## Assault shatters air station

Chief Ordnanceman John William Finn, on watch Dec. 7, 1941, stood waiting for the return of a patrol bomber flight he had helped launch earlier that morning.

Just before 8 a.m. he, like many others here, heard the drone of approaching aircraft. Eyes strained to see the low-flying craft that were hidden behind Kansas Tower and the North Beach sand dunes.

**BUT IT WASN'T** his familiar planes returning home. Japanese fighter planes and dive bombers swooped down on the unsuspecting air station, giving birth to what President Franklin Roosevelt called the "Day of Infamy."

Lt. Fusata Iida, a 28-year-old fighter pilot in the Imperial Japanese Navy, toasted the Rising Sun Flag, climbed into the cockpit of his Zero and roared from the flight deck of carrier Soryu.

The lieutenant, a short handsome man with a glowing personality and quick wit, was in command of the Third Air Control Group whose target for the morning's attack was Mokapu Peninsula, the Kaneohe Naval Air Station.

As his flight sped low over the waves, little did Iida realize that his earlier toast, and this flight, would be his last. He had, in fact, about one hour to live.

**HIS LIFE HAD** been fast-lived, however. He had survived three years of aerial combat in China plus the rigors imposed on a popular and hard-drinking squadron leader.

While miles out at sea, he spotted the landmark for which he was searching, the land mass of Ulupau Crater and Kansas Tower.

Iida led his squadron of Zero aircraft down to the tops of the churning whitecaps and sped to the shore of North Beach for what he knew would be a surprise attack.

The attack was not unexpected, but warning of it went unheeded. A few miles north of the air station, at Kahuku Point, Army Privates

Joseph Lockard and George Elliott of the 55th Signal Aircraft Warning Service were manning a radar station.

**RADAR WAS** a new experiment for the military, and several such centers were in operation on Oahu at the time. There was one on operation high atop Ulupau Crater. On Dec. 7, 1941, Hawaii had 50 Army posts and 26 naval reservations. On Mount Kaala, highest point of Oahu, was one of several radar stations which were established in remote areas. All of these required new access roads which presented major construction problems.

At Kaala, as well as the Kaena Point and Ulupau Head, the extreme inaccessibility of the sites required the installation of steel cableways to carry men and materials to the stations.

Suddenly the privates sprang forward, staring at the dancing impulse on their scope. Lockard thought at first that something was wrong with the instruments, but, after checking it, he knew that the signal meant approaching aircraft.

**THE TWO BEGAN** plotting the nearing flight of airplanes. They began the known course at 136 miles out. When it closed to 132 miles, they called their information center.

The officer on duty, Lt. Kermit Tyler, told them not to worry about it, that it was a flight of B-17 bombers from California expected to land at Hickam shortly after 8 a.m.

It was 7:15 a.m., and Kaneohe Bay had only begun to rise from slumber on a tropical Sunday morning.

Iida nosed his Zero up over the dunes of North Beach and sighted in on the temporary structure silhouetted on top. He touched the button causing his machineguns to chatter a staccato rhythm, sounding for possibly the first time, Japanese war drums of World War II in the Pacific.

Kaneohe Naval Air Station was

under attack between 7:45 and 7:50 a.m. It is believed that Pearl Harbor bound aircraft arrived over " Battleship Row " a few minutes later.

**AS IIDA PULLED** up over the top of Puu Hawaii-Loa crater, a lone Marine sentry fired at the departing Zeroes with his Springfield 03. Though not an effective anti-aircraft measure, it was a determined one. The sentry had received a minor flesh wound, probably from a ricochet, and was firing in retaliation.

The Japanese attackers continued across the peninsula with guns blazing. Fires began to burst from buildings hit with incendiary ammunition. The planes then circled and began their deadly bomb runs.

For 10 minutes the 12 attackers swooped over the dazed air station. The defenders were unable to launch a single plane against them.

The first targets were the big patrol aircraft moored in the waters of Kaneohe Bay.

Following the attack, the damage inflicted by the invaders totaled 27 of 36 planes destroyed and six others damaged; only three Catalinas out on patrol that morning escaped destruction. The Japanese had racked a near total success.

**A STUNNED** Kaneohe began to recover from the initial shock of the first onslaught. By the end of the attack, anti-aircraft measures were functioning and fire apparatus was attempting to control the blazing aircraft. As yet, no building had suffered larger hits than that of machinegun bullets.

After some 15 minutes, the attackers drew off to the north. All but one, that is, Iida's Zero had suffered direct hits from angry Kaneohe guns. Bullets had cut into his fuel tanks and gasoline spurted out in a long white spray. As his crippled plane dropped from the sky, Iida must have remembered the advice he had so often given to

his men. He had repeated it earlier that morning:

"The most important thing for a soldier who is a samurai is his determination. If, for instance, I should receive fatal damage to my fuel tank, I would aim my plane to effect the greatest destruction and, without thought of survival, would throw myself into the target."

**TRUE TO HIS** samurai code, Iida now signaled his group to disband formation, pointing first to himself and then to the ground to make clear his intention. Then he plunged earthward with guns ablazing.

During a pilot's debriefing session later that morning aboard the Soryu, Lt. Iyozo Fujita related that, "The last I saw of Iida was when he began his crash dive, his plane hurtling straight downward into a flaming hangar on Kaneohe Air Base."

It was not a hangar that Iida hit. His crippled Zero slammed into the side of Kansas Tower, near the present location of the Child Care Center.

A lull was sustained for about 25 minutes before the second attack commenced. During the lull, Kaneohe sprang to life.

Among the casualties that continued to pour in was Aviation Chief Ordnanceman John Finn, carried on a stretcher.

Later, Finn received the Medal of Honor for his part in defending against the first attack on Kaneohe Bay.

Seeing the first planes rise over Kansas Tower, Finn had jumped into action in a Lewis machinegun position and began returning fire on the Japanese attackers.

His citation read: "For extraordinary heroism, distinguished service and devotion above and beyond the call of duty. During the first attack by Japanese airplanes on the Naval Air Station at Kaneohe Bay, Honolulu, Territory of Hawaii, on December 7, 1941, he promptly secured and manned a machinegun mounted on an instruction stand in a completely exposed section of a parking ramp, which was under heavy enemy strafing fire.

"**ALTHOUGH** painfully wounded many times, he continued to man his gun and return the enemy fire vigorously, and with telling effect throughout the enemy strafing and bombing attack and with complete disregard for his own personal safety.

"It was only by specific orders that he was persuaded to leave his post to seek medical attention. Following first aid treatment, although obviously suffering much pain and moving with great difficulty, he returned to the squadron area and actively supervised the re-arming of returning planes, specifically the three that returned from an early morning patrol. His extraordinary heroism and conduct in this action are considered to be in accord with the highest traditions of the Naval Service."

## Runways

### Restrictions prohibit pedestrian travel

Illegal pedestrian travel across the Mokapu Road runway crossing at MCAS Kaneohe Bay has prompted the Provost Marshal's Office to inform personnel aboard the air station of the rules and regulations.

**ACCORDING TO** Station Order 5500.6 concerning traffic in airfield operation areas, pedestrians are prohibited from crossing runways at any point. Bicycling across the runway using Mokapu Road is permitted, provided that no stops are made before reaching the other side.

Capt Vincent Norako Jr., assistant operations officer, Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron, noted, "Our major problems are with pedestrians, joggers and beachgoers who travel across the road which intersects the runway.

"This is an extremely dangerous area for the pilot as well as the pedestrian." He continued, "We try to be reasonable, but it has gotten to the point where we just can't tolerate this type of negligence any more. In the interest of safety for everyone, we will simply turn violators over to the military police when pedestrians are sighted from the control tower."

Marines found in violation of the written order will have their names entered into the PMO Incident Report, and their unit commander will be notified. Violators are subject to possible nonjudicial punishment at the discretion of the unit commanders. Dependents caught in the act are subject to fine and/or jail sentence under the U.S. Penal Code.

**NO VEHICLES** are allowed on the runways or taxiways, except emergency vehicles and ordinance

vehicles traveling in the performance of their operational duties.

The helicopter landing pad and aircraft parking areas are restricted to line maintenance vehicles and vehicles required for flight operations.

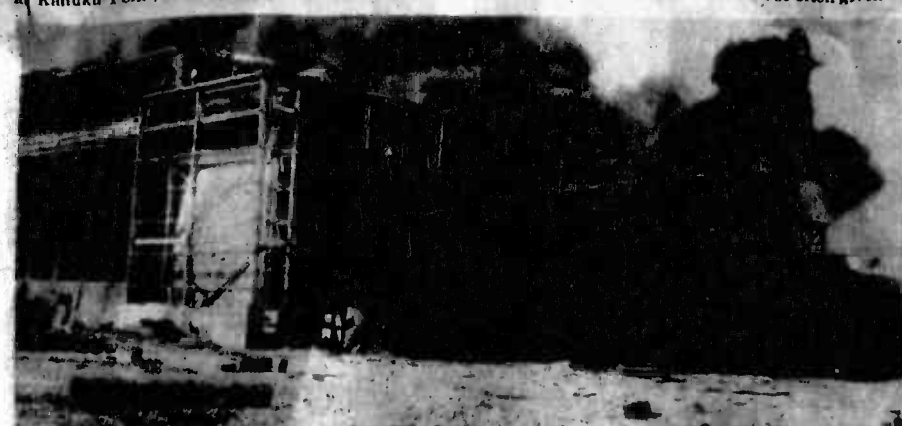
In the event that access to the runway or taxiway are required by facilities department vehicles, clearance will be obtained from Airfield Operations and personnel and vehicles will be escorted by radio equipped vehicles to the designated area.

**ALL VEHICLES**, except yellow emergency vehicles, having a requirement to proceed onto the runways or taxiways must display the checkered flag with red and white colors provided by Airfield Operations.

Emergency vehicles granted clearance on runs to areas that require crossing runways will cross only at Mokapu Road unless radio clearance has been provided by the Air Traffic Control tower to cross in other areas. In no case will such vehicles cross the runway in disregard of the red traffic light at the crossing without prior clearance.

**WHEN IT IS** necessary to cross runways or taxiways under positive control of Airfield Operations personnel, every precaution will be taken to avoid running over runway or taxiway lights. Taxing or towed aircraft always have right of way. Strict attention and obedience to the traffic control lights is required.

Expect in response to bona fide emergencies, all vehicles operating in the airfield area will limit speed to 10 miles per hour, with the exception of designated crossing areas.

## Marine searches for lost memory

Buried somewhere in the battle debris of the Vietnam War are 28 months that belonged to Otis L. McCain Jr. of Winston-Salem, N.C., once a Marine lance corporal.

McCain is alive, but is confined to a wheelchair, 100 percent disabled. His memory of Vietnam is lost.

If 28 months in the life of 33-year-old McCain are to be salvaged, the task must fall on his Marine buddies. However, McCain cannot remember those friends, nor when he met them.

Their faces and voices vanished that day in October 1967 when steel ripped into McCain's head and ended his war. It was his 17th day in Vietnam.

Lost to him that day was any recollection of service in the Marine Corps. He remembers no person, place or event between March 1966 and July 1968.

Parris Island boot camp draws a blank. So does Camp Pendleton, where he was assigned to an 81 mm mortar platoon with the 27th Marines, 5th Marine Division. He falls to

recall his trip to Vietnam as a replacement. McCain has his service records, papers that reflect dates and places. They verify his Purple Heart and his unit citation. But can they replace the experience and the comradeship of a Marine Corps hitch? No amount of paperwork, no quantity of medals, can fill such a void.

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# Debts

## Law protects individuals from collection harassment

Harassment of individual Marines by bill collectors has been a common practice of certain local businesses. Although harassment is annoying, it can be particularly serious if the bill

collector visits or calls a Marine's commanding officer in an attempt to pressure the Marine into paying. This practice not only takes time away from the commanding officer, but may ruin the

reputation of the Marine involved.

**WHILE NO ONE** should purposely fail to pay just debts, Marines should know that Congress has acted to prevent some of the undesirable actions used by debt collectors.

signed into law by President Carter in 1978, contains several provisions that should help end harassment.

**UNDER THE LAW,** bill collectors are not permitted to contact third parties, including employers such as

commanding officers, other than to request the identity and location of the individual who allegedly owes the debt.

The bill collector cannot tell the third party that the individual owes any debt or contact any third party more than once, except to correct or supplement information previously received.

In contacting the individual debtor, bill collectors cannot call any time after 8 p.m., or before 9 a.m. If the individual debtor has an attorney, the bill collector must contact the attorney rather than the individual. Bill collectors are also prohibited from calling places of employment if the employer prohibits receiving debt collection communications on the job.

If an individual informs a debt collector in writing that he refuses to pay a debt or

that he wishes not to be contacted further by the collector, the collector is forbidden to contact that individual again. The only exceptions are in cases where the collector has advised him that he is likely to, or intends to use some remedy, such as a law suit.

**HARASSING** or threatening conduct, use of obscene language or repeated telephone calls intended to annoy or scare debtors are forbidden. False or misleading misrepresentation of the business of the debt collector or of any remedies which might be involved are also forbidden.

**VICTIMS OF** unfair treatment or who are continually harassed by bill collectors should contact their legal assistance officer to see whether this protection applies.

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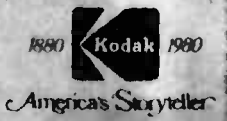
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# At a glance

Nevertheless, the regs governing uniform and civilian clothing worn by Marines and sailors (on and off base) and their families (on base) are blatantly ignored.

Uniform violations will eventually take care of themselves since we're bound to run into someone during the course of a day who will know the regs and straighten us out. It's the liberty attire that goes unquestioned.

People belonging directly or indirectly to MCAS Kaneohe Bay are frequently seen on and off station in clothing that is prohibited. Nine out of 10 times they have never been or never will be approached by peers or seniors about their clothing. And absolutely no one in the civilian community will say anything to them.

However, they will talk to each other about us.

**IF THERE'S** any doubt we are Marines 24 hours a day, pick up a local newspaper and read it. We're judged by our actions and appearances in and out of uniform.

The bigshots say that pride in the uniform is traditional in the Naval Service and the same high standards are expected when military personnel wear civilian clothes. Perhaps this is why we have all these regulations.

Listing all the uniform regulations is as impractical as listing all the violations, but a few of both should definitely be pointed out.

A frequent violation is the absence of upper garments. Naturally men are more prone to this one. In speaking of a Marine in a cut off t-shirt, one woman said, "When I see men in t-shirts cut off so that half their chest shows, I don't think it looks great or try to see how many hairs there are, I think it's in poor taste."

**NOT ONLY** is it in poor taste, it is unauthorized!

Station regulations state explicitly that in the shirt category, any civilian shirt without eccentric alterations may be worn. Eccentric alterations include, but are not limited to: those cut off at the chest; those printed with obscene words, gestures or drawings; those defaming the American flag; and those exhibiting disrespect to the Marine Corps.

Bare feet seem to be the next rule most violated by men.

Women, on the other hand, tend to lean more toward the "abnormally tight or extremely revealing" violations.

Although the braless look is accepted worldwide (still banned in Boston) some women trapse around the air station and in town in garments so revealing that the slightest movement is grounds for indecent exposure.

They are the same women who feel male Marines don't respect them, or yell sexual harassment.

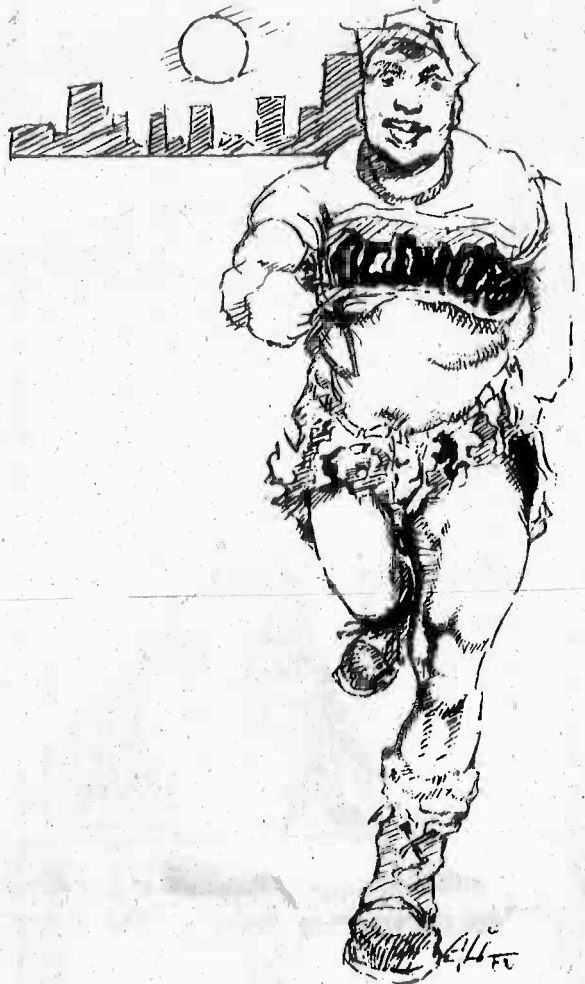
**ANOTHER PRIME** candidate for violation by women is the "hair curlers in unauthorized areas" rule. The uniform board has gone to great expense to inform

us of these regulations, all of which can be found in Marine Corps Order P1020.34C.

MCAS Marines and sailors are more fortunate than those on most military installations in that we are allowed to wear "aloha attire" which, by-the-way, is also regulated.

The commanders of the 1st Marine Brigade and the air station have gone a step further to dispel the "Nobody can tell me what to wear on my off-duty time" myth. They've broken the Marine Corps Order into simpler terms, which can be found in Station Order 1020.4.

All we have to do is read and heed them.

# Pearl Harbor

## Japan blitzes U.S. Pacific Fleet through surprise air raid

"We will not only defend ourselves to the utmost, but will make it very certain that this form of treachery shall never endanger us again... We shall gain the inevitable triumph—So help us God, I ask that Congress declare a state of war."

WITH THESE words on the morning of Dec. 8, 1941, President Franklin Roosevelt set America firmly on the path of history. His request was the ultimate call to arms for an angry nation eager to plunge into World War II.

The sleeping giant

had awakened. Roosevelt's request for a declaration of war was actually a response to a decision that had already been made on the previous day. The combined naval and air forces of Japan had launched a surprise attack on the United States Pacific Fleet as it lay berthed in the waters of Pearl Harbor. Sunday marks the 39th anniversary of that stunning event.

THE ATTACK, while imperfect in execution, was devastating in its effect. When the final Japanese plane departed

Oahu that morning it left in its wake 2,403 dead. Most of these were lost when the USS Arizona blew up and 18 warships either sunk or were badly damaged.

The stage for the Pearl Harbor assault was set nearly two years before its execution. American and Japanese relations had become strained when Japan, in its quest for new conquests, began a program of southern expansion.

The U.S. responded to that ambition by accelerating its naval program and cutting off both metal and petroleum shipments to Japan. The Japanese, wary of the U.S. naval buildup, determined to engage this country in a decisive naval battle to secure their seagoing superiority.

That determination ultimately led to Pearl Harbor.

IT BEGAN on a typically sleepy Sunday morning on the island of Oahu. Residents were just rising to a new day when the lush tropical stillness was terribly shattered by the screaming roar of Japanese fighter planes. Dive bombers and zeroes converged on Pearl Harbor and the numerous airfields

on Oahu, including what was then Naval Air Station, Kaneohe Bay. The hour was 7:55 a.m. The "Day of Infamy" had arrived.

The attack at Pearl Harbor came in two waves and lasted one hour and 50 minutes. By noon Pearl Harbor was blanketed in dense oily smoke rising from the burning and badly crippled Pacific Fleet. A total of 188 U.S. aircraft were demolished. The airfields at Kaneohe and Ewa lost 81 of their 82 aircraft.

HEROISM WAS the watchword for both military and civilians as they teamed up to try and fight back while reeling from the sudden onslaught. A Kaneohe-based sailor named Chief Petty Officer John Finn became the first World War II recipient of the Medal of Honor for his display of resiliency, courage and leadership under fire.

The list of casualties was a register of grim statistics. The Navy suffered 2,008 men killed and 710 wounded; the Army lost 218 men with 364 wounded and the Marine Corps lost 109 killed, 69 wounded. The civilian death toll reached 65, with 35 wounded.

Of almost equal seriousness was the great number of important U.S. warships destroyed or badly damaged. Total ship losses were the Arizona, which sank when her forward magazine exploded; the Oklahoma, which capsized after being hit; the target ship Utah and two destroyers, the Cassin and the Downes, both of which were damaged beyond repair.

DESPITE THIS shattering blow to U.S. Naval resources, there was some luck on America's side that day.

For example, none of the Pacific Fleet's three carriers were in port during the assault. The Enterprise was enroute to Pearl Harbor from Wake Island, the Lexington was ferrying planes to Midway and the Saratoga was on the West Coast undergoing repairs.

The Japanese planners also made a grievous error by failing to destroy the surface oil tanks visible around the harbor, and by ignoring the many machine shops in the vicinity. Despite clearly winning the opening round, the Japanese allowed the ultimate victory to slip away.

Then, like all great champions, the U.S. regrouped, vigorously refusing to stay down for the count.

The Japanese made another mistake by letting their quick victory grow into overconfidence. As many of our earlier foes had done they made the error of underestimating American tenacity.

THEIR cockiness left them unprepared for the stunning reversal that would occur six months later as the Japanese Imperial Navy lost four of her precious aircraft carriers. The long road back had begun.

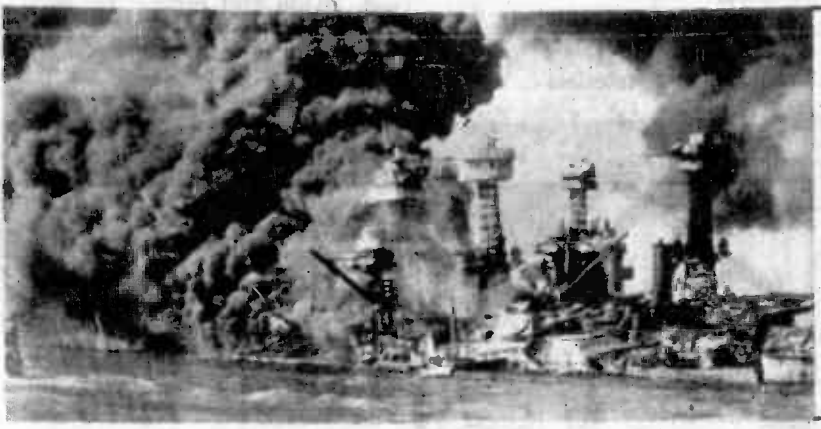
By 1944 the Japanese fleet was completely shattered, reduced to little more than a token navy. The following year it was over.

Perhaps the greatest legacy left by the events at Pearl Harbor nearly 40 years ago can be best explained with a quotation from A.J. Barker's book entitled "Pearl Harbor."

"PEARL HARBOR remains an imperative lesson in war, even in an age of nuclear power. Its lesson is one of history's bitter truths: that the unexpected can happen—and often does."

## Air station assault

It is possible that he accounted for the hits on Iida's downed Zero.

**SAILORS NOW** swarmed over the runway and around the burning amphibians. But there was little they could do for the crippled aircraft. They knew, though, that there was something they could do for themselves.

During the first attack white uniforms were quite conspicuous to the enemy. According to an eyewitness, large mess hall pots were set boiling over open fires during the lull between the first and second phases of the attack. Into these pots were tossed white uniforms, to be dyed a brownish-thick color. Men stripped, waited while their whites were dyed, then donned them to return to the fight.

The drone of heavy bombers continued to sound over the air station, but they did not attack further. They were continuing over the Koolau Mountains, bound for Hickam and Pearl Harbor.

**THEN, NEARLY** a half-hour later, another squadron of dive bombers appeared overhead. They began their attack by steep dives during which they raked everything in their path. This time, they loosed 100-pound bombs on remaining aircraft and hangars at Kaneohe Bay.

Hangar Number One (now hangar 102) received a direct hit and crumpled under the force of the explosion.

Four aircraft inside were destroyed.

Most of the casualties on the air station occurred during the second attack. Bomb fragments accounted for a high percentage of those wounded and dead.

But the Kaneohe defenders fought back. More machineguns were rigged on the damaged aircraft and on temporary mounts. They took a toll among the attackers. One plane was seen to have crashed into Kailua Bay; another went down in the water off Pyramid Rock; still another crashed into the sea off North Beach.

**AFTER ABOUT** 15 minutes, the attackers wheeled about and disappeared over the North Beach sand dunes, seeking the safety of the carrier some 200 miles off Oahu.

As the enemy departed, the station set about licking its war wounds. Fires were brought under control and the dead and wounded were removed to the dispensary. Women and children were evacuated to the Kailua School.

As the battle raged at Kaneohe Bay, one Catalina launched from here earlier that morning, possibly had the first visual contact with the enemy.

Just off Pearl Harbor on routine patrol, the pilot of an aircraft spotted an unidentified submarine. He radioed

the nearby destroyer, USS Ward. The plane circled the area and watched the submarine minutes later.

**WHILE IT WAS** subsequently established that the submarine was part of the reconnaissance group of the Japanese task force attacking Pearl Harbor, the initial report of the action sent high ranking Naval leaders here and at Pearl Harbor into consternation. Popular belief was that the Kaneohe patrol unit and the Ward had acted hastily and that the sub was American.

The submarine incident was under discussion at the air station an hour later when Iida arrived over North Beach in his Zero.

American casualties for the day included 20 dead, scores wounded and 27 aircraft destroyed. For the Japanese, one was known dead; possibly three others were down in the surrounding waters off the air station.

Another casualty figure was recorded that day. At the government bird farm, cages and pens were broken open by bomb blasts and machine gunfire. About 15,000 pheasants and other game birds were casualties of the attack. The remaining birds, about 9,000, were quickly gathered, slaughtered and put on the food market to relieve an anticipated food shortage. The bird farm was abandoned later in the month after

operating nearly 20 years.

December 8th was a day of gloom for the survivors of the previous day's attack.

**IN THE COOL**, precise phrasing of an official report of the Japanese attack were the words.

"At about 4 p.m. Monday the dead were buried in a temporary grave in the sand dunes with appropriate ceremonies."

It was a day of grief for Mrs. Grace Watson who stood in the quickly prepared graveyard in the sand dunes of Heleloa. It had been centuries since Heleloa had received the bodies of warriors fallen in battle. Dec. 8, 1941, 20 warriors received final respects.

Aviation Machinist Mate First Class Raphael A. Watson had been on duty with Chief Finn the previous morning. He had fallen in a deadly hail of machinegun bullets from the strafing aircraft.

At 20 minutes to eight, before the attack, Mrs. Watson had gone to pick up her husband who was to be off duty at 8 a.m. The world around her exploded. The attack had begun. She didn't see her husband that day. At about 9:30 a.m., all civilians were evacuated from the station.

**AS NAVY** chaplains presided over the fallen Navy men, Mrs. Watson stood in disbelief with countless others, as their loved ones were laid to rest.

In a singlerow facing the sea, lay the bodies of: Ensigns R.S. Foss, L. Fox, Jr., J.G. Smartt and R.W. Uhlmann; Petty Officers 3rd Class W.S. Brown, J.D. Buckley, M.A. Manning, L.G. Newman, R.K. Porterfield; Petty Officers 2nd Class G.W. Ingram, C. Lawrence, C.W. Otterstetter and J.H. Robinson; Petty Officers 1st Class S.D. Dorick, C.M. Formoe, B.T. Griffen, L.D. Weaver, I. Lee and Mrs. Watson's husband, Raphael.

One other grave was in the enclosed cemetery. There alone, thousands of miles from his land of the Rising Sun, lay Imperial Navy Pilot Fusata Iida.

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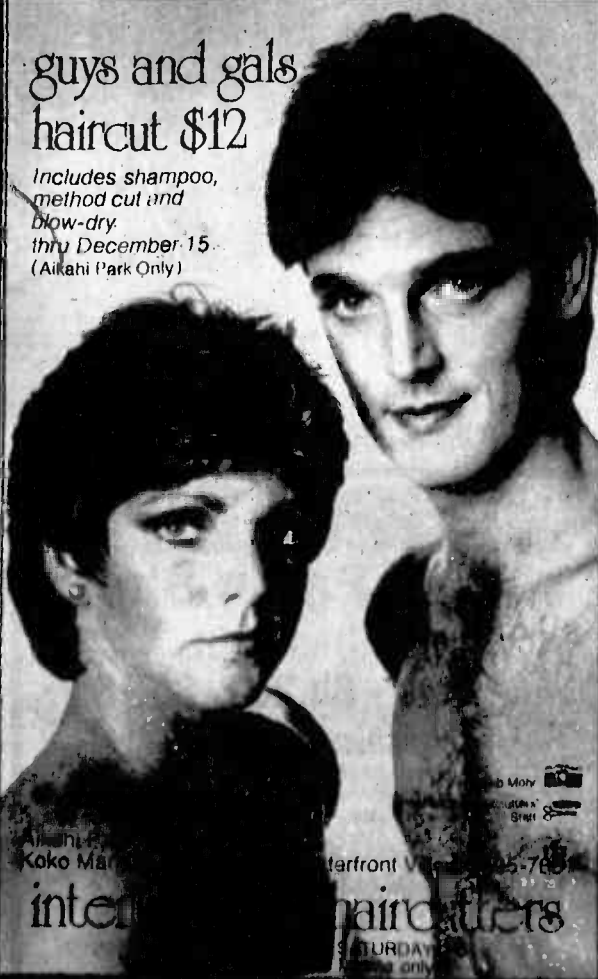
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# Marines bear English phrase

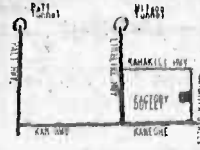
"HE TELLS of a miraculous fish that foretells its element and flies like a bird over the water."

## Inventor Patents Fuel Saver

HONOLULU — The Los Angeles Herald Examiner reported that United States Patents have now been issued to Wm. Trevaskis, California veteran electrical engineer, for his Vapor-Jet brand water vapor injector.

Trevaskis has developed what amounts to a 20 cents per gallon "rebate" on gasoline, by designing a low-cost injector for automobiles, light trucks, and recreational vehicles.

The Vapor-Jet system has survived stringent testing by a certified independent automotive testing laboratory. Test results showed miles per gallon improvements of 17.3 per cent on Trevaskis' 1971 Galaxie.

# Safety

Christmas Day is approaching and by now many families have found those perfect Christmas trees to decorate their homes in the spirit of the season. However, holiday decor can sometimes lead to serious disasters during this joyous season.

**SHOULD FIRE** break out in your home, get everybody out of the house, then call the fire department. Then and only then, should you apply "first aid" with a fire extinguisher. Only attempt to extinguish the fire if it's small and your escape route is clear.

Fire extinguishers are categorized by the

kind of fires they extinguish. Class A extinguishers can combat fires of combustible materials like paper, wood, cloth and some plastic materials.

Class B extinguishers battle flaming liquids, gas and greases, such as cooking grease. Class C extinguishers battle electrical fires.

For all-purpose home fire protection, look for an extinguisher marked 2-A:10-B:C. This code indicates the extinguisher is adequate for small home fires that the resident might attempt to fight before calling the fire department.

**FIRE** extinguishers

generally cost \$10 and up, according to size. The larger ones include pressure gauges that allow you to check to ensure they are ready for use. Operating instructions should be clearly marked on the extinguisher. Be sure to read them before a crisis strikes.

Smoke can be a real killer. A majority of fatal home fires take place between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. Eighty percent of fire deaths are caused by smoke and noxious gases, not from flames. Be sure your family sleeps with the bedroom doors closed. Closed doors may allow extra seconds for escape.

**A SMOKE** detector, properly installed between the bedroom area and the rest of the house, can provide enough warning of a fire to save lives and property. They cost approximately \$35 and can be purchased at MCAS Kaneohe Bay, and can be either photocell or ionization.

Photocell detectors emit a photoelectric beam of light that sets up an electric current within the detector. When the light is obscured by smoke, the alarm goes off.

These detectors have a small light bulb that has to be replaced every three to five years. They're less likely to give false alarms from cooking or smoking in confined areas and operate on house current.

**IONIZATION** smoke detectors use a radioactive source to emit electrically charged molecules into the air, producing an electric current within the detector chamber. When smoke enters the chamber the electric current is reduced, and the alarm is triggered.

This type of smoke detector has no parts that need replacing and can work on either house current or batteries. The battery-operated models can work during power outages, however the batteries must be in good condition in order for the device to be effective. If you prefer the battery-operated model, it would be to your advantage to purchase one with a monitor to indicate battery strength.

No matter which kind you prefer, be it ionization or photocell detectors, make sure it has an underwriter's laboratory label.

**IT IS ALSO** a good idea to practice at least two fire escape plans with your family. Try one route going through the house, and another through windows or other exits.

If your plan of escape includes the use of a ladder, remember that it takes agility which can only be acquired through practice.

An occasional fire drill is a good idea. Simply select a spot outside the house as a prearranged meeting place in case of fire. Should a fire occur, practice will prevent the temptation to dash into one side of the house attempting to save someone who has already escaped from the other side.

**OVER ONE** third of the nation's fire casualties are children. Often, in the confusion of an outbreak of fire, children are trapped in their rooms, cut off from help or unaware of the need to be rescued. In such situations, precious minutes can be

saved if firemen can identify quickly the location where children are sleeping. Tot finder decals placed on the exterior windows of a child's or handicapped person's room and on the bottom of the bedroom door facing the hallway can save time and lives.

Call the fire department for more information on the tot finder decal. Local fire departments provide more than traditional fire-fighting services. They support fire prevention as well.

**A FIRE** inspector can be requested to inspect your premises for fire hazards and help you develop an escape plan. These services are usually free and truly valuable.

Remember, during the Christmas season or any time of the year, there is no such thing as a fireproof home. The best protection against fire is prevention. Take a security walk around your home and try to spot possible dangers. Create a good

escape plan that is understood and rehearsed by your family and place a smoke detector between sleeping areas and the rest of the house.

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# Illegal firearms lead to trouble

"Ignorance of the law is no excuse." While this may be an old cliché, it is true nonetheless. If you own a firearm, and it is unregistered or stored in your car, barracks or home, you may unwittingly be a criminal. There is some information about illegal firearms.

According to Station Order P5500.6A the following rules apply for the possession of firearms on MCAS Kaneohe Bay. Prohibited firearms are those which are prohibited by the National Firearms Act or Federal Firearms Act. They include shotguns and rifles

with barrels less than 18 inches long; weapons made from shotguns or rifles if the overall length is less than 26 inches; machine guns or automatic weapons; mufflers or silencers for any firearm; firearms with a bore over one-half inch.

Hawaii state law requires any weapon that can be concealed upon the person to be unloaded, encased and inaccessible to the operator when in a vehicle.

In accordance with Station Order P3591.7G privately owned firearms, such as rifles, pistols, air rifles and

pistols, BB guns, pen flares and similar items will not be discharged aboard the station, except on ranges.

Prior to importing weapons, including war souvenirs, from outside the United States, information should be obtained from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

Persons residing in family housing may store firearms in their homes if they are registered with PMO and if required, the Honolulu Police Department. Such firearms will be inaccessible to

children at all times, or disassembled.

Firearms should be stored in unit armories, bank safe deposit boxes or other safe places, if the house will be vacant for more than a week. The order stresses that firearms and ammunition

will not be kept in barracks including those quarters assigned to officers and staff noncommissioned officers.

All firearms brought or stored aboard the station (except shotguns for use at the

Special Services skeet range in authorized competitive shooting for short periods) must be registered.

Applications for registering firearms aboard the station can be obtained from the Provost Marshal's Pass

and Identification Office. The application must be signed by the owner's commanding officer, who must grant permission to possess the weapon and authorize storage in the unit armory. Once the application

is completed, and a security screening has been conducted, the owner is issued a weapons permit. This permit must be carried any time the weapon is removed from the unit armory and carried about the station.

According to the Manual for Courts Martial, maximum punishment for possessing an illegal weapon is two years at hard labor and a dishonorable discharge.

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# Toys for Tots:

For the past 33 years the Marine Corps Reserve has sponsored the National "Toys-for-Tots" community action program. The idea of Toys for Tots is quite simple. It is a national campaign to brighten the Christmas season for as many needy children as possible.

**TOYS FOR TOTS** was conceived in 1947 by Marine Reserve

Maj Bill Hendricks, a public relations executive with Warner Brothers Studios in Burbank, Calif. What began as a local program to aid children who lost their fathers during World War II, soon expanded to the national campaign known today.

The first nationally distributed poster was designed and donated to the program by the late Walt Disney.

When the program went international in 1959, toys were given to the children who survived the typhoon-devastated Nagoya, Japan.

The first national celebrity chairman was Dennis Weaver of television's "McCloud" in 1973. He has since been succeeded by numerous celebrities.

**THIS YEAR** Jim Nabors, television's "Gomer Pyle," Todd

Bridges, Willie Jackson on NBC's "Diff'rent Strokes," and the Lollipop Dragon, a lovable character who is seen and heard via filmstrips in thousands of elementary classrooms, join forces to publicize the Toys for Tots campaign.

Toys for Tots campaigners collect millions of toys each year for underprivileged children. Hawaii's Marine Corps Reserve has collected, repaired and distributed new and slightly used toys to the needy children in the island community. More than 11,000 new toys were distributed last year.

This year's local campaign began when Governor George Ariyoshi proclaimed Nov. 16 Toys-for-Tots Day in Hawaii. He commented, "I urge my fellow citizens to share a bit of the fellowship they feel in their hearts during this very special and sacred time of year."

**NUMEROUS** events took place on the 16th at Kapiolani Park, including a Toys for Tots Fun Run, with an estimated 100 participants.

## Iron muscles

*Leatherneck smashes six Hawaii state powerlifting records*

CAMP H.M. SMITH, — Pumping 1,928 pounds of iron can be awfully tiring. But for 24-year-old Marine Sgt Jim Drapal, "It felt real good!" The Omaha, Neb., native broke six state records in the Hawaii State Powerlifting Championships held November 22 at the Nuuanu YMCA in Honolulu.

DRAPAL, of the camp comptroller section, competed in the 275-pound weight class and smashed the record in the squat with a lift of 700. He then shattered his own record with a lift of 733.

Drapal set the bench press record with a lift of 485, and the deadlift with 685 and 710 pounds. His total lift of 1,928 pounds broke the state record.

As a result, the 270-pound accounting technician was named the tournament's best lifter.

Drapal also brought with him two other Marines he had been training in the past six months.

Sgt Marion Dent of the motor transport section placed first in the 210-pound weight class by lifting a total of 1,554 pounds.

SSgt Bill Stevens of Special Services lifted a total of 1,460 pounds to place second in the 242-pound weight class.

Drapal, who has been

training for only two years, has captured 10 Hawaii state championships and two All-

Marine championships. He holds five All-Marine records and eight Hawaii state records. He is now one of the

top 10 lifters in his class in the world. His next step is "to enter the National Powerlifting Championships in Idaho and win that

one," he said.

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## Common sense complies with motorcycle codes

Motorcycles are a popular mode of transportation at military installations and the tropic Hawaiian weather is ideal for two-wheeled transportation.

But as time accumulates between the present and when they went through the mandatory motorcycle safety course offered at

Station Training, riders tend to forget some of the riding regulations. That loss of memory could be costly.

**TO REFRESH** those memories, the following guidelines are summarized from station regulations.

All riders and passengers must wear a helmet while on the air

station. The helmet must be approved and so indicated by a sticker from the State of Hawaii safety coordinator.

Eye protective shields or goggles of nonshatterable material must be worn by all persons riding cycles on station both day and night. Safety glasses can take the place of eye shields

if they are approved by the medical department. A windshield can satisfy this requirement provided it is of nonshatterable material and extends four inches above the rider's eye level. Sunglasses after sundown are not allowed.

Boots or closed toe shoes are the only permissible footwear. Sandals, flip-flops,

showers shoes and shoes that do not cover the entire foot are prohibited.

Although long sleeves and long legged pants are not required, they are advisable. Another vehicle could flip a rock or piece of road debris up that could cut exposed skin. Should the motorcycle wreck, the covering could

minimize dreaded "road rash."

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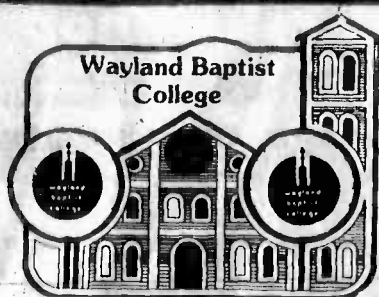

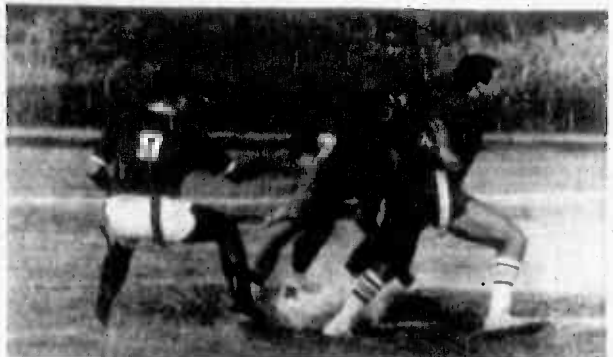

## Rick's Review

"The Odd Couple," written by Neil Simon, was presented by the Koolau Players at the MCAS Kaneohe Bay Officers' Club Saturday and Sunday nights and finished to standing ovations.

**THE PLAY** is about the strains placed on friendship when Felix Unger, portrayed by Capt. Harry Steever, is thrown out of his home by his wife and moves in with his best friend Oscar Madison, played by Lt. Col. David Delgault. The play's title is based on the contrast between their lifestyles. Felix is a fanatical cleaner, loves to cook and is allergic to dust. On the other hand, Oscar is sloppy and likes to eat out a lot.

Other cast members are the Friday night poker group: Speed (Sgt. Kevin Fillo), Murray (Ted Baker), Roy (Sgt. Tony Sandifer) and Vinnie (Cpl. Ron Campbell), and the neighboring Pigeon sisters Cecily (Audrey Hayes), a divorcee, and Gwendolyn (Peggy Graham) a widow.

The sisters are the subjects of an ill-fated double date. The evening is doomed from the start when Oscar gets home an hour late and Felix gives him the "nagging-wife" treatment. Then the girls arrive and, while Oscar is fixing drinks, Felix pours out the woes of his broken marriage. The trio ends up blubbering about their past misfortunes while supper burns.

**TYPE CASTING** for the performance seemed to be a strong factor in the presentation's success. Delgault appears in his second performance as Oscar. Undoubtedly the experience was helpful.

Steever makes his dramatic debut and was extremely promising. Throughout the performance Steever seemed comfortable and in control. The character transition from an hysterical man on the verge of suicide through his apartment-sharing with Oscar and finally to his resolve to

act with determination, is made with surprising smoothness.

Another standout of the evening was Ted Baker who portrayed Murray.

**REGRETABLELY**, Baker was not on stage a great deal. When he did appear, however, the audience was his. In Neil Simon's original theatre production, as well as in the movie and television series, Murray is a policeman who will never be nominated for Detective of the Year. Baker continued that tradition and brought the character to life.

The play was delightful. The audience found numerous occasions to share both laughter and compassion. Aiding in the viewers' enjoyment was the cast's obvious pleasure in performing.

"The Odd Couple," open to all ranks, will be presented again Friday and Saturday at the Officers' Club. The \$7 ticket price also covers a buffet dinner.

# Intelligence Brief

by Combat Intelligence Center

Since the close of the Vietnam era the U.S.S.R. has taken a long look at its military organizations. This Soviet revamping has resulted in major revision of their military map products. Because of this effort, the Soviets currently have extremely accurate information available to them.

The major difference between Soviet and U.S. map sheets is vegetation and relief.

The Soviet map distinguishes between coniferous and deciduous forests and show accurate transitional conditions of forest, brush and taiga (Siberian marshy pine forest), as well as swamp and semi-desert.

Swamps are designated by depth, type of covering area, surrounding vegetation, and the passability or trafficability. In desert areas 12 kinds of desert

surface are shown and water is labelled either drinkable or non-drinkable.

The most stunning feature depicted on a Soviet map is the small relief, which is very important to the soldier. Features such as hollows and rock piles, which offer cover and concealment under fire, are shown in detail.

A simple slope diagram printed in the margin permits an easy measurement of slopes with a pair of dividers,

or pencil and paper. By checking the spacing between contour lines a commander can determine a go, no-go condition for any kind of vehicle.

One of the disadvantages of a Soviet map sheet is the lack of printed legend.

Another, and for the Soviet soldier the

biggest disadvantage of all, is that all small and medium scale maps (1:25,000-1:250,000) are classified usually secret or higher.

The loss of a map is comparable to the loss of a personal weapon. It is punishable by imprisonment, or even death.

For some distorted security reason every city, village, mountain and street is slightly misplaced.

When the disadvantages are compounded, some Soviet units may not know where they are going, where they have been, or much less where they are!

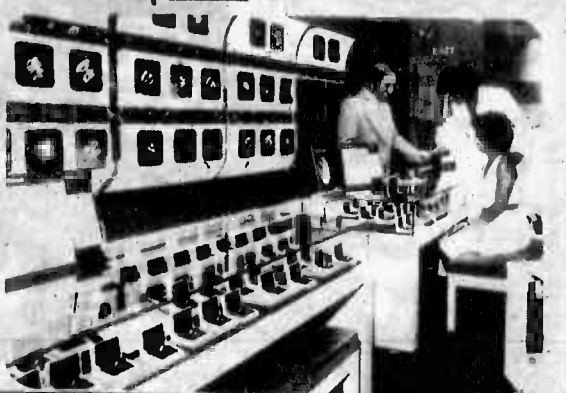

# Consumer's Choice

Food is big business. Because it's so expensive, the effective commissary shopper should learn to operate with the efficiency and savvy of a purchasing agent in the world of business.

Coupons are also big business. Promotions aimed at increasing sales. It is also good business for today's families trying to make ends meet.

By clipping coupons, people can cut down on the amount they normally spend on food.

Here are a few ways consumers can cut bills for groceries and other

household items by using coupons:

**MAKE AN** inventory of things you buy on a recurring basis. List them by product not brand. Examples are coffee, tea, cereal, margarine, soft drinks and detergents. Label envelopes for these products and file them in a box or drawer.

Start clipping and filing coupons for these items. Discard brands if you're really serious about saving money.

Buy the mid-week newspaper in which the large food ads appear, usually accompanied by coupons. In most cases, the total amount

collected in usable coupons will be worth more than the paper. The ads will also disclose which items are actually on sale for that week.

When one of your inventory items goes on sale, use the coupons you've filed away for that particular brand. If the item can be stored for some time, it is advisable to buy more than you normally would.

**Beware of** items marked simply "specials" or "cents off." These are usually customer lures that offer no real bargain. Additionally, the buyer

should determine exactly the amount marked off: an inflated price, a recently escalated price or the regular price.

Don't be penny wise and pound foolish. Driving from store to store may cost you more in gasoline than the worth of your coupons.

Fales economies also dictate the use of a 15-cent stamp to get a 20-cent refund on a mail-in coupon. It should be remembered that the envelope used to send the request costs money too.

The amount of time involved in coupon clipping and sales shopping is also a

budget factor, particularly for busy housewives and shoppers who work. With the high cost of food today, such shopping is usually worth the time, but for many shoppers, "time is money."

**MAKE COUPON** shopping easy on yourself. Organize your grocery basket so that coupon items can be found without having to rummage through already bagged groceries.

Last, but equally important, don't buy a product just to spend the coupon. If you don't need the item, you're not saving money.
