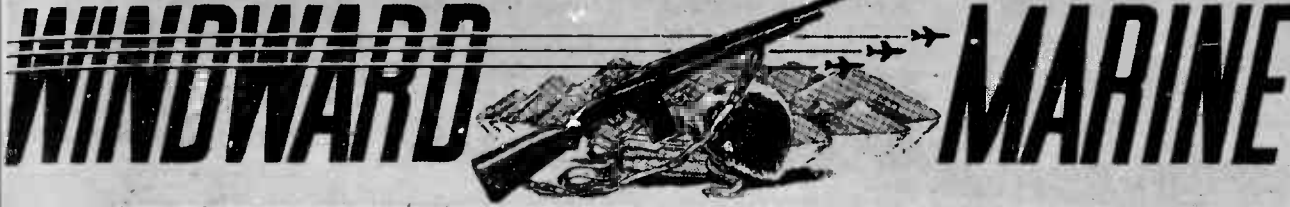

## 'Enemy Out In Open' Says General Krulak

"It's a go-for-broke war now for the enemy in Vietnam," said Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, Commander, Lieutenant General Victor H. Krulak, February 9, following his return from a first-hand assessment of the Vietnam war.

"He's done what we wanted — he's come out in the open."

General Krulak briefed newsmen at a press conference at Camp H. M. Smith, just hours after returning from Vietnam. This was his 52nd trip to the war scene during his four-year tenure as Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific.

The general said there are presently four wars in South Vietnam: for the road system, the cities, the airfields and, yet to come, the Demilitarized Zone.

"A major North Vietnamese DMZ assault is imminent," he said, adding that, "it will be a tough battle and we will win."

According to the general, the Reds had lost the battles for the cities and airfields, but had made substantial progress in disrupting allied supply traffic on the highways.

"They've made our logistics functions more difficult, but we'll

## 643 K-Bay Youths Given Free Fluoride Treatments

Through the combined efforts of five dentists, eight dental technicians and seven Volunteer Red Cross workers, 643 children were given the preventive dentistry fluoride treatment February 10.

This treatment was the second step in the three advocated by Station Dental, the first being chewing tablets designed to show areas of the teeth that needed brushing by staining them red, then brushing them until the stain was removed.

The third and final step is done by the parents and children, brushing after each meal with one of the fluoride toothpastes recommended by the Dental Department.

Treatment was completely free of charge and along with daily brushing, is the most efficient means of preventing tooth decay.

## University Offers Special Scholarships

Armed Services personnel who have served their country in Vietnam and at other military installations at home or abroad are offered a special scholarship program at the Duke University School of Law.

Funds have been allocated to assist servicemen who want to study law upon completion of their tours of duty or under "excess leave" status. This program for members of the Armed Forces is believed to be the first offered by any school.

In addition to scholarships, Duke University reminds servicemen to make full use of educational funds provided through the Veterans Administration. This program, popularly called the G.I. Bill, provides \$130 per month for single veterans, and \$155 and \$175 per month respectively for those with one or two dependents. Applicants for these benefits must have served on active duty continuously for at least 181 days, or be discharged for a service-connected disability.

Likewise, educational loans are available for law study under the National Defense Education Act. Normally, these NDEA grants begin to bear interest at the modest rate of three percent annum, nine months after graduation and are interest free up to that time. These loans are administered through both individual schools and the state agencies. Inquiries may be directed to the law school to which one is applying.

Duke Law School also assists wives of veterans in finding desirable employment as teachers, secretaries and otherwise.

Applications for admission to Duke, and most other schools, should be filed early in the year preceding the fall semester when the applicant expects to enroll—preferably by January. Later admission may be more difficult due to nearly-filled entering classes. Prospective students may secure information and application forms by writing directly to schools in which they are interested.

Most law schools require applicants to take the standard Law School Admission Test. Registration forms may be obtained by writing directly to the Law School Admission Test, Educational Testing Service, Box 944, Princeton, New Jersey,

08540. Duke advises that the test be taken on the November or February dates. Registration for the test must be effected several weeks in advance (earlier for foreign locations). The morning portion of the test covers academic ability, and the afternoon tests examine writing ability and general background.

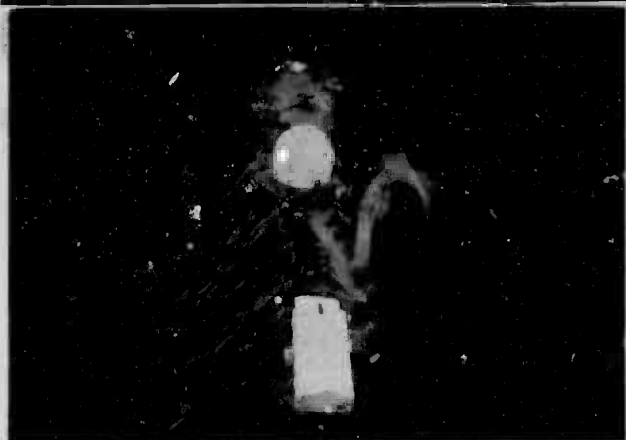
## No Housing At Pendleton

Marines being transferred overseas, who expect to depart from Camp Pendleton, shouldn't plan to leave families in the Camp Pendleton Oceanside area, according to a recent Marine Corps Bulletin.

A large number of Marines have been reporting to Camp Pendleton for further transfer to WestPac units and bringing their families with them to remain in the area while the Marine is overseas.

No housing is available on Base in such cases, and there is little in the surrounding communities. Although there are temporary accommodations at the 40-room Hostess House on Base, reservations must be made prior to departure from the Marine's last duty station. Maximum length of stay is set at two weeks at \$3.50 a day.

Rent in surrounding communities ranges from \$85 per month for a one-bedroom house or apartment to \$165 per month for four-bedrooms. Furnished rooms average \$65 a month, and motels usually rent for \$30 to \$40 a week.

## General Reassignment Announced By HQMC

Two general officers have been reassigned for immediate duty as additional Assistant Division Commanders for the 1st and 3d Marine Divisions in Vietnam, Headquarters Marine Corps announced recently.

Brigadier General John N. McLaughlin, who, since January 1967, has served as the Deputy Director, Joint Staff (J-5) STRIKE Command, McDill Air Force Base, Tampa, Florida, will become an additional Assistant Division Commander for the 1st Marine Division. The other Assistant Division Commander for the 1st Marine Division is Brigadier General Foster C. Lahue.

Brigadier General William C. Chip will replace General Glick as Commanding General of the 9th MAB and the FMF 7th Fleet

forces. General Chip had been serving at Marine Headquarters in Washington as the Deputy Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3.

Brigadier General Jacob E. Glick, has been reassigned in the Western Pacific area as an additional Assistant Division Commander for the 3d Marine Division.

Since March of 1967, General Glick has been serving as Commanding General of the 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade and of Fleet Marine Forces with the U.S. 7th Fleet. This command, with headquarters on Okinawa (or afloat when required) also includes an Air Group, a logistics unit, and the Special Landing Force battalions usually afloat off the coast of Vietnam.

In Vietnam, the other Assistant Division Commander in the 3d Marine Division is Brigadier General Carl W. Hoffman. He departed Washington earlier in January for this new assignment. Previously, General Hoffman had served as the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, and as Military Secretary to General Wallace M. Greene, Jr., the immediate past Commandant of the Marine Corps.

Assignment of two additional Assistant Division Commanders in Vietnam recognizes the present nature of the increased enemy threat in the DMZ area, and the importance of Marine tasks there.

The retirement of Brigadier General Gordon D. Gayle was announced by Headquarters Marine Corps today. A 1939 graduate of U. S. Naval Academy, General Gayle has served in the Marine Corps for nearly 29 years. Since November 1967, he has served in the capacity of Deputy Chief of Staff (Administration), Headquarters Marine Corps.

Replacements for Brigadier Generals Gayle, Chip, and McLaughlin have not been announced.

## Civil Servants Finish Course

# Drownproofing May Expand To High School Programs

Surfing, swimming, skin-diving, water skiing and other water sports find many devotees among those in high school. In view of this, it seems highly feasible that Drownproofing, a fairly recent development in water survival be introduced to high school physical education departments.

Drownproofing can be loosely defined as a relaxing way of treading water for prolonged periods of time. Instead of expending his energy on swimming or treading, which would exhaust him within minutes, a person can drownproof

for hours without tiring.

Unless you are held or pinned underwater, so dazed, unconscious, fatally cramped or injured, anybody can survive a water accident, regardless of age, sex, or condition of body, by drownproofing.

This type of survival in the water was originated by the late Professor Fred Lanoue, a physical education teacher and swimming coach at Georgia Institute of Technology.

In his book, *Drownproofing—A New Technique for Water Safety*, Lanoue wrote, "Swimming is merely a method of getting from here to there in the water, but drownproofing is a set of simple skills and attitudes that keep a person alive in deep water—if cramped or accidentally injured, even with clothes on."

The mainstay reasoning is that the average adult's head weighs about 15 pounds, and in deep water a person tends to try keeping his head above the surface, causing him physical exhaustion and lessening his chances for survival in deep water.

Professor Lanoue's concept teaches people to keep their heads

in the water and to relax their bodies, coming up only for necessary air, improving the chance of survival by reducing the physical strain on the body. In a proven test by Lanoue, poor swimmers were able to stay afloat as long as eight hours, without any floating devices whatsoever.

The simplicity is indicated by the pace of drownproofing instructions at Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station, Oahu, Hawaii. During the first day of the class the overwhelming majority passed. By the fifth day the remainder passed.

Although there are some high schools that give drownproofing instruction, and it is now mandatory in military recruit training, it is still on a scale that should be expanded.

It is hoped that high school authorities seriously consider incorporating drownproofing as essential survival know-how into their regular physical education programs.

## Navy Unit Commendation Awarded To Marine Units

A Marine squadron and aircraft wing detachment have been awarded the Navy Unit Commendation by the Secretary of the Navy for service in the Republic of Vietnam.

Marine Aerial Refueler Transport Squadron-152 and an attachment from Marine Aerial Refueler Transport Squadron-352 were decorated for their exceptional logistic support during Operation HASTINGS.

In HASTINGS Marines confronted the largest number of North Vietnamese regulars encountered in the war up to that time.

The battleground was in an area remote from friendly forces and supplies.

This required the III Marine Amphibious Force to depend entirely on airlifts into the small installation at Dong Ha.

With only a primitive dirt airstrip, from which to operate, the squadron transported men and supplies twenty-four hours a day.

The award's citation read in part: The squadron and detachment "...undertook this task aggressively and accomplished it with distinction, notwithstanding the fact that a combat operation of this scope had never before been supported entirely by Marine Air Forces.

The men of the squadron pursued their task, lifting more than 14,000 personnel and nearly 7,000 tons of war munitions to their destination.

"By their outstanding professional skill, courage and loyal devotion to duty the officers and men of the squadron and detachment made this operation possible."

## Deadline Set For Writers League Contest

Professional criticism and \$100 in cash will be the awards in the Armed Forces Writers League's 1968 Amateur Short Story Contest. The most important award to many will be the evaluation and criticism which each entry will get from three professionals.

The contest, which is open to all military personnel, dependents, civilian employees, veterans and others interested in the Armed Forces, is for unpublished stories of 1,800 words or less on any subject and closes April 1.

There is a \$50 first prize and 25 other awards in addition to evaluation for sales potential and detailed criticism.

All entries must be submitted on an official entry form which can be obtained in writing to the Armed Forces Writers League, George Washington Station, Alexandria, Va., 22305.

## Bachelors May Get Off Base Housing BAQ's

Effective July 1, 1967, three additional groups of service bachelors were given permission to live off-base and draw cash basic allowances for quarters when adequate on-base housing is not available. Eligible for consideration under the new Department of Defense housing policy are enlisted persons in pay grades E-7 through E-9, warrant officers, and commissioned officers in pay grades O-1 through O-3.

Decisions on when on-base housing is unavailable or inadequate are up to installation commanders. If you are one of the newly eligible and are interested in living off base, get details from the housing office.

Rates vary from \$70.20 for an E-4 (with more than 4 years' active service) to \$160.20 for an O-10.

He was commissioned a Warrant Officer in 1948, after six years enlisted service in the reserves and the Pacific Campaigns and later in Korea. He arrived at Guadalcanal when Marines held 15 square miles of beach and was also at Saivo Island.

In 1948 he left the Corps for a year and then joined the reserves the following year. He attended the University of Ohio and graduated in 1949. While there, he earned a Bachelor of Science and a degree in Business Administration. He returned to active duty in 1950.

"All the enemy got was tremendous animosity from the people and a lot of casualties."

He said the enemy had probably succeeded in "grinding down" only one percent of American air strength in attacks on airfields.

General Krulak said the enemy had hoped to generate large-scale support of the local population during their assault on the cities, but had failed to induce even one popular uprising.

The general said that the enemy's infiltration of Saigon and other larger cities was made easier by the local observance of Tet, when the traditional visiting of friends made strangers on the streets seem a natural thing.

"But in the little towns," he concluded, "they didn't make it."

## Marine Couple To Wed At Chapel On March 23

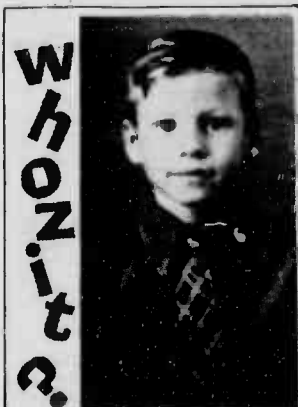

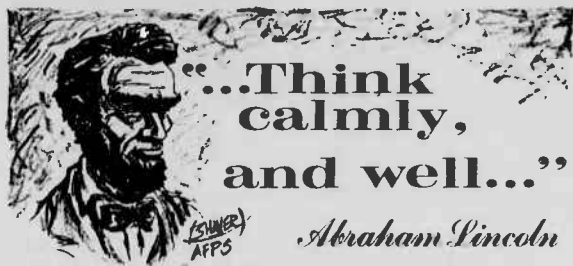

# A Way of Life

It has been estimated by various sources that more than 6,000 separate titles, books and pamphlets have been written by or about Abraham Lincoln since the first one appeared in 1839.

In this wealth of material available on Lincoln, there are evident certain threads of philosophy that influenced his every action.

Most important were his unbounded faith in and devotion to the principles of the Declaration of Independence. In speaking of the men who drafted that document, Lincoln once said, "They grasped

not only the whole race of man then living, but they reached forward and seized upon the farthest posterity. They erected a beacon to guide their children and their children's children, and the countless myriads who should inhabit the earth in other ages."

To this dedication and belief, Lincoln applied his own capable mind and talents, carefully weighing each action, each decision against the final outcome and the cost involved.

Ignoring the violent, conflicting opinions that were thrust upon him, recognizing his own deficiencies and respecting his own abilities, Lincoln followed his own admonition to "...think calmly and well..."

Once again, this Nation finds itself "...engaged in a great... war, testing whether that Nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure..."

Lincoln's dedication to the principles upon which this great Nation was founded and his ability to intelligently apply his individual ability to the problems which confronted him were a way of life.

It is a way of life that, in these precarious times, more of our citizens would do well to follow. (AFPS)

apropos to mention that, the writings of Abraham Lincoln are a rich mine of inspiration. Nearly every speech he made contains evidence of his deep sense of responsibility to God. And it is not hard to see why, since Lincoln himself was constantly seeking higher guidance for his thoughts and actions.

In his famous speech at Baltimore on April 18, 1864, he gave an example of this feeling of dedication when he said, "I am responsible... to the American people, to the Christian World, to History, and on my final account to God."

An even more famous reference to the Deity occurs in the last sentence of his immortal Gettysburg Address. The initial draft of this speech, however, did not include the words "under God." It was only as he was actually delivering his address that he spontaneously put them in. In was as if he suddenly sensed the incompleteness of his remarks and, with that last and most meaningful addition, gave his speech — and our country — its proper direction.

"...that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of

freedom — and that Government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

"The power of the earth is in the hand of God." (Ecclesiastes 10:4). Pray that you always recognize that your final responsibility is to Almighty God.

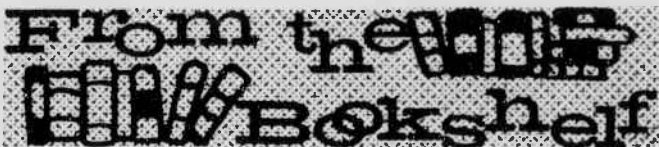
Whether or not you are a good leader depends upon your ability to accomplish a mission with a degree of willing, spiritual

Accompanied by Hawaiian musicians playing haunting Island melodies and native girls swaying in their tropical green ti leaf skirts, Windy wandered to greet the flagship of Matson Navigation Company, the USS LURLINE, as it eased into her berth at Pier No. 10 in Honolulu.

Amid the happy sounds of laughter, Aloha kisses and the fragrant smell of traditional flower

and just plain travelers.

With her gleaming white hull, graceful clipper-type bow, twin buff and blue stacks and the cruiser stern, the Lurline presents a striking appearance of beauty and elegance.

The ship incorporates the latest developments in the highly competitive and rapidly changing field of ocean transportation.

The LURLINE'S facilities, a-

children's playroom.

Outside decks, including the long wide promenades on each side, are of teak.

Spacious rooms start at a round trip fare of \$440 on up to the royale Lanai Suites for \$1492. The latter has twin-bedrooms, dressing room, a lanai sitting room and complete bathroom accommodations.

"Military passengers on the LURLINE," explains Mr. Jerry Murphy, director of information for Matson, "are very frequent. During the summer months," he continued, "sometimes as many as one third of total ship capacity are affiliated with the Armed forces." The ship holds a maximum of 760 people.

On the statistical side of things, the LURLINE has a speed of more than 20 knots and is propelled by two screws driven by turbines with a total of 22,000 shaft horsepower.

The ship is 683 feet, eight inches long, has a maximum width of 82 feet and carries a crew of 389. Though primarily

a passenger vessel, she has 165,693 cubic feet of dry cargo space.

The present LURLINE, fourth to bear the name, was originally the MATSONIA. The 26,000 ton MATSONIA was re-christened the LURLINE on December 6, 1963. It was built out of an old World War II hull at a cost of \$20 million at the Newport News (Va.) Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Co.

The ship sails approximately every 10 days, going both to Los Angeles and San Francisco, a 5-day trip.

Captain James Matson, founder of the line, launched the first LURLINE from San Francisco on June 16, 1887. The voyage to

Hilo, lasting 15 days and costing \$32, was also the honeymoon trip for Captain Matson and his bride who was making her first trip to the Islands.

Their daughter, now Mrs. William R. Roth, was given the name Lurline.

The second LURLINE entered service in 1908 and the third and best known joined Matson's fleet of "white ships" in 1932.

The name LURLINE, according to Mr. Murphy, apparently stems from Lorelei, a legendary German siren, who was the subject of several European operas in the 1900s.

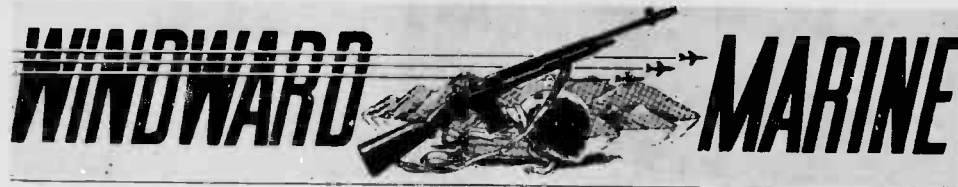

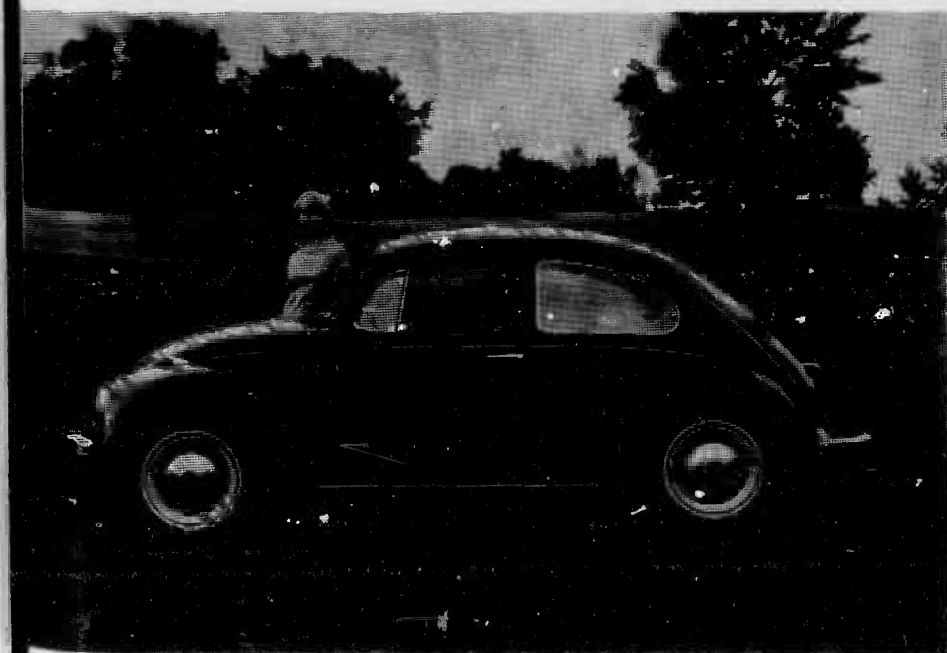

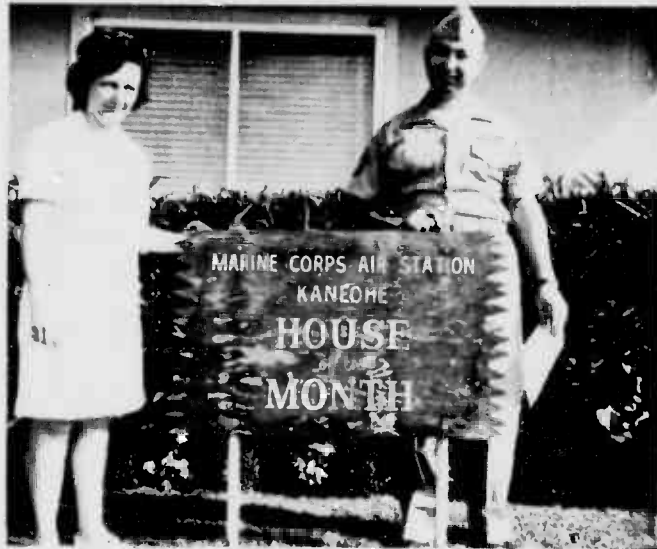

# Woods And Waters

Last week we talked a bit about a rather unsuccessful fishing trip some member of the K-Bay Rod and Gun Club went on. We also started to discuss fishing in general, but due to a few "type like" things got scrambled and the last paragraph in the column didn't quite come out like it should have. So, we'll start all over again.

One of the prime reasons for the popularity of fishing through the ages is that it is just plain "fun" to catch a fish. Angling appeals to millions of people without regard to age, sex, or physical condition. Game fish records are held by fifteen-year-olds, women, and in 1949 a 1,006 pound Black Marlin was caught by a young man with only one arm and one leg.

We often hear about game fish, but have you ever sat down and

tried to figure out what a game fish is? Is the rainbow trout hooked by a dry fly purist any more of a "game fish" to the fisherman than a small creek chub hauled in by a young boy with a cane pole?

Actually, it all depends on one's point of view. It seems to boil down to the simple fact that any fish, caught by any method, that puts up even a minimal struggle, can be called a game fish.

To qualify for a place in the record books, a fish has to be caught under exacting conditions, and this is as it should be. But the majority of us fish for food or fun and records are only incidental.

The informality of fishing could be the key to its popularity. It's an individual effort in all ways. Anyone with a rod and line catching fish for the fun of it is definitely angling.

Records of fishing with rod

and line go back as far as 2,000 B. C. in Egypt, and there's no real way to tell when the first fish was caught on a hook and line.

Equipment may improve with new materials and manufacturing methods, but it's difficult to find something really new in fishing. Artificial flies are mentioned in a book written early in the 15th Century, a rod with a spool-type reel seated in a space in the butt section of the rod was illustrated in a book published in 1651 in England, and the original patent on the spinning reel was given in 1905, also in England.

So, the next time one of "them non-believer types" jests about your fishing, remind him that it's probably man's second oldest sport and will be around much longer than some of the other games that are played today.

Team representatives are requested to submit entries to Station Special Services by April 3, with entries including the organization's name, team roster, team captain and his phone number.

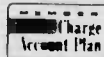

# Pass, 'ID' Section Serves K-Bayites

One of the first places that anyone new on base goes to is the Pass and Identification section of the Provost Marshal's Office.

This section issues passes for all personnel on this station, military and civilian. Also civilians having a need to enter the Air Station three or more times a week, and retired military that use the facilities of the base on a regular basis, are issued passes.

To obtain a permanent or temporary sticker owners must present proof of safety inspection verifi-

cation, a valid Hawaiian driver's license, and current registration. Stickers are issued on a color basis; gold for officers, red for enlisted, and green for civilians.

Registration section of Pass and ID is in charge of registering all cars, boats, firearms, animals, birds, and houseguests. The only animals allowed on station are dogs, cats, monkeys, parrots, and other psittacine birds. Monkeys and birds must be under restraint at all times.

Traffic court is held every Tuesday for civilians and dependents at Pass and ID. The police clerk has the power to award traffic points, revoke licenses or give orders to attend safe driving school. The jurisdiction is the same for civilians and military of this command. He does not have jurisdiction over military not of this command. Such cases are referred to the individual's commanding officer.

Identification takes pictures for ID cards and laminates them and other official cards.

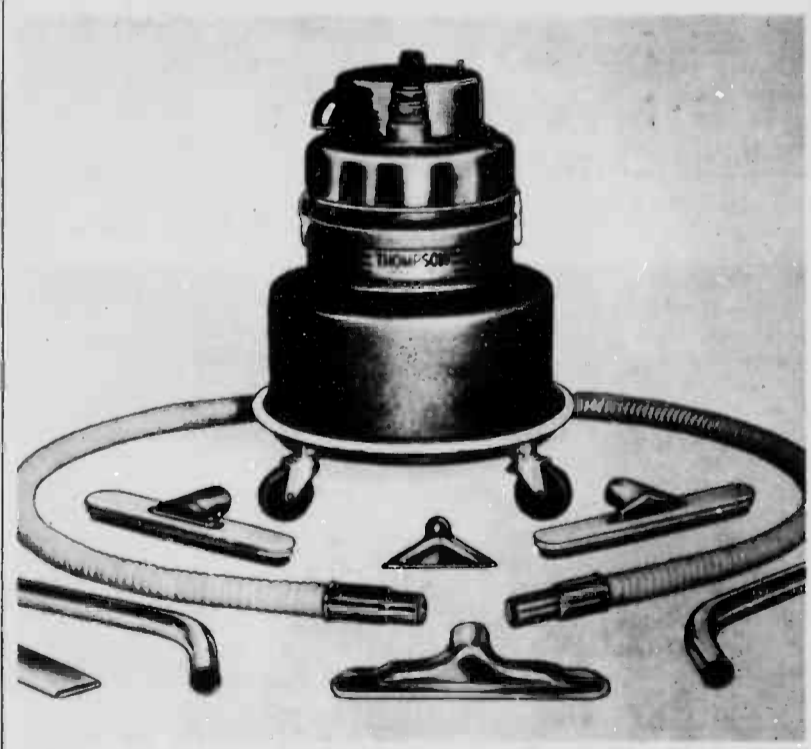
