# K-Bay Marine Fulfills Wish; Is US Citizen

For the first time in ten years, LCpl. Juan M. Alvidrez will not be filling out an alien address report when the reports come due in January.

The 19-year-old VMF (AW)-212 jet mechanic became a United States citizen Dec. 18, at the U.S. District Court House in Honolulu.

Taking the oath of allegiance marked the end of almost ten years of living in the United States without citizenship for Cpl. Alvidrez, who was born in Chihuahua, Mexico.

"This is something I've always wanted since I moved to the U.S.," said Cpl. Alvidrez.


Capt. J.L. Mavretic, who was then serving as VMF (AW)-212 Intelligence Officer, encouraged Cpl. Alvidrez to apply for citizenship shortly after he arrived at K-Bay in April.

"I obtained an acquisition form from the Immigration Department in Honolulu and went right to work on it," the Corporal said.

After turning in his application, Cpl. Alvidrez needed witnesses who knew him for five years or longer.

"Seeing no one over here knew me for five years, I had to write home to obtain the witnesses by notarized letters," Cpl. Alvidrez said. "I also had to take an oral test on basic U.S. principles, including a language test and a Constitution test."

"I will try to prove myself a worthy citizen," he continued. "I am thankful to all who assisted me."

# Zip Goes Zap for Station; New Code Due Tomorrow

A recently published change to postal regulations will enable K-Bayites to utilize a shorter address, and is expected to improve their mail service.

The new regulations, contained in Station Bulletin 2740, will become effective tomorrow.

Under the new regulations, the U.S. Postal Offices have changed from the familiar Zip Code System to a revised Zip-Navy

Number which utilizes an area code number and excludes the use of "Navy #990."

The numerical code for the Air Station, including PMR and all government quarters, is 96628. Brigade and 1st Rad-Bn will retain their present 96601 as their Zip-Navy Number.

Other addressing instructions incorporated in the change to Zip-Navy Numbers include the use of the abbreviation "FPO" in lieu of "Fleet Post Office."

Along with the abbreviation, postal regulations no longer require the state to be included when using with "FPO". (FPO, San Francisco. The Calif. is no longer used.)

The new instructions also state that geographic locations such as "Kaneohe Bay" should not be used as part of the address.

WO W. K. Wilsman, Station/Brigade Postal Officer, suggests that individuals notify parents, relatives, and appropriate business firms and publishers of these changes as soon as possible.

## HQMC Authorizes Commands More Promotions to Corporal

Nearly 1100 Marines may receive a belated "Christmas present" soon from the Com-

mandant of the Marine Corps in the form of a promotion from lance corporal to corporal.

According to HQMC, Commanding Generals of Fleet Marine Force Units, which includes the Brigade, are authorized to increase the number of promotions from lance corporal to corporal from five to 7.5 percent above the authorized T/O or Manning Level figure.

Commanding Generals LFTU Atlantic, and Pacific, Marine Reserve Training Commands, and Commanding Officers of other units including the Station are authorized an increase from 10 to 20 percent above the authorized T/O or Manning Level.

The promotion increase will be made without regard to vacancies in Table of Organization or MOS, and will be administered during the 3rd and 4th quarters of Fiscal Year '65.

Additional information is contained in a recent change to MCO 1418.9D.

## 171 SNCO Promotions Due During January

Only 171 enlisted Marines will start the new year with new stripes according to January promotion figures released by HQMC.

These figures, according to Navy Times, show a drop in the number of sergeants who will be promoted to staff sergeant. Eighty-three will sew on the rocker Jan. 1, compared to the steady quota of 300 per month who have ranked as E-6s since July.

1st Sgt. Anthony L. Krizzan, who ranks 14th among those first sergeants selected for sergeant major, is the only first sergeant who will be promoted during January. This leaves 24 awaiting promotion.

Five master sergeants will be promoted to master gunnery sergeant effective Jan. 1, leaving 41 still on the waiting list. Junior man to be advanced is number 51 on the original list.

Also being promoted are 26 gunnery sergeants, eight of whom will get first sergeant stripes. The remaining 18 promoted to master sergeant. Junior first sergeant promotee is number 147, leaving 15 remaining on the waiting list.

Junior man being promoted to master sergeant is 530th on the original selection list. There are 87 selectees left on the list.

The junior gunnery sergeant selectee who will be promoted

in January is number 637 on the original list. This leaves 679 others still awaiting promotion.

The junior sergeant to be promoted to staff sergeant holds a 1884 precedence number. 894 remain of the original 2778 selected.

The test will consist of a steady blast for one minute, followed by one minute of silence and then one minute of the wailing "Take Cover" signal.

The tidal wave warning system will be tested one minute after the wailing tone ends. This test will be a one minute steady blast on the coastal sirens only.

# 'Duty-Honor-Country' Guided Gen. MacArthur Through Life

K-Bay's Book-of-the-Month at the Station Library is General Douglas MacArthur's "Reminiscences."

The most celebrated soldier of our time recalls half a century of courage and controversy.

In his own words...with characteristic candor and vivid memory...Gen. MacArthur recalls his extraordinary life and the storms of controversy that accompanied his actions in four great wars and while serving eight Presidents.

"Probably no living man," he writes, "has seen as much



of war and its destruction as I." Certainly no soldier's life has so wholly reflected a nation's military history.

The men, the events, the fronts, the spoken and written words...they shine from the pages of these remarkable memoirs. For the first time he fully recounts his role in the Billy Mitchell trial, the Bonus March on Washington, the dispute with General George Marshall over Allied support of the Pacific War, his relationship with F.D.R., his dismissal by President Tru-

man, and his unused plan for winning the war in Korea.

"Reminiscences" is a Portrait of a hero whose mind and heart were "the essence of that elusive and deathless thing called soldiering."

"Old soldiers never die they just fade away," to quote the General, and Reminiscences was written in his own hand just weeks before he, "just faded away." This is a final testament to a life of duty, honor, and service.


