

# 4400 Cpls. To Be Promoted

HQMC has announced cutting scores which will promote some 4400 corporals to sergeants this month.

According to Navy Times this exceeds the "nearly 300" figure predicted earlier by HQMC.

The scores are generally lower though in some fields they do run slightly higher. Pay and allowances for promotions resulting from the cutting scores are effective June 1. Corporals in any occupational field who are qualified to switch to the intelligence field -- 02 -- can be promoted to sergeant as soon as they change fields, regardless of cutting score.

In the initial onslaught of rifle fire and grenades, several Marines were wounded. Hospitalman Douds, senior corpsman in the company, realized the need for urgent medical attention to the casualties and moved among the wounded exposing himself to enemy fire.

His citation read, in part: "Douds, fearlessly disregarded the extreme jeopardy to his own life as he exposed himself to the withering enemy fire and moved throughout the area, expertly administering aid to his comrades.

"As the Marines repulsed the attack and the intensity of the battle diminished, Douds continued in his gallant efforts,

The Stars and Stripes was created June 14, 1777, when the Continental Congress resolved: "That the flag of the



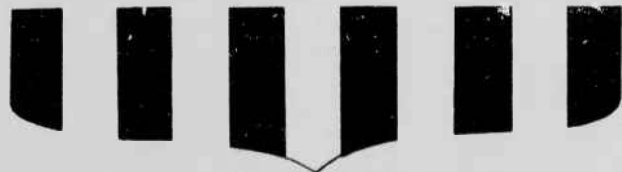

January, 1966 he served in Vietnam as a helicopter pilot with the once-Kaneohe-based HMM-161.

On September 18, 1965, he was flying with seven other "choppers" assigned to a search and clear operation in support of the 101st Airborne Division.

Although he encounter-

ed heavy damaging enemy fire at the landing zone, he debarked his troops and then returned, with a second load of Marines.

Capt. Simpson began his homeward flight when he learned that a fellow pilot had crashed nearby and rescue attempts were threatened by Viet Cong.

Changing course, Simpson took his aircraft down below the 500-foot safe level to fire at enemy machine gun positions firing on the downed crew and rescue helicopter. Again his crippled chopper was struck several times by ground fire.

Through his daring and flying ability he enabled the rescue aircraft to reach the downed Marines and evacuate them from under the noses of the VC.

# PMR MEN WITH A MISSION

To most Kaneohe-based Marines and Navy men, close order drill, escape and evasion, muzzle velocity and combustion

are common every day words and phrases.

But to a small group of navy men located in Hangar 101 nary a word is spoken that doesn't have something to do with the space

age in which we live. Instead they use words and phrases like: telemetry, frequency interference control, orbiting point, pass time and retro fire.

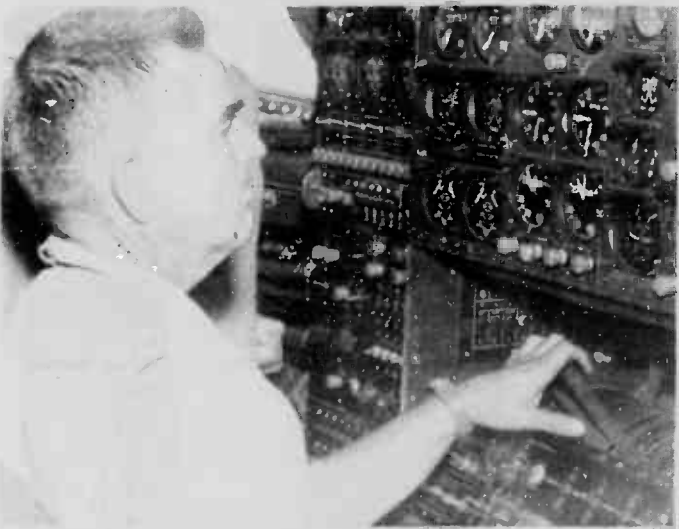
These men, members of

the Pacific Missile Range Facility, support the missile launching at Point Mugu, Calif., and Vandenburg Air Force Base, Calif., into the Western Test Range Area and the orbital flights from Cape Kennedy in Florida.

Over the past weekend, PMR took part in the flight of Gemini 9. Flying the modified Constellation aircraft, PMR spent the better part of Friday through Monday on-station over the Pacific. The "Connies" arrived on-station to cover critical passes of GT 9 and remained for a designated number of Gemini orbits.

In support of GT 9, PMR had three prime missions: record telemetry data from the capsule; maintain on a stand-by basis the Autocat system -- voice communications from the capsule for relay to the Kokee Tracking Station on Kauai -- and operation of the Frequency Interference Control System. FIC is used to police frequencies assigned for a mission and keep them clear of undesirable transmissions.

## VA Ruling Raises GI BILL Rates For Second Termes

Active duty servicemen with an enlistment behind them and some officers with broken service will get regular GI Bill allowances for dependents while studying under the new GI Bill, the Veterans Administration has ruled.

When Congress passed the GI Bill and wrote in on-duty education for active-duty personnel for the first time, it said the subsistence rate would be based on the rates for veterans without dependents -- a \$100 a month -- because servicemen are employed by the government.

The new VA ruling retains this for those without a first discharge, but raises the allowance for men with an honorable discharge. Those with one dependent get \$125 a month while those with two or more \$150.

A man may not draw tuition aid under the Defense program and GI Bill help at the same time, however, he may take advantage of both programs at separate times.

The Veterans Adminis-

tration also noted that in-service students must furnish a Certificate of Availability (VA Form 21E-1999A) signed by their commanding officer, to the school to be returned to the VA with the enrollment certificate.

The forms will not be ready in time for the summer semester this year, but Pentagon officials say may be submitted retroactively. They will be available from the station education office.

## Clothing May Cost More After July 1

A lot of backstage maneuvering is said to be going at HQMC regarding a threatened price hike in uniform clothing slated to become effective July 1.

According to one official, the new price will raise the cost of the complete clothing bag from \$211.66 to \$263.59 -- an increase of \$51.93.

It is known that the new price list is already in the hands of officials but is officially "waiting for Pentagon approval."

Actually, the Corps is far from satisfied with the new price structure which

is said to add a fat increase in the cash clothing items without a corresponding increase in the cash clothing allowance. The Marine Corps has also submitted to the Secretary of Defense a new proposed clothing price list for fiscal '87 which would probably roll back some of the prices pending in the list already published.

But until Defense either approves or disapproves the newer price proposals the list will remain a top drawer "open secret." (Navy Times).

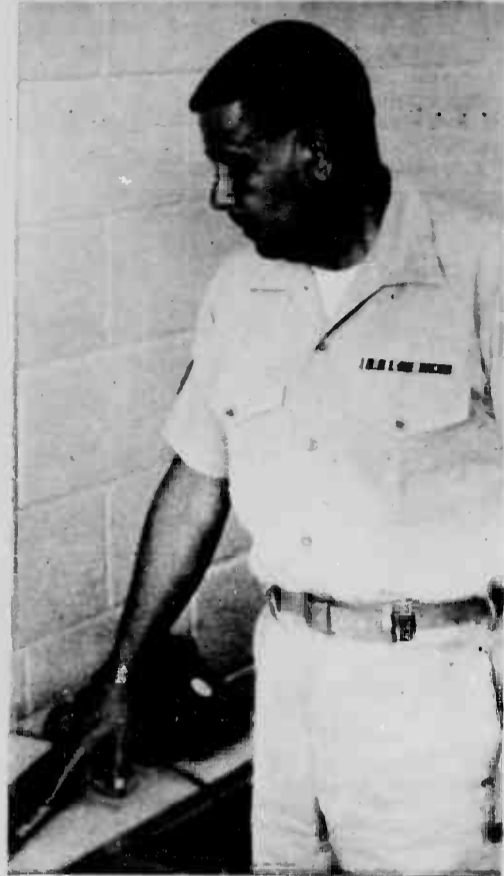

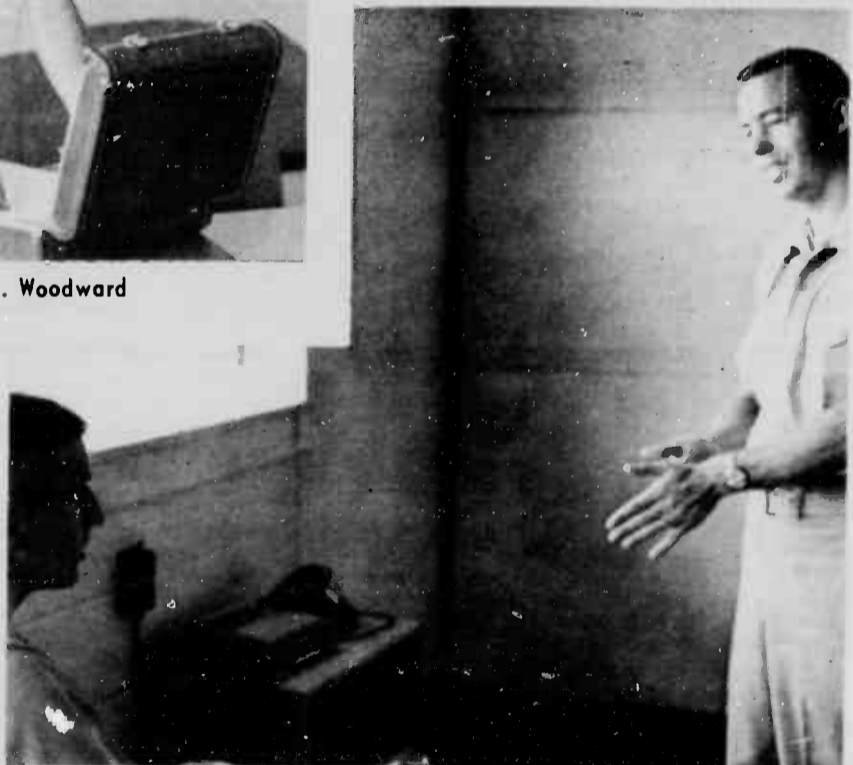

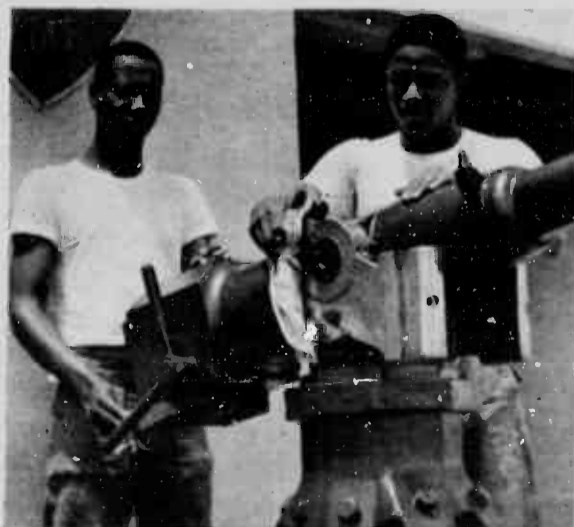

## K-Bay Bowlers Increasing Interest In America's Fastest Growing Sport

In view of the spirited competition between K-Bay teams and the ever-increasing interest in the pin-pushing art, we have delved into history to come up with some facts that might surprise even Roger Pouliot, hottest roller of the "Five Aces" in the H&HS League.

In the 17th century, when an old Rip Van Winkle played the game midst a beard-growing session, he didn't know what he was doing toward popularizing bowling.

Bowling dates back beyond Van Winkle's 40 winks. After checking the books it was discovered that our ancestors rolled rocks around.

Some historians even ponder the possibility that the boys in the Garden of Eden used to throw giant pebbles at a lineup of pointed stones.

The growth of the sport is amazing. In 1934 bowling was not even listed among the 10 fastest growing sports. In 1940, tennis action zoomed to third Fishing and skiing led.

Today, it is unanimously recognized as America's fastest growing sport -- "Everybody's sport."

In 1901 the American Bowling Congress held its first national championship tournament, there were 41 five-man teams entered. The prize was \$2,500. At Cleveland, in 1939, the prize was \$184,000 in cash. In Detroit, Mich., a year later, even a larger sum was recorded. Over 30,000 bowlers, representing 731 cities, traveled to and participated in the championships. Approximately 100,000 spectators payed their way into the Michigan State Fair Grounds to view the 6,000 competing teams over an eight-week period.

There are over 30 million keglers in America today. Not all of them, by far, are men. Women and children have also taken to this ever-increasing family game as the proverbial duck to water.

To all Special Services Patrons:

It seems that a definition is in order today. There is a difference of opinion between me and a few of our patrons on what is a guest.

The book requires that a guest be actually invited and accompanied by his host. This means that a person who shows up on one of our facilities and states he is the guest of Lt. Joe Blow will be refused service.

There is another aspect to the guest bit and that is a guest is not a permanent status. It is assumed that a person is a guest occasionally, not permanently.

There is, of course, the

house guest which is another category. A house guest must be a visitor, not from Oahu, who is actually a guest for a short period of time in the home of the sponsor.

A house guest, with the appropriate paperwork at the Special Services Office, rates golf course privileges without the sponsor actually accompanying him. Though technically limited to the golf course now, the revised Special Services instructions now being prepared will extend this to all facilities.

Though no specific time limit applies to house guests it must be conceded that one should be set. A month is a good rule of thumb.

We have had cases of persons requesting house guest status for a year, and that's not right. I understand there is a person around here who has been pulling this for eight years. Would you believe seven?

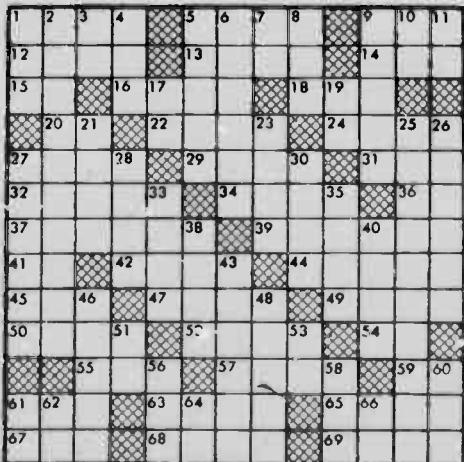
