## Fiberglass

Blades add new dimensions to flying.

Detroit uses it in automotive production. Hobbie Cat sailboats usually include it in the construction. And now, Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-265 has implemented it on its CH-46 Seaknight helicopters.

"It" is fiberglass. The use of fiberglass blades on the rotary-winged aircraft will add a new dimension to flying.

**REPLACING** the old metal circulating blades, pilots and crews in the helicopter squadron feel that the new fiberglass blades provide a smoother ride while the aircraft is in flight.

"Every time maintenance was conducted on metal blades, extra materials had to be added to repair any apparent damages," noted Sgt Doug Sweeney, a crew chief. "This changed the weight of the blades from that of factory specifications, sometimes causing an uneven ride."

The main asset of the fiberglass blades is that they require little maintenance.

SWEENEY and Maj

Ron Bailey, maintenance officer at the squadron, compared the metal blades to those made of fiberglass: "A Marine Helicopter Squadron on the East Coast completed a cruise using the new fiberglass blades without having to replace a single blade," said Bailey. "The last time we went on float, we had to replace or change close to 200 metal blades," added Sweeney.

Another impressive feature of the fiberglass blades is that, in controlled tests conducted by the United States government, blades made of the same composition of fiberglass withstood the impact of a 20mm round.

**THIS ADDED** attraction is significant to infantry units, because the newly constructed blades will increase combat survivability.

"The metal blades normally break if they are struck by ordnance," remarked 1st Lt Dave Sherry, pilot and classified materials control officer. "This causes the aircraft to

crash. If the fiberglass blades receive any type of shot-holes, it is possible that the helicopter could still complete its flight mission."

Not only are the new blades more reliable, they are also considered more durable.

**"POUND FOR** pound, the fiberglass blades are stronger than those made of steel," stated Capt George Kowdreck, pilot. "Fiberglass material weighs much less than metal, so more fiberglass can be added into the blades to match the same factory specifications of the metal blades." The reduction of maintenance hours spent on blade repair or replacement is appreciated.

Like most automotive, sailboat and other manufacturers, the Marine Corps continually searches for newer and better equipment to assist in accomplishing the mission.

By incorporating an idea proven effective by other industries, the Corps continues to move ahead.

## Naval history marches on

Two hundred-five years ago a fleet of less than 20 ships set sail from the Eastern colonies to escape the restricting bonds of another country.

Today the Navy's responsibilities have changed. The sea routes have expanded to encompass the world, and only the beams in the galleys and the spirit of the men manning the decks remain to link the Navy today with the Navy of 1775.

**JOHN PAUL** Jones, father of the Navy, was commanding the *Ranger* when the first recognition of the American flag (forerunner to our present Stars and Stripes) by a foreign government occurred in Quiberon Bay, France, Feb. 14, 1778. Vice Adm. La Motte Picquet, commander of the French Fleet, returned the *Ranger's* salute of 13 guns with a nine gun salute. When speaking of the Navy, such names as David Glasgow Farragut, William Sowden Sims and Chester W. Nimitz are brought up. The traditions for which these men fought and the customs they honored are far from forgotten.

The memories of the men, the battles they fought and won and the ships they commanded, will live on forever as the men and

women of the United States Navy hold their heads high with pride and courage. They stand for all that was accomplished then and now.

**IT WAS AFTER** 20 years of Arctic exploration that Robert E. Perry, civil engineer officer, United States Navy, became the first person to reach the top of the earth Apr. 6, 1909.

It is tradition like this that encourages Navy people to stand tall and say, "I am a member of the United States Navy."

Today naval history marches on as the Navy continues to man ships for the protection of those who live in the United States and its territories.

**OCT. 13 MARKS** the 205th birthday of the U.S. Navy. The Navy's saga is not unlike other large organizations. It has its high and low periods. However, there is one real difference that separates the U.S. Navy from some other organizations. The Navy's members have the advantage of a strong and steadfast history on which to grow. It is this foundation for freedom that enables them to command world respect and appreciation under, above and across the sea.

# Academy observes anniversary

An institution with a long tradition of creating responsible and intellectual officers from young midshipmen celebrates 135 years of teaching and training Saturday.

The story of the way Annapolis Naval Academy became a source of military leadership in America today is described by E.B. Potter, Professor of Naval History, U.S. Naval Academy.

**IN 1802, THE U.S. ARMY** acquired its military academy at West Point. But the U.S. Navy had nothing comparable during the first half century of its existence.

American midshipmen were expected to acquire the majority of their knowledge through on-the-job training. Chaplains were ordered to instruct them in mathematics, navigation and French, but, they were rarely qualified to do so.

Each ship of the line had politically appointed schoolmasters. However, since classes afloat were not taken seriously and were subject to constant interruption midshipmen were ordered to "more important duties."

For the most part, American

naval officers, if educated at all, were likely to be self-educated.

**TWO OF THE** most successful self-educated officers were Mathew Fontaine Maury and Mathew Calbraith Perry. Both strongly advocated the establishment of an academy ashore for the training of midshipmen.

Congress refused to authorize the necessary appropriations, since many naval officers insisted that midshipmen could learn all they needed to know by paying attention to detail.

As time passed, it became increasingly evident that midshipmen could not learn enough at sea to pass required examinations. As a result, coaching schools were established in the Boston, New York and Norfolk Navy yards, and at the Naval Asylum, a home for old sailors.

**IN THESE** schools midshipmen were trained by both civilian and military professors and then examined for promotion by a board of senior naval officers.

In 1842, the reputation of the Philadelphia school rapidly began to surpass the others. The reason was the leadership of 23-year-old

William Chauvenet, the new head of the school's small faculty.

A recent honor graduate of Yale, Chauvenet set out to develop a two-year course at the Asylum School. His attempt was unsuccessful because senior Naval officers believed midshipmen could not be spared that long. However, he did establish a one-year course which demanded and maintained such high standards that the Navy Department began to phase out the other schools. All midshipmen trainees were sent to Chauvenet in Philadelphia.

**WHEN CHAUVENET** and George Bancroft, a historian and educator, first decided to put their heads together, their plan wasn't clear. However in 1845, when Bancroft became Secretary of the Navy, he and Chauvenet did agree that the time was ripe for establishing a college of the Navy.

Bancroft first induced the Army to transfer to the Navy an outdated post, Fort Severn at Annapolis, Md. When the examining board of senior officers, including Commodore Perry, met in Philadelphia that same year, Bancroft recommended moving the school to a better location and proposed Annapolis. The officers approved both points.

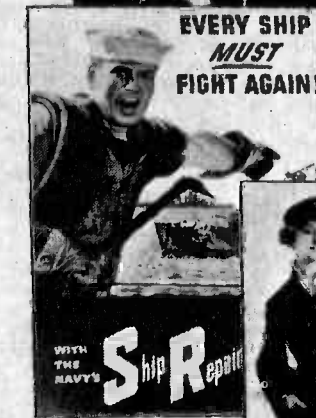
Thus the Naval School opened at Annapolis on October 10, 1845, under Superintendent Cmdr. Franklin Buchanan. Although both the faculty and student body had been enlarged, it was generally assumed that the Philadelphia school transferred to Annapolis as a move to keep the impressionable midshipmen from the temptations of the big city.

**AT FIRST,** the school was like a facsimile of its predecessors, simply a coaching center, with midshipmen attending on makeshift schedules between voyages.

In 1846, Bancroft left the Navy to become a minister to Great Britain. The school remained the same. It remained the following year when Buchanan departed to fight in the Mexican War. Chauvenet was left behind as the president of the school's academic board. It was Chauvenet who supervised the development of a long range plan that would carry out the intention of its founders.

**IN 1850** the plan was adopted. The Naval school was renamed the United States Naval Academy, and its course of instruction was extended to four years.

Today it remains a symbol of pride, discipline and American tradition.

### Leatherneck shares his adventures

World War II... Korea... Vietnam... call to mind a distinct era in the glory-laden annals of Marine Corps combat history.

Sadly, there are only a few remaining Leathernecks on active duty who can claim participation in each of these events. One is MGySgt Wilbert Detty, aircraft maintenance chief, Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron 24.

Detty retired Sept. 30 after completing more than 37 years combined active and reserve duty as a United States Marine.

In light of his wealth of military experience combined with a natural Irishman's penchant for storytelling, Detty was asked to reminisce a bit and share some parting thoughts with Hawaii Marine readers.

HIS ADVENTURES began even before he entered the Marine Corps. "I was fresh out of high school and work was scarce around my hometown of Chicago. A buddy and I were reading the paper one day when we spotted an ad for foreign employment. After getting our parents' consent, we were on our way to Burma to help build the famous Burma road.

"I was assigned as a truck driver to haul TNT up to the work site. We had to work at night since the temperature would hit 120-130 degrees during the day," he recalled. "What I didn't know at

the time was that along with the TNT, I'd been driving around truckloads of nitroglycerine. When I found out, I was scared a little bit, but I was young and wet behind the ears, so I kept driving.

"I made \$95 a week plus hazardous duty pay, which was an extra 10 percent. That was pretty good money back then. Most people on the mainland made about \$35 a week."

BY JULY 1943, Detty decided it was time to take President Franklin Roosevelt's advice and sign up for the service. He had little problem making a choice. He wanted to be a Marine. After completing recruit training and acquiring the position of platoon sergeant, Detty was ready for his first assignment with none other than Col Merritt Edson's legendary 2d Raider Battalion.

"We were called 'Edson's Raiders,'" he explained. "I was a platoon sergeant and my platoon commander was Capt James Roosevelt, son of the president. I spent about four and a half months with the Raiders before they broke up. I was sent over to the airdale side of the house."

With his assignment to Marine aviation came orders to bombardier and gunner school and further assignment to the South Pacific, where he worked as gunner with Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 134 and later with VMFA-132. Both units

flew the SBD dive bomber and the TBF torpedo bomber at the time. VMFA-134 was a unit where Detty encountered one of his best-remembered experiences.

"I was shot down four times in one day when I was with VMFA-134," he explained. "Our job was to hit the Japanese fleet in the areas between the Philippines and the South China Sea. We lost 43 gunners and 24 planes in one week."

FROM THERE Detty was moved to VMFA-122. He barely had time to settling in before they were headed north for Peleliu, where they became the first assault wave to participate in a ground beach assault.

"We just didn't have enough ground forces," said Detty. "The first assault wave on Peleliu lost 1,000 troops and that left the 'Pioneers' and the air wing as the only backup. So, we were loaded on amtracs and dropped off. The beach was covered with bodies. Peleliu was a lot like Iwo Jima. We lost a helluva lot of men."

"I remember we each had two canteens of water that were supposed to last us for two weeks. Of course I didn't have water in mine—I had tequila. I don't drink much water anyway," he added with a wry grin.

Once on the beach, the second assault wave drove the Japanese defenders back about 500 yards and a command post was established. Detty

explained what happened when he was called to the command post.

"GEN HOLLAND 'Howling Mad' Smith was there asking all the officers where they were from. Then my turn came.

"Where're you from, Sarge?"

"The Hundred and Twenty-second, sir."

"The Hundred and Twenty-second what? We don't have any Army here."

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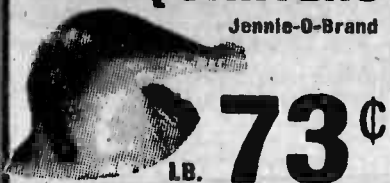


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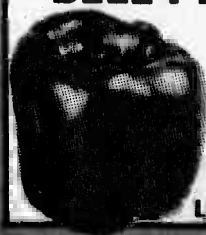


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## Street Scoop

## Unique unit

Marine Aircraft Group-24 functions as the aviation combat element

Throughout the course of recorded history, many people, places and things have shared the title, "unique." According to the dictionary it can mean several things, but it usually refers to someone or something that is "one of a kind."

The United States Marine Corps as a singular entity is "one of a kind," but is in actuality a conglomeration of smaller units that are exceptional.

**MARINE AIRCRAFT** Group-24 is different in many aspects, not the least of which is the fact that it operates as many different types of aircraft as one would normally find in two, or even three disparate aircraft groups.

Comfortably ensconced on Mokapu Peninsula on the island of Oahu, it calls MCAS Kaneohe Bay home and is the aviation element of the Corps' only collocation air/ground team, the 1st Marine Brigade. The brigade consists of a major ground combat maneuver element, the 3d Marines; an aviation combat maneuver element, Marine Aircraft Group-24; a Brigade Service Support Group for logistical and maintenance support; a Communications Support Company, 7th Communications Battalion and Headquarters Company which provides the brigade headquarters with communication and administrative services.

Marine Aircraft Group-24 is the largest aircraft group in the Marine Corps and is the only one on active duty Marine Corps rolls

combining fixed and rotary wing assets. It consist of 10 separate squadrons flying five types of aircraft.

**THREE MARINE** fighter-attack squadrons VMFAs 212, 232 and 235, fly the F-4 Phantom II.

Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-24 has its own aircraft, three TA-4F Skyhawks.

So far, you might have the makings of two separate groups. Here's where the clincher comes in that makes MAG-24 so unique. It has four helicopter squadrons mixed in with its fixed wing assets.

Three Marine helicopter squadrons, HMM-165, 262 and 265, fly with the CH-46 D or F models of the Sea Knight. A fourth, heavy helicopter squadron HMM-463, flies both the CH-53D Sea Stallion and the UH-1N Huey.

**THE NINTH** of the group's 10 squadrons, Marine Air Control Squadron-2's mission is to provide air surveillance and control of aircraft and surface to air missiles for anti-air warfare in support of the Fleet Marine Force.

It is tasked with installing and operating electronic and communications equipment required for the identification and control of aircraft and surface to air missiles.

Additionally, it must perform air intercepts by directing fighter aircraft and maintaining a capability to coordinate and pass information laterally.

**THE SQUADRON** is also tasked with

providing enroute air traffic control for friendly aircraft; maintaining the capability to deploy and operate as an integral unit, as well as being prepared to operate as an alternate tactical air control center as directed.

Marine Air Base Squadron-24 rounds out the roster of the group's 10 squadrons. It is tasked with providing air base facilities and services for the group and since it is based at MCAS Kaneohe Bay, it augments the station's facilities in providing those services.

The squadron has a diversified set of tasks which include conducting airfield operations as required for supported units; providing dining facilities as required for MAG organic units (at Kaneohe, the squadron augments one of stations two dining facilities); maintaining the capability of deploying as an integral unit or providing supporting elements in support of separately employed units and conducting unit and individual training for both itself and supported squadrons.

**ADDITIONALLY**, it must provide third echelon and/or intermediate maintenance of communications-electronics material items organic to the group. This does not include maintenance of avionics equipment single side band radio or for a Marine Air Traffic Control Unit.

Squadron members also perform first echelon maintenance on organic motor transport equipment; provide weather service support where and when necessary as well

as providing internal security to air base facilities. This would include personnel and traffic control and in a combat environment, limited perimeter security.

As a result of the mix of rotary and fixed wing assets, both the MABS and H&MS have heavier commitments on more diversified aircraft and components than they would in a normal MAG.

**NATURALLY**, since the air and ground elements of the 1st Marine Brigade live aboard the same air station, the entire gamut of air/ground training is readily available. This collocation also allows closer coordination with Direct Air Support Centers and Air Support Radar Teams, something that's normally carried out on a higher level of operations.

When asked how MAG-24 differs from other Marine Corps aircraft groups, Col Warren Ferdinand iterated, "I think that there are two basic differences that are fairly obvious once one looks at the organization chart and the numbers of squadrons we have assigned here.

Those basic differences are the size of the air group and its configuration, or structure. With the 10 squadrons, eight of which have aircraft, that of course makes us the largest in the Corps. Also significant is the fact that three of those squadrons are augmented by detachments. For example, HMM-463, our heavy lift helicopter squadron is augmented by a detachment from a Marine light helicopter-

367, which provides our UH-1N assets.

**"OUR MARINE** Air Control squadron, MAC-2, is augmented by two detachments," the veteran aviator continued, "one of which is from Marine Air Traffic Control Squadron-18 and another is from Marine Air Support Squadron-2. We also have an augmentation detachment with our MABS unit. That of course is from Marine Wing Support Group-17."

Asked if there were any advantages to living aboard the same installation with the ground element, the group commander replied, "I would say the biggest advantage of collocation is our capability to conduct joint planning and dovetail training requirements. We do this primarily at quarterly joint planning conferences. Plans are then reviewed and updated on a monthly basis."

**THE MIX** of fixed and rotary wing aircraft operating within such close proximity, may conjure up nightmares in some people's mind, but it's a daily occurrence at Kaneohe.

According to Col Ferdinand, this too can be advantageous. He explained it this way: "The primary advantage is an interchange of tactical information. The fixed and rotary

winged communities become aware of and gather knowledge of the capabilities and limitations of the other community. And, I think, this is done on a daily basis when you have such a dynamic, constantly changing air group as we have here."

**HE POINTED** out that it can have its drawbacks, saying, "MCAS Kaneohe is a small airstrip with a single runway primarily devoted to fixed wing operation. We also have West Field operations, where the helicopters operate and do external lifts. The disadvantage then would be simultaneously mixing fixed and rotary wing aircraft in the same pattern, which of course would create problems for the air controllers and air crews."

There are other considerations regarding the mix of the two aircraft communities and Maj Charlie Mills, former assistant operations officer for the MAG addressed these, saying, "About 70 percent of the decisions made, impact on the other community in one way, shape or form. For instance," he continued, "if you make a decision to drop bombs from fixed wing aircraft, it restricts helicopter operations in a given area."

Mills also observed that, "The mix slows

down each community's training cycle somewhat, but it's not an insurmountable problem. It creates a minor inconvenience and requires close scheduling coordination. But it does not adversely impact on either community."

**A QUICK** look at the group's table of organization would be enough to send some people scurrying. It does give one a good idea of just how unusual this group is and how the mix impacts on personnel assignments. In its present form, the MAG requires 32 more military occupational specialties than would a composite group made up of fixed and rotary wing assets.

Mills explained this by saying, "We're manned at a group staff level, while managing the personnel MOSs of an entire aircraft wing, with some variances."

If the composition and operation of MAG-24 is starting to look complicated, it's not too surprising, but there's more to come. It seems the deeper you get into the group's operating arena, the more involved it becomes.

**"MARINE AIRCRAFT** Group-24, is set up on a VA/VF basis," explained 1st Lt John Gebalde, of Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-24's Intermediate Maintenance Activity. For cont. on B-4

"So he sent us to take 'Purple Beach' with an added order to do it within four hours."

"We went charging from 'orange beach' to 'purple beach' through the jungle, jumping over dead Japanese soldiers as we moved. One guy wasn't dead and he stuck me here with his bayonet (pointing to the lower right side of his back). Our corpsman looked me over, put a band-aid on me, tapped me on the back and said, 'Go! We secured 'purple beach' in three and a half hours, losing only two out of 32 men."

WITH PELELIU captured, VMFA-122 headed north again to Ulithi, the Navy's fleet anchorage, where his unit spent 30 days at a time covering the fleet.

With World War II drawing to a close, Ditty decided to leave active duty. After less than three years of service he'd risen to the rank of master sergeant, then E-7. He stayed in the Marine Corps Reserve, however, and pursued a civilian job with American Airlines as a flight line superintendent. He later worked as a salesman for a carpet company in Chicago.

Ditty's civilian endeavors again came to a halt in August 1950 when he voluntarily returned to active duty with the advent of the Korean conflict. It was an exciting time since

the Marine Corps was beginning to enter the jet age.

Ditty's first work with jets was with the TBI trainer used to indoctrinate pilots into jet aircraft.

**THE WINTER OF 1951** added another chapter to Ditty's adventurous career. He explained what happened.

"There were six of us assigned to an airstrip called K-50, way up north by the 38th Parallel along with the 5th Marines. Our job was to patch up shot-up aircraft so they could make it back home. While there, we were overrun three times by the Chinese. We'd be working on planes using two trees and a rope as a hoist. We'd barely get the engines back in and put the prop on, before those damn Chinese would shoot 'em up. We called them every name we could think of."

"Anyway, in January 1952, Gen Lemuel Sheppard, then the commandant, came up to visit us. He stayed in a tent right next to mine. During the night it seemed like the firing was getting pretty hot around us. At about 1 a.m. I got up to take a look. Our Korean guards were gone—they just disappeared and we couldn't find the 5th Marines either. I woke my guys and said, 'hey, there's something wrong out there.' So we got Gen Sheppard up and told him we'd been overrun. "It was about 47 below zero out there, but we knocked down our tents and got down into a foxhole. After setting up a guard shift we settled in to wait for morning."

"SO THERE I was in a foxhole with the CMC and a case of blackberry brandy from one of the tents. By

morning the Chinese had been pushed back into the hills again. That afternoon a '62 transport came in and took the general out. He never forgot me. When I left Korea in 1955, I met him at Treasure Island and he tried to get me to stay on active duty, but I told him I'd had it. I hadn't seen my family in more than four years and I figured it was time to head back to Chicago."

For the second time in his Marine career Ditty opted for life as a civilian and Marine reservist. He returned to American Airlines to tending their aircraft during the week and military aircraft on drill weekends at nearby Glenview Naval Air Station, Glenview, Ill.

He was promoted to master sergeant (E-8 this time) in May 1961. Just one year later, Ditty was promoted to his present rank of master gunnery sergeant. His total time in grade of more than 18 years at his retirement made him the senior master gunnery sergeant in the Marine Corps.

By December 1965, with the increased escalation of fighting in Vietnam, he again returned to active duty, this time to stay.

**THOUGH** assigned with MAG-12 at Chu Lai, he also spent nine months at Shochorn, where many of the A-4s used in Vietnam were fitted with specialized electronic warfare equipment. After two years in-country, Ditty was sent back to the states for duty at MCAS Beaufort, S.C. where he was a member of MAG-31. From there it was on to Iwakuni, Japan, and more duty with MAG-12. By May 1962 he was on his way to Vietnam again this time to Bien Hoa outside of Saigon.

"We went down there

with 500 Marines and replaced 40,000 Army troops," he recalled. "It started out as 30 days temporary duty but we ended up staying a year. At that time I was a maintenance chief, sergeant major of H&MS, sergeant major of planning and estimating, and Vietnamese coordinator, handling the hiring and firing of Vietnamese nationals."

After leaving Vietnam for the last time in January 1973, he returned to MCAS Beaufort to Training Management Element-23, where he served as noncommissioned officer in charge, legal officer and administrative chief.

He arrived in Hawaii for duty with H&MS-24 in 1976.

**WITH MORE** than 37 years of colorful experience behind him, it seemed natural to ask what kept Ditty in the Marine Corps for so long. He had a swift explanation ready.

"Back when I came in they had a saying, 'Once a Marine, always a Marine' and I believed in that. I came through a tough boot camp, they either made you or broke you. Then they didn't have ice cream, we couldn't smoke and we never had any free time. Now recruits get all those things and more."

"Another thing," he continued, "people say they see a change in today's Marines. There is a basic change, but few realize what it is. They say this is the 'new' Corps but hell, it's been the 'new' Corps ever since I came in. All the basics are still there—you're still a

Marine first and a technician second.

"Living conditions and pay have improved but I think we made a big mistake going to the hotel-type rooms we have now. It took away a lot of comradeship and honesty. Today you can't leave a dime out without somebody lifting it. In all the time I've been in up to the last 10 or 12 years, I'd never seen the thievery we have now. I guess some people just don't know how to live among other people."

**"YOU KNOW** back in the old days a platoon sergeant could tell you the name of every man in his platoon. Today that's no longer true."

"We should get back to walking together instead of running away from each other. Today you run the Physical Fitness Test and everyone's scattered for a mile, and nobody in there knows who the leader is. He can be way in front or in the back and nobody knows the difference. We should get back to putting on those 40

pound packs and walking together like we used to. If we marched three miles a week and added a 10-miler a month with a pack on, you'd have a stronger Marine. There's no way you're going to run in combat. That's what we're teaching right now. In Korea at the Chosin Reservoir we were ordered to walk out and we did—foot by foot. So I say march 'em and get them close knit again."

Ditty plans to settle in Chattanooga, Tenn. with his family, and has already received several job offers from major airlines.

"This isn't it for me," he stated. "I want to work for an airline. I figure I've got a good five to seven years left before I finally retire for good."

Asked if he had any parting advice for young Marines, Ditty replied, "There's an old Chinese expression 'Gung-Ho' that many people no longer seem to understand. It means working together in harmony. What more can I say?"

## Pilots rely on controllers' directions

An aircraft pilot's job is to fly passengers or cargo from one point to another. But to perform his job successfully he must work with the air traffic controllers.

**THE PILOTS** and controllers must form a bond of trust between them before the mission can be completed safely.

This trust is carried one step beyond controllers passing information to the pilots. The pilots must have no doubt the information they are receiving is accurate, and the pilot must follow directions given by the controllers without hesitation.

know when he has arrived at certain points and when he has departed the designated area," says Bachmeier.

"If I, as a local controller," comments SSgt James Harp, "refuse a civilian aircraft entry into the airport traffic area because of incapability, the pilot must take an alternate route around the five mile radius."

**CLYDE** Tamashiro, a GS-10 working at ATC explains, "Air traffic control governs a pie shaped area up to 35 miles north of the tower and up to 29,000 feet. It is used by aircraft flying by instrument flight rules." Due to separation regulations and weather minimums, holding patterns are sometimes executed in this air space.

When visibility at the airfield is less than three miles, or there is a cloud ceiling lower than 1,000 feet, all approaches and departures must be by IFR. Pilots are also required to fly a certain number of hours by IFR.

When a pilot is flying IFR his life and the lives of his passengers and crew lie in the hands of the approach/departure controller and the radar controller. It is their responsibility to assure the pilot of a safe entry and landing.

**AS SOON** as the approach/departure

controller has made contact with the radar controller, all systems swing into action.

"Marine one-two-three, this is Kaneohe G C A, ident."

With the radar scope flashing lights and numbers representing aircraft, the radar controller must know without doubt which aircraft on the scope he is directing in.

When the pilot touches a button in the cockpit, an aircraft shows up on the radar scope with four rings flashing around it.

"Marine one-two-three, radar contact, turn right heading..."

Through standards set by the Federal Aviation Administration the radar controller will continue to bring the aircraft and pilot to a safe landing by advising him of altitude changes, wind direction and speed, air traffic and approach paths.

**ONCE ON THE** ground, the pilot is turned over to the ground controller in the tower and taxied off the runway.

When visual flight rules are in use by pilots and controllers, departures and landings are conducted through the ground and local controllers in the tower.

The ground controller deals with all movement on the ground. "I am responsible for the crash crew trucks and for any taxiing. Once the pilot has his aircraft in position for take-off, I turn him over to the local controller," points

out Cpl Jeffery Ireland, a ground controller.

**BACHMEIER** explains his job as a local controller. "It is my job to issue out clearances for take-offs and landings. When I give a pilot clearance for take-off I'm responsible for making sure there is no traffic that will interfere with the aircraft's path. I also include wind conditions during the clearance."

When a pilot requests to land during VFR conditions, he reports his location to the tower through visual ground

points, published and approved by the FAA.

"Through the pilot reporting these points, or giving an estimated distance from Kaneohe when they are over water," Bachmeier says, "it not only allows me to make the pilot aware of any air traffic that they need to be concerned with, but it also enables me to put them in proper landing sequence."

"Marine three-six-two, this is Kaneohe tower altimeter 3002, wind 090 at 5, enter left down wind runway 4."

controllers deal with routine take-off and landings throughout the day," relates Ireland, "but they also keep a continuous log of aircraft's departure, arrival and aircraft transactions in the airport traffic area."

As Marine Corps pilots at MCAS Kaneohe Bay strap themselves in their cockpits each day and taxi onto the runway, they can rest assured that capable air traffic controllers will be there when needed to guide them home to a safe landing.

## Intelligence Brief

This article is a combination of all available unclassified material on the mission and organization of the Soviet combat engineer.

Engineers have always been considered

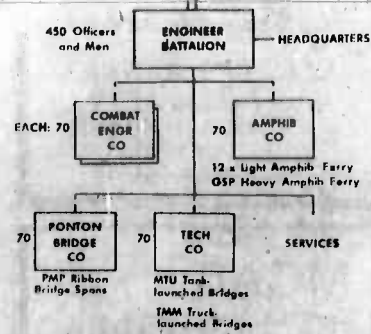
important in the Soviet Army, but in the current view, combat engineers have an increasingly valuable role to play in ensuring the viability of combined arms units, especially during a

high speed offensive.

The primary mission of the Soviet combat engineer is to ensure momentum of maneuver mobility by rapidly overcoming extensive natural and man-made obstacles and mine-fields while at the same time hindering the enemy forces movement.

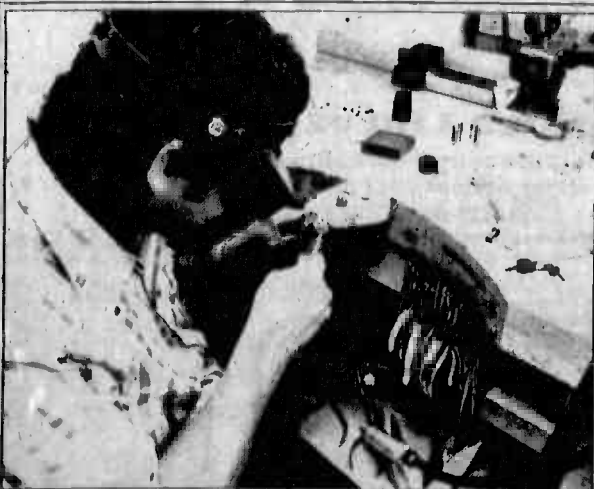
Secondary missions include camouflage, fire protection, damage clearing, water supply, preform mine detection and mine laying. Engineers conduct extensive construction, engineer reconnaissance and develop engineer intelligence.

The unit structure of the Soviet Army allows engineers to be assigned down to the regimental level and in some cases to battalions for specific operations. The Motorized Rifle Division/Tank Division have engineer battalions of 450 men. This organic battalion consists of two combat engineer companies, a pontoon bridge company, an amphibious company and a technical company, each having 70 men. Additionally, Soviets have a reconnaissance platoon, a mine laying platoon and a sapper company. Additional information concerning company structure and equipment will be published at a later date.

Pat VanCleve McKinley had a dream when she was growing up. A dream that she has seen grow and develop along with herself.

"When I was growing up," says Pat, "I was always going to get married, have five kids and be a nurse." Smiling, she continues, "Well, I've been married twice, became a nurse, and had six kids, that's one for the road."

**PAT'S STORY** is not unusual. Most people have dreams of who and what they are going to be when they grow up.

But, it is Pat the person, the mother and, most of all, the Resident Nurse that is important. She works at the Immunization Clinic at the Naval Regional Medical Clinic, Kaneohe Branch, a job that she remains convinced the good Lord gave her.

"I have worked as a Resident Nurse for a full 30 years," explained Pat. "I began working here Sept. 15, 1974. Before that I worked at Tripler Army Medical Center."

"I had applied for a job here, and a year later they were going to add a night shift for nurses, so they called me and asked if I was still interested."

When people first walk into the immunization clinic they may notice that it seems geared towards the young. But along with the children that Pat sees daily for allergy shots, she also handles Marines and Navy personnel.

"I give the best shots!" she brags. When people come in for shots a lot of them are really afraid. I just take and beat on their arm for a little bit. Of course now, I don't do this to the children I see."

Beat on their arm? "Oh, it's nothing that really hurts," Pat explains. "I just slap their arm for a couple of seconds then give them the shot. I give quick shots so people hardly even know they got it."

People arriving for shots may alternately think Pat childish, silly or great. Parents comment that their children don't mind coming for shots anymore because they know they will get them from Pat.

Many times the kids leave with something special, since she uses the method of "tell, show and do."

"The first thing I do in the mornings is draw a face on my arm," she says. "Right here on the inside below the

elbow. That way when a child comes in for a DPT I can make it a little easier by drawing a face on his arm and giving him something to look at as I give the shot."

Besides leaving with a smile on their arms children also grab some paper and draw pictures, or play with toys she brings for them. If people don't feel like playing, they will always leave with the memory of a laugh and a smiling face.

**"A LOT OF** people have a fear of receiving shots. Even I don't like getting them. I don't mind giving them, though," she laughs. Pat has a remedy for helping people with their fear of shots.

"I think being silly helps take away some of the fear," she quips.

Pat has come a long way from the days of taking care of the runt in litters of cats and dogs. Today a dream she has had since she was "knee high to a grasshopper" has been fulfilled. It materialized through long hours of study to graduate from Duke University, and from work as both a private duty nurse, and staff nurse at Tripler Army Medical Center.

Today Pat has a job that she says is just perfect. By the enthusiasm in her voice and watching her work, people can see that for her it is perfect.

## Sea soldiers take a hike

# Water walk changes pace

**ABOARD THE USS NEW ORLEANS AT SEA, SEPT. 15**—It has long been alleged by many Marines that there are those in the Corps who walk on water. Today, troops from the Indian Ocean Amphibious 31st Marine Amphibious Unit proved that to be true.

Sea soldiers from Company E and Weapons Company of Battalion Landing Team 2/3, the unit's ground combat element, "took a hike on the high seas," route-stepping lap after lap around the New Orleans flight deck in a bright mid-morning sun.

"It was nice to be able to get out into the fresh air for a little exercise, something we aren't always able to do working around a pretty heavy topside flight schedule. The gas masks, besides being a little warm, didn't have that much of an effect at all on our breathing or make us that uncomfortable."

Nineteen-year-old LCpl Chuck Weldon of Albany, N.Y. found the training to be good conditioning. "We're gradually building up our endurance. Each time we hike, it's a little further," he says. "Right now it's in preparation for a forced

provider to the maximum, keep patient waiting to a minimum and avoid, as much as practicable, mixing the acutely ill (contagion) with those who are recovering from illness. It works well, particularly with those who understand there are just so many patients that can be seen in an hour. There are just so many hours you can safely work someone without that person developing chronic fatigue; that insidious monster that is given to missed diagnoses and poor judgement calls. And that equates to less than quality care.

Medical personnel frequently miss meals and work after hours to see patients, paint or clean their spaces or accomplish other things that need to be done, outside of watches and working hours. I feel that there's a great crew of health

care providers at the air station now: hard working and caring. But many are young and inexperienced. How does a newly trained, 18-year-old youth handle another phone request for an appointment after being raked over the coals by an earlier request that couldn't be granted because there was "no room at the inn." I'll tell you how... with white knuckles and a catchy voice just barely able to mutter, "Go to Tripler." He is afraid to say anything else. He has just been verbally abused (talk about obscene phone calls) and if a confrontation occurs, must account for what he has said and there still are no more appointments. He can't make time or doctors. He is terrified because the tank of the caller (or caller's husband) has been not so softly mentioned and the

caller refuses an appointment for the following day because there's a meeting he must attend. So he croaks "go to Tripler." The patient labels this a "poor attitude" and lodges a complaint. An investigation ensues so the complaint can be answered and if the corpsman is wrong, he is taken to task. Top it off with duty that night (or the previous night) and I wonder if his "attitude" will improve.

Some patients are exceedingly hostile and demanding. Some just cannot be reconciled and refuse to recognize that when we can't meet the need, we must refer. It's not convenient, but necessary. Sometimes, even when fully staffed, the best "quality health care" we can render is through referral.

This brings us to the bottom line. Many equate "quality" with

"convenience." If they can be seen quickly and locally, they're happy. In fact, we are able to see the great majority of our patients.

# YMCA instructor invents fast-paced sport

Basketball is one of the most widely played and watched sports in the world. It's loaded with fast-paced thrills and action and played on playgrounds, in alleys, backyards and driveways. Basketball is considered by many folks to be an excellent form of recreation.

Basketball is as American as apple pie. Since its invention in 1891, it quickly became a popular winter sport enjoyed by men, women and children. Today organized teams

participate in the sport year 'round.

James Naismith, an instructor at the International YMCA in Springfield, Mass. is the father of the cage game. One day he was tasked with devising a team sport that could be played indoors during the winter months.

Naismith tried soccer, but it proved to be impractical on the hard, wooden floor. Rugby was given a chance but the students couldn't seem to finish a game without too many injuries, so it was back to the drawing board for Naismith. One cold, wintry night

as he sat at his desk, Naismith tried to figure out a way to keep the students entertained without risking injuries.

"I've got it," he cried as he snapped his fingers. He then labored through the night finalizing his plans. The next morning he asked a janitor to hang two baskets at either end of the gym's balcony.

When his students came to class, they saw the baskets and began grumbling at the idea of trying a new sport. When Naismith promised them that if they didn't like this one he'd never experiment again, his class reluctantly agreed.

He divided his 18-student class into two teams. A soccer ball served as a basketball, and the first basketball game in America had begun.

Naismith's class ran, sweated and hustled up and down the gym floor. In spite of all that activity the game ended with a score of 1-0.

Word of this new sport spread like wildfire. Basketball

was soon played almost everywhere. Naismith published 13 rules for the sport in 1892, but many groups had established their own regulations and were playing by them. In 1915, various rule-making groups met to develop a standard set of basketball guidelines.

Basketball, as it is played today, is basically the same as Naismith invented. One of the first changes made affected the baskets. At first, each time a goal was made, a ladder was brought onto the court to recover the ball.

Metal baskets soon replaced the bushel ones. The metal hoops had a hole in the bottom so the ball could be pushed out with a pole. In 1873, a net bag was attached to the metal hoop and officials would pull a cord fastened to the net to pop the ball out. It wasn't until 1913 that present-day baskets were phased in.

Backboards came into existence in 1894 to keep spectators from leaning over the

balconies where the baskets were hung, and interfering with the shots. At one time the playing area was enclosed by a wire fence to prevent irate fans from throwing debris onto the court. Thus, basketball was dubbed with the nickname "cage" sport, and players were called "cagers."

Through the years more rule changes were made to help make basketball a faster and high-scoring game. At one time players could only advance the ball by passing it. It wasn't until 1900 that dribbling was implemented, and the situation improved.

Two important changes occurred in the '30s. Angelo (Hank) Luisetti of Stanford University introduced the one-hand push shot. Before Luisetti's technique, players scored from under the hoop, or used a two-hand push shot with both feet firmly on the floor. In 1937, a jump ball after each goal was eliminated to speed things up.

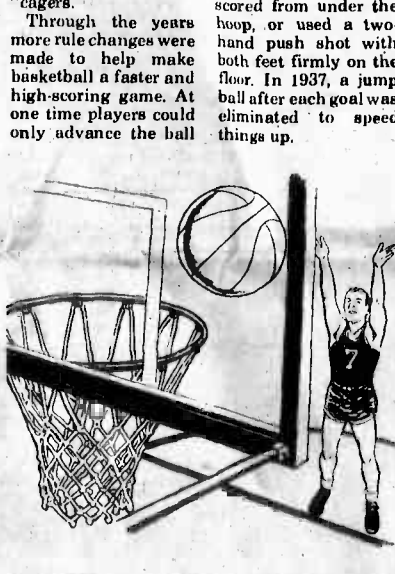

Again, more years passed and new changes were made in the sport. Today teams play with such features as 24 and 30 second clocks, fiberglass backboards, synthetic nets, larger courts, extended free throw lanes and a host of other improvements.

Basketball is also played by handicapped people who are blind, deaf or in wheel chairs. Partially blind players use large, soft, brightly-colored balls, while totally blind cagers use balls with bells or rattles inside.

Buzzers indicate the location of the baskets, which are lower and larger than regulation size. Players in wheel chairs normally follow college rules, and are able to play in an annual national championship tournament.

# Jargon sidles into every language

Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary defines jargon as: 1) confused unintelligible language; 2) a strange, outlandish or barbarous language or dialect; 3) a hybrid language or dialect simplified in vocabulary and grammar and used for communication between people of different speech activities or groups; 4) obscure and often pretentious language marked by circumlocutions and long words.

In other words, jargon is used to talk to anyone about anything.

As Marines, jargon is very much a part of our lives. Words such as "bullhead," "deck," "swab," "hatch," "topside," and "below" are tossed about daily. We're confident the terms will be understood.

JARGON IS nowadays unavoidable. It is deeply rooted in the English language and takes extraordinary liberties with our national tongue. Some versions of jargon completely reverse the original meaning of a word while other versions take refuge in euphemisms. Still others appear as acronyms, and there doesn't seem to be an end in sight.

Since jargon users are everywhere, the old cliché, "If you can't beat 'em, join 'em," holds very true. The following is a collection of jargon phrases used in our military duties, though not unique to the Corps, and phrases used in other activities.

MANY MILITARY phrases are said to be the product of public relations men whose skill in euphemisms knows no limit. Occasionally, military jargon is brought back to earth by salty servicemen, but somehow, the PR people flow them out of proportion again. Some of the military talk includes:

**Alphabet soup** — This phrase refers to atomic, biological, and chemical warfare. Since many nations have the capacity to use any, or all three, of these it's common to hear the saying, "Everyone's in the soup now."

**Apple** — A private code word for the Marine Corps. One which will often be tattooed, either phonetically or symbolically, on a Marine's shoulder.

**Believer** — A captured enemy soldier is a believer; a dead enemy soldier is a true believer.

**Bug bunnies** — Bacteriological scientists specializing in biological warfare are known by this term.

**CEP** — Circular Error Probable (pronounced "sap"). According to the 1976 SALT Lexicon it's, "a measure of the delivery accuracy of a weapon system which has a .5 percent chance of failing."

**Close, but no cigar** — Any nuclear device that fails to strike its intended target.

**Contact** — In the military, one never fights, but rather makes contact with the enemy. It's a neutral word often used to cover an unsuccessful engagement or ambush.

**Credible threat** — The real thing. Any weapon, offensive or defensive, that does exist and is effective.

**(the) Elephant** — When you're really frightened and your heart feels suffocated,

when your breath is constricted and your muscles absolutely immobile, then you've experienced the elephant sitting on your chest.

**Expecting rain** — The Pentagon code for an all-out nuclear attack.

**Greenbacking** — The hiring of mercenary troops. Also used as an euphemism for an under-the-table bribe.

**Lurped out** — To be in a state of total exhaustion; the pits.

**THE MOST** vibrant and colorful of all jargon is the talk of the people, street talk or slang as it is commonly called. By listening to daily conversations many phrases can be picked up, but to the indoctrinated ear they are difficult to understand. However, the language shows a readiness to accept newcomers, providing the novice is ready to share a particular lifestyle. People jargon includes:

**Ace** — This phrase denotes a close friend, a pal.

**Bear** — noun describing something that is very difficult or dangerous. "Man, rappelling down that cliff was a bear!"

**Be in a high place** — Not necessarily equated with drug use, but is meant to describe happiness and content.

**Brocas** — Spanish for a real profit; big bucks; a windfall.

**Busting suds** — Washing dishes. "Bustin' suds ain't the best way to get rich, but at least it's a clean living."

**Call** — Not to be confused with a telephone call. This phrase means to challenge or confront.

**Crib** — Home; sanctuary; a place of refuge or a neighborhood.

**Fat City** — If you've been accused of living in Fat City don't look at your waistline, look into your soul. This coinage refers to living the life of fast cars, money and women.

**Funky** — Not smelly or dirty, but good or genuine. This term can also be used to describe something (or someone) not realistic or on the level.

**Ran it down** — Simply to tell the truth.

**Shuck** — To string someone along; to continually fool someone.

**EVEN** politicians are famous for using jargon. Though some political phrases are

carefully invented, politicians have been successful in getting their point across. Without too much detail, here is some political talk:

**Aesop's fables** — White House slang for the daily press briefing.

**Barnburners** — A term for a renegade of a political party who is willing to risk total loss in pursuit of an ideal, goal or personal interest.

**Cowwaddle** — A political attempt to delay passage of legislation by constant talking.

**Deucing** — A sudden inflation increase equaling at least a 10 percent jump.

**Humpty Dumpty** — Doubletalk, gobbledygook, half-truths and misinformation.

**THE WORLD** of

show business is not only flooded with lights, cameras and action, but jargon, too. In fact, some folks in "the biz" have confessed to occasionally forgetting how to converse normally. The following are examples of show biz verbiage:

**Angel** — Not the heavenly spirit, but the backer of a show.

**Annie Oakley** — Free pass for theatre admission.

**Bench act** — An old-fashioned, tired routine.

**Big Bertha** — The one and only Ringling Brothers-Barnum & Bailey Circus.

**Bowdlerize** — To censor or sanitize a potentially suggestive performance.

**Buskers** — Street entertainer who perform songs, dances, and feats of magic.

**Catch flies** — To

attract an audience or to upstage other actors.

**CW** — Not country western, but Comfortably Weird, that is, someone who made it in the business without losing their individual eccentricities.

**Throwing babies** — The highest praise one can pay a stand-up comic. "The audience loved your act so much, they were throwing their babies from the balcony."

**Wipe** — A show business term for being fired before the completion of a show.

**ZZZ** or three Zs — Private movie-industry joke identifying G-rated, child-oriented films which are typically wholesome, upstanding or sleep-inducingly dull.

**JARGON** WILL never replace standard

conversational English, but it's so embedded in the vocabulary of almost everyone, regardless of the language they speak that it seems normal. Jargon guides us on a witty and informative

odyssey, teaching us not only to speak and understand it, but also giving us a rare opportunity to study the English language in its liveliest, most foolish and revealing form.

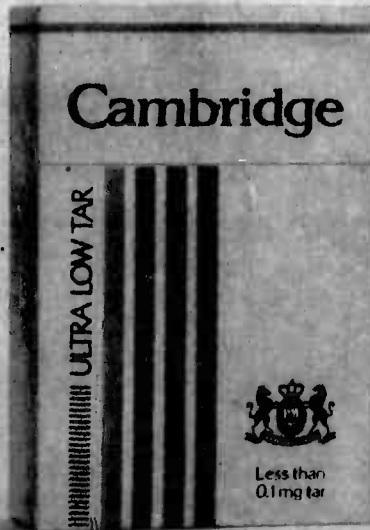

# Hale Koa: Resort facility nestles within Fort DeRussy to provide first class service to the military

The Hale Koa Hotel, overlooking Waikiki Beach at the Fort DeRussy Recreation Center, celebrates its 50th year of operation this October. However, the series of events leading up to the "House of the Warrior" began 76 years ago.

The Army began buying land for the Waikiki Military Reservation in 1904. By 1918, the government owned approximately 72 acres of land.

**THE COAST** Guard wanted a chain of forts

built around the island and the Army Engineers went to work in 1908. Detachments of Coast Artillery Corps followed in 1909.

In the same year a burrow pit was dug behind the reef, a suction dredge was created to transfer 250,000 cubic yards of coral and sand to fill the land that had for years served as duck ponds for Hawaiian royalty. Also during 1909, Fort DeRussy was named in honor of Brig. Gen. Rene E. DeRussy.

The Fort DeRussy Recreation Center opened on June 8, 1942. The center consisted of billeting accommodations for 25 enlisted men and by 1945 there was space for 300 enlisted men and 109 officers.

**FORT DeRUSSY** Recreation Center was renamed the Armed Forces Recreation Center in June 1949.

The Recreation Center has come a long way since it was first opened. One of the major additions was the Hale Koa Hotel,

which opened Oct. 25, 1975.

From the beginning the hotel mission was to provide a first class, full-service, resort facility for active and retired military personnel and their dependents, without regard to patrons' rank or branch of service, at affordable prices.

The hotel's primary purpose is to serve active duty military and their dependents on pass or leave.

**LOOMING OVER** the beach at Waikiki, the Hale Koa boasts 416 rooms with an

incredibly successful 98 percent occupancy rate. But it has more to offer than rooms.

The Hale Koa contains four main lounges, each with its own atmosphere. The Mauka Lounge is the hotel's pre-show lounge. The lounge's chairs sit among hanging plants and a view of the Koolau mountains, creating a relaxed atmosphere for quiet conversation.

The Banyan Tree Showroom hosts the Hale Koa's lavish buffet dinner with a show. Such performers as Tama's Polynesian

Show, The Surfers or Earl Hughes and Friends, during week-nights for entertainment and fun.

**COMFORT** and informality is provided by the Warriors Lounge.

The "House of the Warrior" theme is reflected in the decor and it offers entertainment nightly.

Continental style dining can be found in the romantic surroundings of the hotel's Hale Koa Dining Room. The room offers views of the Pacific with a Polynesian flare.

fixed wing unit. IMA folks are the ones who do intermediate maintenance. Those are jobs too big for the individual squadrons to handle, but not quite big enough to send to a NARF, or Naval Air Rework Facility.

Gebaide went on to say, "All our IMA personnel for rotary wing aircraft repairs are augmented from the various helicopter squadrons. As a consequence, we have a constant turnover of supervisors because of helicopter squadron deployments."

As part of the support the MAG provides for the 31st Marine Amphibious Unit, a composite helicopter squadron deploys with a battalion landing team from the 3d Marines every six months for a normal WestPac stint as augmentation for the III Marine Amphibious Force, headquartered on Okinawa.

Tom Berry, MAG-24's aircraft maintenance management officer says, "When you come right down to it, due to the complex nature of MAG-24, we're doing the work of two groups."

1st Lt Gebaide offered more insight when he explained, "A normal group can get by with one engine test cell. I can't because of the mix of different types of engines. I need more than just one cell and five different stands to test our engines. And since we have so many different types of aircraft, we also have need of more civilian technical representatives with our group."

men B of MATCS-18 is part of MACS-2.

CWO-2 Thomas Zarnier, officer in charge of the detachment, observed how the mix of both fixed and rotary wing aircraft impacts on his personnel and their jobs.

**HE EXPLAINED** that when his troops go to the field with the infantry, they must develop aircraft approaches. In his words, "These are pre-planned penetrations of our own air space, or arrivals proceeding to a terminal area. Because of the different characteristics of the aircraft, we have to develop that mix and coordinate it. The time differential between two helicopters is going to be different than for a jet following a helicopter. Because of the helicopter's unique capabilities, they must be handled differently. For instance, jets have a long roll before they stop, whereas helicopters normally use a very short roll. And in the case of Hueys, they must air taxi to the terminal area. All this has to be considered."

ship between the MAG and the 3d Marines, Col Ferdinand replied, "I think that this close working relationship has provided an arena in which we in aviation have been able to learn more about the capabilities and/or limitations of our ground counterparts and at the same time, they, through our joint planning sessions and joint Marine Corps Combat Readiness Evaluation system evolutions, have been able to become more aware of our capabilities, as well as our limitations."

**AS ONE DELVES** further and further into the daily operations of the group, it becomes readily apparent that an awesome amount of teamwork is necessary just to maintain aviation operations. Coupled with the very close working relationships MAG-24 maintains with the ground element—the 3d Marines—it becomes even more evident that teamwork is not just some overworked cliché, but rather a very real keystone in the creation of a cohesive air/ground team.

**THE LOGISTICAL** support for the group could be a nightmare for any aviation supply officer, with the increased store of necessary parts to keep the aircraft flying. With two different types of fixed wing aircraft, it might not seem too complicated, but when you add three different helicopter types to the recipe, you can almost envision the geometrical progression that must surely follow one. The people who know will tell you that it takes about two and a half times the normal amount of parts necessary to operate a group consisting of fixed wing only, or rotary wing only aircraft.

Another unique aspect of the group is the fact that is assigned to it, a detachment of Marine Air Traffic Control Squadron-18. Detach-

**AN INTERESTING** metamorphosis takes place when a medium helicopter squadron becomes a composite squadron. The deploying squadron becomes a composite squadron. The deploying squadron is augmented by CH-53 Sea Stallions and UH-1N Hueys from HMH-463. However, if you scratch the surface, you discover that the Hueys are actually a detachment from HML-367, homebased on Okinawa. Further augmentation comes in the form of AH-1J Cobra gunships. And where do they come from? Why, from HMA-169 of course, traveling a long way from their home at Camp Pendleton to provide an added aerial punch to the air/ground team. One almost needs a scorecard to keep track of the players.

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# Eagle, globe and anchor symbolize fighting force

The late MajGen Smedley Butler once wrote: "I selected an enormous Marine Corps emblem to be tattooed across my chest. It required several sittings and hurt me like the devil, but the finished product was worth the pain. I blazed triumphantly forth, a Marine from throat to waist. The emblem is still with me. Nothing on earth, but skinning, will remove it."

Butler, then a lieutenant, spoke somewhat too soon. Less than a year after the tattooing, while assaulting the Tartar Wall in Peking, China, a Chinese bullet ripped off part of his emblem.

Forty years later the remainder of his tattoo was laid to rest with him.

the Corps entered new years. How ever, in 1868, Zeilin decided the emblem should be more elite. Once again, another British device was borrowed; the globe.

The globe was bestowed on the Royal Marines in 1827 by King George IV. He contended it was too great a task to relate all the accolades of Marines on the Corps' color. He proclaimed, "The great globe itself is to be their honor, for Marines have earned honors everywhere."

holding a scroll in its beak. Semper fidelis, the Corps' motto, is inscribed on the scroll. Scarlet and blue are the background colors and the words Department of the Navy and United States Marine Corps are in the background.

Besides emblems and seals, military services are also recognized by their colors. The colors scarlet and gold have been associated with Marines for many years.

Gen John Lejeune, the Corps' 13th Commandant, officially recognized these colors as the Marine Corps' own. Today, the scarlet and gold is seen throughout the Corps on signboards, pouches and auto tags.

The globe and anchor is the most prominent insignia Marines have, but the Corps' colors and seal are no less important. Together they distinguish Marines as the most elite fighting force in the world.

Besides emblems and seals, military services are also recognized by their colors. The colors scarlet and gold have been associated with Marines for many years.

Gen John Lejeune, the Corps' 13th Commandant, officially recognized these colors as the Marine Corps' own. Today, the scarlet and gold is seen throughout the Corps on signboards, pouches and auto tags.
