1614 Marines To Receive SNCO Promotion Warrants

HQMC officials have announced that 1614 Marines previously selected for SNCO grades will be promoted this month.

Cutting scores for promotion from corporal to sergeant are expected to be announced prior to the end of November. Promotions will be effected in December.

The following promotions will be made during November with a Nov. 1 date of rank:

Seven master sergeants to master gunnery sergeant, cutoff precedence number is 43.

Ten gunnery sergeants to first sergeant, cutoff precedence number is 129.

Nineteen gunnery sergeants to master sergeant, cutoff precedence number is 491.

Seventy-eight staff sergeants to gunnery sergeant, cutoff precedence number is 502.

Fifteen-hundred sergeants will be promoted to staff sergeant, cutoff precedence number is 1500. Promotions will be effected on Nov. 1, 1964, with pay and allowances accruing from that date.

Sergeants promoted to staff sergeant Nov. 1 will be assigned seniority dates of ranks as follows: first 300 to rank from

July 1, second 300 to rank from Aug. 1; third 300 to rank from Sept. 1; fourth 300 to rank from Oct. 1 and the last 300 to rank from Nov. 1.

Promotions for Marines previously selected for SNCO grades will continue to be made as Corps-wide vacancies occur.

Combat Review To Honor Gen. H.M. Smith Monday

Gen. H. M. (Howling Mad) Smith, USMC (Retd), — considered by many Marines as "the father of amphibious warfare"—will review the Brigade during a Combat Review in his honor at 3 p.m., Monday on Platt Field.

The 82-year-old Marine, after whom Camp H. M.

Smith — the home of Headquarters FMFPac — was named, was the first Commanding General of the Fleet Marine Force, Pacific.

Gen. Smith has been invited to Hawaii by LtGen. V. H. Krulak, FMFPac CG, to participate in the Marine Corps' 189th Birthday activities with FMFPac.

A veteran of 41 years Marine Corps service, Gen. Smith, who has lived in La Jolla, Calif., since his retirement in 1946, is scheduled to arrive at the Air Station, by plane from El Toro, Calif., at 7 p.m., Sunday.

He will be greeted upon his arrival by LtGen. Krulak, BrigGen. M. E. Carl, Brigade CG, the Brigade General Staff and Col. P. T. Johnston, Station CO. The Brigade Band will also be on hand to greet the General.

At 9 a.m. Monday, Gen. Smith will receive honors on Bordelon Field, Camp Smith.

At 10 a.m., Hawaii Governor John Burns will present Gen. Smith with a proclamation designating Nov. 10 as "Marine General Holland M. Smith Day" in Hawaii.

Gen. Smith will call on Honolulu Mayor Neal Blaisdell at 10:45 a.m., at which time the General will receive the "Key to the City."

At noon the General will have lunch with SNCOs at the (See 'Gen. Smith,' Page 3)

Job Same; Name Changes

ServBn's 1st Landing Support Company Becomes "B", 3rd Shore Party Battalion

The Brigade has announced the redesignation of ServBn's 1st Landing Support Company, to Company "B" (Rein), 3rd Shore Party Battalion, Service Battalion (B—Shore Party), effective Nov. 1.

Other units within ServBn

are expected to change designations after the first of the year according to 1stLt. R. E. Monette, ServBn Adjutant.

The change became necessary when CMC established Shore Party Battalions within each of the three Marine Divisions.

ServBn will still control the Company and have responsibility for carrying out the company's mission of facilitating the landing and movement off the beaches of troops, equipment, and supplies.

This is not the first time that amphibious landing support units have been identified by the name "Shore Party". Marine Shore Party Battalions participated in some 61 successful landings during World War II.

30 Complete Course In Ship Embarkation

Thirty Brigade Marines completed the Combat Loading of Amphibious Ships and Craft (EMB-1) Course; Friday at Brigade Schools.

On hand to present completion certificates to the graduating Marines were LtCol. R.M. Head, Assistant Brigade G-4 officer and LtCol. T.J. Brierton, Chief Instructor from LFTUPac, San Diego, Calif.

The four-week course, which was instructed by Col. Brierton and Navy Lt. (jg) R.C. Jensen, also of LFTUPac, utilized lectures, conferences and practical appli-

cations in teaching the indoctrination principles of embarkation planning.

The first two weeks consisted of classroom lectures and instruction on combat loading and practical application involving the loading of ships presently assigned to amphibious forces.

The embarkation of a helicopter-lifted force was studied the final two weeks.

Stevedoring and naval terminology, embarkation planning and determination of shipping requirements were also studied during the course.

Marine Captain Receives DFC—The Distinguished Flying Cross has been presented to a Marine Captain for rescuing a seriously wounded Vietnamese soldier last year in enemy-infested mountain terrain of Vietnam.

Capt. Robert K. Ervi piloted his helicopter into the area and hovered over the wounded soldier. As the man was hoisted aboard, Capt. Ervi was hit in the hip by Viet Cong fire.

During his four-month tour in Vietnam, from October 1963 to January 1964, Ervi received two Purple Hearts and six Air Medals while flying 125 missions.

He is now assigned to Marine Helicopter Squadron 1, at Quantico, Va. Capt. Ervi received the DFC Oct. 16 from Brig-Gen. Gordon D. Gayle, chairman of the Long Range Study Panel. (NAVY TIMES)

Parents Asked To Insure Kids Safety With Lights, Reflectors on Bicycles

According to PMO earlier soundowns have increased the danger to children riding bicycles.

"It is imperative that parents insure their children's safety by seeing that they comply with the Station traffic regulations and in particular those portions which pertain to bicycles," stated 1stLt. P.E. Dawson, Assistant Provost Marshal.

Lt. Dawson quoted Station Order 5560.4D (Traffic Regulations): "Every bicycle, when in use at night, shall be equipped with a lamp on the front which shall emit a white light visible from a distance of at least 200 feet to the front.

"The red reflector on the rear shall be visible for a distance of 200 feet to the rear, when directly in front

of a lawful upper beam of head lamps on a motor vehicle...

Bicycle head lamps are available at Toyland and are priced from \$2.85. Reflectors cost 10 cents each.

"Every person operating a bicycle upon a roadway shall ride as near the right side of the roadway as is practicable..."

"Persons riding bicycles upon a road shall not ride abreast of another bicycle except when passing."

"Military Policemen have been instructed to stop any

person riding a bicycle which does not meet the Station safety requirements," continued Lt. Dawson, "Parents will be required to redeem the bicycle from the Provost Marshal's office, and will also be held responsible for the actions of their children."

Lt. Dawson also cautions motorists to be extremely careful when driving through housing areas. And in the vicinity of Platt Field and the Enlisted Swimming pool during the early hours of darkness.

John H. Glenn Promoted To Colonel

Astronaut John Glenn, the first American to orbit the earth, has been promoted to full colonel in the Marine Corps.

President Johnson promoted Col. Glenn at a special ceremony held in the Rose Garden of the White House Saturday.

Col. Glenn had previously requested that his name be not considered for promotion in view of his plans to retire as soon as his health per-

mitted.

However, the Secretary of the Navy and the Commandant of the Marine Corps, desiring to recognize Col. Glenn's many accomplishments while in the service of his country, nominated him for promotion.

President Johnson signed and sent to the Senate Col. Glenn's nomination for promotion.

Col. Glenn plans to retire at the end of the year.
