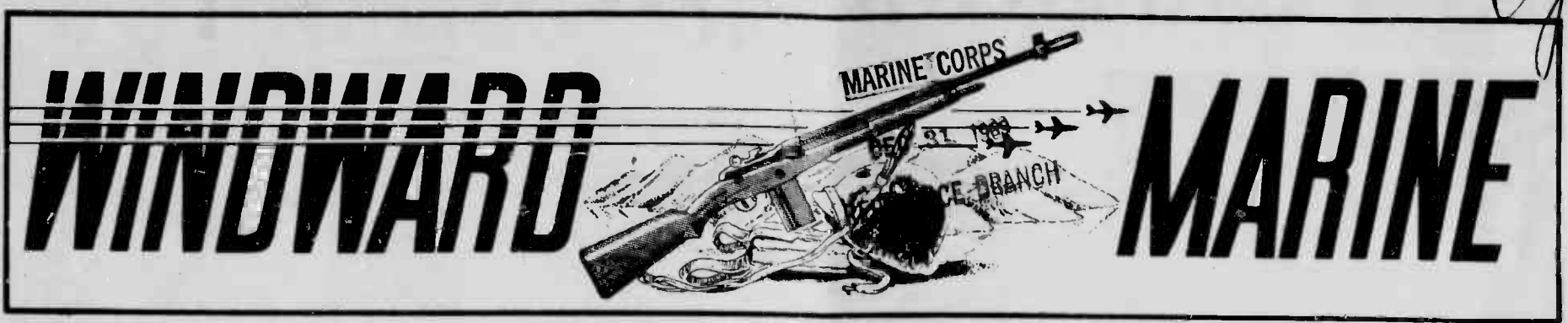

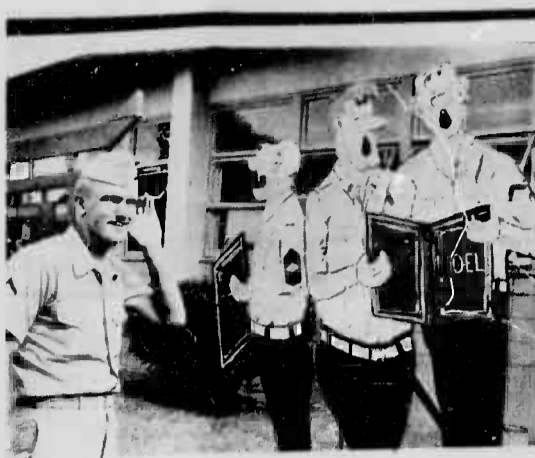

A REMINDER OF THE REAL MEANING

1/3 Awards Silver, Bronze Stars

In separate ceremonies taking place last week, combat awards were presented to two officers of 1/3.

Captain Thomas F. Hinkle was awarded the silver star for his gallant action while serving as CO of M-3/9. On February 9, 1969 Capt. Hinkle was directed to cross the Da Krong River in Quang Tri Province in order to seize and hold the high ground on the opposite side in support of Operation Dewey Canyon. As the Second Platoon operating as the lead element, crossed the river and maneuvered toward the objective, the Marines came under a heavy volume of

mortar and automatic weapons fire, accompanied by rocket-pro-

pelled grenades from a well-entrenched NVA force. Rapidly assessing the situation, Captain Hinkle deployed his First

Platoon to the aid of the lead element and, skillfully adjusted air strikes and supporting artillery fire upon the hostile unit, enabling his men to regroup and establish a night defensive position.

Early the following morning, Capt. Hinkle deployed his Third Platoon and command group across the river in a brilliant strategic maneuver to divert the attention of the enemy and, while the NVA force concentrated its attention on the new units, Capt. Hinkle initiated an aggressive assault upon the hostile emplacements, fearlessly moving among

his Marines to shout words of encouragement to them and direct their

accurate fire. His timely and imaginative actions inspired all who observed him and enabled his men to account for twenty-

eight enemy soldiers killed and countless others wounded.

In a ceremony held last Friday, Capt. Fred H. McWaters was awarded the Bronze Star medal for his meritorious service while serving in Vietnam from July 1968 to July 1969. Capt. McWaters served as Assistant Senior Marine Advisor to the Fifth Infantry Battalion, Vietnamese Marine Corps. During this time, he participated in numerous combat operations throughout III and IV Corps Tactical Zones in which he distinguished himself many times.

Santa Claus is visiting K-Bay again. Today he will visit the various Exchange stores and tomorrow, Saturday, he'll be in his house at Toyland from 12 to 5 p.m.

Sea Life Park is playing Santa during the holidays by offering to all service personnel 1/2 price admission to the popular tourist attraction located at Makapuu.

If you have an alien registration card and are in the United States or one of its possessions on 1 January, you must report your address during the month of January. To do this, go to the Post Office and ask for an Address Report Card. Fill it out and hand it back to the clerk. If you are outside the United States or its possessions, report your address within 10 days after your return. There are severe penalties including deportation for noncompliance.

MACS-2, Public Works Allotted \$1.7 Million

The House Appropriations Committee recently approved a \$17,084,000 military construction bill; with \$1,174,000 of the funds going to KMCAS.

The money will be used here for two projects: building of a secondary sewage treatment plant and supplying MACS 2 with equipment for much-needed additional electrical power.

The new secondary sewage treatment plant includes installation of a sand filter and other advanced sewage-refining techniques. The improvements will increase K-Bay's sewage disposal capacity from 13,000 persons and 1.7 million gallons per day to 20,000 persons and 2 million gallons per day.

The treatment improvement enables K-Bay's Public Works Dept. to further meet strict requirements the State of Hawaii imposes for disposing of sewage into Kaneohe Bay.

Two operational buildings and a vehicle, repair shop designed to support MACS 2 radar fa-

cilities near Pyramid Rock are now under construction.

ComRats Jump 7¢ On Jan. 1

Beginning January 1 the commuted ration rate goes to its highest point in history, \$1.39 a day. The raise will affect about a million enlisted men authorized to eat away from messes every other enlistee while he is on leave.

The seven-cent jump from \$1.32 is the largest since 1968 when there was a dime hike in the "comrats" to \$1.10.

Comrats is paid to men given permission to mess separately and to men on leave. The change does not affect the rate, \$2.57, paid to men where no mess is available, or the \$3.42 which goes to a handful of men under emergency conditions.

The change will, however, raise the meal price charged men on temporary duty by the messes. That will go to \$1.40 a day from the present \$1.32.

CHAPLAINS' CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

However, if you are a bit weary of the Kalakaua angels announcing good tidings of great bargains, of the many shopping shepherds crowding the merchandise hills, of the Star of Bethlehem being no more than a soft spotlight over the candy counter, then perhaps you are ready to get out of the hollering season of advertising and into the Holy season of Christmas.

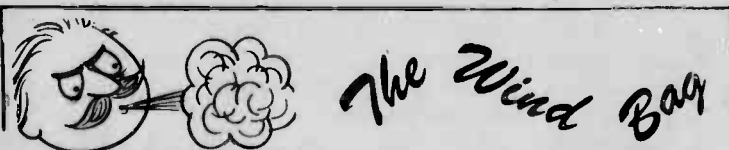
But how?

Two thousand years ago a voice cried in the wilderness, "Make the crooked ways straight, level down those hills of hatred between you and your fellow-man, and fill in those ditches of spiritual sloth." John the Baptist was not a shopkeeper nor a shopper but almost a surveyor when he spoke those ideas. From the point where the Star of Bethlehem hung over the manger to where the future Cross of Calvary rose John was laying out the straight and narrow road which everyone who believes Jesus is God must pursue: the road of being GOOD.

Whereas an enlisted man stands the chance of spending up to five years in jail, DD, etc. For how many other infractions do officers have such an 'easy out'? Why the disparity in your 'justice?'"

Upon conviction by general court-martial, officers and enlisted in the Marine Corps are subject to the following maximum punishments for use, possession,

sale, transfer or introduction into a military base, station, post, ship or marijuana: ENLISTED; Confinement at hard labor for five years; forfeiture of all pay and allowance; Dishonorable Discharge. OFFICERS; Confinement at hard labor for five years; forfeiture of all pay and allowances; Dismissal (separation with dishonor).

While the sentences adjudged will vary with each case and the court-martial adjudging it, NO court-martial may accept an officer's resignation in lieu of adjudging an appropriate sentence."

Be Here For Next Year's Holiday Cheer

In his 1968 report to Congress, Secretary of Transportation Alan Boyd pointed out that 25,000 deaths and at least 800,000 crashes is the yearly toll resulting from the use of alcohol by drivers and pedestrians in the United States. This is 47% of the 1968 toll of 55,300 deaths, and the 800,000 crashes represent 6% of 14.6 million accidents.

Secretary Boyd stressed that high blood alcohol concentrations were found in more than one quarter of the crashes in which drivers were seriously, but not fatally, injured. The clear implication is that alcohol plays a major role in serious accidents and that alcohol contributes to a higher accident toll during the Christmas season.

On Oahu, with Christmas just around the corner, the police will be setting up weekend roadblocks to "sniff out" drinking drivers. Last Christmas season there were 1,847 traffic accidents on Oahu, killing 16 people and injuring 882. This represents one fatality every two days that month. This was an 80% jump from the year's grisly average of 9 deaths per month. The total of 1,847 accidents was an increase of 683 over the average 1,164 per month for last year.

The average person who has a few drinks feels perfectly capable of driving a car. Only, he is unaware that his driving performance and judgment are not quite up to par, that he is unprepared for the emergency, the unexpected on the highways.

In our affluent and very "social society", a drink or two is the rule, rather than exception, particularly during the Christmas and New Year's season. Thus, the familiar admonition, "if you drink, don't drive; if you drive, don't drink" has become almost meaningless. We must learn to exercise self-restraint and use common sense at parties. Make that "one more for the road" coffee, and try to allow as much time as possible between your last drink and the moment you take the wheel -- or better still -- call a taxi. The rule is to allow at least an hour for each bottle of beer or each shot of whiskey before getting into the driver's seat.

Remember, drinking and driving are not mixable ingredients. Mix with caution and assure yourself that you'll be with us in 1970.

Career Notes

MSgt. J. G. Stonebreaker

Many Marines have had their MOS's changed due to the recent revision of the MOS Manual. To many this means a wait to know what happens to their eligibility to receive a Variable Reenlistment Bonus (VRB) upon reenlistment.

An ALMAR is presently being worked up at HQMC regarding payments of VRBs on MOSs which were changed by the new MOS manual. The word and a list of the new MOSs will be out to the field as soon as the ALMAR is approved.

The VRB program is designed to alleviate critical shortages of careerists, either existing or projected, certain MOSs by providing an additional pay incentive for first reenlistments. This VRB is in addition to the regular reenlistment bonus. A MOS can be added or deleted at any time by HQMC depending on the availability of personnel within that particular MOS.

Education News

The Joint Education Office, in addition to counseling Marines and setting up College and High School courses, has the responsibility of testing all Marines aboard the Air Station. The Station Education Officer doubles as the USAFI Test Control Officer. We administer the High School Achievement Test, High School GED, College CLEP (GED), Army Language Aptitude Test, Army Language Proficiency Test, Area Aptitude Test, and USAFI and MCI tests. The Area Aptitude Test (GCT) and the Language Proficiency Test require special authorization via an AA Form. All of the others can be taken on a Tuesday or Thursday morning at 7:30 without a prior appointment. Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays are set aside for those outfits who would like group testing on a reservation basis.

Audit Of 1969 Water Carnival

Recently, many have asked what the proposed distribution of income from our last Water Carnival would be.

With this in mind, Windy contacted members of the Water Carnival Committee and the Custodian of the Recreation Fund.

Here are the basic figures: Approximate income from the Water Carnival and Queen Contest was \$40,000; expenditures ran nearly \$24,000; profit (which includes \$1,500 from the contingency fund from the prior Water Carnival), was set at \$17,500.

Of the \$17,500 profit, the following allocation of funds was established:

Reimbursement to the Recreation Fund was necessary as money was used from the Recreation Fund to support our last Summer Fun program. A total of \$8,191.52 was used; reimbursement of \$6,000 indicates that after the next Water Carnival, Youth Activities will have to reimburse the Recreation Fund with an additional \$2,191.52 to liquidate the debt.

Asst. PMO Grad From FBI Academy

Lieutenant F. C. Stilson, provost marshal officer here, recently returned to K-Bay following graduation Nov. 5 from the FBI's National Academy in Washington, D.C.

"The academy," Lt. Stilson commented, "is called the 'West Point of Law Enforcement'. Attending it was the epitome of my law training."

Offered to both civilian and military law officers, the academy runs an intense, 12-week law enforcement training program. Only 4 active Marines have graduated from it.

The military sends people to the academy "because it has become aware of the need for good law enforcement," Lt. Stilson feels. "Courses there broadened my knowledge of police-work. Before I was mainly concerned with 'on-the-street' type of law en-

forcement. At the academy, I learned the importance of good managerial and administrative work, also."

One-hundred people attended the 84th Session with every state and 9 foreign countries being represented. "All together, our group had 1400 years of law enforcement experience. Our class finished with the highest academic rating ever recorded in the 35-year history of the academy," Lt. Stilson concluded.

Headquarters Marine Corps, with the endorsement of Gen. Chapman, submitted Lt. Stilson's name for admittance to the academy while acceptance came from FBI Chief, J. Edgar Hoover.

Lieutenant Stilson attends Chaminade College as he continues his studies of social sciences. He needs 35 hours of credit to receive his degree.

Career Day At UH

A program aimed at acquainting Hawaiian and Mainland college seniors with employment prospects here in the Islands is scheduled for Dec. 30 at the University of Hawaii.

The Third Annual Kamaaina Career Day, sponsored by the Industrial Relations Association of Hawaii, University of Hawaii Placement Office and Hawaii Employers Council, offers college seniors a chance to be interviewed by representatives from various career fields such as accounting, banking, data processing, hotel and restaurant managing, retailing, engineering, personnel communications, general manage-

ment and science. (Marines who have are about to receive college degrees are invited to attend.

The all-day "job fair" begins 8:30 a.m. Dec. 30 with a brief introductory meeting at the university's auditorium. From 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. interviews with employers will be held.

A detailed brochure and directory will be mailed to persons who call Hawaii Employers Council at 841-6141.

Last year over 300 seniors attended Kamaaina Career Day and were interviewed by some 38 employers.

Are you from Alabama? If so you're in for a Christmas gift from your home state.

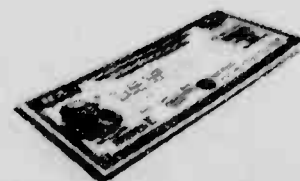
The State of Alabama has announced that it will provide free license tags to members of the Armed Forces under the following conditions:

K-Bay Hosts Moto-

Attention all sports enthusiasts. If you want to attend one of the biggest sports events ever held in Hawaii, be sure to set aside Sunday, December 21, on your calendar. On this day, the eyes and ears of the motor-cycling world will be tuned in to K-Bay for results of one of the biggest events in cycle racing, the 1st Annual International Moto-Cross Championships.

Ten or more of the best riders in the world, representing such countries as Sweden, Belgium, England, and Czechoslovakia, will be competing against the best Mainland and Hawaiian riders. The contestants will be fighting for \$3,000 and Koa Wood Trophies.

HUGE CROWD

A crowd of eight to 10 thousand is expected for the one day affair. However, grandstands, hillside viewing and parking areas are planned for 15,000. Admission will be \$1.50 with children under 12 free. The sportsmen classes get under way at

10 a.m. with the finals for the pros, starting at 1 p.m.

This Sunday, the European style of motorcycle racing called Moto-Cross will be introduced here in Hawaii. This is considered to be the roughest, toughest, wildest sport on earth. This form of motorcycle racing draws a very large spectator audience in Europe. The star riders are idols and are written up in the newspapers similar to baseball heroes in this country.

EUROPEAN RIDER'S

You will no doubt be dazzled and amazed at the European professional riders and the way they can hurl their machinery over rough grounds for so long and so fast. Moto-Cross is a sport of racing over rough terrain at very high speeds. These events are run in heats of three motos. The riders usually

have an hour's rest between events and this time is filled in with other races.

The riders you will find in Hawaii are highly skilled entertainers playing a highly paid game of two wheel roulette. Bengt Aberg of Sweden began taking part in competitions in 1962. In 1967 he became a member of the Swedish factory team riders for Husqvarna. Since then he has climbed the ladder to success. This year he became the 1969 Grand World Champion in the 500 cc class.

Roger DeCoster is an exciting rider to watch. He performs his best when the gong is rough. This 24 year old Belgian has been known to have ridden in two meetings in one day many times, being ferried by helicopter between the circuits in order to make the first moto of the 500cc race 50 miles away.

Arne Kring from Sweden is this year's moto-cross sensation. A rider

who was "no one," is suddenly named amongst the favorites for the World Championship title. The real shock came at the Swedish Grand Prix, this year's 2nd round of the World Championships. Since the competition was held in Sweden. Arne got the chance of taking part. Arne was impossible; he won both heats easily.

HAWAIIAN PROS

Providing some strong competition for the European Champions will be Oahu born John DeSoto. John has recently spent several months on the Mainland and Europe going against some of the best drivers in the world.

The United States 250 cc champ, a Waianae High graduate, spent several months in Europe this year racing his bike over rugged terrain.

Two other local motorcycle racers, Barry Bloomfield and Jerry McGregor will join DeSoto against the visiting cyclists Sunday.

From its inception, the Little Quakers have been one of the finest boys football teams in the nation. Made up of young-

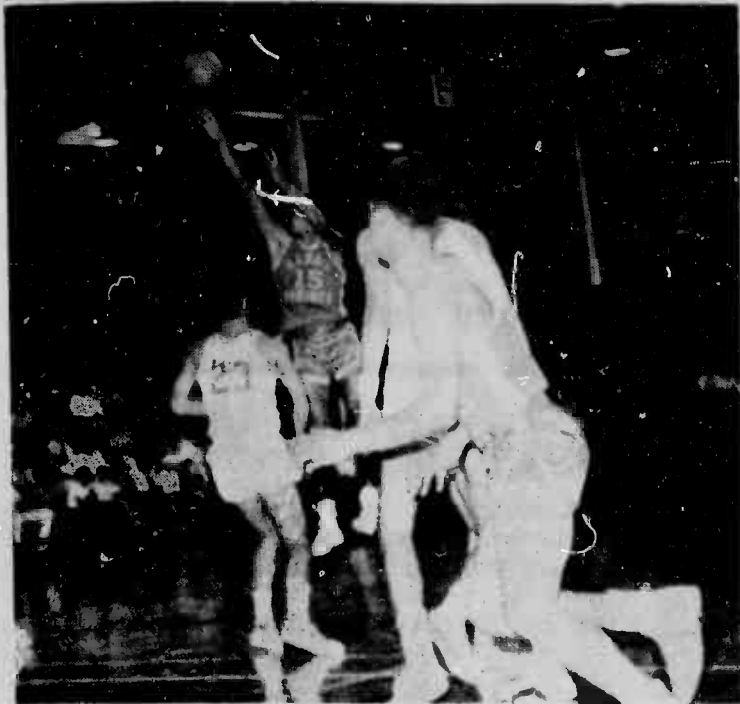

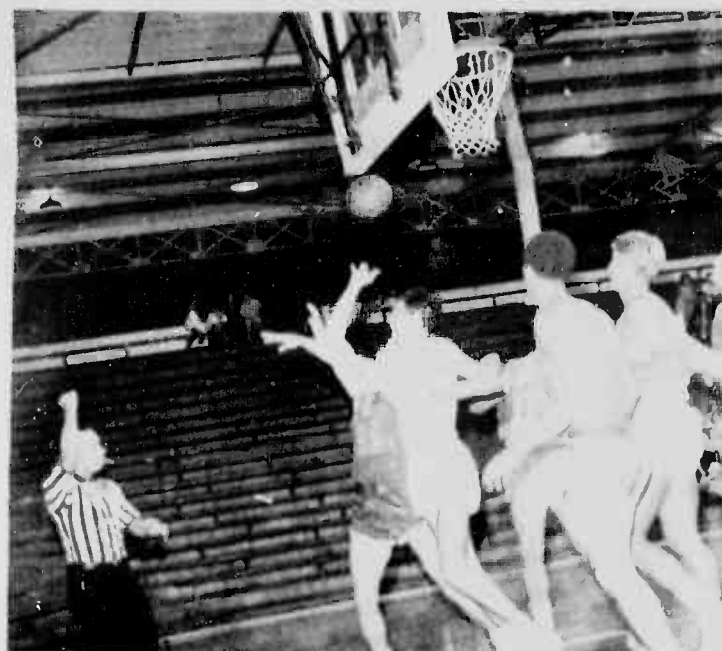

This remarkable book is one of the best pieces of American journalism to come along in years. It is a beautifully engineered piece of writing. It builds like a novel. . . pace and suspense all the way.

Men are only human. . .

Doctors dare not be. . . Men love and hate. . . Men want power, money, glory. . . Men hesitate and err.

Men need to be loved, to be forgiven. . . Doctors can't afford such frailty. Because at all times he "Death Committee" stands looking over their shoulders.
