## Brigade begins 82nd year

The 1st Marine Brigade, unique in that it is the only permanent brigade in the Marine Corps, is celebrating its 81st anniversary Jan. 1.

The 1st Marine Brigade was formed Jan. 1, 1901 in the Philippines and was made up of Marines stationed there plus about 1,000 Marines from China who had been participating in the Boxer Rebellion.

At that time the Brigade was often referred to as the "Philippine Brigade". Its mission was to

guard Naval bases in the Philippines and to administer the military government. In 1914 the Brigade was disbanded.

**JUST A YEAR LATER** the 1st Marine Brigade was reorganized and sent to Haiti to restore law and order and protect American interests in the revolution-torn country. The Brigade was disbanded again in 1934 after nearly 20 years of service in Haiti. During its stay in Haiti the Brigade was at one time commanded by Major Smedley D. Butler. Gunnery Sergeant Dan Daly also earned his Medal of Honor while serving there.

The Brigade was reorganized from 1939 to 1941 at Marine Barracks, Quantico, Va. where Brigade Marines studied the techniques of amphibious landings.

In June 1941 the 1st Provisional Marine Brigade was assembled in Charleston, S.C. and in July landed in Iceland. For the first time during World War II, Marines had been sent into what was considered a war zone. Shortly after the Japanese attacked Oahu in Dec. 1941, the Brigade was pulled out of Iceland, disbanded and the Marines were sent to parent organizations,

mostly in the Pacific Theater.

**THE 1ST PROVISIONAL** Marine Brigade was again revived in March 1944, this time at Pearl Harbor. Shortly after that it was headquartered on Guadalcanal.

During the Korean War the 1st Provisional Marine Brigade was comprised of the 5th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division from Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton, Calif., and was known as the "Fire Brigade." Although active less than 40 days, the Brigade traveled nearly 400 miles, mostly on foot, and took up many important battle positions.

In 1953 President Harry S. Truman commissioned the 1st Provisional Marine Brigade as the 1st Provisional Marine Air-Ground Task Force and based it at the newly established Marine Corps Air Station, Kaneohe Bay. For a very brief time, the Task Force was comprised of the 3d Marine Regiment and Marine Aircraft Group-13.

**IN 1955 THE SCOPE** of the Task Force was greatly expanded with the arrival of the 4th Marine Regiment and additional squadrons from the Far East to reinforce the MAG. In addition, the Task Force and its attached units were homeported here, ending their six-month rotation schedule.

Amphibious tractors and helicopters soon began arriving from Korea and by 1956 the Task Force had been renamed the 1st Marine Brigade and was ready to participate in live fire air-ground exercises on many of the neighbor islands.

During the 1960s major units of the Brigade deployed to Okinawa and served in a number of campaigns in Vietnam including the Tet Offensive in 1968. Also in 1968, some elements of MAG-24 began arriving here from the MCAS Cherry Point, N.C. In 1969 the Brigade's 1st Battalion, 27th Marine Regiment was redesignated as the 1st Battalion, 3d Marine Regiment.

**DURING 1970 THE** Brigade's strength increased with the arrival of a company of amphibious tractors, a company of engineers and the activation of a Provisional Service Battalion. By 1971 the Brigade had three fighter attack squadrons equipped with the F-4 Phantom aircraft and medium and heavy helicopter squadrons. The 1st Battalion, 12th Marine Regiment arrived in early June and the remainder of the 3d Marine Regiment joined the Brigade June 9.

Since 1977 the Brigade has exercised its combat readiness by providing battalion landing teams for the Unit Deployment Program. Units of the 1st Marine Brigade make regular deployments to Japan and the Western Pacific in six-month increments, providing international security and engaging in a number of various training exercises. During the early months of 1980 the Brigade's 31st Marine Amphibious Unit sailed from Oahu to the Arabian Sea to support U.S. policy.

**TODAY, THE 1ST MARINE** Brigade is the only permanent brigade in the Marine Corps. It combines both air and ground elements to provide a complete force in readiness. The 1st Marine Brigade is made up of three battalions of the 3d Marine Regiment. With more than 4,000 Marines it is the largest infantry regiment in the Marine Corps.

Included within the reinforced regiment are the 1st Battalion, 12th Marine Regiment, providing artillery support; Detachment, Company A, 3d Assault Amphibian Battalion; and Company A, 3d Reconnaissance Battalion.

Logistical support and supplies are provided by the Brigade Service Support Group.

Air support for the Brigade is provided by MAG-24 comprised of three fixed wing fighter attack squadrons, VMFA-212, 232 and 235; and four helicopter squadrons, Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-165, 265 and 262, and Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron-463. Support is provided by Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-24; Marine Air Base Squadron-24; and Marine Air Control Squadron-2.

**AT 81 YEARS OF AGE,** this unique air-ground team known as the 1st Marine Brigade is constantly training and ever ready for amphibious warfare.

## Construction causes traffic pattern changes


**TRIPLER ARMY MEDICAL CENTER, Hawaii** — Whether you're driving, parking, or walking, Tripler's traffic patterns totally turned around with closing of Patterson Road, parking lots and entrances on the mauka (mountain) side of the hospital.

The entire area featuring the former main entrance was fenced off Monday and designated off limits due to construction of the new three-wing, four story addition. The mauka (ocean) side of the hospital is now the "front" with main entrances at D and E wings. Upper D and E parking lots are reserved for patients from 8 a.m. till 2 p.m., Monday through Friday. Access to the Emer-

gency Room and hospital parking is via Jarrett White and Ward Roads only. Due to the narrow width of Ward Road, no parking is allowed on it nor adjacent to the spray pond across from D Wing. Staff parking is in the lower D and E lots on the mauka side of the hospital, except for a few slots by the


Personnel Building, H lot and G unit. The rerouted city bus line enters Ward Road from Jarrett White, make its first stop at the E wing entrance, next at the D wing entrance, then exit through the lower D parking lot past the ballfield and out via Krukowski Road. Coming up the hill, a new left turn only lane was added at the

intersection of Jarrett White and Krukowski Roads. All traffic driving in the vicinity of the Tripler gas station, the Company area, gymnasium and Well Baby Clinic is routed via Krukowski Road. All construction vehicles will use Krukowski Road. Entrances and exits to parking lots are clearly marked.

## Memorial services set

Christopher R. Hartley, 19, son of Lieutenant Colonel and Mrs. Gene H. Hartley, drowned Dec. 23, while body surfing here. Funeral services for the youth are scheduled to be held in Kingston, Mo.

Hartley, an apprentice at the Naval Shipyard in Newport News, Va., was in Hawaii for Christmas visiting his parents. He and his brother Thomas, 16, had been body surfing at the Air Station's Pyramid Rock beach area when heavy waves swept the two away from shore. Surfer Jim Robinson, son of Colonel Charles Robinson, Commanding Officer of the air Station, came to their aid and managed to pull Thomas to shore but was unable to help Christopher, whose body was not recovered until Saturday.

Hartley is survived by his parents; two brothers, Bennett, 21, a Central Missouri State University student, and Thomas, who resides with his parents aboard the Air Station; and a sister, Cynthia, 23, of Richmond Va. LtCol Hartley is currently assigned as the 1st Marine Brigade Comptroller. The entire family had gathered in Hawaii for the holidays.

# Worker finds ancient skull

Dec. 18 was just another day on the job for Kevin Holloway of Aqua Blue Pools. He and several other workers were busy putting the finishing touches on a trench around the Officers' Club pool. The trench was necessary for the men to make the appropriate repairs.

Suddenly Holloway hit something which looked like a large rock. He removed the sand from around the object and was shocked as a human skull rolled out from among the debris.

"I wasn't sure what it was at first," he said. "I picked it up and removed some of the sand. That's when I realized it was a skull."

Investigators from the State Archeological Department

were summoned, and the skull was examined. State Archeologist Buddy Neller determined that the skull was "of an early Hawaiian teenager, approximately 12 to 15 years of age." He added that the description was based on "the size and condition of the skull, as well as the formation of the teeth."

The skull was not found in its original resting place. When the pool was constructed, workers used sand from near the ancient Hawaiian burial grounds aboard the Air Station to help fill in the space around the pool.

The skull will be placed in the Bishop Museum along with other ancient Hawaiian artifacts.



# Company D transfers to Twentynine Palms, replaced by detachment

Question: How do 25 amphibious assault vehicles and roughly half of Company D, 3d Assault Amphibian Battalion disappear?

Answer: Transfer them to the 27th Marines.

Company D, a part of the 1st Marine Brigade for more than ten years, has been replaced by the newly-created Detachment, Company A, 3d AABN. "Our new role is to provide amphibious

mechanized and anti-mechanized training for the 1st Marine Brigade," said Captain Richard Roan, Officer-In-Charge, Det. CoA, 3d AABN. "Instead of going on deployment, we will provide amphibious training for the Brigade," he added.

Units going on deployment will now pick up "amtracs", as well as tanks and tubed-launched, optically-tracked, wire-guided missile at Camp

Pendleton, Calif. The 27th Marines, headquartered at Marine Corps Air Station, Twentynine Palms, Calif., is part of the 7th Marine Amphibious Brigade, the Marine Corps primary unit designated for the Rapid Deployment Force.

Due to the change in personnel, Det. CoA will be moving out of building 1059 and into building 1284.





Where possible mess duty (and often guard duty) should be performed by units. If infantry platoons, for example, stand duty together, innumerable problems are solved, the stigma is removed, normal leaders (i.e., the platoon commander, platoon sergeant, squad leaders, etc) are available to supervise, mess sergeants are free to concentrate on food preparation instead of on disgruntled messmen, and rotation of jobs within the mess hall is simpler.

It would be foolish to pretend that the procedure makes mess duty a choice billet, but it certainly makes it far more bearable and the results benefit the entire command.

**Dear Editor:**

As we Marines are asked to defend our country and ideals on ships or in far away places like Okinawa, we leave behind our friends, our loved ones and our families.

When assigned to these tours of duty, we are told that it is to help defend that which Americans have fought for so many years. We go, not because we wish to or because we grow tired of our

lives at home, but because it is our "duty" which we are honor-bound to accomplish.

Out of our love of country and Corps, we are involuntarily separated from the ones we love. During these periods of stress, the loved one who has been left behind may wait with eternal patience for that man or woman who traveled so far away. As is more often the case, loneliness will be the cause for the loved one to be no more.

We Marines, and personnel in other services, are lonely for our loved ones as much as they are for us. I, a United States Marine, would ask that you at home keep your faith in God and country, as well as with your Marine who might be overseas.

While apart, I ask that you recall the good times you shared for they have not been forgotten. Remember, too, that it was not our fault or wish that took us so far away. A "Dear John" letter, or a letter which overflows with sadness, does no good for either party.

You at home who initiate this type of letter may feel some guilt or perhaps remorse. We Marines simply cannot function, knowing we have lost that which we left behind. More of us have died, physically and spiritually, from these type letters than from bombs or bullets.

I ask you to consider carefully what you have had before you devastate and demoralize that Marine who is away, and helpless to do anything but cry.

Also, remember that the holiday season is the hardest time of all for those of us who are separated, regardless of which "front" you are on. Just because we are Marines does not imply that we are not human.

When you write to your Marine, think of what I've written, perhaps you may even read between the lines and understand all that which cannot be put into words. And when you write, remember that wherever your Marine may be, he is thinking of all of you and of what all of you mean to him.







## Marine Pugilists lose close decisions

Five Marines boxing with the Kaneohe Boxing Club stepped into the ring Dec. 19 to compete in the Hawaii Association Amateur Boxing Smoker at the Kalihi Valley Recreation Gym.

The main event was the heavy weight bout between Corporal Jesse Ferguson and Jesse Shelby of the Hawaii Youth Club.

The results were dramatic. Four of the five Marines lost their contest and the fifth match, Cpl Ferguson's, was stopped after the second round and both fighters were disqualified.

After the bell sounded ending round two both of the heavy-weight fighters continued to "duke it out." Referee Leo Cruz had no other choice but to stop the

contest before it got out of hand, and in doing so, disqualified both fighters.

"When the bell is rung signifying the start of a round, there is no talking," stated Cruz. "The fighters can't talk to each other, nor can the coaches advise their boxers."

The referee twice warned Cpl Ferguson of talking, and if a third warning had been issued, the contest would have been temporarily stopped and the judges would have been officially notified.

"I even warned Ferguson's coach Todd Bristow about talking," Cruz added.

Up to that point Cpl Ferguson was winning on points, having won the first round 20-18. He gave a slight edge to his opponent 19-20 in the second.

At the beginning of the fight Cpl Ferguson burst out of his corner like a runaway freight train, and landed a few solid blows early in the round. Shelly hit the canvas for the only knockdown of the contest when he was surprised by a Cpl Ferguson right.

Shelly quickly recovered and finished the round in good condition.

During the second round the tables had turned and Shelly held the upper hand. He hit Cpl Ferguson with more scoring punches than he received which influenced the judges to see this round in his favor.

According to Cruz, "Ferguson kept repeating 'You're going to go down' or something like that and I warned him twice that talking wasn't allowed."

Just as the bell sounded ending the round, Shelly landed a blow to Cpl Ferguson's midsection. This disputed punch was legal because no warning was given by the referee. After the punch the boxers exchanged words and Cpl Ferguson, after proceeding to his corner, turned and headed for his opponent.

The two boxers tried to continue the fight, but the referee stepped between them. The referee attempted to contain Cpl Ferguson as Shelby's coach grabbed him but the heavyweights still managed to exchange punches until more assistance came.

At this point the referee stopped the contest and declared both fighters disqualified.

on a few punches of his own, and hurt Seabrooks with a solid cross to the head. The judges scored this round 20-20, both fighters equal.

In the third round Cabral knew he had to be the aggressor if he was to win the match. Sgt Seabrooks tried to stay away but was caught with good punches to the midsection and one which caused blood to trickle from his nose. Sgt Seabrooks reopened Cabral's cuts and both fighters were weary by the end of the round. The judges scored this round 20-19, Cabral.

As both fighters stood in the center ring awaiting a decision, the referee held up Cabral's arm signifying him the winner.

of the first as Cpl Bullock threw a punch and Cardona countered.

By the third round Cardona realized Cpl Bullock wasn't an easy pushover. Cpl Bullock looked strong and took the offense, but he received an official warning by the referee.

Hawaii Youth's Walter Sims Jr. upset Kaneohe's Lance Corporal Chauncey Johnson by a decision in the 132-pound class when Sims took all three of the rounds 20-19, 20-18 and 20-19.

Sims scored his points early in the match landing good punches although they didn't phase Johnson.

In the closing seconds of the first round Johnson slipped past Sims' defenses with a right and Sims slipped while trying to side step.

The reverse happened in round two. As Johnson blocked the punch with his forearm he lost his footing. To ensure that everyone believed it was a slip and not a knockdown, Johnson hit Sims with a right which caused him to readjust his head gear.

As both fighters battled it out in the third round the audience came alive. Each took his turn trapping the other against the ropes and

mercilessly scored on a variety of punches.

When the referee held up Sims' arm declaring him the winner, the amount of the audience's applause determined this was the best contest of the evening.

**Banks vs Jenkins**

Even though Kaneohe's LCpl Andre Banks was stunned early in the first round by Marvin Jenkins of Hawaii Youth, he stayed in the center of the ring acting as the aggressor. Both fighters appeared winded at the close of the round.

LCpl Banks had Jenkins against the ropes in the second but a well-executed reverse pinned LCpl Banks to the ropes. A stinging left by Jenkins secured the round for him although when he returned to his corner he was just as exhausted.

The third round was anticlimactic as both fighters had punched each other out in the first two. The referee had to break up their clinches three times. Before its end Jenkins hit Banks with two good blows to the midsection. However, LCpl Banks countered with a left uppercut to get himself off the ropes.

Marvin Jenkins was declared the winner by decision 19-20, 20-18 and 20-19.

## Department announces hunting seasons

The Department of Land and Natural Resources announced that the administrative rules relating to forestry and wildlife, under Title 13 (Department of Land and Natural Resources), Subtitle 5 (Forestry and Wildlife) has become effective. The administrative rules are grouped into six parts and are as follows:

**1. Chapter 104 Rules Regulating Activities Within Forest Reserves.**

The purpose of these rules is to regulate activity within forest reserves as to preserve, protect and utilize the public resources.

**2. Chapter 105 Rules Regulating Closed Watershed.**

The purpose of these rules is to regulate watershed areas established pursuant to section 183-31, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and closed to public access by this chapter

of the administrative rules.

**3. Chapter 121 Rules Regulating the Hunting of Wildlife on Public Lands and Other Lands.**

The purpose of these rules is to prohibit the hunting of wildlife on public lands and other lands except as authorized by the department.

**4. Chapter 122 Rules Regulating Game Bird Hunting, Field Trials, and Commercial Shooting Preserves.**

The purpose of these rules is to regulate the hunting of game birds on public lands and other lands.

**5. Chapter 123 Rules Regulating Game Mammal Hunting.**

The purpose of these rules is to set seasons and bag limits for game mammal hunting on the islands of Hawaii, Maui, Molokai, Lanai, Oahu, and Kauai.

**6. Chapter 125 Rules Regulating Wildlife Sanctuaries.**

The purpose of these rules is to conserve, manage, and protect indigenous wildlife in sanctuaries.

**Hunting Seasons open on Hawaii and Lanai Closed on Molokai**

The Department of Land and Natural Resources announced that the Lau Ranch Cooperative Game Management Area opened for game bird hunting through Jan. 17, on Saturdays and Sundays. Hunters are reminded that they must possess a 1981-82 State of

Hawaii hunting license and that they must check in and out at the Kiloana checking station. All hunters are required to carry field forms while hunting and to turn them in at the end of each hunting day. "Lau Ranch" must be written in on the field form in the "other" column along with the appropriate data. Access to the hunting area will be via Kaoho Horse Pasture on foot only. Maps of the open paddocks within the ranch will be posted at the Kiloana checking station.

For details on species, bag limits, hunting times, and other pertinent information, consult Chapter 122, Rules Regulating Game Bird Hunting, Field Trials, and Commercial Shooting Preserves, that are available at the Division of Forestry and Wildlife office on Hawaii.

On Molokai the department has suspended the axis deer hunting season.

The season was suspended as a

conservation measure to allow time for the deer herd in the public hunting area to recover.

The Department also announced recently that application forms for the 1982 axis deer season on Lanai, together with instruction sheets, are available at Forestry and Wildlife offices and license dealers statewide. The season this year is scheduled to begin Feb. 28, and end April 25. The bag limit will be one deer of either sex per hunter.

Interested hunters may apply at any Forestry and Wildlife office or to the Division of Forestry and Wildlife office on their respective islands. The deadline for accepting applications will be 4 p.m. Jan. 15. Public drawings for the season of hunting dates will be held on Jan. 20 in Waiuku, Maui and at 4 p.m. on Lanai at the Division of Forestry and Wildlife offices. Only senior citizen hunters (65 years of age or older)

will be allowed to be accompanied by bagboys, and standbys will be allowed to replace non-participants.

An archery season for axis deer will be held on two Sundays, Feb. 14 and 21. No drawing for permits will be required and there will be no limitation on the number of archers that may participate. Archers must check in at the check station in Lanai City between 5 and 7 p.m. the day before the hunt or between 7 and 9 a.m. on the morning of the hunt to obtain a tag. The tag will authorize the archer to take one axis deer of either sex per season. Successful archers will not be eligible for the next season. Units 1 and 2 will be open to archers.

# Marine completes 250-mile journey

CAMP S.D. BUTLER, Japan — "Long-distance leatherneck" Tom Knoll is a living legend when it comes to the motto of the Shriners of North America. "Strong legs run so that the weak may walk" has become a philosophy with him.

He believes so fully in this concept that he has a dream. "During my lifetime, I want to earn a million dollars for crippled children through my running efforts," emphasized Knoll. "That's why I returned to Okinawa again this year and ran around the island's perimeter."

Knoll began his 250-mile run Dec. 19 at 8 a.m. in front of Camp

Butler's building 1 and finished 73 hours later at 9 a.m. Dec. 22.

With this run Knoll has passed the 4,000-mile mark for the year and the contributions have tallied more than \$10,000.

Running the grueling perimeter of Okinawa is nothing new for Knoll. On his first attempt in 1974, he covered the distance in 58 hours and 40 minutes.

As if this wasn't enough, he returned in 1979 with plans of running 500 miles. There were some skeptics, but he made believers out of everyone when he painfully jogged from Christmas to New Year's Day to accomplish his goal.

Even after this remarkable performance, the humble 50-year-old leatherneck felt his supporters and the Okinawa Shrine Club deserved the credit.

Knoll explained, "As the runner, I have the easy part... I just run. It's the supporters who have the hard part, and that's putting their faith and support behind my dream."

Some folks thought Tom would take a breather after his 1979 performance, but he returned again last year. The outcome of that trip resulted in a 250-mile jaunt.

To keep this string going, while adding to the more than \$60,000 in

donations his runs had generated thus far for crippled children, he decided to return for "one more run around Okinawa."

Besides helping the crippled children on Okinawa, this short 250-mile warm-up will keep him in shape for a longer run he has scheduled in 1983.

"In conjunction with the Shriners of North America," said Knoll, "I will run coast-to-coast, board a plane to Hawaii and then run around the perimeter of Oahu. If things go as planned, this long run could help me realize the dream of raising a million dollars."

The Navy, realizing they were beaten, stopped playing so the



# Marines' gallant efforts rewarded

LUALUALEI, HAWAII — Six-year-old Gwendolyn Rabe has a special reason to celebrate the New Year. After a recent brush with death, the Waianae Elementary schoolgirl is alive and well thanks to the swift actions of two Marine Guards who rescued her from being swept out to sea.

Corporal Gerald Toomey and Lance Corporal Daniel Bruner were recently awarded the Navy Commendation Medal

and the Navy Achievement Medal respectively during a ceremony at the Marine Barracks Guard Company here.

In addition to their military awards, Honolulu Police Chief Francis Keala presented a letter of appreciation to Bruner and awarded Toomey with the Honolulu Police Department's Certificate of Merit. The certificate is the highest award given for heroism to an individual outside of

the police department.

Toomey and Bruner were traveling on Farrington Highway along the Waianae Coast near Keauu Beach when a woman waved frantically for them to stop. The woman, in an apparent state of panic, related to the Marines that one of her children was swept from the beach and was being pulled out to sea.

The two Marines ran to the beach and observed the child's head bobbing from the high surf. Toomey unhesitatingly dove

into the choppy waters, with swells of four to six feet and swam nearly 100 yards to the helpless child then returning her safely to shore. Meanwhile, Bruner kept the mother calm and quickly summoned for an ambulance.

"You know, we all hear about these lifesaving stories, but who would think that I'd be in the middle of all this?" asked Toomey, a 23-year-old sergeant of the guard. "I've never even taken a lifesaving course,"

he added. However, according to Marine swim qualification standards, the North Adams, Mass. native is a first class swimmer.

Toomey's and Bruner's quick reactions definitely saved the girl's life. "We found out afterwards, had we waited a few more seconds the girl would have drowned," said Bruner, a 22-year-old sentry here.

"The swift and selfless actions that day were truly a display of love and concern for a fellow citizen," said

Keala. "I think they were rewarded appropriately and I wouldn't hesitate one minute in recommending these fine Marines to join the police force," he added.

The girl's mother was speechless during the ceremony. However, later she said, "I can't describe how thankful I am to these Marines."

For Gwendolyn, she made a New Year's resolution — learn to swim better. "I'm almost seven years old," she smiled. Indeed she will be.

# Corps cracks down on travel fraud

HQMC, WASHINGTON — The Marine Corps is constantly attempting to control and, hopefully, eliminate fraud, waste and abuse within its organization. One of those continuing efforts deals with the proper filing of travel claims for permanent change of station moves and temporary additional duty.

According to Brigadier General William Etnyre, Deputy Fiscal Director of the Marine Corps, here, the move is on to reduce costs and

reemphasize control procedure to help eliminate errors in travel claims.

"ONE OF THE BIG opportunities for problems regarding fraud, waste and abuse, is the moving of people under either PCS or TAD orders," he stated. "A good part of the expense involved in both these types of activities culminates in a voucher that's filed by the individual Marine for reimbursement of expenses involved. Therefore, the potential for fraud

is present on numerous occasions."

Payment of a travel claim by the local disbursing officer doesn't mean that the audit and review of the claim is final. The travel voucher will remain susceptible to further audit by other agencies, both internal and external to the Marine Corps. If during any of these audits it is determined that misrepresentation of facts or fraud exists, the member involved will be required to repay any undue monies and face possible

prosecution on criminal charges.

GIVEN THE SERIOUSNESS of such misrepresentation, two main functions are in place to help alleviate the problem. A quality control function was established in 1977 at the Marine Corps Finance Center in Kansas City to randomly validate selected travel claims, forwarded from Corps-wide disbursing offices. If inconsistencies are found that could be construed as fraudulent, the claims are turned over to the

Naval Investigative Service for further review and possible prosecution under the Uniform Code of Military Justice. If convicted for submitting a fraudulent travel claim, a Marine can be fined not more than \$10,000 or be confined not more than five years, or both. Thus far this year, 79 such claims have been referred to NIS, and according to fiscal officials here, the numbers are increasing.

The Marine Corps' Disbursing On-site Examination Teams are other weapons used in the battle against fraud, waste and abuse. Under control of the Fiscal Director of the Marine Corps, here, there are two teams in existence, located at Camp Pendleton and Camp Lejeune.

throughout the Marine Corps, the teams look at pay functions of local disbursing offices and randomly select and screen travel vouchers for the legality and propriety of the claim.

In any given year, the Marine Corps will handle more than 225,000 travel vouchers from Marines, covering a wide spectrum of expenses. Given that large number of claims, the possibility exists for fraud of

fraud to occur. The Corps has taken steps to halt that rising problem, and though the programs are not new, they are, however, a refined and coordinated effort. As one fiscal official here stated, "This is not a witchhunt; rather, it's a renewed emphasis on eliminating fraud, waste and abuse where travel claims are concerned."



# Service members field test new M-16A1E1 rifle

QUANTICO, Va. — Braving the snow, hail and rain which poured down upon Quantico, a select group of Marine and Army shooters swept down on Weapons Training Battalion to field test the Colt Industries' modified M-16A1E1 service rifle.

Twenty Marines (representing Camp Pendleton and Camp Lejeune) along with 10 Army personnel from Fort Benning, Ga. began firing the weapon at Range 3 recently as part of a series of exercises designed to test the rifle in every possible way.

"The object of the test is to try and evaluate the rifle to see if it is operationally effective and to find out if it is better than the M-16A1,"

said Major Bruce Wincenten, test director for the project. "We really want to see if the changes are improvements or not."

The testing being conducted here will be separated into eight different courses which will be held over a period of about three weeks. During the testing, both rifles will be pitted against each other and the results will be analyzed by both the Marine Corps and the Army, who've also expressed an interest in the weapon.

"Seven of the 12 events will be live fire courses," added Maj Wincenten. "Most of these will occur at WTBn with others being conducted at Combat Town, TBS (The Basic School) and OCS (Officer Candidate School)."

The servicemen will be firing the standard K-D course, a field range course, a modified infantry trophy team course, a long range course of 600 to 800 yards an unknown distance field course, a night firing course and a fire distribution-suppressive fire test, among others. Firing will be both semiautomatic and automatic when specified for the test.

The modified rifle has several unique changes which, if shown to be improvements, will enhance the firepower of the infantry.

The barrel of the rifle is heavier both in achieving a modified twist designed to handle a Belgian-SS109 round. The Belgian round proved to be the best round tested at the NATO trials and is expected to replace the current round.

The front sight post is square with the settings for windage and elevation now located on the rear sight. This will allow Marines to set their elevation and windage by using knobs located on the rear sight.

The flash suppressor has been done away with and replaced with a muzzle break compensator which will reduce the amount of jump in the barrel after firing.

Another change is in the stock and the hand guards. Colt has used a stronger material for the two areas while, at the same time, redesigning the hand guards to make them more easier to take off and put back on.

Perhaps the most significant change in the weapon is in the

firing mode. The new weapon no longer has a fully automatic mode. The modified M-16 utilizes a short burst control mechanism which allows the shooter to shoot three rounds bursts with each trigger pull.

Besides these changes, Colt Industries also saw fit to include a brass deflector to prevent ejected shells from striking left-handed shooters in the facial area.

When the shooting began some of the test personnel were already praising the changes in the rifle.

"It's quite an experience to fire this weapon," said Corporal James Reid, from the 6th Marines out of Camp Lejeune. "I think the heavier barrel improves

marksmanship. So far, my scores have risen considerably."

The testing still has a way to go before any reports can be formulated for review but Maj Wincenten is optimistic and quite pleased with the group, of Marines and soldiers he has working with him.

"I think it's going quite well," he said. "I'm also pleased with the enthusiasm of everyone involved with the testing."

While the Firepower Division, Development Center, is far away from making a decision on, the merits of the modified M-16, they will keep on charging forward in their efforts to provide the ground Marine with the best fighting equipment he can possibly have.

## Labor Department programs aid armed forces

# Act assures re-employment protection for servicemen

WASHINGTON (NES) — If you are due for separation in the near future and if you were employed before joining the Armed Forces, then this information is for you: The Military Selective Service Act of 1967, as amended by Public Law 90-491, gives re-employment protection to ex-service members and reservists who leave jobs, private employers or the federal government for periods of up to five years to perform military duties.

If you left a job and are interested in re-employment, you must apply to your pre-service employer within 90 days if you were inducted, enlisted or recalled to extended active duty for training in excess of 12 consecutive weeks. The law provides that you shall be reinstated in your position with each seniority, status, pay and vacation as you would have had if you had not been absent for such training. So, no matter what

you now think you wish to do in civilian life, you should find out first what your pre-service employer has to offer; the seniority you accrued during military service may entitle you to other employment benefits. However, you may have some difficulty determining the extent of your rights, since many changes may have taken place during your absence.

Also, your employer may not be familiar with his or her

obligation under these statutes. To assist you both in achieving a clear understanding of this act, the Department of Labor, through its Office of Veterans' Re-employment Rights, is responsible for providing information.

The Labor Department also has several other programs that are set up to assist those veterans returning to the civilian work force. These include assistance in finding

your first job, locating a new job, information about training programs available to prepare you for suitable employment and obtaining unemployment compensation while you are looking for work.

Reservists must satisfy the following criteria in order to gain protection under this law:

- You must request a leave of absence from your employer before leaving to perform any type of duty that

exceeds 12 consecutive weeks, and your employer must grant the leave requested. You must also keep your employer informed

about your scheduled weekly and weekend drills.

• If your return is unavoidably delayed, you must apply to

your employer for reinstatement at the beginning of your next regularly scheduled work day.

If you or your

employer have any questions about re-employment, contact the nearest Office of Veterans' Re-employment Rights.

## Alien registration bill

Aliens may no longer be required to register with the Immigration and Naturalization Service every year, if a bill that has already been passed by Congress is also signed by President Ronald Reagan.

According to L.H. Dahlin, District Director of the Immigration Service here, the President is expected to sign the bill within a few days. This bill, if passed, will eliminate the requirement for non-citizens who are in the United States, Puerto Rico, Guam or in the Virgin Islands Jan. 1, to report their address to the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January.

Dahlin cautioned that even if the bill is signed by the president, aliens must still advise the Immigration and Naturalization Service of any change in address within 10 days of the move.

He was sentenced to two months restriction, forfeiture of \$250 pay per month for three months and reduction to sergeant.

**Lance Corporal Eddie Reza,** 3d Battalion, 3d Marines, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unauthorized absence from Sept. 9 till Sept. 11, 1981, from 5:30 a.m. Sept. 15 to 3:45 p.m. Sept. 16, 1981, from Sept. 25 till Sept. 29, 1981, and from Nov. 20 till Nov. 30, 1981.

He was sentenced to

one month confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$300 pay per month for one month and reduction to private.

Arena,** 3d Battalion, 3d Marines, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unauthorized absence from 7:30 a.m. Aug. 25 till 8:30 a.m. Aug. 26, 1981 and from Aug. 27 till Sept. 18, 1981; for disobeying lawful orders of a non-commissioned and staff non-commissioned officer; and of willful damage of window screens, military property of the U.S. government.

He was sentenced to five months confinement at hard labor and forfeiture of \$20 pay per month for four months.

# Maintenance Division keeps Station in shape

The Maintenance Division of the Facilities Department is perhaps the largest civilian work force on the Air Station. Comprised of approximately 148 civilians and 17 Marines, the division is tasked with all maintenance and repair of public works and utilities, operation of utilities systems, compliance with safety regulations and, virtually everything else dealing with the Marine Corps' facilities maintenance management system.

Headed by Major Anthony Motto, four branches make up the Maintenance Division: Maintenance and Repair, Utilities, Maintenance Control, and Facilities Support.

The Maintenance Repair Branch performs all carpentry, painting, millwork, rodent control and the upkeep of the Station's roads and grounds. The duties of the Utilities Branch include scheduling of downtime for maintenance and overhaul of utilities systems, and provides assistance for control inspections.

All common utilities such as electric, water, steam, gas, fuel, oil, alarm systems, galley equipment, refrigeration units, sanitary systems and government-owned fire programs, are also under the cognizance of this branch.

Facilities Support, where the 17 Marines work, manages the military maintenance unit and the Station Self-Help Program, which is not related to the housing self-help. This service is primarily for industrial areas. The branch oversees many special command ad hoc programs, particularly those that enhance the health, morale and welfare of Marine Corps and their families.

Rounding out the division is the Maintenance Control Branch, which can be considered as the heartbeat of the division. This is where long and short range maintenance plans, workload assignments and emergency service work is initiated. According to Mai Motto, more than 19,000 trouble calls are handled by the branch each month.





# Councils provide communication

A world community can exist only with communication, which means something more than extensive shortwave facilities scattered about the globe. It means common understanding, a common tradition, common ideas and common ideals."

Robert M. Hutchins Common understanding is the goal of the Kaneohe Bay (subarea) Health Care Consumers' Council and the Family Housing Advisory Council. Communication is the vehicle that transports the exchange of ideas and ideals necessary to that understanding.

The Family Housing Council is composed of volunteer representatives from the Air Station family housing and key Air Station staff officials. These staff officials include: the Air Station Commanding Officer, Housing Officer, Station Inspector, Provost Marshal and Maintenance Manager.

Major Robert Hohman Jr., Housing Officer, said the volunteer representatives are usually

dependent spouses living in family housing and represent a cross section of enlisted and officer housing. He added that the council needs representatives from the junior enlisted quarters and from company grade officers quarters.

Why should a Family Housing Council exist?

"Sometimes we (Air Station Officials) see with tunnel vision," David Simon, Housing Project Manager said, "but the representatives have a different perspective and fresh ideas. We are trying to humanize the program here and assist people who live in housing. The council provides us with a two-way street in communication."

The council is advisory in nature and doesn't direct managerial policy, but it takes seriously and many of the ideas aired at council meetings are implemented.

According to Kathy Derringer, Family Housing Advisory Council Chairperson, one project that resulted from the council meetings was the installation of

playground equipment in four different housing areas.

It was brought to the council's attention that children who lacked a safe place to play were using the streets as playgrounds.

The problem was discussed and solutions were examined. The result of these actions was the installation of appropriate equipment.

The council is primarily concerned with this type of broad spectrum issue. It is also concerned with services provided to housing residents, the appropriate implementation of future services, and those policies and practices which impact on services.

Individual complaints should be voiced through the appropriate station agency, and if necessary brought to the attention of housing area representatives who can direct the best activity for the solution of the problem.

Health care problems can be resolved through the Health Care Consumer Council.

"The Council was

established to provide an official mechanism by which the established lines of communication can be enhanced between health care providers and consumers of the Navy's health care services within the Kaneohe Branch Clinic," said Lieutenant Commander Walter Roberson, Administration Officer at the clinic. "It is designed to keep consumers abreast of the clinic's capabilities through two-way communication."

The health care council is composed of the Air Station Commander, Senior Medical Officer and appropriate medical command representatives, dependent representatives and tenant command representatives.

LCDR Roberson encourages concerned consumers who are interested in the quality of health care aboard the Air Station to participate in the council.

He said that the council handles problems in the same

manner as the housing council. In addition, the council has established two suggestion boxes in the clinic. One is located in the dependent clinic and the other is in the television area by the emergency room.

The boxes are locked and the keys are controlled by the chairperson of the council. The council reviews the suggestions before it meets and takes appropriate action.

The Health Care Consumers' Council meets bi-monthly on the second Friday of the month at 9 a.m. in the conference room at the Kaneohe Branch Clinic.

The Family Housing Advisory Council meets on the third Friday of each month at 9 a.m. in the classroom at the Family Service Center.

Active participation is important to the two councils. It takes people with an active interest in the Air Station community to communicate and accomplish the councils' goals.

## Indoor Christmas gardens bring year-round joy

The symmetrical branches





- $\frac{1}{2}$  cup confectioner's sugar

In top of double boiler, melt chocolate over hot (not boiling) water; remove from heat.

Stir in coconut rum liqueur and corn syrup until mixture is smooth.

In large bowl, combine graham cracker crumbs, almonds and confectioner's sugar.

Add chocolate mixture; mix well.

Press into an 8-inch spring-form pan.

Chill 2 hours until firm. Remove from pan.

Spread with Chocolate Glaze. Chill 1 hour until glaze sets.

For snowflake pattern, place paper doily over torte.

Sprinkle with confectioner's sugar. Carefully remove doily.

YIELD: 10 to 12 servings.

## Chocolate Glaze

- 2 squares (2 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate
- 1 tablespoon light corn syrup
- 2 teaspoons CocoRibe coconut rum liqueur

In top of double boiler, melt chocolate over hot (not boiling) water; remove from heat.

Blend in corn syrup and coconut rum liqueur; mix well.

YIELD: About  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup glaze.

## The historic origins of the modern Christmas card

Christmas cards originated with an English nobleman who yearly wrote Christmas letters to friends and family.

One year—1843—he didn't have the time, and so commissioned an artist to design a card to which he could just add a note. By the 1860's Christmas cards had caught on in England, and shortly afterward crossed the ocean to America.

Today Americans exchange some 3 billion Christmas cards each year. What with the rising prices of cards and postage, it's a custom that can be costly. No wonder so many people are now making their own.



Here are a few ideas, which are easy and fun to make:

First, find envelopes, then cut colored paper or card stock to fit. For a design, cookie cutters are one quick and sure trick, especially for the novice designer.

Trace a single tree or star, or make a pattern of several. Fill in the outline with scraps of fabric, glitter, bits of pretty giftwrap, whatever. You could accent the outline by glueing on contrasting glitter or yarn.

Here is another idea: You can make shiny paint by mixing

Elmer's Glue-All and food coloring. Mix in small applicator bottles of Elmer's—red in one, green in another, and so on. Then apply direct from the bot-

tle in dots or lines. Or, mix in small paper cups and apply with toothpicks or paint brushes.

Once you've started card-making, you'll find yourself





# The tale of a Christmas plant: the lovely poinsettia

The Spanish name for poinsettias, *Flor de la Noche-buena* (flower of the holy night), derives from a Mexican legend which holds that the plant originated in a miracle.


As the legend has it, a poor peasant child, ashamed at having nothing to take to a service honoring the nativity of the Christ child, sadly picked a few weeds along the road to give as an offering at the church.

As he knelt at the altar with his humble gift, the child's earnest prayer and tears of reverence transformed the weeds into the flowering plant that has become as much a part of Christmas in this country as the evergreen tree.

Today, poinsettias are still imported from Mexico, though commercial growers in Hawaii and other warm-weather states add to the supply. A careful plant-lover, however, can keep the plant from one season to the next and enjoy its brilliant flowering year after year.

The poinsettia will flourish outdoors during the summer months in most parts of the country, becoming denser with foliage as the weeks of sunshine pass. Prior to putting the plant outdoors, it should be pruned to avoid its becoming too "leggy."

In order to have the plant bloom at Christmastime, poinsettias require equal amounts of daylight and darkness from the first week of October to the second week in November.



Ready or not, there's no denying the arrival of the holiday season once the poinsettia plant begins to make its appearance.

Whether it appears on the cover of a greeting card, in the windows of a local department store, or in a sea of red, pink and white flowers at a roadside nursery, the poinsettia is a sure sign that Christmas is just around the corner.

Although the poinsettia plant is not indigenous to the United States, Americans have come to associate its brilliant red, delicate pink and snowy white bracts with the Christmas season.

This exotic flowering plant, used to decorate homes and churches in Mexico during the Christmas season, was introduced to the United States in 1828 by Dr. Joel Robert Poinsett, at that time the U.S. ambassador to Mexico. Upon returning from his term of service in Mexico, he brought the plants home to his native South Carolina.

Poinsett propagated these plants, which he called "Painted Leaves," in his own greenhouses, and sent cuttings to botanists throughout the country. The plant was later named "Poinsettia" in his honor.

Poinsettias grow wild in Mexico and other areas of Central America, where they are shrubs that can reach 30 feet in height. Their brilliant flowers are most profuse in mid-December.

Wondering what to do on the day after Christmas? Why not invite some guests over, mull over the events of the previous day's celebration, and throw nuts at each other just prior to dinner. This is an old practice which commemorates the feast of St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr, who was stoned to death on December 26.
