

Brigade Sergeant Major Change Set for Monday

Sgt. Maj. Kenneth Chase will leave Sgt. Maj. W. W. McElliott Monday as the Brigade's senior listed Marine.

Sgt. Maj. McElliott, who has served as Brigade Sergeant Major since November 1961, is scheduled to depart Oct. 1 for MCAS, El Toro.

Sgt. Maj. Chase arrived at K-Bay last month from duties as Attachment Sergeant Major, MARTD, Naval Air Station, New York.

He enlisted in the Marine Corps in August 1940, and completed recruit training at Parris Island.

The Sergeant Major saw duty with the 1st and 5th Marine

7th Marines in Korea, he was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds he received at the Chosin Reservoir.

Since Korea Sgt. Maj. Chase has served as Sergeant Major of the 7th Recruit Training Bn. at Parris Island; MCB, 29 Palms; 3d Tank Bn. on Okinawa; and MARTD, Naval Air Station, New York.

The Sergeant Major is married to the former Miss Joan M. McCaffrey of Peekskill, N.Y. They have three children, Kenneth, 16; Ann, 14; and Timothy, 9.

BLT 1/4 Routs Guerrillas In Exercise 'Royal Oak'

Exercise "Royal Oak" ended Wednesday as BLT 1/4 mopped up what was left of guerrilla resistance on Molokai.

More than 1000 Marines of HMM-161, commanded by Lt. Col. L. J. Engelhardt, and BLT 1/4, commanded by Maj. H. D. Fredericks, invaded Molokai Tuesday from the USS Princeton (LPH-5) and the tank landing ship USS Floyd County (LST 762) in a sunrise helicopter-borne assault.

Lt. Col. L. J. Engelhardt, land-

ing commander, summed up the exercise with one word, "excellent."

"I feel the exercise went off in an outstanding manner and that the raids were a great success. They provided practical experience for both HMM-161 and the ground troops," he added.

"Royal Oak" was ordered in response to a request from the mythical nation of West Molokai, which had been aggressed by guerrillas of East Molokai.

The mission of the assault troops was to hit the guerrilla infested areas with day and night raids and then destroy the aggressors with a large scale assault.

The exercise began Sept. 23 when Leathernecks boarded the Princeton and Floyd County.

During the first raid, which took place Friday, a B-1/4 platoon, commanded by 1st Lt. J. A. Albrecht, ran into heavy guerrilla resistance while recovering Capt. Wan, a guerrilla informer.

According to 1st Lt. D. B. Brown, 1/4 S-2 officer, "The landing force commanders were disappointed in the information the informer gave them and were also concerned with discrepancies in his identity."

"Capt. Wan was finally taken aboard the Princeton as a 'POW'." Lt. Brown said.

A D-1/4 platoon, commanded by 2d Lt. J. M. Mitchell Jr., destroyed a guerrilla radar site late Friday night.

Part of the platoon was heli-lifted back to the Princeton during the night. Others were forced to wait until the next morning because their "helos" were driven off by ground fire.

1st Lt. R. S. Burgess, C-1/4 CO, led a raid Saturday to retrieve Li Woo, West Molokai Minister of Social Welfare, who had been held prisoner by the guerrillas.

"The raiding force was surprised when they had to bring out Li Woo's seven cousins, including two 'girls,'" Lt. Brown said.

"The Navy was even more surprised when they had to provide for the two 'girls'—portrayed by L-3/4 Marines," he added.

The "girls" were quartered (See "Exercise," Page 4)

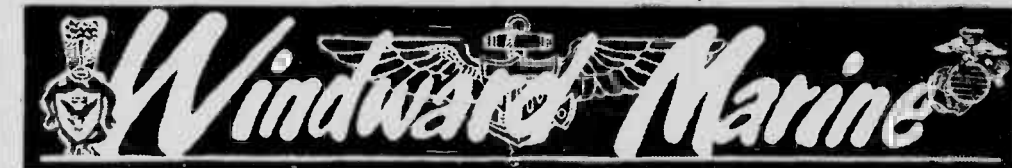

Wounded in Korea

SSgt. E. Wright Gets Belated Purple Heart

A Purple Heart — earned in Korea more than 14 years ago by an Army staff sergeant — has finally been delivered.

SSgt. Eugene M. Wright — now a Marine — HqCo, Bri-

gade, received the Medal and Certificate from Brig. Gen. M. E. Carl, Brigade CG, 14 years and 23 days after the day that he received the wound.

The Sergeant, then a gunner with the 79th Heavy Tank Battalion, 25th Infantry Division, was hit in the chest with shrapnel from enemy mortar fire as he dismounted from his disabled tank near Masan, Korea.

According to Sgt. Wright, he had no idea that he would receive the citation at this time. He said that he believed that a mix-up in records was the reason for the delay.

He entered the Army in December 1948 and arrived in Korea in July 1950.

Sgt. Wright served with the 79th Tanks until he returned to the United States in June 1951.

He was discharged from the Army in June 1952.

In March 1954 he enlisted in the Marine Corps and completed basic training at MCRD, San Diego, Calif.

Sgt. Wright arrived at K-Bay in January 1963, and was a member of Service Battalion's Field Maintenance Facility until assigned as NCOIC, Athletic and Recreation, Brigade Special Services last February.

According to Maj. George Pechar, MABS-13, CO, the squadron's mission is to provide air base facilities and

service (except airfield construction) for supported units.

He added that the purpose of Operation "RAHCEP" is to test MABS-13 readiness and capability to deploy.

The Base Camp will include three separate branches, Headquarters Branch, Base Operations Branch, and Base Services Branch.

Base Services controls 10 sections consisting of utilities, food services, motor transport, ordnance, TAFDS, Chaplain, medical, air freight and passenger service, MATCU-62, and communications.

Station facilities will also be supplemented by the Base Services Branch during the operation.



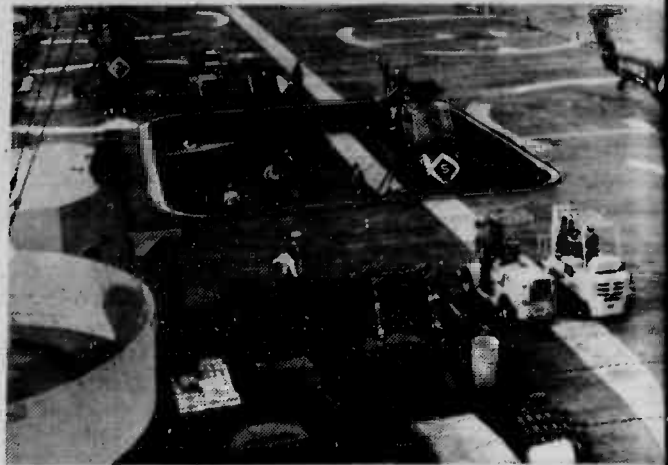

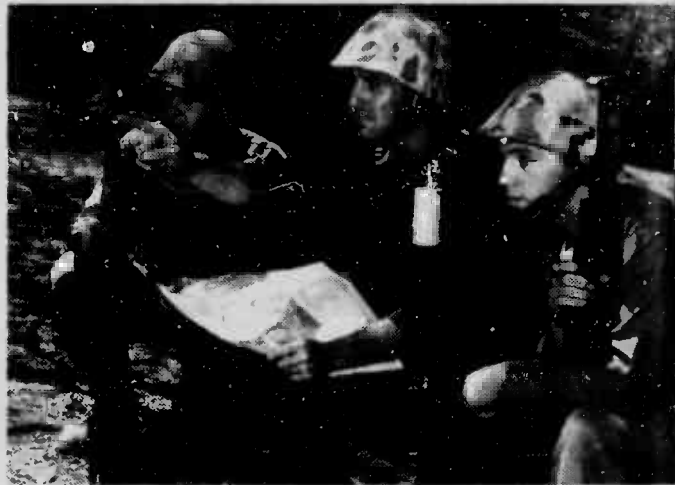

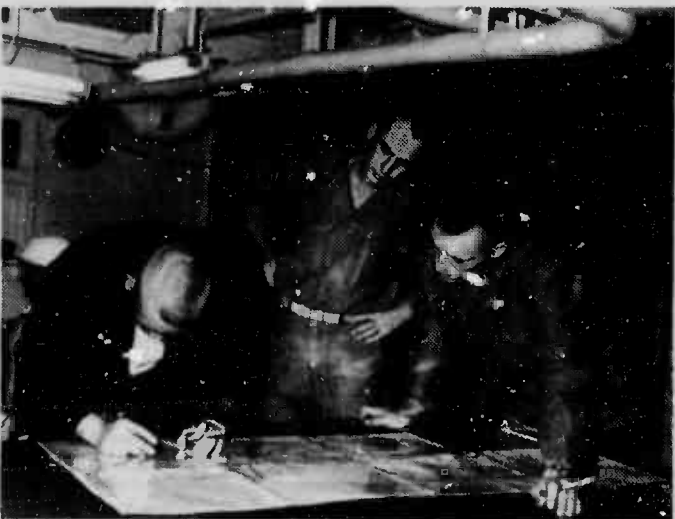

Barbara Bryan will ride in the junior classes for riders 13 through 17 years. Shawn O'

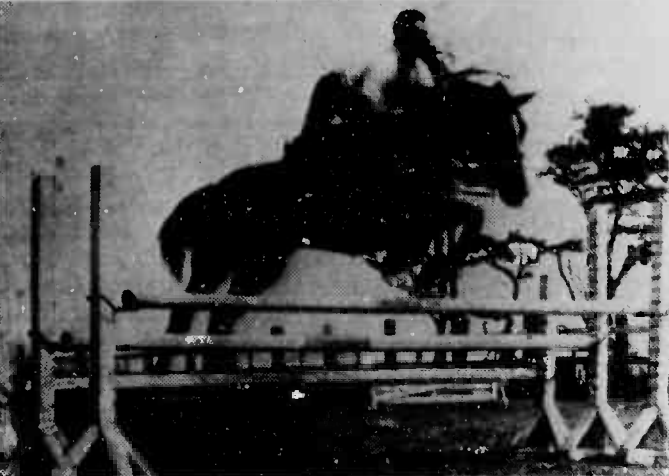

According to 14thND Chief Fire Inspector, Chester F. Kempczenski, "Ninety per cent of all fires are due to carelessness and therefore can be prevented."

"To prevent future loss of lives and property I wish to caution K-Bayites against careless smoking habits, unattended cooking and faulty electrical appliances," Maj. W. E. Rudolph, Station Fire Prevention Officer said.

"With the co-operation of Station personnel and their dependents, we can make every week a Fire Prevention Week," Maj. Rudolph added.
