington and authorized the El Toro test program.

Among the advantages of the IBM card system, according to Cdr. Stewart, is the ability to project medical requirements in advance for units which may be deployed and also to obtain a complete history of unit personnel within

Closing down ceremonies next Friday will include the firing of the last rounds by former distinguished Marine Shooters who have served at Camp Matthews and played a part in training the thousands of Marine recruits who learned to shoot

To Blend as Chameleon Does

### Scientists Research New Battle Dress

American combat uniforms may one day be able to change color and blend into the natural background-much the way a chameleon does

Army and industrial scientists have been doing extensive research in this direction, although a workable system is reported to be a long way off.

If the research pays off, servicemen fighting in the jungle would be hard to spot because their uniforms would turn lush green.

In the desert, the battle dress might change to sand color and in the arctic it might become snow white or glazed silver ice in color

The camouflage cloth now used is basically the same as that of WWII-a mottled combination of greens, browns and

A major problem encountered by the present experiof a color after a change has been made. Sometimes the dyes fade and then come

The main research at the-present time is aimed at find-

ing dyes that will change color in response to light.

In addition to trying to locate a color-changing dye suitable for camouflage, scientists are also experimenting with various kinds of textiles that could take such dyes. (AFPS)

Speaking at the dedication ceremony, John A. Gronouski, U.S. Postmaster General, stated that "With the issuance of this five - cent stamp, we are dedicating ourselves not to the past but to the future

"Today we have in our nation at least 40 million citizens who take no part in (the) process of consent (the government's derivation of its

just powers from the consent of the governed)-either because they will not or cannot exercise their right to vote,'

Mr. Gronouski said. "The Register -and-Vote campaign, of which this stamp is a part," the Postmaster General stated, "is headed by the American Heritage Foundation, the Advertising Council and a total of 86 other civic cil and a total of 86 other civic and public service organizations. Chairmen of both the Democratic and Republican parties have heartily endorsed the efforts of these groups."







### San Diego Marine Gets MC Medal

A 34-year old Marine received the Navy and Marine Corps Medal July 24 at MCRD, San Diego for heroism and "inspiring efforts in behalf of others without regard to his personal safety."

SSgt. George Feeney won the medal for rescuing seven Marines from a crashed and burning helicopter Oct. 3, 1963 at Camp Lejeune.

Seconds after Feeney freed

the trapped leathernecks from the burning helicopter, the plane exploded, but he was left

The medal is the highest decoration awarded by the Navy and Marine Corps for heroism in an action not involving combat with an armed enemy.

Feeney, who was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds suffered during the Korean Conflict in combat, reported to MCRD last March from Camp LeJeune.
