Evacuation participants awarded service medal

The Secretary of Defense has authorized the Humanitarian Service Medal to be awarded to eligible personnel who participated in any of the 1975 evacuation events or any other military acts of assistance in the event of national or international disaster.

A series of major evacuations took place between the months of April and November of 1975. They included: Operations New Life/New Arrivals, and Operations Eagle Pull, Frequent Wind, and Baby Lift. If you were a part of the 1975 activities in the Republic of Vietnam, Guam, Subic Bay, Camp Pendleton, Cambodia, or Thailand, you are eligible for the Humanitarian Service Medal.

Initial delivery of the medal is anticipated in

late 1979. The ribbon bars for the medal, though not available now, are on order through the Main Exchange and will be sold in the uniform shop of the exchange.

Marine Corps Bulletin 1650 of March 12, 1979 states that additional events or operations which occurred from 1976 through 1978 have been nominated by the Commandant of the Marine Corps to the Secretary of the Navy for consideration of the Defense Secretary and will be announced if and when approved. The precedence for this award is immediately following the Vietnam Service Medal. VMFA-232 gets new commander today

Major Laurence Stults, assistant G-3 (operations officer), 1st Marine Brigade Headquarters, will take command of Marine Fighter Attack Squadron (VMFA)-232, relieving Lieutenant Colonel Frank Horak Jr. in ceremonies to be held at 3 p.m. today.

Lieutenant Colonel Horak took command of the squadron on July 11, 1977. He will be assigned as executive officer, Marine Aircraft Group (MAG)-24.

Major Stults, a native of Evanston, Ill., graduated from Colgate University, Hamilton, N.Y., in 1962, with a Bachelor of Arts Degree (Economics) and was commissioned a 2d lieutenant.

After 18 months of flight training in Kingsville, Texas, Major Stults was awarded his naval aviation wings in 1963 and assigned as an A-4 pilot with Marine Attack Squadron (VMA)-224 at MCAS Cherry Point, N.C. While serving with VMA-224, Major Stults accompanied the squadron to such places as Naval Station, Roosevelt Roads, Puerto Rico; aboard the USS Saratoga; and Chu Lai, Republic of Vietnam, where he flew 150 missions between August 1965 and August 1966.

From 1966 to 1968, he was an advanced jet flight instructor for Training Squadron (VT)-24, at Naval Air Station, Beeville, Texas.

Major Stults was then transferred to MCAS Beaufort, S.C., undergoing pre-deployment exercises as an F-4 pilot with VMFA-312 and VMFA-333, and also VMFA-251 out of Key West, Florida. During this same time frame, Major Stults completed training as an air intercept controller at the former Naval Air Station, Glynnco, in Brunswick, Ga.

In 1969 and 1970 Major Stults was assistant operations officer with VMFA-115 at Chu Lai where he flew an additional 300 missions. Upon his return to the states, Major Stults attended the Amphibious Warfare School, Quantico, Va., where he was honor graduate of his class.

Major Stults then attended the Naval Test Pilot School, Patuxent River, Md., from 1971 through 1974. During this schooling, he tested airstart and flameout approaches in the A-4M, A-7E and F-8J aircraft; high angle of attack characteristics of the F-14 and the low smoke engine in the F-4 with leading edge slats; inflight thrust reverser on the F-11 aircraft; and was also chief test pilot on the F-4N aircraft.

Marine Corps Air Station, Yuma, Ariz., was the major's next duty station from 1974 to 1976. He was operations officer and executive officer of Marine Fighter Attack Training Squadron (VMFAT)-101 and was also an F-4 air combat tactics instructor.

From 1976 through 1977 Major Stults was operations officer for VMA-223 at MCAS Yuma. During this time, he participated in trans-Pacific flights to Iwakuni, Japan, and Australia. During this tour, the squadron earned the Commandant's Aviation Efficiency Trophy, awarded each year to the Marine Corps' finest squadron.

Before assuming duties here last summer, Major Stults received a Master of Science Degree in Administration of Science and Technology from the George Washington University, Washington, D.C. He also attended the Marine Corps Command and Staff College, Marine Corps Development and Education Center, Quantico, Va., completed the Joint Aviation Supply and Maintenance Management School, Athens, Ga., and F-4 refresher training with VMFAT-101, MCAS Yuma.

The major's first six months here were spent as the director of naval aviation training and operating procedures standardization (NAT-OPS) and safety in MAG-24.

His personal decorations include three awards of the Distinguished Flying Cross; the Bronze Star Medal with combat "V"; 30 awards of the Air Medal; the Navy Achievement Medal; and the Combat Action Ribbon.

Family Housing Council

Quarters residents queried

I feel safe. I know my responsibilities. My neighbors respect my property and privacy.

These three statements best sum up the satisfaction base housing residents feel about their quarters and existing housing policies according to a recent survey conducted by the Family Housing Council.

The 17-question survey was mailed to residents toward the end of March and was collected on March 30. Every tenant had the opportunity to respond to the questionnaire and air any grievances or kudos. Mrs. Liz Trach, council chairperson, says the response was excellent with about 25 per cent of 476 questionnaires returned out of 1,881.

Mrs. Trach said the council needed a "starting point" to find out just what the problems were in base housing and try to figure out solutions. The council has only been in existence three months and the survey was their first major project. Through the survey, the council believed it would be able to get a good canvassing of opinions. A cover letter on the survey also served as a way to introduce council area representatives to the community.

Through the response from the questionnaires returned, Mrs. Trach says problems have been identified and plans are now underway to solve them. (Complete survey results are in the adjoining chart.)

For example, the biggest complaint was the lack of playgrounds in some housing areas.

The Cochran area has only one playground; there are two in Ulupaa but not any in Hillop nor Pond Road housing. Some of the playground equipment that is in place for example, needs repairs. One playground at Ulupaa was torn down through misuse. There are various other playgrounds in other areas. Public works officials have already informed the Family Housing Council that the material and the manpower will be made available to repair existing playground equipment according to Mrs. Trach.

Another problem area was the supervision of children while at play in those playgrounds. Many respondents felt that children were not adequately supervised. This can not only prove dangerous to the child

but the children might not respect their neighbors' property. "What do you tell a kid when he says, 'This isn't your yard, it belongs to the government'?" claims Chairperson Trach. "They do not realize that base residents have as much a right to their yards and quarters as off base tenants do."

Animal control was another concern reflected in the survey. Loose pets roaming housing areas create a nuisance and abandoned dogs can form packs. "This is mostly a personal responsibility," says Mrs. Trach. "Everyone should take it upon themselves to control their animals and if they are leaving base, making sure their pet is not left to fend for itself."

Some areas require lighting according to the survey. Courtyards or common areas behind Cochran area complexes are very large and residents there suggested that street lights be added.

Even with these problems, most residents are satisfied with their quarters. An overwhelming 92 per cent of the tenants understand their responsibilities for maintaining their unit. Only three per cent did not and the rest remained neutral on that answer.

The fact that most tenants are aware of their responsibilities may account for the satisfaction with existing policies and their feeling of safety (56 per cent) in their unit as well as trust in their neighbors.

Street traffic, however, was a major safety concern. Fifty per cent of the respondents felt that most motorists do not abide by the speed limit on their street. About one third said motorists did abide by the law.

The Housing Department, their Self-Help section and Public Works personnel were given a good "pat on the back." Fifty-nine per cent of the answers said they appreciated the services offered by these sections, finding the services efficient and the personnel courteous. Sixteen per cent disagreed.

Mrs. Trach added that though the survey has been tabulated, it is not over. Forms are still available at the Housing Department for incoming tenants.

Area representatives are always available to help out tenants with any complaint. They can be contacted through the Housing Department. Everyone is also invited to attend the council's monthly meeting May 18 at the Family Services conference room.

Rodeo stresses safety

In an effort to increase bicycle safety consciousness, the Provost Marshal's Office here assisted the Honolulu Police Department (HPD) in conducting a Bicycle Rodeo April 25, at Mokapu Elementary School.

According to the school's vice principal, Harry Uyeda, this is the second consecutive year the school has evaluated safety consciousness among their students by conducting a bicycle rodeo. Last year, he says, the MPs gave the students safety lectures and checked bicycles for safety. "We are doing what we can to improve our program on bicycle safety," declared the school's vice principal. This year, written and practical examinations were added to the program.

A total of 55 Mokapu students participated in the event. According to Sergeant Edward Burch, military police coordinator, the bike rodeo boys and girls had overwhelming results on their written test. "Ninety-seven per cent of the students did very well on their written test and if it wasn't for nervousness, I'm sure they

Sgt. Burch said that the pressure of competition caused the youngsters to make mistakes "they wouldn't normally have made." On the written test according to Sgt. Burch, the participants had no problem with hand signals, but on the practical, they didn't give the signals properly.

The school plans to have the rodeo as a continuing event. "We are beginning to stress bicycle safety," declared Sgt. Burch. "I think the kids will set the example for some less careful parents."

Grounds maintenance Trimming the turf

Everyone likes to be recognized for doing a good job, and aboard the air station here, there are eight people who fully deserve recognition but are usually, if noticed at all, taken for granted. It is the long hard hours of work put in by these people, from Public Works' grounds maintenance section, that keep the air station lawns and shrubs green and well-cared for. They include two grass cutters, four tractor operators and two gardeners. "All of these people are very familiar with their job," said Anthony Pada, foreman of the grounds maintenance section, "and don't wait to be told what to do. They know when the lawns need caring for, what they need and they do it."

Each of the grounds maintenance persons have their gear checked out, ready, and are on the job at 7:30 each morning. They work a 40 hour, five day work week.

The two grass cutters are women and classified as light laborers because they do minimum labor jobs and keep the sidewalks and road trimmed of grass and weeds. When needed there is also a male heavy laborer who gives assistance cutting grass.

Large grassy areas around the station would definitely be a problem if it weren't for the tractor operators. The tractor mowers can cut huge areas of grass in a fraction of the time it would take with a hand mower.

The two gardeners, familiar with soils, fertilizers and such, are responsible for what could be called the "showplaces" of the air station, those areas most noticed by everyone. These are the Headquarters Building (Bldg. 215) and the areas around H-3 and Mokapu Gates. They are also responsible for the dispensary lawns.

So, the next time you're driving around the air station, take time to notice that it is a beautiful place and remember those eight people who work to keep it that way — the Kaneohe Bay grounds keepers.

31st MAU hits the

Landing Exercise (Landex) 2-79 provided the recently combined elements of the 31st Marine Amphibious Unit with their first amphibious assault exercise conducted April 8-10 in the Zambales Province, Republic of the Philippines.

The USS Tarawa (LHA-1) is the first general purpose amphibious assault ship ever utilized by the 31st MAU. The LHA's highly automated facilities were built from their very conception to enhance a Marine Air-Ground Task Force's capabilities. Landex 2-79 provided the 31st MAU with its first opportunity to become familiar with the LHA's advanced technology.

Before the assault phase began, a Navy Underwater Demolition Team was landed to perform a beach reconnaissance and to clear simulated beach obstacles for the amphibious landing. Additionally, a Marine reconnaissance team from 2d Platoon, Alpha Company, 3d Reconnaissance Battalion was inserted to provide the landing force with advance information about "enemy" locations and fortifications.

Simulated naval gunfire and fixed-wing, close-air-support were provided prior to and throughout the landex in support of operations ashore.

The USS Fort Fisher (LSD-40), acting as the primary control ship, for the exercise, controlled all amphibious assault craft movements to and from the beach. The personnel from Echo Company, 2d Battalion, Third Marines (BLT 2/3) deployed from the USS Barbour County (LST-1195) in the Amphibious Assault Vehicles of 4th Platoon, Delta Company, 3d Assault Amphibian Battalion and were the first to assault the beach.

Simultaneously with Echo's amphibious assault was a helo assault by Golf Company into a landing zone just south of Echo's position. The Golf Company

Marines were transported in CH-46 Sea Knight and CH-53 Sea Stallion helicopters from Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-262. Six AH-1J Cobras provided armed escort for helicopter operations throughout the landex.

Next to hit the beach were the Marine Shore Party group and Navy Beachmasters. They immediately proceeded to organize the landing beach to accommodate the follow-on assault waves.

The M-60 tanks of 1st Platoon, Bravo Company, 1st Tank Battalion came ashore in the fourth wave. Echo Company then moved inland in the AAVs, supported by tanks, mortars and a Dragon anti-tank missile unit.

The first on-call support wave consisted of Bravo Battery, 12th Marines, with its six 105mm Howitzers and five-ton trucks. In addition to the 81mm Mortar Platoon from Headquarters and Service Company, the Bravo Battery guns provided simulated artillery support for Golf Company's assault on its assigned objective.

Fox Company was held in reserve aboard the USS Tarawa until mid-morning of D-Day when they were heloed in to relieve Echo. The BLT completed its operations ashore by the morning of the 10th and conducted a tactical withdrawal back to the amphibious ships.

Before the exercise began, Lieutenant Colonel Walt Boomer, the BLT commander, explained, "A tactical withdrawal is a very difficult maneuver to accomplish." After the operation the commander stated that this was the most outstanding part of the landex.

Colonel John Conlin, 31st MAU commander and Lt. Col. Boomer agreed that Landex 2-79 was executed smoothly, on-time, and that much was learned. However, the landex represents only one in a continual series of exercises designed to maintain the 31st MAU's high degree of readiness.



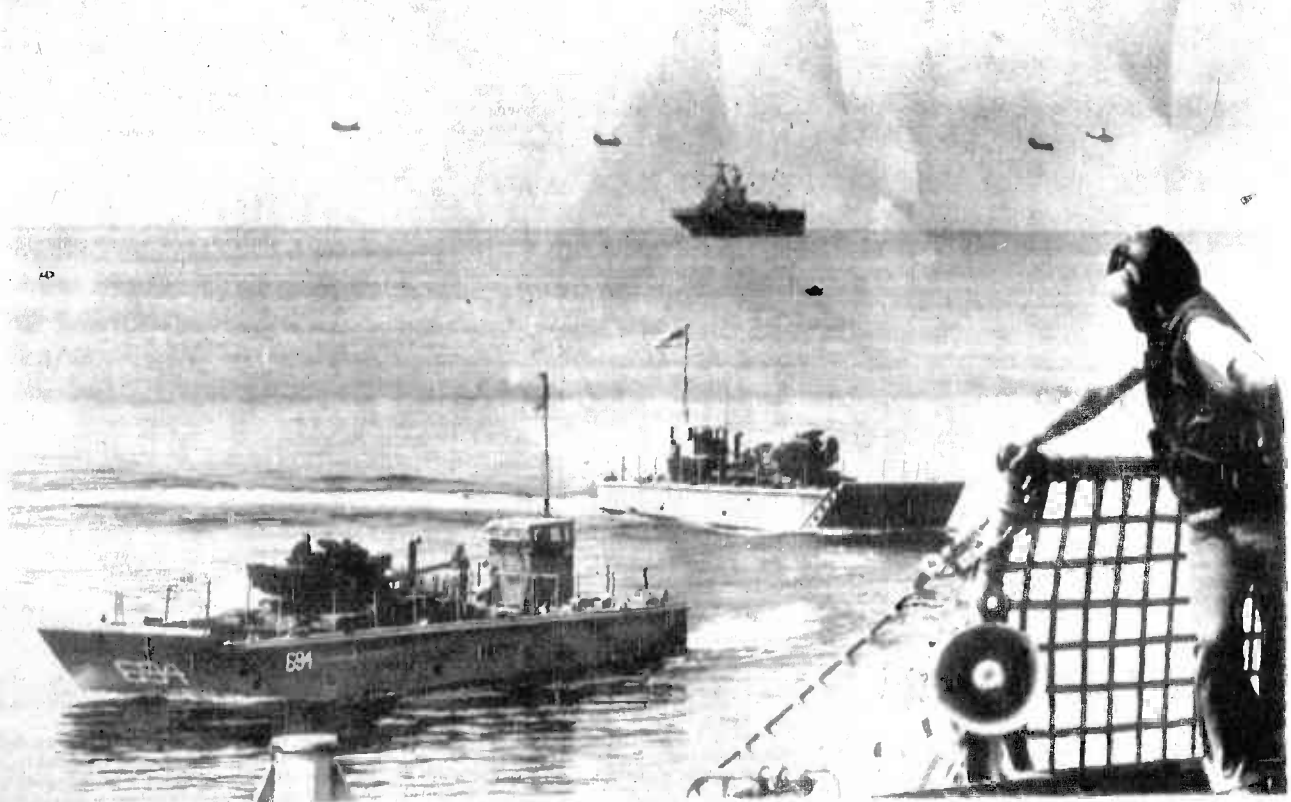

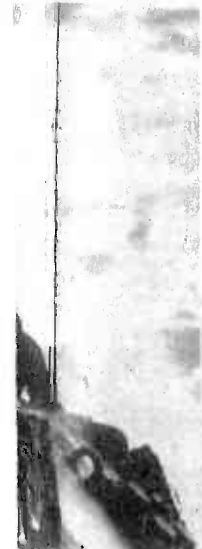

Powerlift season begins

The 1979 Hawaii Marine Athletic Powerlifting season opened Saturday, April 28, with 10 Marines and one sailor competing in the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) sanctioned meet.

Although seven different weight categories were represented, with five Marines competing in the 165-pound weight class, everyone was pitted against each other by using the AAU's pound-for-pound equalization method known as the Swartz formula. In using this method, a smaller lifter can compete against a larger one by measuring the weights proportionately.

The adjoining chart shows the weight categories, total lift weights, and how the Swartz formula helped give each competitor an even chance.

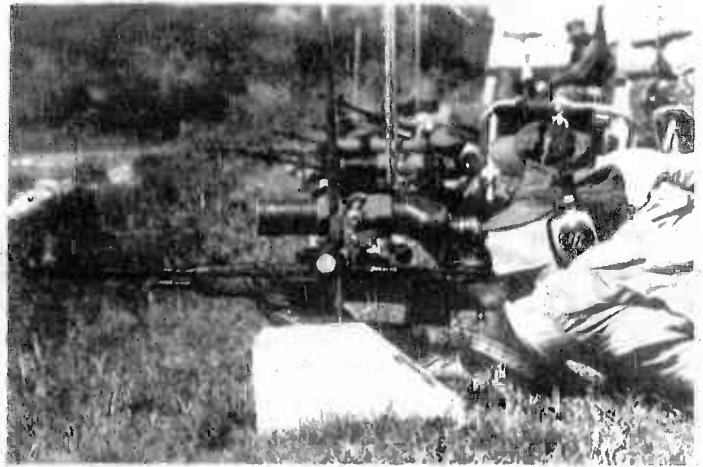
