

MOS billets reduced

WASHINGTON, MCNews — As the result of a review of enlisted strengths in critical MOSs, the number of Marines with MOS 2144 (Self-Propelled Artillery Repairer) on Okinawa can be reduced.

However, upon promotion to master sergeant (MOS 2149) these staff NCOs will again be considered for unaccompanied tours in WestPac. 
"Fair benefits package"

WASHINGTON, MCNews — A "fair benefits package" for all servicemembers was announced May 26 by President Jimmy Carter and Secretary of Defense Harold Brown. Details on the package are still being worked out, but key points in the proposal include: —more appropriate compensation when servicemembers incur costs because of relocations as a result of reassignment:

RO-RO ship joins force

The last thip of seven has been identified for the near term prepositioning force. The tanker Zapata Patriot has been leased from a private firm to carry water for the force. The 35,000-ton ship can carry nearly 9 million gallons of portable water. The first roll-on, roll-off (RO-RO) ship to load, USNS Meteor, previously loaded some equipment at Port Huseneme, Calif. and is now loading the bulk of its cargo in Wilmington, N.C. two other assigned RO-RO ships will also load in Wilmington while the break-bulk ships will load ammunition, food, medical supplies and spare parts at Sunny Point, N.C. Most of the work will be completed in June with the ships stated to arrive in the Indian Ocean during July.

These ships will carry equipment, supplies, fuel and water to support a Marine Amphibious Brigade of about 12,000 men and several Air Force equadrons. Equipment will be removed from the ships at periodic intervals for maintenance and operational checks.



Recruits Men from Pacific basin enlist

Seventy-five young men from the Hawaiian islands and Guam received the oath of enlistment into the Marine Corps Friday during swearing-in ceremonies conducted aboard MCAS Kaneohe Bay, The oath was administered by Hawaii Governor George Ariyoshi

THE NEW RECRUITS form the 1980 All-Pacific Marine Recruit Platoon. Several hours after being sworn in, they departed Oahu for 11 weeks of recruit training at Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego. The group will remain together throughout the training cvcle.

Cycle. The ceremony was a warm blending of both military and civilian communities as they gathered to bid a fond aloha to their Kama'aina Marines.

Fifty-one of the neophyte Fifty-one of the neophyte Leathernecks haveopted to return to Onhu through the 'Come Home to Hawaii' option. The program originated in 1977 to provide young people from the Hawaiian islands the opportunity to serve their country as Marines while being stationed in their own "backyard."

AFTER HONORS were rendered for the arriving governor, the ceremony opened with a stirring rendition of the National Anthem sung by Noelani

Once the anthem was completed Ariyoshi, escorted by BrigGen W.H. Rice, commanding general of the 1st Marine Brigade, reviewed the honor guard from Company A, 1st Battalion, 3d Marines. In his introductory remarks, Rice commended the young

Marine candidates, adding that recruits from the Pacific basin are invaluable in building the strength of the Corps and also bringing greater understanding of the Marine Corps mission to their island communities. Presently, there are approximately 400 Pacific basin Marines assigned to the brigade, including natives of Hawaii, Guam and American Samoa

PRIOR TO SWEARING-IN the recruits, Ariyoshi offered his own words of congratulations to the men for enlisting in the Corps and reminded them that they are also representatives of Hawaii. He asked that they take the spirit of Aloha and brotherhood with them to San Diego. He also requested that they watch out for each other and do their very best in the tradition of Hawaii and Pacific

tradition of Hawan and Factice platoons from years past. Following the Qath of Enlistment, members of Kaneche's Koolau Senior Hui presented leis to each member of the All-Pacific platoon. Sgt Mel Ugaitafa, a drill instructor from MCRD San Diego, then took charge of the platoon. His sharp commands were awkwardly executed by his charges, exemplifying the amount of work they face in order to learn close order drill. To conclude the ceremony, the honor guard passed in review accompanied by the proud notes of the "Marine Hymn," played by the Fleet Marine Force Pacific Band.

wonders why the policeman didn't stop at the gate. The Marine breuks the impression that Capt Carl King, pro-vost marshal at MCAS through the gate, he was safe and secure. He said, "It's the



Bonus program assists retention

Occupational fields eligible for the Selec-tive Reenlistment Bonus Program were announced June 1 in ALMAR 091/80. The SRBP was established to assist in attaining and sustaining adequate numbers of career enlisted personnel in designated occupational fields. It provides additional

pay incentives reenlistments or extensions of enlistment of at least three years during the first 10 years of service. TWO ZONES of

eligibility were estab-lished: Zone A (21 months) to six years of active service) and Zone B (six to 10 years current MCBul 7220 of active service). The occupational fields eligible for a SRBP payment and their respec-tive award levels are normally announced annually, but are subject to change at any time to meet the needs of the Marine Corps

A Selective Reenlist-ment Bonus, not to

Don't take your home wiring for granted

Most homeowners take their house wiring for granted. As long as the lights go on and the refrigerator works, the entire system is left alone. When the paint on a house starts peeling and cracking, the homeowner schedules a paint or siding job. When the plumbing leaks, he fixee it or calls a plumber. When the driveway washes away or starts cracking up, he calls a contractor. When the roof leaks, he gets immediate repairs. If he doesn't have enough hot water, he goes and buys a larger beater.

But what does he do when his lights blink, the TV picture shrinks, the hot water doesn't get real hot, the refrigerator compressor quits, breakers routinely trip and he doesn't have enough recepticals? Well, he usually just buys more extension cords and lives with the situation. He can't fix it himself and is afraid it would cost too much to "fix it right." And strongest of all, the homeowner dreads getting a permit. He wants to avoid the hassle. He thinks of the inspector as a bureaucratic pile of red tape, the enemy, someone to be avoided.

Well folks, Glenn, of Glenn's Electrical Service in Kaneohe says "the inspector is the best friend a homeowner ever had. He works cheap, polices the work done by contractors and makes sure that the installation or work meet 'the minimum Code standards."

The electrical contractor "has to" guarantee his work, and "has to" maintain appropriate minimum liability insurance, for the benefit of the customers.

Of all the construction trades, the Electricians are about the highest paid, most technically educated, "work alone" people. According to the Hawaii Vehicle Code, a moped is defined as: "A device upon which a person may ride that has two or three wheels in contact with the ground, a motor having a maximum power

half horsepower (1,119 watts) or less. If a combustible engine, a computations engine, as maximum piston, or rotor displacement of 8.05 cubic engine and propels the device unassisted on a level surface no faster no faster than 35 mph."

MOPEDS ARE not allowed on Hawaii's highways and when operated aboard the station or city streets,

they must travel as far to the right side of the road as practical, at speeds not to exceed 35 mph. Whenever bicycle lanes are available, the driver must use them. Extreme care should be used in passing parked or moving cars. Mo-peds, as well as other motor vehicles are motoritied from deiving prohibited from driving on sidewalks or areas intended for pedestrian

Persons operating mopeds must possess valid driver's licenses, however, no one under the age of 15 may drive the vehicle. Mopeds must be equipped with standard safety standard safety features (lights, horns, brakes, etc.), and cannot be modified except as authorized by the manufacturer. Such modifications may not increase the vehicles'


