Pass in Review

Reenlistment bonus update

Marines with an expiration of active service date on or after Oct. 1, 1981 who meet reenlistment requirements and are bonus eligible, may now reenlist for a Selective Reenlistment Bonus.

In May 1981 Selective Reenlistment Bonuses were temporarily constrained to those Marines with an expiration of active service in Fiscal Year 1981.

Effective June 11, 1981 the portion of the May bulletin rescinding SRBP payments to Marines with FY 82 expiration of active service dates was rescinded and normal SRBP eligibility resumed.

Congress has recognized the positive impact of the current Marine Corps retention trend and supports Marine Corps efforts to retain additional career force personnel in selected skills. As a result, the necessary additional funds have been appropriated for FY 81.

Marines instructed to resubmit reenlistment documents when appropriate due to constraints contained in the May bulletin are encouraged to resubmit at this time. Marines with approved reenlistment requests which stipulate deferral of reenlistment until Oct. 1, 1981 are authorized immediate reenlistment within the normal guidelines according to Marine Corps Order 7220.24K and MCO P1040.31B. All permanent change of station orders issued in conjunction with reenlistment from May 5 to June 11, 1981 will not be modified.

CH-53E pilot requirements

The Marine Corps is in the process of staffing its first two CH-53E Squadrons, Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 464, MCAS New River, N.C. and HMH-465, MCAS Tustin, Calif. To meet programmed training requirements the selection of pilots for the conversion training will take place in July.

Applications for CH-53E conversion training should be submitted in accordance with references which set forth by the basic eligibility criteria and applications procedures. In addition, the following criteria will also be considered:

- Service record, competitiveness with contemporaries.
- Flight time and experience in CH-53A and D helicopter.
- Availability for transfer.
- Commanding officers' endorsements and recommendations as to service potential and demonstrated aeronautical abilities.

Active duty naval aviators, in the military occupational specialty 7664, must have sufficient obligated service to be able to complete a three year tour of duty.

The approximate quotas for staffing these squadrons are: 1 lieutenant colonel, 6 majors, 9 captains and 12 lieutenants. Other lieutenant requirements will be filled by Navy aviators undergoing CH-53A and D training in Marine helicopter training squadrons.

A special selection board will convene at Washington, D.C. during July to review applications based on demonstrated performance and recommendations of respective commanding officers. All applications must be received by Commandant of the Marine Corps (Code MMOA-2) by July 15.

June promotions

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The following number of staff noncommissioned officer promotions will take place in June, according to Manpower officials here.

To master gunnery sergeant, 10; first sergeant, 2; master sergeant, 43; gunnery sergeant, 36; and staff sergeant, 191.

The 1981 board to select sergeants major, master gunnery sergeants, first sergeants and master sergeants is scheduled to convene here July 14, for two months.

Overseas extension

Enlisted Marines now serving in designated areas overseas who voluntarily extend for a period of 12 or more months, will be able to select one of three incentives subject to Headquarters Marine Corps approval.

The three incentives are: \$50 per month special pay for each month during the period of the extension, 30 days rest and recuperative absence or 15 days rest and recuperative absence plus round trip transportation at the government's expense from the location of the extended tour of duty, to the nearest port in the 48 contiguous states and return.

The duties eligible for voluntary tour extensions by enlisted people include all dependents restricted movement control centers, all ships homeported outside the continental United States and Hawaii, and both movement control centers at Marine Barracks, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. All military occupational specialties are eligible for the incentives.

Requests for extensions should be submitted to the Commandant of the Marine Corps (Code MM) and should state the incentive option for which the Marine is extending. In addition to an in-place extension a person may also request reassignment to another dependent-restricted movement control center within the same geographical area.

Enlisted personnel who are eligible for the incentives and began serving their extended period of duty on or after Dec. 23, 1980, may elect to receive the special pay for the months beginning after Dec. 31, 1980 or elect to receive one of the remaining benefits.

People who began serving an extension before Dec. 23, 1980 will be eligible to receive only the \$50 per month special pay for the remaining period of the extension after Dec. 31, 1980.

Command changes hands

MajGen John K. Davis will be promoted to Lieutenant General and assume duties as the commanding general of Fleet Marine Forces, Pacific/Commander, Marine Corps Bases, Pacific during change of command ceremonies to be held Tuesday at MCAS Kaneohe Bay.

MAJGEN DAVIS IS presently serving on the staff of the Commander-in-chief, Pacific as the director of operations.

He will relieve LtGen Andrew W. O'Donnell, who assumed command of Fleet Marine Force, Pacific in October 1978. LtGen O'Donnell will retire from the Marine Corps after 39 years service.

The Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, is the largest single field command in the Marine Corps, comprised more than 72,000 Marines and extending over almost half the earth's surface.

MajGen Davis, a native of Hagon, N.M. was born March 14, 1927. He graduated from Albuquerque High School in 1945 and enlisted in the Marine Corps Reserve, attaining the rank of private first class prior to being discharged.

AFTER GRADUATION from the University of New Mexico, he was commissioned a Marine second lieutenant in June 1950. He completed The Basic School in March 1951 and was assigned as a platoon commander, 3d Amphibious Training Battalion, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

He was promoted to first lieutenant in June 1952 and the following October he began flight training at the Naval Air Station, Pensacola, Fla. He was promoted to captain in December 1953 and was designated a Naval Aviator in June 1954.

MajGen Davis served as a training officer with Marine Night Fighter Squadron-542, Marine Aircraft Group-15, El Toro, Calif. He remained in that billet until December 1954 when he was transferred to the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing serving in Korea and Japan, as a supply officer and later, as a personnel officer, Marine All-Weather Fighter Squadron-513, Marine Aircraft Group-12.

HE RETURNED TO the United States in May 1956 as the operations officer, Marine Air Control Squadron-4, Marine Wing Headquarters Group, 3d Marine Aircraft Wing, El Toro. He was later reassigned and served consecutively as the aviation safety officer, Marine Attack Squadron-121, Marine Aircraft Group-15 and Marine Attack Squadron-311.

In July 1959 MajGen Davis was transferred to the Naval Air Station, Beville, Texas as the operations officer, Training Squadron-26.

He was promoted to major in February 1961 and in July 1962 he attended the Air Command and Staff College, Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala. He completed the course in June 1963 and was ordered to Iwakuni, Japan serving concurrently as the operations officer, Marine Wing Headquarters Group-1 and as the officer-in-charge of the

Tactical Air Control Center, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing.

FROM SEPTEMBER 1964 to August 1967 he served as a staff officer in the Air Branch, Joint Exercise Planning Division, Headquarters, Allied Forces, Northern Europe, Oslo, Norway. He was promoted to lieutenant colonel in January 1966.

MajGen Davis returned to the United States in September 1967 and served consecutively as executive officer, Marine Aircraft Group-14; commanding officer, Marine All-Weather Attack Squadron-224 and commanding officer, Marine All-Weather Attack Training Squadron-202, 2d Marine Aircraft Wing, at Cherry Point, N.C.

He attended the Industrial College of the Armed Forces, Washington, D.C., from August 1968 to June 1969 when he was ordered to the Republic of Vietnam as 1st Marine Aircraft Wing aviation safety officer and later as executive officer, Marine Aircraft Group-11.

HE WAS PROMOTED to colonel in August 1970 and a month later returned to the United States as executive officer, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Air, Headquarters Marine Corps. He remained in that billet until June 1973 when he was transferred to El Toro as commanding officer, Marine Aircraft Group-46, Marine Air Reserve Training Detachment.

He became assistant wing commander, 3d Marine Aircraft Wing, El Toro, Calif., following his advancement to brigadier general July 1, 1975 and assigned duty as commander, Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro and commander, Marine Corps Air Bases, Western Area in June 1976. During this tour he was advanced to major general Feb. 17, 1977 and assigned duties as commanding general, 3d Marine Aircraft Wing at El Toro.

DURING THE PERIOD July 6, 1977 to Aug. 8, 1977 he was assigned additional duty as commanding general, 1st Marine Amphibious Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Feb. 15, 1978 he was assigned duty as commanding general, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, Camp S.D. Butler, Okinawa.

He assumed his current assignment June 16, 1979.

A list of his medals and decorations include the Legion of Merit with Combat "V", The Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with numeral 10, the WWII Victory Medal, the American Campaign Medal, the Asiatic/Pacific Campaign Medal, the National Defense Service Medal with one bronze star, the Republic of Vietnam Service Medal with silver star, the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Meritorious Unit Citation of the Gallantry Cross with palm, the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal and the Republic of Vietnam Meritorious Unit Citation, (Civic Action.)

MAJGEN DAVIS and his wife, the former Jane Dickey of San Clemente, Calif., have three children, Keri, Gwendolyn and Julie.

Air station receives new leader

Col Charles Robinson relieved Col Mel Sautter as station commander in ceremonies at Dewey Square at 9 a.m. today. Col Sautter is scheduled to retire in Fairfax, Va. after 30 years of service.

COL ROBINSON, a native of Colorado, entered the military Service in 1953 as a naval aviation cadet. Upon commissioning as a

second lieutenant in the Marine Corps and designation as a naval aviator in March 1955, he joined Marine Attack Squadron-323 at Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro, Calif.

A short time later he was ordered overseas and joined Marine Attack Squadron-251 at Pohang, Korea, completing a tour with that squadron both in Korea and at Naval Air Station Atsugi, Japan.

Returning from overseas to Cherry Point, N.C. he served for a year in Marine Aircraft Repair Squadron-27 before reporting to the 2d Air Naval Gunfire Liaison Company at Camp Lejeune, N.C.

DURING A NINE-MONTH Mediterranean tour as a forward air controller, he participated in the landing ashore in Lebanon during the crisis of 1958. His next tour of duty was as an advanced jet flight instructor at NAS Kingsville, Texas.

Col Robinson subsequently served with Marine Aircraft Group-13 at MCAS Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii both in Marine Attack Squadron-214 and on the group staff from 1961 through 1964.

Next came an assignment with Marine Aircraft Group-11 overseas during the initial entry of the 1st Marine Air Wing into Vietnam. Returning from overseas, he served again at Cherry Point, N.C. as an instructor pilot at Marine Training Squadron-1 and as the wing G-3 operations officer before attending Auburn University in the college degree program there.

SUCCESSING TOURS of duty were with Marine Attack Squadron-223 at Chu Lai, Republic of Vietnam as a squadron executive officer and as tactical air officer, G-3 Division, III Marine Amphibious Force Headquarters.

From October 1969 to June 1971, Col. Robinson served as an operation planner on the Joint Strategic Target Planning Staff at Offutt Air Force Base, Omaha, Neb.

Reporting to the 2d Marine Air Wing at Cherry Point, N.C. in June 1971, he was assigned as the assistant wing G-1 before assuming command of Marine Attack Training Squadron-203 from November 1971 to March 1973.

AFTER A YEAR AS the 2d Marine Air Wing G-3 operations officer, Col Robinson commanded Station Operations and Engineering Squadron at MCAS Cherry Point, N.C. from February 1974 through June 1975.

Col Robinson then attended the United States Army War College at Carlisle Barracks, Pa. before becoming the deputy G-3 of III Marine Amphibious Force on Okinawa.

Returning to Hawaii in 1977, Col Robinson has held various billets within the G-3 Division of Headquarters, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, Camp H.M. Smith. During the last 15 months, he had been assigned as the assistant chief of staff, G-3.

Col Robinson's medals and decorations include two Distinguished Flying Crosses, the Bronze Star with Combat "V", Meritorious Service Medal, 18 awards of the Air Medal, the Joint Service Commendation Medal and the Combat Action Ribbon.

Col Robinson is married to the former Joan Andrews of Boulder Colo. They have three children, Linda, Mark, and Jim.

Human goals charter reaffirms equality

PENTAGON, WASH.—INGTON, D.C. — Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger reaffirmed the Department of Defense's commitment to equal opportunity and affirmative action recently by signing the Human Goals Charter for military and civilian personnel.

THE CHARTER, originally issued in 1969, has been subscribed to by each secretary of defense. Other signers of the charter include deputy secretary of defense, Joint Chiefs of Staff and the service secretaries.

Pentagon, Secretary Weinberger stated, "The Human Goals Charter is the foundation of this department's equal opportunity and equal employment opportunity programs."

secretary of defense and the top Department of Defense leaders since that time. It is an excellent statement on the dignity, worth, and rights of the individual regardless of race, color, religion, gender, or national origin.

"President Reagan has said that his administration would be dedicated to equality and that there would be no retreat from the government's advocacy of equal opportunity and affirmative action programs. I share this dedication and I want to pledge my administration's continued support for equal opportunity and affirmative action programs.

"OUR SIGNING of the Human Goals Charter is a symbol of the strong and personal leadership that each of us will give these programs. I want equal opportunity and affirmative action initiatives to be effective and to have a high priority. I also want these efforts efficiently managed."

The secretary went on to say, "Equal opportunity and affirmative action programs must be inextricably interwoven into our efforts to revitalize American military strength because they can only improve our

cohesiveness, our readiness, and our total defense capability. I believe that we can afford no less than to allow each person within the Department of Defense the opportunity to realize the fullest of his or her potential — and that will be done.

"THIS MEANS that I want qualified people, regardless of background or gender, to carry forth this department's mission of national security. That's the public policy of the Department of Defense's human goals statement and one that we intend to fulfill completely...."

Tuition

Weinberger stands against proposed fees

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger recently issued the following memorandum to the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff, and the Service Chiefs regarding tuition charges for military dependents:

"AS YOU ARE probably aware, some local jurisdictions are contemplating the imposition of tuition charges for the public school education of military dependents.

"This action is in response to proposed reductions in federally funded impact air provided to communities having a significant population of federal workers. I want to make clear my view that

any such action by states, counties, or school districts is completely unwarranted and that the Department of Defense will take every possible measure to prevent it.

"The administration will use all available legal steps to prevent the imposition of tuition charges on military members for the public school education of their dependents.

"THIS MATTER HAS my close personal attention. Please advise members that I am determined that no soldier, sailor, airman, or Marine will be forced to pay tuition for the public school education of his or her dependents."





Diploma

St. Louis High School offers second chance

If you're thinking of getting a high school diploma, St. Louis High School offers Kaneohe-based Marines and sailors a second chance. Since the highly regarded Honolulu school began offering classes at MCAS Kaneohe Bay nine years ago, more than 2,300 Marines and sailors have successfully earned diplomas.

A high school diploma can be obtained through St. Louis by completing a 60-hour English class, a 60-hour math course and by taking the General Educational Development Test. Students must score at least a 35 on any one part of the GED and compile an overall average score of 45 for the five part test to earn a passing grade.

Students can earn credit for English or math classes in three ways. The first is by completing a Tuition Assistance funded English or math class. The second is by previous GED scores. An average score of 45 on the English portion of the exam earns English credit. A 45 on the math portion of the test likewise earns

math credit. The last method to earn credit is by scoring an 11th grade equivalent or higher on an English or math comprehensive exam. Both tests are offered at the Joint Education Center.

To qualify for participation in the St. Louis High School program, an 8th grade reading level or higher is required. All Marines reporting to the Joint Reception Center take a reading test. Those scoring below eighth grade level can take a developmental reading course. Once the required reading level is achieved, students then qualify for enrollment in the high school program.

Funding for the high school diploma program is provided through the Marine Corps Tuition Assistance program. TA pays 100 percent of the cost.

Classes meet three days per week for seven weeks. For deployed units, certified instructors conduct on-ship English and math courses. The reading program however is unavailable on deployment. Registration for deployment classes is completed prior to deployment departure.


WHILE SOME OF THESE pens may be found in one piece, most will be found in at least five pieces. If a Marine is really in

Marine Physical Fitness Test motivates Leatherneck sergeant

Marines can often be heard attributing some achievement in their life to the Marine Corps. One Marine at MCAS Kaneohe Bay attributes his accomplishment to the Physical Fitness Test.

"I STARTED running to achieve the maximum number of points on the PFT explains Sgt Ron Welsh, 1st Battalion, Twelfth Marines career planner. "Once I started running I just kept going."

Once bit by the running bug, Sgt Welsh got interested in long distance running. In 1977 he decided to run the Maui Marathon just to see if he could finish the 26 mile, 385 yard distance.

"There was something about the idea of running a marathon that just seemed to challenge me," the Columbia, Pa. native says. "I finished in 3 hours, 2 minutes and 43 seconds. It was so close to three hours that I

got motivated to break that barrier."

The 23-year old Leatherneck took a shot at his personal goal in June 1977. He took leave and went to Plattsburgh, N.Y. to run in a marathon there. But the elusive sub-three pace was not to be his.

"I GAVE IT my best try and posted a time of 3:04. But it just got me more determined," Sgt Welsh recalls.

His resolution and hard work paid off at the 1978 Marine Corps Marathon held in Washington. Sgt Welsh broke his three hour obstacle and finished in 2:53.

"I don't even remember the place I was in," he reminisces. "I was just excited at the time."

Sgt Welsh reached a turning point in his running endeavors when he joined a relay team for an around Oahu run earlier this year. He met Maj Dick May from the 1st

Marine Brigade G-1 office.

"MAJ MAY was sort of like the father-figure for the team," Sgt Welsh points out. "He started helping me to understand how to train properly, how to get ready for a race and what type of sacrifices are involved. He really helped me a lot."

Maj May's influence and direction kept Sgt Welsh striving for

better and better times. Then June 14 he reached another first... first place in the first Windward Marathon. This race pitted more than 800 runners against each other on Oahu's Windward side and traversed through MCAS Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii.

"The marathon was not only my best time ever, but the first race I'd won," he says. "Running the part on

base helped because I was familiar with the road surface and knew how the winds were out by the runway. I wanted someone to be ahead of me at the wind but I was all alone and just kept pushing."

Sgt Welsh was still going strong when he crossed the finish line just 2 hours, 40 minutes and 59 seconds.

BUT EVEN with a

fast first finish Sgt Welsh is looking ahead.

"I'd really like to run in the Olympic Trials for the marathon someday," he admits. "I'll worry about making the Olympic team when I get there, for now I'm working on making the trials."

As for the "perfect PFT" score Sgt Welsh was striving for, he finally got it in March 1977 with a three mile run in 17:57.

Marathon challenges runners

Nearly 1400 military and civilian runners took to the streets of Enchanted Lake, Kailua, Lanikai and MCAS Kaneohe Bay June 14 as part of the first Windward Marathon and Half-Marathon.

SGT RON Welsh of 1st Battalion, 12th Marines, 1st Marine Brigade was the fastest of the long run finishers with a time of 2:40:59. He was soon followed by the top female marathoner of the day, Sharon Given from North Point, N.Y. Given's time was 3:2:15.

The Big Island was the first half-marathoner to cross the finish line tape at 1:12:58. That was just 2 seconds off his predicted time. Connie Del Rosario, from Honolulu was the first female half-marathoner finisher in 1:29:45.

Runners, race officials and volunteers commented on how smooth the race seemed to go.

"THE COURSE was really well laid out," said Sgt Nelson Hartman of 1st Battalion, 3d Marines. "The course marshalls helped keep everyone to one side of the road and

going in the right direction. Running on station helped because I was more familiar with that part of the course. It was my first marathon and I needed all the help I could get."

Sgt Hartman apparently got that help, because even though it was his first race he finished second in his age group division with a 3:01:10 pace.

Winner Sgt Welsh complimented the race officials for the fine event.

"ALL THE RACE officials did a great job," he said. "The course had nice scenery and was enjoyable to run. Some people who

lived along the route kept cheering us on, offering us water and spraying us down with hoses. The whole thing was just great."

Race Director Dan Tompkins attributed the race's success to cooperation and teamwork between runners and volunteers.

"We had more than 200 volunteers at aid stations, start and finish lines, medical tent and all through the course," Tompkins explained. "They put in a lot of work to keep things running smooth. The race committee tried to cover all the aspects of the race as best as possible. It was our first race and even

though things went extremely well we learned quite a bit. Next year will be even better."

OF THE 1381 runners registered to participate 488 finished the marathon and 632 completed the half-marathon.

Many runners expressed their thanks to the race officials, volunteers and communities involved for providing the joyful experience. It's a safe bet that many of the smiling faces that crossed the finish line of the First Windward Marathon and Half-Marathon will be there again next year.





Friendship erodes language barriers

MOTOBU, Okinawa — They make the headlines of almost every newspaper in the world at least once a week. They're known by many names: boat people, refugees and wanderers. They're the people who vote with their feet; the Vietnamese citizens who fled their country in hopes of finding a better life for themselves.

On Okinawa, near the Exposit at Motobu Peninsula is a Vietnamese refugee camp. Three hundred Vietnamese live here.

"We first came here about three years ago," said Thong Van Tho, one of the first boat people to arrive on Okinawa. "Originally there were 41 of us. Now there are 304 of my people living here."

How do the refugees survive on Okinawa? "Housing, food and other necessities are provided for the refugees by the Japanese government and the United Nations. Both contribute half and half," said Chuang De Dan, an interpreter who works at the camp for the Japanese Red Cross. "Also, many religious and other groups help out with donations."

Last week, Navy Lt. Ray C. Burley, group chaplain for Marine Aircraft Group-36, took 34 people up to the camp on a bus. They had eight boxes of clothes for the refugees.

"We just wanted to help out some," said Lt. Burley. "Many of us feel a kinship for those people since we served in Vietnam. We plan to

make more of these trips in the future."

The Marines and sailors who went,

enjoyed themselves as much as the Vietnamese during the visit. They talked, played volleyball and

just got to know one another. Clothes were passed out and plans made for future visits. The end result was

the feeling of friendship that surpassed any language barrier. For laughter sounds the same in any language.

Statement clarifies food stamp eligibility

Marines and their families applying for food stamps have previously experienced difficulty with qualification procedures.

THE PROBLEM was due to the basic allowance for quarters entry on the service-member's leave and earnings statement which confused food stamp agencies.

According to Marine Corps Bulletin 1740, this misconception was a result of United States Department of Agriculture proceed-

ures that include BAQ as earned income. To alleviate the problem caused by the misinterpretation of procedures concerning the program, Headquarters Marine Corps has provided USDA officials with several recommendations.

One suggestion recommends that Marines applying for food stamps and already assigned to government quarters, obtain a signed statement from their commanding officers. The statement should specify whether or not

the Marine is residing in adequate or inadequate quarters.

The applicant should ensure that it reads as follows:

"SERGEANT Joe Marine" is assigned to adequate government quarters. The amount shown as BAQ in Section F is merely the equivalent amount which would be paid if the Marine was not provided government quarters. The subsequent deduction of that same amount in Section F indicates that the Marine is not entitled

payment of BAQ."

In the event the Marine is provided with inadequate quarters, the statement should be prepared in this manner:

"Sergeant Joe Marine" is assigned to inadequate government quarters and is not entitled to full BAQ. The amount shown as BAQ in Section F is merely the equivalent amount which would be paid if the Marine was not provided government quarters.

Although an appropriate entry of a BAQ

entitlement is entered on the servicemember's LES, applicable laws say that members residing in adequate government quarters are not entitled to BAQ.

A BAQ entry, whether the entitlement is receivable or not, appears on the leave and earnings statement specifically to ensure that all servicemembers are aware of the full value of their entitlements.

Section 273.9 (C) (III) (A) of the Federal Register (Volume 43) governing the food

stamp program states: "If the employer provides housing to an employee, the value of the housing shall not be counted as income."

Most food stamp agencies recognize the leave and earnings statement as the best documentation available in determining Marine applicant eligibility.

IN DOING so, the agencies suggest that the commanding officers eligibility statement be stamped or written on the member's LES.

Not only is the area dangerous for children, but the ground worker is spending an excessive amount of valuable time trying to ensure that the children are not in any danger.

This is not the only problem the electrical workers have noticed

while working at the air station. "We have dug holes beside old poles to place new ones in, then covered the hole with a wooden platform with dirt and rocks piled on top. By adding blinker barricades by the holes people are warned of possible danger," explained Bob Igawa, acting foreman for the Mauna Kea Electric.

"But the barricades are being torn apart and the batteries taken. The dirt and rocks are also being removed and scattered. The plat-

forms are being taken from over the holes leaving a dangerous situation for everyone."

According to Igawa, after the platforms are removed the holes are then covered with grass and leaves, creating a trap for unsuspecting pedestrians to fall into. Igawa commented that parents should realize that the construction sites are extremely hazardous and assist in preventing injuries to their children by keeping them away from the work areas.

Sculptor restores Marine monument

CAPE CORAL, Fla. — After more than \$75,000 and 18 months of blood, sweat and sometimes tears, the Iwo Jima War Memorial standing outside the Cape Coral North First Bank has been dedicated.

The dedication ceremony, which had more than 750 guests in attendance on a sun-baked Florida afternoon brought a happy ending to a saga which was started by Mike Geml, the North First Bank vice president.

THE IWO JIMA War Memorial, a tribute to the gallant raising of the American flag on Mount Suribachi during World War II, was constructed by Felix de Weldon, who is the sculptor of the original memorial in Washington, D.C. De

Weldon also constructed the Iwo Jima War Memorials in Quantico, Va., and Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, S.C.

In 1980, as a community project, North First Bank moved the crumbling monument, which fell to vandalism, to a permanent site at the bank. De Weldon was contacted, and he agreed to restore the statue, working for three months making replacement pieces alone.

The restoration was completed in January and the Marine Corps raised the 48-star flag over the monument recently in honor of the now freed U.S. hostages from Iran.

"The ceremony was just beautiful," said De Weldon, a native of Vienna, Austria. "It

shows how people love the Marine Corps, while it also displays the patriotic flame still burning strong here in Florida."

In addition to De Weldon, BrigGen Jacob Moore, from Headquarters, Marine Corps, was present at the ceremony. BrigGen Moore, the commandant's representative, appeared as guest speaker. Also, Adm. Peter Brown, commander of the Naval Civil Engineers from Clearwater, Fla., made a brief speech during the ceremony.

SAYS GEML OF the dedication ceremony: "I don't think it could have gone any better. The dedication went very smoothly. I'm glad of the turnout — it indicated to me that people here are supportive of our efforts."

Mutual trust enhances Marine team

Some things just naturally go together like salt and pepper, oil and vinegar, cookies and milk or pen and paper. At Marine Fighter Attack Squadron-235 1stLt Terry Wilcutt and Bob Graham are a matching pair.

THEY WORK together as other teams like them work throughout the Marine Corps. When sitting in their respective offices 1stLt Wilcutt works as the flight line division officer and 1stLt Graham is the personnel officer. But when they step out of their offices and into their flight suits — where one is the other is sure to be close by.

When preparing for an air mission the flight line division officer converts his

maneuver the aircraft," said 1stLt Wilcutt. "Bob concerns himself with the radar and weapons system."

After suiting up in their flight gear the pilot and RIO make a visual check of the aircraft together, then with great care and apparent respect for the F-4S they are about to venture to the skies in, they make their way up the side of the approximately 16 foot white 'bird.'

WITH AN AIR of aplomb, a smile of satisfaction, and a glint of adventure in his eyes, the RIO slides into the rear cockpit while the pilot eases into the front seat. "The pilot will start the aircraft with the help of the ground support equipment and then let me know if there is

anything wrong," commented the RIO. Once the aircraft is started both sets of eyes go to work, they are not just eyes though, they are skilled eyes. Eyes that are trained to note minor changes in the instrument readings as well as major ones.

"MANY OF THE instruments overlap in the two cockpits," remarked 1stLt Wilcutt. "The instruments that do overlap are checked by both Bob and myself. Other instruments are checked and we let each other know that everything is okay or we talk about the problem."

Once the instruments are checked on the ground and the aircraft is on its way into the air, both sets of eyes must continue to be alert to the world in and outside of the cockpits.

While the RIO aids the pilot by keeping a close lookout at the rear of the aircraft for any possible enemy planes. Whether in the air, or on the ground, from take off to a safe landing, both Marine's

lives depend on the other guy, his decisions and actions decide the safety of the mission.

DURING THE past 1stLt Wilcutt and Graham have spent 90 percent of their air time flying together. "We have built confidence in each other," emphasized 1stLt Graham. "I know how Terry is going to react to a situation and he knows how I will react. It's a trust that must be between a pilot and RIO. If you don't trust someone, you don't fly with them."

"Flying is a challenging and satisfying job," commented 1stLt Wilcutt. "And the cockpit of an F-4S has become like a home away from home for me. It's good to know I can rely on the guy in back of me."



He was sentenced by military judge alone to three months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$372 pay per month for three months and reduction to private first class.

LCpl Richard Allen

1st Battalion, 3d Marines, was convicted at trial by special court martial of unauthorized absence, disrespect toward a superior commissioned officer, offering violence

against a superior commissioned officer, disobeying lawful orders on three occasions, the wrongful use of provoking words and of disorderly conduct on station.

He was sentenced by military judge alone to two months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$150 pay per month for four months and reduction to private first class.
