## Amidst smoke, mortars, and gunfire, Engineer Soldiers set the pace during Pacemaker Stakes

JBLM — Smoke filled the forest, blinding the Soldiers of the obstacles ahead. Sounds of mortars and gunfire deafened the ears to orders shouted down from the squad. The smell of mud clogged every pore of the land, capturing the senses of the surrounding squad.

As the Soldiers scrambled around onlookers might assume this was an enemy attack, but in fact it was the Soldiers of 864th Engineer “Pacemaker” Battalion conducting a week-long intensive military skills training event, on Joint Base Lewis-McChord North, May 15.

While Soldiers are no stranger to training, the Pacemaker Battalion took it a step further and added a little competition to the mix, thus bringing life to the Pacemaker Stakes competition.

Events like this not only prepare Soldiers, but it does wonderful things for their morale, said Sgt. Steven Cools, a squad leader for the Pacemaker Stakes competition.

The exercise consisted of seven different events ranging from reacting to enemy fire to chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear defense training.

“The competition is a combination of real-world and basic-Soldiering skills,” declared Capt. Katherine McKenna, the battalion

plans officer.

Each squad was evaluated individually during the event, and the winning squad was recognized and awarded later in the competition.

“It gets the Soldiers

pumped up, and they stay pretty high-spirited throughout the day,” exclaimed McKenna.

According to McKenna, the help of a little friendly competition has positively impacted the morale of the Soldiers during the Pacemaker Stakes exercise.

Unit cohesion, motivation and determination have all been factors contributing to preparing the Soldiers for real-time war situations she stated.

At the beginning of the competition, Soldiers performed an Army Physical Fitness Test which consists of push-ups, sit-ups and a two-mile run, all while wearing full Army Combat Uniforms.

“This is what Soldiers train to do,” said Cools.

Through it all, there has been a lot of hard work and effort from everyone to ensure this exercise was gauged as a successful mission. The noncommissioned and commissioned officers in charge have been working around the clock to ensure everything ran smoothly and effectively, said McKenna as she cheered on the competing Soldiers. The Soldiers throughout the battalion have been taking part in individual-level military training since February in order to prepare for this competition.

“It (Pacemaker Stakes) will make you a better individual and definitely a better Soldier,” said Cools.

Training events such as the Pacemaker Stakes are what shapes the Army and its Soldiers today. Through these intense competitive training scenarios, Soldiers are learning the necessary skills to better prepare themselves for the future.

“It’s an opportunity you should not miss,” said Cools. “Soldier first, train first!”

## 557th Engineer Company— “Animals Lead the Way!”

### 1<sup>st</sup> Platoon

1<sup>st</sup> Platoon, 557<sup>th</sup> Engineer Company hit the ground running after COPA (Campaign on Property Accountability), and got right in to training on Warrior Skill Level 1 Tasks in preparation for Pacemaker Stakes. March was a busy month and platoon training focused on learning how to shoot/maintain, employ, and engage targets with various weapons systems to include the M2 .50 caliber machine gun, M249/M240 machine gun, and M4 Carbine. At the end of March, 1<sup>st</sup> Platoon performed Land Navigation training in TA-2 and convoy training throughout JBLM training areas. Other training for Pacemaker Stakes consisted of movement training, communication training, first aid, CBRN (Chemical/Biological/Radiological/Nuclear), and battle drills. During the month of April, 1<sup>st</sup> Platoon enthusiastically completed change of command inventories for the new Animal Commander, CPT Daniel Larson, and the platoon welcomed him into the Animal family at the end of May participating in the Company Change of Command ceremony.

The Soldiers of 1<sup>st</sup> Platoon performed in an outstanding manner during Pacemaker Stakes proving their mastery of Warrior skill level one tasks and verifying that they are the best platoon in the company. 1<sup>st</sup> Platoon also found the time to complete the CWST (Combat Water Survival Test), to include a 75 m swim with weapon. 1<sup>st</sup> Platoon loved the pool so much that they stayed for an extra hour of physical training after the test, demonstrating their strong commitment to physical excellence.

A demo range was a last farewell to route clearance tasking, and was followed immediately by a stress shoot, a welcome back to regular Sapper tasks. services. Though the platoons have been stretched they continue to re-source the platoons and keep the vehicles running.



## 610th Engineer Support Company— “Ghostriders!”

The 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of FY14 found the Ghostrider company mid-stride, preparing our Soldiers for upcoming rotations to NTC and Korea. The company participated in the Junior Leader Seminar, SHARP Stand-Up Day, several NCOPTD’s, and a week-long Base Camp Development FTX in support of 380<sup>th</sup> Quartermaster. The exercise was accomplished in addition to concurrent training to prepare us for our National Training Center (NTC) rotation in September 2014.

During the FTX the Ghostrider Company spent six days at Training Area 16 running 24-hour operations to develop fuel, water, and living areas for the annual training of 380<sup>th</sup> Quartermaster Battalion, a reserve unit from Evansville, IN. 1<sup>st</sup> Platoon was responsible for preparing the site for a Reverse Osmosis Water Purification Unit (ROWPU) and a Tactical Water Distribution System (TWDS) to purify and distribute water for nearly 900 Soldiers. 2<sup>nd</sup> Platoon developed OBJ SLEEPY, they cleared, grubbed, and leveled nearly 3 acres for a battalion base camp. 3<sup>rd</sup> Platoon built a tactical fuel point, complete with a combat road loop and fueling pad for a new fuel blivet containment and distribution system fielded



by 380<sup>th</sup> Quartermaster (pictured). The 380<sup>th</sup> QM Battalion Commander, LTC Turks, was very impressed by the results. He asked the company to send some of its top Soldiers back out so that he could personally thank them and present them with the commander’s coin (pictured). “When we first came out here in September, this area was nothing but woods,” LTC Turks recounted, “and in one week, with probably half-done information from us, you made all this happen.” The Ghostrider Company maintains its dedication to delivering high quality products.

The line platoons while focused on the base camp development project also conducted an impressive amount of training. Throughout the last quarter Ghostrider Soldiers trained on individual and crew served fighting positions, night operations, tactical convoy, job site security, HLZ construction, route and bridge reconnaissance, vehicle recovery training under combat conditions, combat life saver training, and weapons training on the M2/M9/M240B/AT-4 systems at the EST 2000.



Supporting the FTX and other training events, Headquarters and Maintenance Platoons started the month of April with CLS and Field Communications training, transitioning into RTO training, Land Navigation, M2 and M9 EST 2000 training. 
