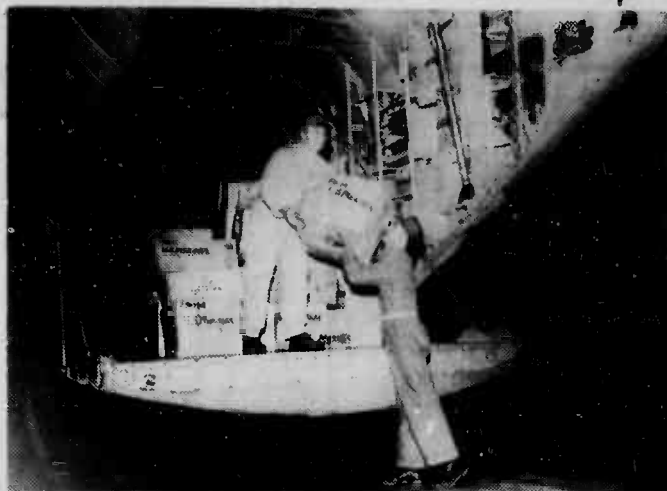

K-Bay's Vietnamese Clothing Drive Ends Today

K-Bay's drive for clothing and blankets for the disaster-stricken families of Vietnamese Marines will end today as the Teen Club, accompanied by the Brigade Band,

canvass the Station housing areas for last minute contributions.

The clothing drive, coordinated by LtCol. R.L. Gover Jr., Station Special Serv-

ices Officer, was conducted in answer to the "Corps-to-Corps" plea from the Vietnam Marine Commandant.

LtGen. V.H. Krulak, FMF-Pac CG, received a personal

appeal for clothing from General Le Nguyen Khang, Commandant of the South Vietnam Marine Corps. General Khang stated that more than 2000 Marine families have been left homeless and without shelter due to the widespread flooding that was caused when typhoon Joan hit the battle-ridden country last week.

Gen. Krulak relayed the request for assistance to units of his command, and Kaneohe Bay personnel sprang into action.

BrigGen. M.E. Carl, Brigade CG, and Col. P.T. Johnston, Station CO, urged Station and Brigade Marines and all K-Bayites to give wholehearted support to the "Corps-to-Corps" project.

Clothing began pouring in, and K-Bay clubs and activities began planning drives for the needed clothing and blankets.

Within 48 hours the first aircraft, a KC-130 "Hercules" from MCAS, El Toro, Calif., was loaded with 2770 pounds of clothing, and on its way to the disaster area.

Another KC-130 was scheduled to depart the Air Station Wednesday with additional clothing and blankets. The final contributions will be flown to Vietnam on the next available flight.

The initial "rapid response" collection was made while more than half of the Brigade was in the field on exercise "Quick Slash." K-Bayites, Marine families at FMFPac at Camp Smith, and members of the Christ Presbyterian Church of Kailua, who heard about the drive from LtCol. O. "E" Howe, MAG-13, ExO, and a member of the church, were the primary participants in the early stages of the drive.

MajGen. Hori Views Brigade in Action

MajGen. Eizo Hori, Chief, J-2 Division, Joint Staff Office (JSO), Japan Defense Agency, viewed the Brigade's might Monday with Col. Masao Shoji and LtCol. Shoji Tomizawa, also of the Japanese Defense Agency.

Accompanying the General's party were U.S. Army Maj. Masato Inouye and George Takabayashi, who acted as interpreters for the group.

They arrived at K-Bay by helicopter at 9 a.m. and were met by BrigGen. M.E. Carl, Brigade CG, Col. Regan Fuller, Brigade Chief of Staff, and Col. P.T. Johnston, Sta-

tion CO.

After a briefing by Gen. Carl at K-Tower, Gen. Hori witnessed members of the 4th Marines rappelling from helicopters, and a demonstration on the characteristics and capabilities of the LVTP-5 amphibian tractor at Ft. Hase Beach.

During the Amtracs demonstration, Gen. Hori accepted an invitation to drive one of the vehicles. Following a short lecture on how to operate the vehicle, the General proved himself a capable Amtrack.

The General then viewed a static display of MAG-13 aircraft and a MOREST-assist-

ed landing demonstration on the Station's air-strip.

Gen. Hori and his party departed the Station at 11:10 a.m.

Father C. J. Griffin Expects To Retire After Serving Navy, Marines 18 Years

Chaplain (Cdr.) Cornelius J. Griffin, Station Chaplain, will be honored at a dinner Thursday marking the 189th Anniversary of the Chaplain Corps.

Father Griffin, who has served as Station Chaplain since his arrival at K-Bay last April, plans to retire in January after completing more than 18 years service as a Navy Chaplain and enlisted sailor.

Father Griffin entered the Navy in January 1945 as an enlisted man, and was promoted to Yeoman 2d Class before entering Pontifical College, Josephinum in July 1946. He was ordained a priest in May 1948.

He received a commission as a Lt. (jg) in the Chaplain Corps in February 1949, and completed two months of indoctrination at the Bureau of Naval Personnel in Washington, D.C.

In May 1949 he reported to Naval Operating Base, Norfolk, where he served as a Catholic Chaplain until July 1950.

During Korea, Chaplain Griffin served as Battalion Catholic Chaplain with the 2d Battalion, 7th Marines. While serving with the 7th Marines he made the Inchon Landing, and remained with that unit during the historic withdrawal from the Chosin Reservoir.

In Korea, Chaplain Griffin

was awarded the Silver Star Medal for his action on Nov. 2 and 3, 1950, while serving with the 7th Marines at Chin-

hung-ni. His citation read:

"During the late morning of 3 November, the same units of the 7th Marines were subjected to heavy small arms fire. Chaplain Griffin left the comparative security of the battalion sickbay, where he was rendering aid to the wounded and moved back to the front lines. Here he repeatedly exposed himself without regard for his personal safety to render what aid he could to the wounded men in the attack..."

Father Griffin, the most seriously wounded chaplain of the Korean War, left Korea in December 1950, after receiving machine gun wounds while administering last rites to a dying Marine.

He returned to Oakland Hospital, and was transferred to Great Lakes, Ill., for further treatment.

In November 1952, he reported to 2d ITR at Camp Pendleton, Calif., where he served until October 1954.

Reporting aboard the USS Sperry (AS-12) in October 1954, he was assigned as Chaplain for Submarine Squadrons 3 and 5.

Other tours of duty for the Chaplain have included NTC, San Diego, Calif., February 1957 to April 1959; USS Midway (CVA-41), April 1959 to May 1961; and Station Chaplain at the Naval Air Station, Moffett Field, Calif., from May 1961 to March 1964.

A complete list of Chaplain Griffin's medals include the Silver Star Medal; Purple Heart; Presidential Unit Citation, with 2 stars in lieu of second and third awards; American Campaign Medal; WWII Victory Medal; National Defense Medal; Korean Service Medal, with 2 bronze stars; the United Nations Medal, and the Korean Presidential Unit Citation.

During World War II, one Chaplain was decorated with the Medal of Honor, one with the Navy Cross, eight with Silver Star Medals, nine with Legions of Merit, six with Marine Corps Medals, 28 with Bronze Stars, and 40 received Letters of Commendation.

The Chaplain's Corps again distinguished itself in Korea under combat conditions when four Silver Stars, 5 Legions of Merit, 44 Bronze Stars, 2 Air Medals, 65 Letters of Commendation and 15 Purple Hearts were won by chaplains serving with Marine forces.

According to historians, the

first Navy chaplain was Reverend Benjamin Balch, a Congregational Minister, who re-

Sirens To Wail Next Tuesday

K-Bay's sirens will be tested Tuesday at 30 seconds prior to 11 a.m.

The tests are conducted monthly in connection with the sounding of the Civil Defense sirens on the island of Oahu. These tests ensure that each siren is operative.

Air raid tests will consist of a steady blast of one minute duration followed by one minute of silence, then one minute of the wailing "TAKE COVER" signal.

The tidal wave warning system will be tested one minute after the wailing tone ends. This is a one minute steady blast.

RLT-4 Ends 'Quick Slash'

Exercise "Quick Slash" ended Friday, Nov. 20, as counter-guerrilla forces of RLT-4 swept the Kahuku hills clean of remaining guerrilla resistance.

RLT-4 composed of some 3200 Marines from the 4th Marine Regiment and sup-

porting units, traveled to Kahuku Nov. 16, to begin the week-long semi-controlled counter-guerrilla field exercise.

The purpose of the problem was to train in counter-guerrilla warfare, civil affairs, and counter-intelligence op-

erations.

Mythical villages utilized during the exercise were: Summitville, Ki, Howemane, Kapu, and Kiki. They averaged 30 persons per village in population.

Monday was utilized to move the three battalions into separate Tactical Areas of Responsibility from which they would operate for the next week.

Tuesday, all units started extensive patrolling and initial contact was made with all the villages.

Wednesday, Operation "Eagle" was conducted. In this operation platoon-size heli-patrols were heli-lifted in a search for guerrilla infiltration.

Also on Wednesday, LtCol. N.W. Hicks, 3/4 CO, spokesman for the landing force unit, met with the provincial chief to establish friendly relations with the Provincial Government. The purpose of the meeting was to insure that Marines did not violate the sacred laws of the village.

All during the problem each battalion used civic action contact teams for their operation with the villages. They also gave the villagers emergency food and water and administered first aid to all the villagers in need.

The provincial chief was then taken to all villages in order to discuss any immediate problems and to insure the Marines were not violating any laws.

Summitville was moved from the high grounds to the larger town of Ki at the request of the villagers for better protection from the guerrillas.

A few obstacles were encountered by the counter-guerrilla forces but the biggest obstacle was keeping the villagers from being peaceful farmers during the daytime and guerrillas during the night.

To counteract this problem, all villagers were registered, a curfew was put into effect, and a Marine security guard was placed around the villages.

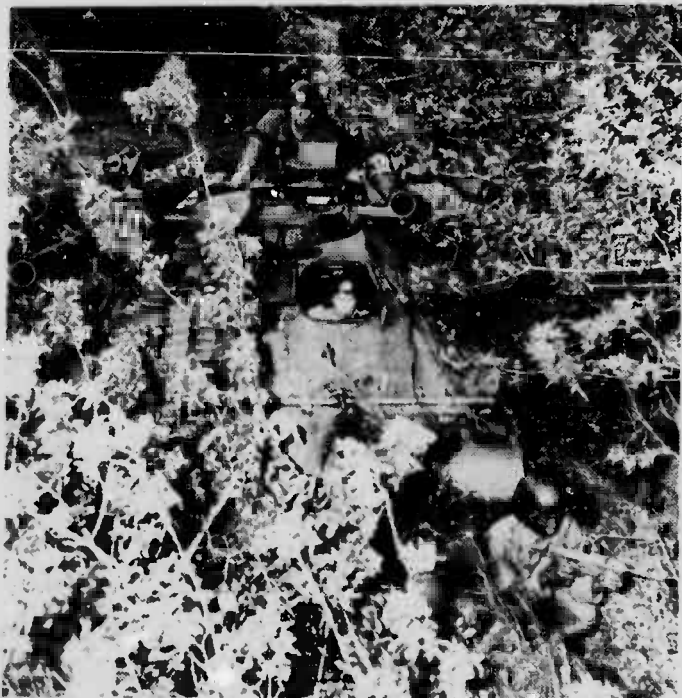
Friday, the guerrillas were captured and the problem was pau.

At the conclusion of Exer-

cise "Quick Slash," Col. E.P. Dupras Jr., 4th Marines CO, said, "The exercise can be rated as excellent. The success of this exercise could not have been achieved without the full cooperation of each participating unit. To all participants involved a 'Well Done'."

Located in Bldg. 221, the office is staffed by trained volunteers and one paid book-keeper.



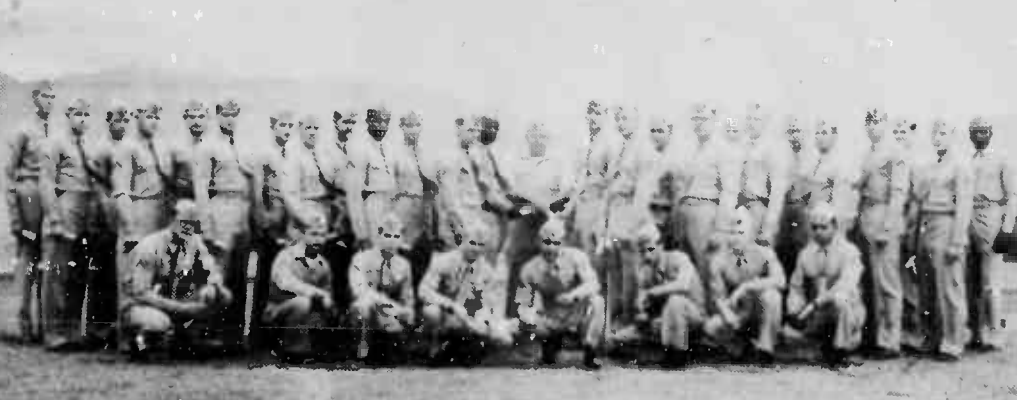

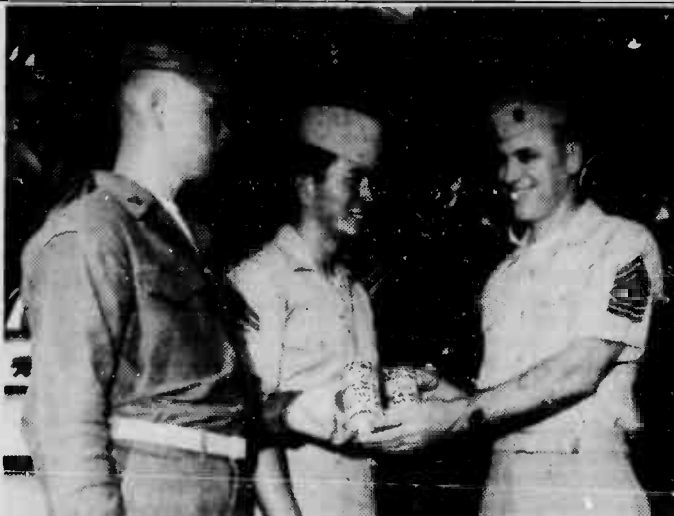
A few miles from Eielson AFB, Alaska, is a post office officially designated Santa Claus House, North Pole, Alaska.
