

Air Station SAR Team Saves Boy

Aarona Fauolo, a 2-year-old Kahuku boy who had wandered away from his family was located recently by the Marine Corps Air Station's Sea, Air Rescue helicopter crew.

He was found sitting in a mud puddle on a cane road five miles from the Kahuku home where he was staying. He is reported in good condition except for mosquito bites.

Marine Lieutenant Colonel Bobby R. Wilkinson was piloting the SAR aircraft on a routine training flight when he received word to return to K-Bay. After a briefing he and his crew took off for Kahuku. Flying as observer was Staff Sergeant S. E. Dodson. Corporal T. R. Wagner was the crew chief.

"When we arrived," said LtCol Wilkinson, "we were told that we were looking for a 2-year-old boy last seen near Kahuku High School."

The colonel continued that they were making a right turn when SSgt. Dodson said he thought he had seen something.

"We returned to re-search the area and found the boy on a road cut out of the side of a hill," the colonel continued. "He was sitting naked in a mud puddle crying."

They were unable to land the aircraft, however, because of the 10-20 foot cane stalks, so they returned to where the horsemen were. Corporal Wagner jumped out of the helicopter and told the men to follow them. Within minutes the boy was in safe hands.

CMC Visit Scheduled For K-Bay

7.9% Pay Increase Receives Approval

The \$2.3 billion civilian and military pay raise bill has been approved by the President in the amount of six percent and 7.9 percent respectively.

Everyone will get the raise except for the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

K-Bay's Disbursing Officer LtCol M.C. Kramer stated that if his office receives the necessary administrative information concerning the pay raise from Headquarters Marine Corps, the pay raise, which is retroactive from Jan. 1, could be in the Jan. 30 pay check.

Shortly after the pay raise bill went to the White House, President Nixon vetoed another bill providing for a four-percent (\$130,000,000) raise for the government's blue collar workers. He said they were already getting

more than their civilian counterparts. The vetoed bill also would have raised the pay of nonappropriated fund employees.

In addition to these raises included in the government-wide bill, defense is pushing ahead for the 20 percent pay hike for enlisted men with fewer than two years of service which it sent to Congress last April. The measure was ignored in Congress.

Defense Secretary Laird has promised even more increases in pay and benefits in the fiscal 1971 budget. The budget document is now in preparation. Details of the Laird proposals may be included in the budget document or in separate messages from the White House.

LtCol Cox Assumes Duties As Station Executive Officer

Colonel Cox comes to the Air Station after serving as VMFA-115 commanding officer

Officer Reduction

In a recent ALMAR (003), the Commandant outlined the initiation of a recent reduction in force (RIF) action designed to reduce the Marine active officer strength by the end of FY'72.

Approximately 285 reserve officers will be involuntarily released from active duty as a result of the RIF action.

According to the ALMAR, the reduction of Marine active officer strength makes it regrettably necessary to undertake a reduction in force (RIF) action. Prior to this decision significant management actions have already been taken to reduce RIF to a minimum. These actions include reversion of temporary officers, officer early releases which will be continued, insignia change

promotions reduced below normal, accessions reduced below minimum estimated requirements, relaxation of retirement prerequisites, and stringent quality control of officers selected for retention beyond obligation.

Reduction in force boards will be convened at Headquarters Marine Corps in the immediate future to consider all reserve officers serving beyond their initial obligation who have not accrued 20 years active duty retirement eligibility prior to June 30, 1972. Approximately 285 reserve officers so considered will be required to be involuntarily released from active duty by June 30, 1971 may be retained on active duty until retirement eligibility is attained.

In addition, boards will consider all reserve officers on active duty who have accrued 20 years of active duty retirement eligibility by January 31, 1972 and will select twenty percent for retention. The remainder will be required to retire by Jan. 31, 1972. Boards will also consider all active duty reserve officers accruing 20 years active duty retirement eligibility between Feb. 1, 1972 and June 30, 1972, select twenty percent for retention and the remainder will be required to retire by June 30, 1972.

Convening of RIF boards will be expedited in order to inform individuals of release dates or retention earliest. It is anticipated that RIF actions indicated will not be repeated unless there is a significant future reduction required

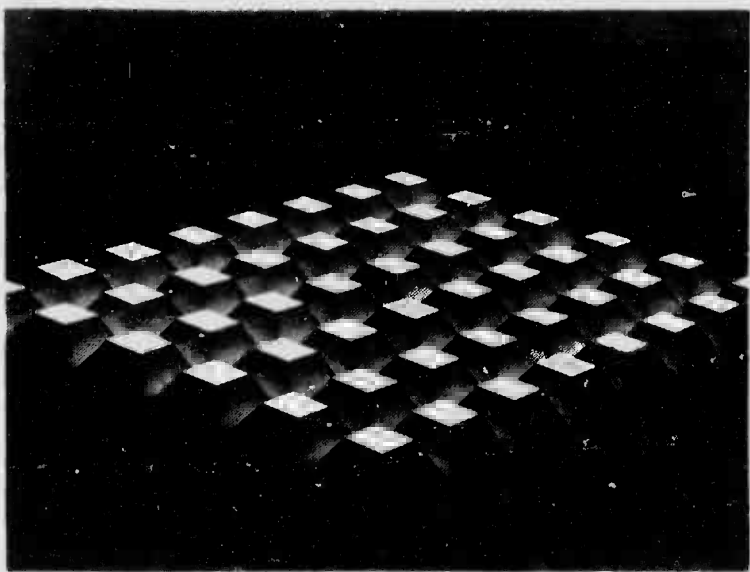
One year and two months later he was designated a Naval Aviator and ordered to his first squadron, VMFA-324 (AD-4B) at Miami, Fla.

What The '69 TAX Reform Act Means

According to ALMAR (004) of Jan. 9, concerning the tax reform act of 1969, military services will not withhold tax nor reflect on W-2 forms amounts paid to members as reimbursements for moving expenses during 1970 and 1971, except in the case of dislocation allowance.

Members will be required to report in their own tax returns for 1970 and 1971, those cash reimbursements of moving expenses they receive.

In general, members will be entitled to offsetting deductions for travel expenses actually paid and the expenses incurred as

outlined in subparagraph 2B, subject to regulations to be issued by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) in 1971.

Military personnel will not be required to report reimbursements for government-ordered travel where no change of residence is required; i.e. TAD, etc.

Under regulations to be issued by IRS in 1971 it may be possible for members to claim allowable moving expenses in excess of those for which they received reimbursement.

Considerable information has been promulgated via services journals and other media with

respect to the effects of the tax reform act of 1969. While the law may have a profound impact on some military personnel, it is vital that all Marines and attached Navy personnel be made aware of the salient points and counseled as it becomes available.

The tax reform act of 1969, effective on and after Jan. 1, 1970 would:

(A) Require that military members report in their gross taxable income, when filing their individual income tax returns all amounts received for expenses of moving from one residence to another, whether by direct cash

Tax Exemption Slip

There appears to be many vehicles with out-of-state registration plates being operated without the State of Hawaii tax exemption certificate displayed. This is necessary if you plan to sell your car or re-register it in the state. All vehicles licensed outside the State of Hawaii shall display a tax exemption slip issued by the state at the Honolulu Police Department. Applications may be obtained at the PMO Pass and ID Office. There is no charge for this certificate.

Effective immediately, Pearl Harbor switchboard operators will honor requests for AUTOVON service only if the call is placed by dialing 8. Normal dial service assistance requests will continue to be handled by dialing 0. The alternate method for requesting AUTOVON service will remain 110.

Duty Station 'Swap'

MCO 1301.18 of Nov. 7, 1970 sets forth policy and guidelines for Marines changing duty assignments providing certain requirements are met:

- Individuals concerned must be of the same grade and possess an MOS compatible with the duty assignment and mutually agree to exchange future assignments.
- Both individuals must be in receipt of orders and have not moved dependents or personal effects at Government expense.
- Both must have sufficient active service remaining to meet tour length requirements for the duty stations under consideration.
- If the proposed exchange involves one unaccompanied WestPac tour, both assignments must be unaccompanied in WestPac.
- Both individuals must meet all essential assignments criteria for duty stations to be exchanged. Requests must be sent via the chain of command.

• Immediate replacement of all prescriptions for Pyridoxine (Vitamin B-6) originally dispensed by the Tripler Hospital Pharmacy in quantities of 100 tablets or greater is mandatory. 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Great Americans

Sylvanus Thayer
(1785-1872)



Sylvanus Thayer, who served as Superintendent of the U.S. Military Academy from 1817 until 1833, is known to history as the "Father of the Military Academy."

A native of Braintree, Mass., he entered the Academy in 1807, five years after it opened, and was graduated and commissioned a second lieutenant in the Corps of Engineers.

During the War of 1812, he served on the Canadian frontier and at Norfolk, Va. He was sent to Europe in 1815 to study military schools, fortifications, and armies, and two years later returned to the Academy as superintendent at the age of 32.

Thayer found the Academy in a deplorable state, without organization or system. He began examinations, dismissed incompetents, organized the cadets into companies officered by members of their own body and appointed an Army officer as commandant of cadets, responsible for their tactical instruction and soldierly discipline.

Official and unofficial commendations were heaped upon him from many directions. He was recommended for brevet to colonel "for the highest development and effect" he had brought to the Academy. One commendation stated: "It is believed that he has at length given the school an excellence equal to the most celebrated in the world."

After leaving the Academy at his own request, Colonel Thayer was engineer in charge of construction of fortifications at the entrance to Boston harbor and was responsible for the improvement of other New England harbors. Brevetted a brigadier general in 1862, he retired in 1863.

Army engineers trained at the Academy in the Thayer tradition are recognized as having been primarily responsible for the westward expansion of the United States in the early part of the 19th Century. Generations of Academy graduates have provided our country with leadership in the arts of peace as well as of war.

This system has proven to be effective and workable. The situation described by the customer probably occurred during the holiday period when children were out of school and happens rarely. The recommendation, however, has merit for implementation during holiday periods and will be acted upon to provide priority service to personnel in uniform during these periods, except for Saturdays.

FICA Deductions On The Increase

Individual Marines will be contributing slightly more out of each month's pay under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA), as on Jan. 1, 1971.

On that date, the FICA tax was raised to 5.2 per cent with a maximum annual contribution set at \$405.60. Only the monthly basic pay, as determined by pay grade and length of service, is

subject to the FICA tax. The FICA tax includes the basic FICA, or Social Security tax, and an additional tax to provide hospital insurance for the aged.

Military personnel came under Social Security coverage on Jan. 1, 1957. Since 1968, the first \$7,800 of basic pay credited during the calendar year has been subject to the FICA tax.

Qualification Necessary

Regardless of an individual's composite score, occupational field cutting score or HQMC selection for promotion, individual commanding officers have the final authority when it comes to actually promoting enlisted personnel within his command. HQMC directs that commanding officers are

responsible to insure that a Marine is fully qualified to assume the next higher grade at time of promotion. If an individual Marine does not meet this criteria, commanders may decline to promote a lance corporal or corporal and must return the promotion warrant of a sergeant or above.

reimbursement or that furnished in kind.

(B) Authorize the following new categories of deductible expenses to be used in adjusting gross income:

1. Traveling, meals, and lodging expenses incurred during house-hunting trips.
2. Expenses for meals and lodging in the area of the new duty station for up to 30 days after reporting there at.
3. Expenses in connection with selling old residence or

settlement of lease at the old station and similar acquisition expenses at the new station.

(C) Impose on military personnel the requirement that the following conditions be met in order for any travel expenses to be allowable deductions from gross income.

- (1) That the new duty station be located at least 50 miles farther from member's former residence that was his old duty station.
- (2) Member must be

stationed at new duty station for at least 39 weeks after arrival there at.

The interests of all Marines and attached Navy personnel are being represented at the highest levels to obviate any unfair consequences from any provision in the tax reform act. All further developments in connection with the act affecting their interest will be rapidly communicated.

More information on the 1969 tax Reform Act will be forthcoming.

VMFA-235-H&S BDE

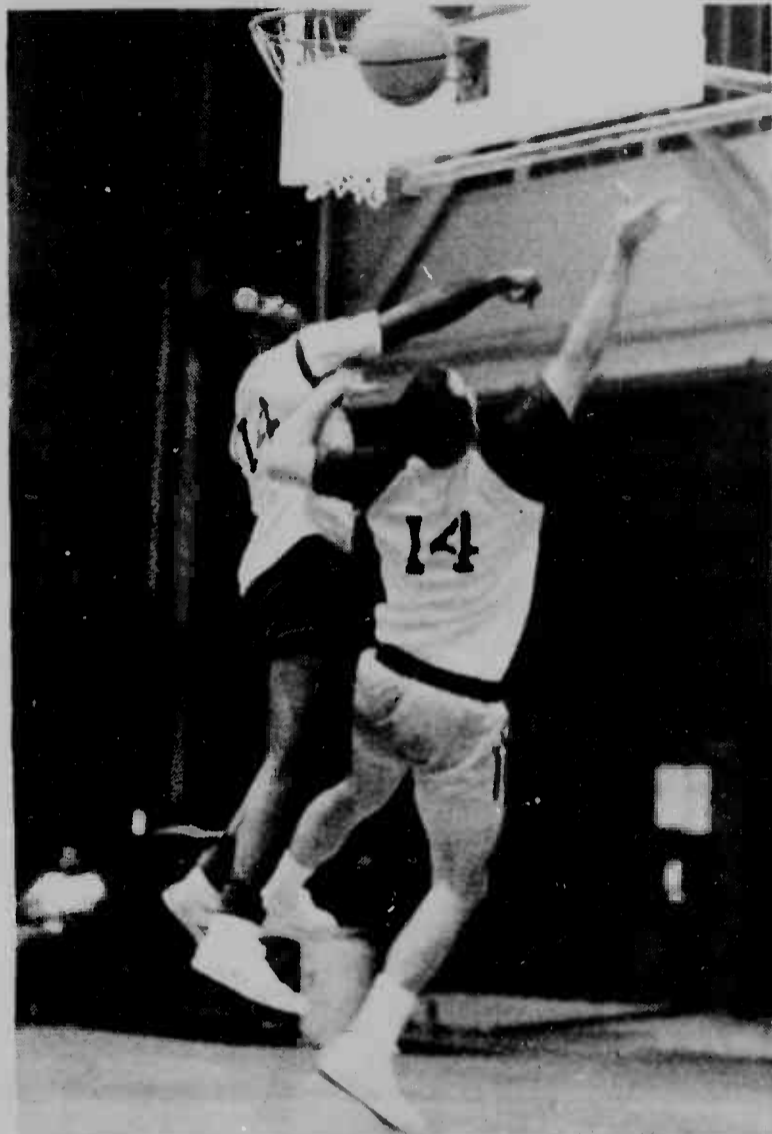

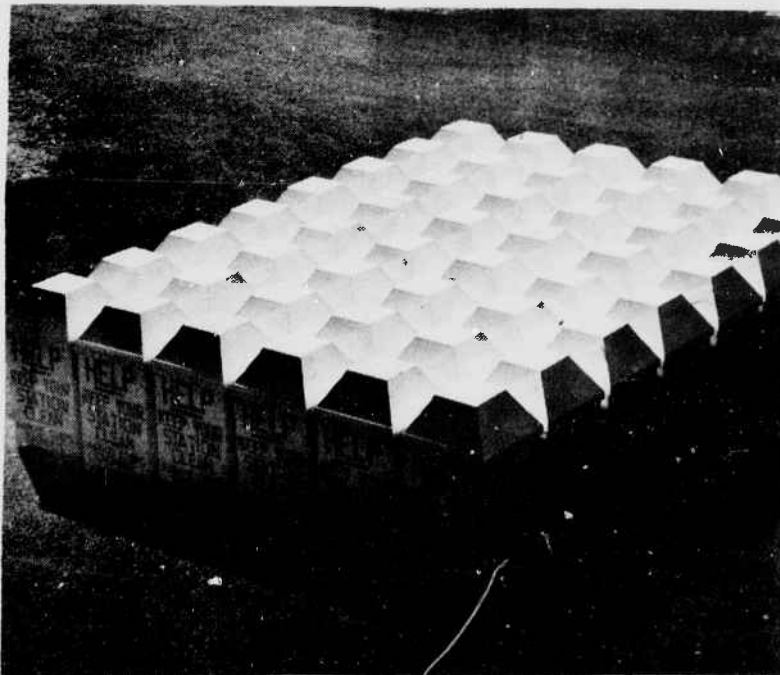

CHAMPUS Rule Aids 'In' Patients

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — Dependents of active duty men and other beneficiaries of the Civilian Health and Medical Care Program of the Uniformed Services may find the government paying a greater share of the cost for some surgical procedures.

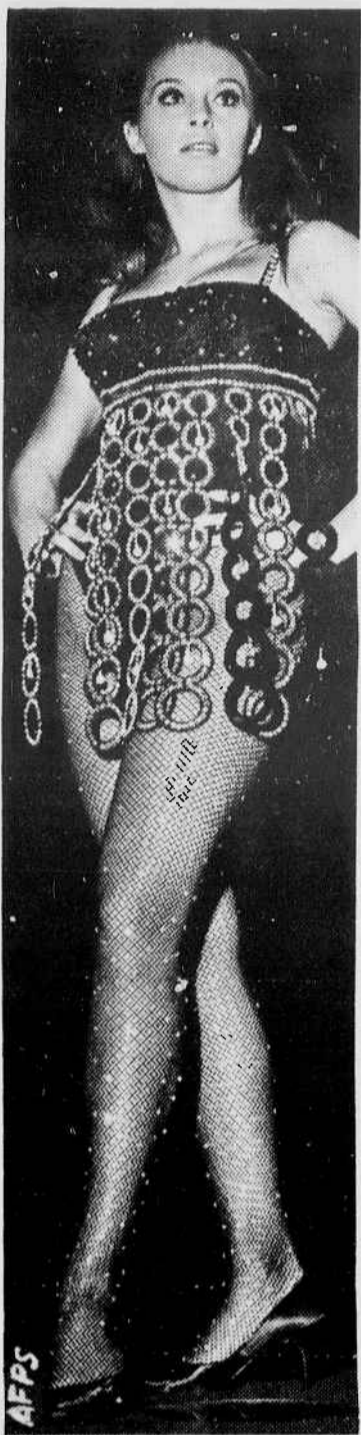
CHAMPUS officials said surgery performed in ambulatory surgicenters and in civilian hospitals where the patient is not actually admitted may be designated inpatient care if such a designation will be an advantage when determining the cost of treatment.

Inpatient care for dependents of active duty men in civilian hospitals is \$1.75 per day or \$25, whichever is greater. For outpatient care, the cost is 20 per cent of the health bill, plus an annual deductible of \$50.

Other beneficiaries of CHAMPUS pay 25 per cent of the charges for inpatient or outpatient care.

Dependents of active duty men do not need a Nonavailability Statement (DD Form 1251) before receiving such care, officials said.
