

VMFA-235 Joins 1st Marine Brigade

Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 235, better known in Vietnam as the "Death Angels," became the latest addition to the air arm of the First Marine Brigade last Friday when their colors arrived here from Iwakuni, Japan.

No stranger to the Air Station, they flew out of here between 1952-54, the squadron will join VMFA 212 in flying the F4J Phantom jets to support the Brigade.

At the time of their official arrival here Friday, the squadron

changed from an all weather fighter squadron (VMF (AW)) to their current designation and also was assigned a new commanding officer, LtCol. William Tyksinski.

Commissioned originally as Marine Scout Bomber Squadron

(VMSB) 235 on Jan. 1, 1943, at El Centro, Calif., the squadron served four tours in the Pacific during World War II. Flying the Douglas SBD dive bomber, the Death Angels flew missions over Guadalcanal, Rabaul and New Britain.

From the end of WW II to the outbreak of the Korean War, the squadron was assigned to the Marine Air Reserve Training Command. With the opening of hostilities in Korea, the unit was recalled to active duty, equipped with F4U-4 Corsairs, and sent to Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro, Calif.

Two years later they received the F9F Panther jet and alternated between El Toro and here until 1954. That year they received the FJ-2 Fury and were deployed to Atsugi, Japan, until 1957.

A trip half-way around the world to the Marine Corps Air Station, Beaufort, S.C., followed for the unit. During a five-year stay at the South Carolina base, the squadron received the Chance Vought F8U-1 Crusader as its primary weapons system.

At the end of 1962 they headed for the Far East again where they joined Marine Air Group 11 in Japan for a two-year tour. Another two-year tour at Beaufort came next for the well-traveled squadron. During this period they once again changed aircraft, this time to the F8E Crusader.

In February, 1966, they were transferred to Vietnam for duty with Marine Air Group 11 and flew out of Da Nang in support of operations in "I" Corps. With the exception of two brief tours at Iwakuni for training and reforming (one just prior to their transfer here), the squadron remained in Vietnam.

During the past two and a half years they lived up to their name of Death Angels as they flew more than 15,000 sorties against the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese Army. Squadron pilots earned more than 500 Air Medals while logging better than 15,000 flight hours in combat.

Lieutenant Col. Anthony L. Blair commanded the squadron prior to its transfer here.

The new commander, LtCol. Tyksinski, comes to the Brigade air unit after a year as staff officer with Joint Task Force 2 at Sandia Base, Albuquerque, New Mexico.

A native of Chicago, Ill., the 38-year-old Marine officer was

in the Corps in June, 1953, following his graduation from the University of Idaho that same month.

After basic officers training at Quantico, he was assigned to duty in Korea where he served as a platoon leader with the Ninth and then the First Marine Regiments.

He entered flight training after a tour at the Marine Corps Supply Center, Barstow, Calif., in July 1956. LtCol. Tyksinski served with Marine Transport Squadrons 352 and 253 after receiving his wings in October, 1957.

He served as Operations Officer of Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 314 from April 1965 until July 1966 and during that period was stationed in Vietnam for four months. Prior to his assignment to Sandia Base, he attended the Marine Corps Command and Staff Course at Quantico, Va.

Col. Tyksinski Receives Joint Service Medal

Lieutenant Colonel William A. Tyksinski, Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 235 commander, received the Joint Service Commendation Medal in ceremonies at First Marine Brigade headquarters Tuesday afternoon.

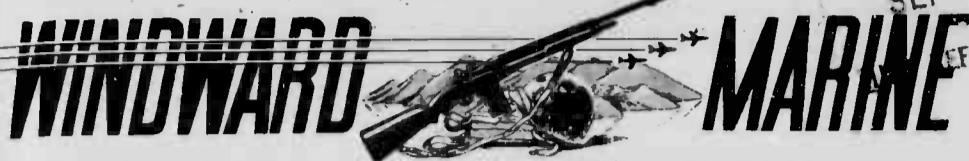
Presented by Col. W. C. McGraw Jr., Brigade commander, the medal was awarded by the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff, for LtCol. Tyksinski's work with Joint Task Force Two.

While assigned as an all weather attack pilot, Operations Directorate, JTF-2, he took part in the Combat Aircraft Recording and Data System (CARDS) test conducted at China Lake, Calif., Naval Air Station.

During the test he served as aircrew briefing officer, munitions officer, and maintenance officer. LtCol. Tyksinski was "highly instrumental in organizing personnel from all services and many different bases into an efficient test team," the citation read.

He was especially commended for his skill and initiative as briefing officer and was given full credit for the fact that no sorties of the research and development test were aborted or failed due to aircrew performance.

The period covered in the citation was from July 1967 to

1/27 Returns To Kaneohe Next Week

The colors of the 1st Battalion, 27th Marines, will return to Kaneohe next Tuesday when approximately 100 officers and enlisted men arrive from Vietnam.

Only those Marines whose families remained in Hawaii, and those who have requested duty here, will come to Kaneohe. Other members of 1/27 who deployed to Vietnam last February have either extended their tour in Vietnam, have been transferred back to the Mainland for discharge, or were casualties.

Major General Paul J. Fontana, deputy commander, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, will welcome the unit home during planeside ceremonies at Hickam Air Force Base, scheduled for 1 p.m., September 17.

A military spokesman in Saigon said that of the 4500 men in the regiment about 1500 have left Vietnam for either discharge or as medical evacuees, that 710 were leaving under the withdrawal order and that another 2000 will be absorbed by other units still there.

The return of the battalion to Kaneohe will complete the unit organization of the First Marine Brigade. Those bringing the colors home will provide the nucleus of the battalion as it reforms.

Fritsch Assumes Duties As 'Lancer' Commander

In dual ceremonies held here Friday, Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 212 changed commanders and saw a sister squadron, VMFA 235, transferred here to serve with the First Marine Brigade.

Lieutenant Colonel Billy D. Fritsch, who earned a Bronze Star and a Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry while serving with VMFA 323 and Marine Aircraft Group 13, relieved LtCol. T. F. Rochford as commander of the Lancers.

The former commander is being transferred to WesPac to serve with the Marine Air Wing.

A staff sergeant at the time he was commissioned in December, 1952, LtCol. Fritsch took command of the Lancers after a 13-month tour at Headquarters, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, as

aviation training officer with Operations (G-3).

Originally from Aibion, Ill., he enlisted in the Marine Corps in January, 1951, and, following recruit training, served with the Second Marine Division at Camp Lejeune, N. C., until he was assigned to Officers Basic School at Quantico, Va.

He went into flight training from basic school in May 1953 and was designated a naval aviator on the Marine Corps Anniversary (Nov. 10), 1954, at Corpus Christi, Texas.

After a two-year tour with Marine Composite Squadron 2 at Cherry Point, N. C., he served as a flight instructor at Pensacola until May 1958.

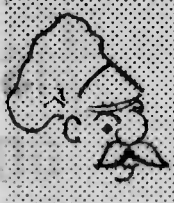
From then until April 1959, he was released from active duty and attended the University of Illinois. On his return to active duty he was assigned to the First Marine Aircraft Wing where he served as Special Services Officer.

During the next three years from August, 1960, to July, 1963 LtCol. Fritsch served with Marine All Weather Fighter Squadron: 114, 115 and 531 while with the Second Marine Aircraft Wing at Cherry Point.

After attending the Junio Officers Course at Quantico, he became the commanding officer of Headquarters and Headquarter Squadron, Marine Air Reserve Training Command, Glenview, Ill.

In July 1966 he was transferred to Vietnam where he served as executive officer of VMFA 323 and operations office of Marine Aircraft Group 13.

Chef de Cuisine

I'd like to leave you with one last recipe that very well describes my activities at present. A good description of the same is a Far Eastern sloppy joe.

Oriental Burgers

- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 2 tbsp. vegetable oil
- 1 can (1 lb) bean sprouts, drained
- 1 can (5 oz) water chestnuts, sliced (3/4 cup)

- 1/3 cup soy sauce
- 1/3 cup water
- 1 tbsp. dark molasses
- 2 tbsp. cornstarch
- 2 tbsp. water

Saute onion and beef in oil until browned. Add bean sprouts, water, chestnuts, soy sauce, 1/3 cup water and molasses. Cook about five minutes. Add mixture of 2 tbsp. water and cornstarch. Bring to boil; boil 1 minute. Salt to taste. Serve on buns. Serves eight.

Maccine Titus

One of the best novelists of our time... with sensuous, imageful, vigorous style that I have not found equaled in any other novelist today... writes again.

"Tunc" by Larence Durrell, his first novel since 1960. "Tunc" means "Then," "Next" or "Next in succession."

The story is told by scientist Felix Charlock, a "thinking weed" he calls himself. He has created a computer named Able, a giant memory-bank that can recall or predict just about everything.

"Tunc" is set in Athens (flyblown hotel, Parthenon and Acropolis, brothel and a country mansion), Istanbul (luxury hotel and Byzantine fortress), and London (modern laboratory and ancient mansion), and it bursts with exotic macabre personalities: Benedicta, the girl who so bemused Felix by her strangeness that he married her.

Iolanthe, the green-eyed

prostitute who later became movie star.

Hippolyta, political maneuverer.

Caradoc, the architect, a will verbose wit.

Sipple, clown of the brother and... Julian.

This book is beautiful... full of twists, surprises and ironies beautifully done and handsomely written.

Sensuous... Mr. Durrell conveys a warm, sensuous response to the plain facts of being alive, rubbing his wit along them much as a cat rubs its fur against the chair leg.

Clever... devilishly so... metaphysical late... with a gaiety, originality, raw talent and rebellious exuberance... reams of a kind of beautiful travel and nature writing.

Funny... rich as a plum cake. The book is mysterious and funny.

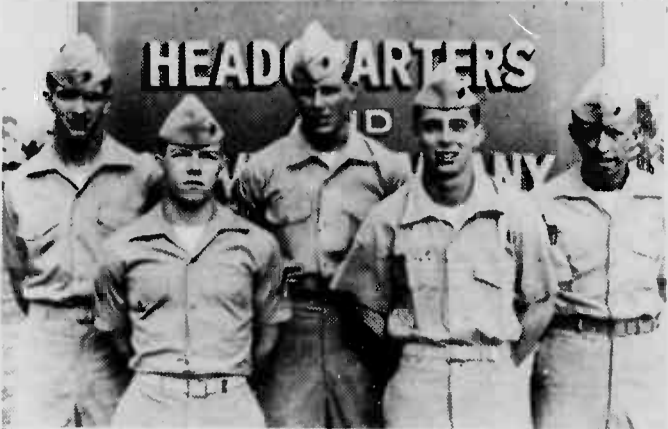

Course "C" has introduced a new and different target, sequence of strings of fire and scoring system.

The basic target is a silhouette without value rings. The standard tall silhouette target is used, as well as modified silhouette targets representing a man behind some object and to represent a man

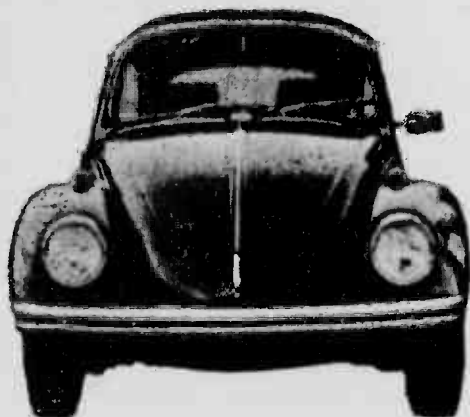

will have two full silhouette targets to shoot at, one silhouette on each of two adjacent target frames.

Sequence of firing and time limits are different for slow and rapid fire strings. Two timed fire strings will be shot at the 200-yard line. Ten rounds for each of these two strings are fired in 120 seconds. One string is shot standing and the other kneeling.

A third string of fire at the 200-yard line consists of 10 rounds rapid fire in the sitting position with a time limit of 40 seconds. On the 300-yard line a string of 20 rounds rapid fire is fired in the prone position. Time limit for this string is 60 seconds.

On the 200-and 300-yard lines magazines are changed with 10 and 20 rounds respectively and loaded from the belt after the time limit starts and targets appear.

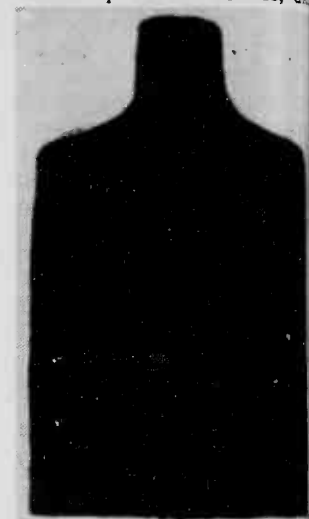

Sixty shots complete the course, 10 more than the A and Courses.

The scoring system is not based on the value ring system, but each time a round strikes the silhouette the shooter receives a hit. The shooter is required to change from fire from one target to another

because there are maximum allowable hits per silhouette.

After each string of fire the shooter's score is computed by multiplying the total number of hits times the number of target hit. A shooter who has exceeded shots on a target will not receive credit for these hits since maximum hits per silhouette is four hits per target on the two strings of fire at the 200 yard lines, seven hits per target at the 300 yard and five per target at the 500 yard line.

K-Bay's first "C" Course firing was August 16 with a requalification percentage of 90%. Preceding the new course firing all rifle range coaches at K-Bay received schooling on "C" Course for three weeks. High score firing so far at K-Bay is 140, so you'd better start snapping "Dingers."

Archery clubs, through membership and state affiliation, help establish special seasons and without numbers and organizations, there is no way for the individual to make his desires known to the State Fish and Game Department.

Windward Bowmen offer its members State and National Field Archery Association membership. Members may apply for the Pope and young big game awards and Pope and young small game

awards, available only through the National Field Archery Association.

A Hawaiian Junior Olympics Swimming Championship capped a successful season for the K-Bay Swim Club, August 10, and after a short rest, Coach Paul Slack and club members hope to pick up where they left off - in winning form.

Not resting on their past laurels club members are eyeing September 16; marking a new season in which the young "Tanksters" will begin daily practice and prepare for future swim meets, both among military and civilian swim clubs.

The start of the new season is also an ideal time for any youngster, girl or boy, to become members of the K-Bay Swim Club, with membership being open to all military dependents. Aside from wishing to see all members return to practice, Coach Slack and his assistants are hopeful of seeing new faces and talent this season.

Competitive swimming through the K-Bay Swim Club develops strength and coordination among swimmers and also brings forth the need and appreciation of teamwork, dedication, sacrifice and sportsmanship.

Under the coaches tutorage, swimmers are developed to their fullest capacities; whether it be that of a highly skilled swimmer or a champion, as the program helps youngsters to improve themselves by bettering their own individual times as they progress.

Daily and weekend practice is held at the Station pool for K-Bay swimmers. On weekdays, practice is from 4-6 p.m., with practice scheduled on Saturday from 9-11 a.m. The long hours of practice, persistence and training pays off, however, during the competitive meets which are held throughout the year.

K-Bay, along with other Island swim clubs, competes in dual, non-classified and classified age group meets. Dual meets are for the swimmers experience with non-classified meets held for the progressive youngsters. Classified

meets are for "Tanksters" who have attained times set by the swim committee in their age group. Military meets are also held regularly.

The pert lass participated in the Junior Olympics in which 300 swimmers from 14 regions were represented and placed seventh in the 100-meter Freestyle event, while finishing tenth in the 400-meter Medley Relay.

Teresa was chosen to represent Hawaii with 16 other swimmers by being selected an outstanding swimmer in the Hawaiian State Junior Olympics and earlier, was the top swimmer in the girls, 13-14 age group at the Hilo State Age Group Swim Meet in April.

She was well chosen to represent the State of Hawaii and her records can attest to the fact. Teresa holds or has held six Hawaiian State marks, three of them in the 15-17 age group and she just turned the corner on 15! The older she gets, the stronger she swims, so more records will be stricken from the books, even if they're her own.

Another befitting example of effort plus practice equals a winner is Barb Hefti, who swims in the 10 and under age group.

"When she joined the club two and half years ago," Coach Slack mused, "She could barely cross the pool, and now she's the third best swimmer in her age group in the state."

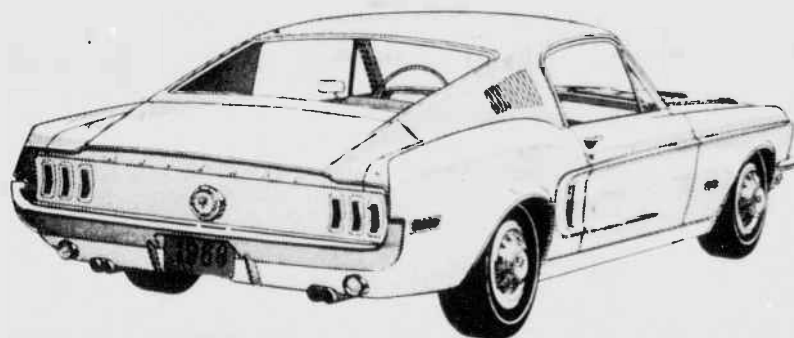

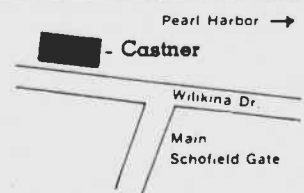

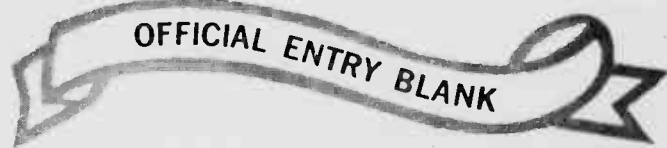
