LCpl. Edward F. Sylvia Commended; After Rescuing 2 Children from Fire

A Meritorious Mast, a Letter of Commendation, and a spot promotion to Lance Corporal made last Friday a big day in the life of LCpl. Edward F. Sylvia, B—Engineers.

LCpl. Sylvia is the 19-year-old Marine who entered the burning quarters of SSgt. F.A. Libby and rescued the sergeant's two sons last Thursday.

The young Marine had just been relieved of guard duty at 4 a.m. when he and other members of the ServBn guard smelled smoke and saw the flames.

LCpl. Sylvia broke the glass of the bedroom window with his cartridge belt and climbed into the fire and smoke-filled room. He handed 2½ year old Larry out the window then followed the screams of Frederic Jr., 7, across the room until he located him in the smoke. He passed Frederic Jr. out and then climbed out the window to safety.

The Meritorious Mast and promotion were awarded by LtGen. Victor H. Krulak, CG, FMFPac, during informal ceremonies held at Camp Smith Friday.

While LCpl. Sylvia was rescuing the two boys, SSgt. Libby was saving his daughter Joanna, 5. SSgt. Libby smashed a bedroom window with his fist and passed Joanna out to other Marines of the ServBn Guard.

Both SSgt. Libby and his daughter received first and second degree burns on their arms and faces in the fire.

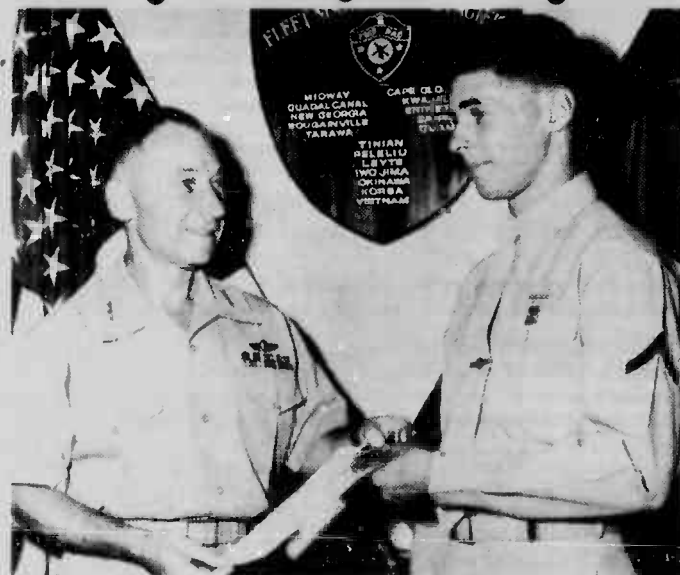

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'Neck Cagers Upset San Francisco Dons 77-71

Rainbow Classic Will Begin Saturday

Hawaii Marine cagers upset the Nation's 3d ranked college team, the San Francisco Dons, 77-71 Friday night at the Station Gym.

The win was the 15th straight for the 'Necks with 11 of them coming in league play. The loss was the first for the Dons against five wins.

Prior to playing the Dons on Friday evening the Marines defeated the Hickam Flyers 80-68 in a game played at Wheeler Air Force Base Thursday.

Saturday evening the 'Necks will play Utah State in the opening round of the 1st annual Rainbow Basketball Classic at the Honolulu International Center.

Wisconsin will meet Boston College in the second game on opening night. Game times are 7 and 9 p.m. throughout the four-day tournament.

The second night of the tournament will find Los Angeles State meeting Arizona State and the University of Hawaii will take on the SubPac Raiders.

The sure eyes of 'Neck forward Clyde Stallsmith and guard Bill Connolly from the foul line gave the Marines their upset victory

over the Dons Friday.

Stallsmith went 11 for 12 from the foul line while Connolly hit 10 for 11. Connolly also hit nine field goals to lead the scoring with 28 points.

Stallsmith sank five field goals to give him a total of 21 points. Chico Dennis hit for 14 tallies on six field goals and two free throws.

The Marines sank 27 of 35 free throw attempts while the Dons hit 7 for 12. The Dons were called for 23 infractions while the Marines were called for nine.

At half-time the Marines trailed 31-28 in the game that saw the score tied five times. The Marines went ahead for the final time 62-60 on a 15-foot field goal by Dennis.

"We did a lot of scouting said LtCol. R. A. Smith, Hawaii Marine Cage Coach. "All the credit for the win goes to the players because they are the ones to execute the plans."

High scorer for the Dons was forward Irwin Mueller with 21 points. All-American Candidate Ollie Johnson sank 18 points while Joe Ellis connected for 15.

Both Ollie Johnson and Russ Gumina fouled out of the

game. Gumina left with about 5 minutes remaining and Johnson followed him three minutes later.

In Thursday night's league game with the Flyers the Marines were behind for the first time this season at half-time. The Flyers led 35-32.

Clyde Stallsmith was the high scorer for the 'Necks with 18 tallies. Other Marines to hit the two column figures were Carl Hunter 14, Marty Erdheim 11 and Chico Dennis 10.

High scorer of the game was Walt Essex with 27 points. Bill Dula was the only other Flyer to score in the two column figures. He sank 10 points.

The 'Necks were slated to play the SubPac Raiders Tuesday evening at Bloch Arena.
