Joint Airline Office Gives Air Travel Tips

el itinerary assistance for trips to the Mainland.
"We at the Airline Military Traffic Office," said William P. Julian. office manager, "understand and are able to solve most air are able to solve most air travel problems peculiar to military personnel and the dependents."

According to Mr. Julian, most flights from the Mainland to Hawaii are already filled until Jan. 10. He advises servicemen to plan their return trips after that date.

Mr. Julian adds that travelers to the Mainland should experience no difficulty in obtaining tickets through Dec. 25, but may find the flights crowded or filled if they plan to travel from Hawaii between Dec. 30 and Jan. 5.

The Airline Military Traffic Office is located at the Military Air Transportation Service Terminal Building at Hickam Air Force Base. The office is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Saturday from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Upon request, the office handles travel for personnel on leave, and accepts reservations for military families traveling via commercial air under permanent change of station orders. When requested, they also make reservations for servicemen traveling commercial air while under tem-porary additional duty orders. These services are available to all military members on Oahu.

In addition to selling the military half-fare tickets, the office also is able to plan an itinerary for travelers. This enables the military man to spend a few days in any given city before continuing to his final destination, or next duty station.

New MATS Regulations—Military personnel authorized air travel on a space available basis, and who decline airlift on certain MATS flights because of personal desire to travel via commercial airlines, may find their travel delayed or suspended.

According to Commander, 14th Naval District Notice 4600, effective immediately, any space available traveler who refuses to accept accommodations offered at the time they become available will have exhausted his travel privilege under the authority which has been issued to him.

Passengers refusing available flights will then be placed at the bottom of the space available register in the appropriate category and will be furnished transportation only after all others in the category have received accommodations.

Retired personnel who decline to accept accommodations offered them will have their named removed from the register. and not be permitted to re-register for 30 days from the refusal

Since 1917, veterinarians have nearly eliminated bovine TB by slaughtering herds wherever the disease was discovered and before it had a chance to spread.
Obviously this cannot be done with humans. In Hawaii there

are 5000 Islanders who are on the case register of the Tuberculosis Branch of the Department of Health and an estimated 173,

000 Islanders who react "positively" to the TB skin test.

The Christmas Seal Association is pledged to continue its efforts in the fields of TB detection, treatment, education and research until the disease has been brought completely under control.

Colonel Johnston's Deposit Increases K-Bay CU Assets to One Million Dollars

K-Bay's Credit Union joined an elite group last week when a \$5 deposit by Col. P. T. Johnston, Station CO, increased its assets to \$1,000,-000.

"The credit union has expanded tremendously since receiving its charter in 1953," Mrs. Darwyl Lowe, Office Manager and Assistant Treasurer said.

We've occupied the old Exchange gas station building, a quonset hut and are now outgrowing our present building," she added.

According to Mrs. Lowe, at the end of 1963 there were 21,518 active credit unions in the United States. Federal government and military credit unions represent 7.59 per cent of this total, and

16.7 per cent of the total active credit unions listed assets of \$500,000 or more.

"If we had a list of those credit unions with assets of \$1,000,000 or more, the percentage would be very small," she said.

Mrs. Lowe has credited the success of the Station's Credit Union to the time and services given by military and eivilian workers aboard the Station, who served during their own time without pay, and in general the cooperation of all personnel.

"The Credit Union, which is owned and operated by its members, serves members only," Mrs. Lowe stated.

"To become a member, a person pays a 25-cent membership fee and buys at least one share of stock for \$5," she added

HQMC Announces 'Early Out' PolicyFor Tour's Expiring Near Christmas

HQMC has announced the policy for early releases of those Marines whose term of service will expire during the Christmas-New Year Seasons.

Published in Marine Corps Bulletin 1910, HQMC authorized Commanding Officers to discharge or release from active duty all enlisted Maines and reserve officers who request early separation.

Those eligible for the "early outs" are those Marines who would normally end their active service between Dec. 18 and Jan. 4.

In event of future recall, Marines separated will be considered in the same status as those who have completed their normal enlistment.

Any previously paid reenlistment bonus will not have to be repaid, however, if early separation would cause indebtedness to the government, the indebtedness must be liquidated before early separation is authorized.

The early discharge does not however, apply to those aliens who are seeking to qualify for citizenship by completion of three years active military service, and does not apply to six-month trainees.

Those Marines accepting

Those Marines accepting early separation and who are otherwise eligible, may be awarded the Good Conduct Medal.







Radio, Television Star, Spy Catcher; Now 'Miss Mac': Chief K-Bay Librarian

What woman do you know that's been an air raid warden, driven a 10-ton truck, turned down a job in Turkey and worked in the Black Hole of Calcutta?

Maccine Titus, the Station's Chief Librarian, has done all this and more.

Maccine came to Hawaii in 1959 from Arizona believing that she would go to work for a local college.

Upon her arrival, she was startled to find that she would have to be a state resident for a year before the college would hire her.

the college would hire her.
Not one to give up, "Miss
Mac," as she is commonly
referred to by K-Bayites, went
to work for the Dillingham
Book Shops in Honolulu prior
to accepting her present position at the Station Library in
April, 1961.

Miss Mac was 18 years old when she married Marine Pvt. John Wilson in 1943. Shortly after their marriage her husband shipped out to the Pacific with the 1stMar-Div.

Maccine and her mother then became active in Civil Defense activities in Hollywood, Calif. Her mother, Elizabeth, was known as a "block mother," and Maccine became an air raid warden.

While patrolling her "beat" with her Doberman pinscher one night, Miss Mac spotted six men, flashing a signal mirror toward the sea.

"I immediately contacted my superiors, who in turn apprehended the men," Maccine said. "Shortly after, they informed me that the men were German spies who were signalling a ship out at sea," she added. Maccine left California and

Maccine left California and went to Oregon in 1945, when she received the tragic news that her husband, then a sergeant, had been killed during the battle of Okinawa.

She then became an Assistant State Librarian for the southern portion of Oregon, and was also Assistant Librarian for the city and county of Medford, Ore.

As part of her various duties, she drove a 10-ton book-mobile to secluded ranger stations in the northern California mountains.

"I also had a radio and television show in Medford, on which I would give book reviews and invite authors to lecture on their literature" she sald

literature," she sald.
"I invited a Navy Commander who had written a book to be a guest on my show, and in turn he offered me a job as a librarian at the U.S. Navy Base in Turkey," she smiled.

"I turned the position down because it would have meant being confined within the perimeters of the base," she added.

Miss Mac left Oregon in 1955 to become a librarian at the Davis-Monthan Air Force Base in Arizona.

While at the SAC installation, she also ran the Reference Department of the

Tucson Public Library.
"While in Arizona, I also
drove a bookmobile which
serviced Indian reserva-

tions, small villages and National Forest Reserves," she said.

"When I first came to K-Bay," Maccine said, "I used to refer to the old library as 'the Black Hole of Calcutta,' because of the very poor lighting facilities."

"At that time the library was located in the Brigade Schoois building, and J checked out an average of 18 books a day," she said.

"Today the new library has an average daily attendance of 705 and we check out an average of 421 books a day," she added.

Miss Mac stated, "We now

Miss Mac stated, "We now have approximately 19,000 volumes in the library, and I hope one day to have 25,000 volumes"

Maccine says that she achieved her main goal in life when she became a Chief Librarian.

She was born in Hollywood, Calif., May 14, 19?? and was graduated from Beverly Hills High School in 1943. She is also a graduate of the University of California.

While attending UC as a psychology major, Miss Mac obtained a Bachelor of Science Degree. She also has a degree in music from the Hollywood Conservatory School of Music and Art.

In summing up her adventures, Miss Mac said, "I've worked with almost all the Armed Forces and I feel that the Marines are 'tops' in my book."

"But then again, maybe I'm just a little 'gung-ho' about the subject," she laughed.
